Multi-use =

appealing to users in the local vicinity; users arriving on foot; not seeking users from further afield (apart from sports fixtures)

To be an excellent multi-use local park we are all proud of, playing a positive role for local users and the environment

Environment =

positive, visible role for flowers and trees, enhancing the Rec's stress-busting qualities and supporting habitats for bees, butterflies and birds

Excellent =

as good, if not better than the best multi-use local parks (evaluated by Richmond Council user satisfaction surveys)

Playing a positive role =

being an uplifting place to visit – improving the quality of local users' lives; being good neighbours to those who live near the Rec

Rec wins Green Flag Award!

Green [®] Flag Award

The Rec was awarded a Green Flag Award for being an excellent park – July 2018

- Richmond Council entered the Rec into these Awards with input from the Friends Committee - we supplied the Rec Vision, suggested amendments to the Management Plan and Sue Burden + Peter Hart were present when the judges came to inspect the Rec
- Green Flag Awards are are run by the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government with Keep Britain Tidy; they judge against 8 criteria:
 - A welcoming place
 - Healthy, safe and secure
 - Clean + well-maintained
 - Sustainability

- Conservation + heritage
 - Community involvement
 - Marketing
 - Management
- The main benefit to Rec users is it gives us a written Management Plan for the Rec that is agreed by Richmond Council and the Friends Group; this specifies exactly how the Rec is managed e.g. how often litter is collected and the planned tree planting

The outdoor gym in the North Sheen Rec (by North Road entrance) is waiting for you and it's free to use! We are now holding free training sessions for new users, at 10.00am – 11.00am on the first Saturday of each month, from 1st September.



Come along and try out the apparatus – ordinary clothes are fine

NB The equipment manufacturers specify the minimum height to use the equipment safely is 1m 40cm (4ft 7ins)



2018/ 19 Update

- Friends supplied research on awareness of Outdoor Gym
 + proof of training sessions to justify London Marathon Charitable Trust grant
- Second gate direct to path installed May 18
- 4 free training sessions run by Friends volunteers Sept-Dec 2018 – many thanks to Anna Gilbert + Grant Lewison!
- Friends lobbied Richmond Council for the repairs carried out in June 18
- Friends marked 1.4m min height restriction on all equipment + requested appropriate signage

Cross Rider CW-23


A full body cardio workout using the arms and legs simultaneously.

Trees – next phase 3


- Possibly hold a "Tree Fest" event in 2018
- Themed around trees –
 what they do for us / how
 we can encourage them
- To be confirmed volunteers needed

Trees - next phase 1

 We have asked Richmond Council for 3-4 Fruit trees to be planted on the west side of the Rec; these reflect the orchard / market garden history of our area and could be a focus for tree walks

Trees – next phase 2

- Richmond Council's Tree Officer did a survey of the Rec's 98 trees in 2016
- We would like to get permanent identification labels on all trees, so we can create information sheets / guided tree walks
- We would need to get a grant (Tesco's environment fund, etc) to cover the cost of the labels

2018/19 UPDATE

- Richmond Council's Tree Manager promised in 13.2.19 email that "We will of course be planting trees and this will be taking place during March/April."
- Revised proposed location for fruit trees
 group West or South-facing; not East-facing
- Other trees to be planted will be crab apples by Marksbury Avenue entrance
- Deceased trees (rem. = removed):
 - Whitebeams #70 + #71 (disease) rem
 - Laburnham #92 (old age died) rem
 - Prunus Avium Plena #44 (old age + damaged bark) rem
 - Hornbeam #23 (strimmer damage) rem
 - Hornbeam #30 (? Dry Summer died)

Tree Labels Next Actions:

- We agreed to go for Kew Gardens style perspex labels and to do a test one for Richmond Council to OK (cost from current funds)
- Info on label to be common name, Latin name, country of origin and Richmond Council tree ref. number

Trees – next phase 2 **Tree Labels 2018/19 UPDATE**

- Richmond Council's Tree Officer has OKed trial of tree labels, using labels like AluTags or engraved labels from Garden Label & Sign Company and special spring-washer nails (13.2.19)
- Tree information (not in short supply!) and photos need to be collated to create Tree Information Guides and Tree Worksheets suitable for schools
- Funds for labels etc to be sought from supermarket environment funds
- We will start with selected trees and expand the Guide over time



Example Tree Information (currently on our website for a few trees)


Indian Horse Chestnut, Aesculus indica, is native to the lower slopes of the north-west Himalaya, from Afghanistan and Pakistan to western Nepal. In the Himalayas it is one of the dominant trees of deciduous forests, growing alongside oaks, maples, birches and laurels.

It was introduced to Britain in 1851 by Colonel Henry Bunbury, a friend of Sir Joseph Hooker, Director of Kew Gardens from 1865-1885, who planted seeds in his family's Suffolk garden.

Its conkers, inedible and poisonous, come in a smooth and spineless case. They are wrinkled, darker and smaller than that of the standard Horse Chestnut.

2018/19 UPDATE

- Tree Fest idea to be considered for 2020 after phase 2 is complete
- Information worksheets from phase 2 will provide a relevant framework for a Tree Fest event, as well as a long-term resource for Rec users

 We agreed to review the idea of the Tree Fest at our next AGM; current focus for trees is phase 1 and 2



2018/19 Update

- → Following lobbying from Friends Committee, the badly damaged paths by the Marksbury Road entrance and around the junior playground were re-surfaced in June 18; the drainage was also renewed by Richmond Council at cost of c£80k
- → Paths by the Dancer Road gate + in front of Pavilion will need re-surfacing soon

Election of Committee Members



- 16. The Members shall elect a Management Committee ("the Committee"), consisting of a Chair, a Secretary, a Treasurer and not less than three nor more than eight other Members.
- 17. The Committee shall conduct the business of the Group, and may regulate its own meetings from time to time as it considers fit.
- 18. The first members of the Committee shall be elected by a simple majority vote of those persons present and voting at a public meeting of those who have expressed a wish to become Members upon formation of the Group. Those so elected shall hold office until the close of the first AGM. The Chair, the Secretary and the Treasurer shall each hold office until the close of the third AGM, but shall thereafter be eligible for re-election for one or more further fixed terms.
