## **Dear Friends**

Welcome to our spring 2015 newsletter – and a big thank you to everyone who voted for the Duke of Northumberland's River project. We received 1754 votes in total, making it the third most popular project across London, and as a result the project will receive  $\pounds 157,500$  – which is matched against at least  $\pounds 250,000$  further funding from the two councils and other interested parties.

There is more about the DNR improvement proposals below along with updates on other projects and a comprehensive list of summer events.

#### The Duke's River Project

FORCE is part of the steering group to manage this project, which will also include Hounslow and Richmond boroughs alongside Crane Valley Partnership, The Environment Agency and The Isleworth Society. We are currently scoping the project and would love to receive suggestions from you on how to improve the Duke's River

## **Citizen Crane Project**

We are pleased to say that this project has now received funding for a second year of operation, with teams of volunteers monitoring invertebrates and water quality every month at 12 sites up and down the river. We have also extended the project to include a pilot investigation on the condition of drainage outfalls. The Zoological Society of London is running a training day for the project on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> May at the Tower in Crane Park – and this is open to anyone wishing to get involved. ## **Donkey Wood and Brazil Mill**

We have been supporting LB Hounslow and TCV in improvement works to these two sites, upstream of Feltham Marshalling Yards, for the last couple of years. We have now produced a leaflet that includes a large scale map of the sites alongside information on their history and environmental value.

This is the fourth in a series of maps we have helped to produce for the Lower Crane, and we will shortly be starting work on a fifth for the Duke of Northumberland's River. Copies of all these will be available at our events as listed below. We are also running an archaeological walk at this site on 16<sup>th</sup> May.

## **Twickenham Sorting Office & Station Sites**

The new buildings are taking shape on the old sorting office site – and we have seen images from the developer of how the riverside plaza will look – with more bankside vegetation added at



our request. The path through Twickenham Rough, which will transfer into public use as part of this project, remains on target to open in January 2016.

FORCE has also joined a new liaison group for the station re-development. Our focus will be on the new riverside pathway and open space proposed to link the station with Moormead Park. When completed, in 2018, this will provide a riverside walkway linking St Margarets and Twickenham Station to the rest of the Crane valley.

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#### **Richmond College development**

A scheme is due to be submitted as an outline planning application in May. We remain very concerned about the scheme as it stands, specifically the impact upon the Crane corridor of losing public access to the Craneford East Field alongside increased demands on the one remaining public open space in the area from more housing and students. We have set out our concerns to the development consortium, which includes Richmond council, but have yet to see any significant proposals to assess or mitigate the impact for local people and the riverside environment.

#### Poppy Beds and Wild Flower Meadows

We have been working with Richmond council and Heathfied and Trafalgar schools to create

new poppy meadows in Crane Park - look out for them later in the summer. We can also report that Richmond council is re-doing the very popular wild flower meadows in Crane Park as perennial meadows. There is a further new meadow in Kneller Gardens adjacent to the river and railway.

#### **Crane Valley survey**

We will be undertaking our twice annual survey

of visitor numbers on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> July. This survey, carried out over the last three years, has proved immensely helpful in understanding more about the numbers of people using the Crane valley – information that can be used in discussions about resources and funding. We cannot do these surveys without the support of volunteers so - if you are able to help for a couple of hours on this day all you need to do is count people as they pass!- Please let us know via e-mail or telephone.

#### **Volunteer Days and other Events**

We have been working in Crane Park on our last two volunteer days, improving the environmental value of the areas around Butts Farm and the outdoor classroom in the western part of the park.

In June we will be joining volunteer groups up and down the river on the annual big balsam bash – and this will be followed by a barbecue at Twickenham Rifle Club for all our members.
