Dear Friends

CRIME PREVENTION

RHS Hyde Hall Summer Flower Show 2019

As part of a partnership working between Essex Police, the RHS, and Secured by Design we were privileged to have had a show garden designed and built for us at the RHS Hyde Hall Summer Flower Show. We added security measures to the shed and garden whilst the RHS included nature's own security in the form of defensive planting. Defensive planting being that of a spiky and or dense nature that will deter intruders. The show attracted a record 33,000 visitors and I think most them came through the show garden and spoke to us. A big thank you to all of you that dropped by for a chat, some very interesting conversations and I learnt from one that defensive planting goes back to Anglo Saxon times with farmers defending their crops.

It is proving to be a most rewarding partnership for all with each of us gaining from each other's expertise enabling us to provide a better standard of advice to yourselves, as can be seen in the new RHS Hyde Hall's garden security leaflet, which also lists some defensive plants and where to find mature examples of them at Hyde Hall.

Heating Oil

Before it gets to autumn, you may be thinking about topping up your heating oil tank for winter. With the value of fuel ,it is worth considering its security. In the more isolated parts of the countryside, it is primarily domestic properties that have been targeted by the heating oil thieves, but we have also seen such thefts at farms and other businesses.

There are a number of **security devices available** that will help protect your fuel supplies - details of which can be found via your fuel supplier or local plumber's merchant. One such system is Tank Commander from http://www.scrabosecurity.com/ which has "Secured by Design" accreditation, others can be found by searching the member companies at www.securedbydesign.com. These products will detect a dramatic drop in fuel and calls you on the telephone. There are also other systems that can be added on to an existing intruder alarm system, whilst others protect the filler cap and there are, of course, the conventional locks.

Another consideration would be **defensive planting**, **gates or fencing around the tank** concealing and restricting access it. Where possible, locate the tank under lighting in view of lived in rooms within the house.





FOXEARTH & LISTON PARISH COUNCIL

The Council met on 27th July 2019 with Cllr Tony Clayton in the Chair. There were two local residents present.

Councillor vacancies: A policy was agreed to fill the two vacant seats by cooption. Details would appear and applications invited via the Parish News.

Future meetings: Subject to the availability of the Village Hall, meetings were agreed for the following dates - 28th September 2019, 23rd November 2019, 25th January 2020, 21st March 2020, 23rd May2020 (Annual meeting of electors followed by Parish Council AGM, 25th July 2020, 19th September 2020, 21st November 2020.

Closure of "essexinfo.net" web site: It was noted that this site would close in March 2020

Essex County Council report: Apologies were received from Cllr David Finch and a written report of his key messages for 2020 was received. Significant points were:

- A balanced budget This had always been a priority for the Council and 2018/19 had been successful in that respect. To deliver the same in 2019/20 will require savings of £72m because of decreasing support from central government but the Council is on track to achieve a balanced budget again.
- Potholes Between 2015 and 2017 reports of these in the county decreased by 47% bucking national trends. This reflects the hard work and additional resources deployed.
- Reducing air pollution and plastic use working groups have been established to tackle these issues.
- Additional funding has been provided for footway repairs, mental health and homelessness support.
- Essex 2020 is the title of a programme being launched next year to celebrate the County's history as a home for all kinds of arts and sciences. More information as 2020 draws nearer!
- Efficiency and effectiveness a survey of 150 upper tier councils placed Essex 7th for getting best results; in relation to comparably sized councils Essex came top. The survey took account of performance in key areas of children, disability and elderly services, housing and homelessnes, waste and recycling. The fact that ECC have increased Council Tax in only 4 of the last 9 years was also relevant.

The best time to take a cutting ... is when no one is looking.

In September, due I believe to the earth clicking on a point or two on its axis, everything wakes up and starts growing again, and it is a lovely month of clear light, and often warm weather; a good month to be in the garden.

- Once the tassels of sweetcorn turn brown, check that they are ripe for picking: when ripe the kernels contain a milky liquid.
- It is still possible to take cuttings of tender perennials, such as *fuchsia, pelargonium or penstemon* to over-winter under cover.
- Continue to feed and deadhead summer bedding plants: well cared for, they can flower on until the frosts.
- Plan for next year's late summer colour by planting perennials such as *Helenium*, *Helianthus* and *Aster*.
- Leave marrows, pumpkins and winter squashes to ripen on the plants, but harvest before the frosts. Put the fruit on a wooden board or tile, to prevent soiling.
- Plant onion and shallot sets suitable for over wintering; on heavy clay, spring planting might be better.
- Continue harvesting apples and pears, to store in a cool, well-ventilated place.
- Harvest maincrop potatoes, and dry off before storing in a cool, dark, frost-free place.
- Sow winter greens, land cress, mustard spinach, corn salad and hardy lettuce for spring picking.
- Collect seeds from perennials, and dry off before storing.
- Start planting spring flowering bulbs in borders and containers.
- Lift and divide hardy perennials, move evergreen shrubs, and plant new shrubs and trees towards the end of the month.

September is a good month if you are re-thinking your garden, and most things can be moved around easily. It is also the best time to attack vine weevils, as the almost exclusively female species have produced around 1,000 eggs each by the asexual process of parthenogenesis. These will hatch into grubs which nibble the roots of plants, while the parent eats the leaves. Nematodes are the only way, these days, and this is the best time to use them, catching both parents and children. Good luck, but also enjoy the garden – warm, sunny, golden September days are to be treasured.

VILLAGE KITCHEN BY SALLY HAM

EASY SAUSAGE CASSEROLE (ONE POT)

4 portions: Approx 1 hour to cook

Ingredients

1 tbsp olive oil

8 shallots

8 sausages

100g pancetta lardons

1 tbsp plain flour

1 tbsp wholegrain mustard

300g new potatoes

500ml cider

100g runner beans

1 medium courgette

100g frozen peas

Fresh parsley

Dash of double cream

Method

- 1. In a casserole, heat the olive oil and fry the shallots, halved, for 3-4 minutes until they start to caramelise. Add the sausages, each cut into 3 pieces, and the pancetta lardons. Brown for 4-5 minutes, then stir in the plain flour and the wholegrain mustard. Add the new potatoes, halved if large, then pour over the cider.
- 2. Simmer, covered, for 20 minutes. Add the runner beans, cut into 2cm lengths, and the courgette, halved and sliced. Cook for 8 minutes. Season, then stir through the frozen peas, defrosted, chopped fresh parsley and a dash of double cream.

FOXEARTH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

On Monday 12th August, 19 members of the Foxearth History Society had a fascinating day-trip to the Stow Maries Great War Aerodrome, near Maldon.

The aerodrome has the largest known surviving group of Royal Flying Corps buildings on a WWI aerodrome anywhere in the country. See www.stowmaries.org.uk

First opened in 1916, the aerodrome saw the birth of Air Defence in response to the first raids by Zeppelins on London and the southeast. It played a key role during the first London Blitz the following year, continued in its role until Spring 1919, then reverted to agriculture.

A newly formed Trust was able to purchase the land and surviving buildings in 2012, with the plan to save and restore dilapidated buildings, and reopen the site to the public. A small army of volunteers set to work, with stabilisation and reconstruction work being the first tasks.

It is remarkable to see what has been achieved in such a short time: a visitor centre and museum opened, the restored Airmen's Mess now provides lunches and teas and holds private events, and two hangar buildings display seven WWI period replica aircraft (some give flying displays). There are 22 buildings still surviving, that will take millions of pounds to fully restore, so fundraising for the future is another priority.

We were given a tour by a very knowledgeable guide. She explained the aerodrome's buildings and layout, and its role in fighting the German Zeppelins and planes that bombed SE England (including Sudbury) in WWI.

We heard stories of the young pilots who flew their flimsy planes on winter nights, up to 15,000 feet without oxygen - they were often too cold to move on their return to the ground, and had to be carried back to their quarters to recover. And, of course, some did not survive. Of the ten from 31 squadron who died, two were shot down by a Zeppelin, but eight perished in flying accidents: a mid-air collision, faulty maintenance, but often simply a lack of flying experience before being sent to war...

Stow Maries was never attacked in WWI, though in WWII a German aircraft mistakenly bombed the former hanger buildings (then used as cattle sheds), and a number of animals died.

After a hearty lunch in the Airmans' Mess, our group spent some time in the museum. This has been well laid out with everything from post cards, original artefacts and audio-visual displays – it really gave a good understanding of the air war and the "First London Blitz". Even those who felt they knew about this period learnt a lot more. Unfortunately our arrival had been delayed by closure of the only route the local council allow to be signposted, and the minibus Satnav did not offer much help! So many of the group plan to revisit another time – it is well worth it.

Next meeting: Tuesday, 10th September - The History of Cupola House

As I write this at the 11th hour of the editors deadline, we are approaching midway through August, and have about 25 acres of wheat left to combine, along with 120 acres of beans - so we are almost there.

Up until a week ago, and the rain, we had been able to crack on with this years harvest and, so far, we are pleased with the yields and overall quality.

The barley harvest started on the 15th July, with the oilseed rape following on the 23rd July, and wheats coming in on the 3rd of July.

We have sold and moved all the barley, 496 tonnes, similarly the oilseed rape

has been sold and already moved, with a total of 115 tonnes. The wheats are not finished and we are looking at a total yield of approximately 1600 to 1800 tonnes, if the last field runs as well as the others.

With my brother in law, Adrian, busy on the industrial side of the business and Peter, our father in law, out of action due to a hip operation, Thomas and I have tackled the harvest between us.

We have cultivated and recently drilled the oilseed rape and it has had a good soaking with the rain, which may be frustrating from a harvest perspective, but is essential for the rape to get a good start.

On the sheep front, our first few boxed lambs have gone to our customers but, since the really hot

weather, the lambs have stalled in growing on and finishing, so it will be a while before the next batch is ready. This is often described as lambs going into a store period of growth

Al the Blue Texel has been running with the pure Blue Texel ewes since early July so, hopefully, we will have lambs around December/January.

I do have one little moan, and just want to put a point across in a polite manner, as I have the chance to do so in this article - hopefully people will read and understand the reasons behind it.

Down on the Farm continued...

We are lucky to live in a beautiful part of the world, in a rural location and are blessed with many footpaths and rights of way.

In recent years, we have put a lot of time, effort and finance, into creating margins and areas on the farm which create and enhance wildlife habitats, along with corridors for many different species are struggling, especially the insects and ground nesting bird populations.

It is frustrating, and often soul destroying, to see some, not all, dog owners allowing their dogs to roam where they like, often not even on public byways or footpaths, but on parts of the farm that are not. Unfortunately, this can often be to the detriment of the wildlife we are trying to encourage to thrive. So, when you are out for your walk in our wonderful countryside, exercising your loyal pets, please be mindful that there are hidden beauties you may not even be aware of, that could be disturbed by a dog or dogs going about what dogs only do naturally, which could affect their chance to thrive and survive

I hope you've all had a great Summer so far as I look forward to a busy autumn - my favourite season.

Mr and Mrs Martin Stuchfield, once again, offered their spacious grounds as the venue and Melanie Davies generously offered to run the event.


We were fortunate that it was a lovely day once again, and when the gates

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HOSEPIPE BAN?

With all the rain we have had in August, one would expect that our aquifers and reservoirs are full. Sadly not.

We live in the driest county in the UK, yet we continue to produce a significant portion of the breadbasket of England. We may, possibly, be on the verge of drought conditions. Dig down in the earth a couple of inches and one comes across very dry earth - almost dust. The farmers are right to be concerned and to be thankful that rain falls just as a new crop is being drilled to aide its initial burst of growth.

On the other hand, too much rain at harvest times can ruin a crop. You often hear a farmer complain that 'there is not enough' or 'too much' rain. The reality would be an equal amount of rain and sunny days.

Unless we have a magic wand that is never going to happen. But even irrigation is sometimes very difficult because of the shortage of water.

I was surprised to read in the Essex and Suffolk Water Drought Plan 2018 that hosepipe bans no longer exists and have been replaced by a Level 2 Level of Service, in 2010. The Drought Plan splits service action by the water company into Levels which are aimed at conserving what little water there may be in a drought situation.

The Levels of Service become more severe the higher the level:

Level 1 - Appeal for restraint Level 3 - Phase 2 Drought Order

Level 2 - Phase 1 Temporary Water Use Ban Level 4 - Pressure Reduction The level of frequency of the Drought Action is by the likelihood of each action in years e.g. 1 in 10 years (for Level 1) up to 1 in 250 years for Level 4.

Level 1 will call for restraint by consumers. Typically via media advertising or public awareness campaigns. DEFRA's experience is that such Appeals can cut demand by up to 7%. The Level 2 action will restrict water use by consumers for certain activities - watering gardens by hosepipe, cleaning cars with a hosepipe for a temporary period. There will also be the banning of commercial use of water (subject to exemptions e.g. nursery/garden service trade). Banning and exemptions must be proportionate to the prevailing situation and the water consumption of the activity.

Drought Orders will ban those activities temporarily banned under a Level 2 Service with a Pressure Reduction being the ultimate sanction. One hopes that we will never come to that!

Although the use of a garden hose may be part of a service Level 2, it does not prevent the use of watering cans, or prevent any watering of plants, or the use of a bucket of water and a sponge to wash a car.

One of the statistics in the Drought Plan, which was quite astonishing, was that a hosepipe can use over 500 litres of water in an hour. This volume is greater than the total daily consumption of water for the average household.

Our hearts go out to the residents of Whaley Bridge in Derbyshire who suffered a near catastrophe with the threat of a dam collapse following extraordinary rainfall. If only there was a system to pipe excess water from flood risk regions of the country to the more drought prone areas.

The 1976 slogan for that years drought 'Save water, bath with a friend' may be taking matters to an extreme but the underlying message is save water, it's precious.

BIG BORLEY SECRET

One of the best kept secrets of the summer was revealed to the nation in the new Channel 4 series 'Secret Teacher', a new 'fly on the wall' programme exposing the pressures on the state education system. The programme follows a successful entrepreneur who has been placed 'undercover' as a classroom support worker in a school for a period of six weeks. But what does Borley have to do with this?

'Secret Teacher' featured local resident Katherine Just, Deputy Head of Haileybury Turnford Secondary School in Cheshunt. As the programme began Katherine (Kath) gave an interview to camera, which pulled no punches and which exemplified the difficulties that a school, such as hers, face. No funding for additional exercise books, additional teaching staff or any budget for the maintenance of the fabric of the school itself.

Paul Rowlett, a successful entrepreneur and Chief Executive of Leicester based EverythingBranded.co.uk, was selected by producers to 'go under cover'. We learned from the programme that Rowlett struggled when he was at school. On leaving school, he joined the Royal Navy but on his discharge his fortunes took a turn for the worst in the worst possible way - losing his home, sleeping rough - before investing in a lap-top a loan of £500 and his future success. Who better then to encourage, inspire and motivate the pupils at Haileybury.

Part of the programme highlighted the shortage of teachers when an existing teacher had quit, requiring one teacher to attempt teaching a class of 60 pupils. Although the problem of staffing and under funding is not the main point of this four-part series, it is more about about how losers at school can become winners in business. If teachers and schools had more time to teach and nurture their pupils rather than worrying about budget deficits, such a programme need not have been made.

Kath has won plaudits for her no nonsense, no-holds barred take on the depressing state of state education. Telling it as it is, but also showing the

compassion she has for her job, teaching and the care and advancement of her pupils - who all consider her to be a terrific teacher.

Kath placed her head above the parapet to show how every school and every teacher face difficulties in their day-to-day job. Her most telling and important comment of the whole programme. "State education should be the jewel in the crown, really, because these students are the people of the future, and what do we show them? We don't value you. You're not worth that nice new shiny building."

Having already floored Rowlett by telling him that the government's last Budget allocated more extra money to potholes than schools, he simply responded: "I'm really, really shocked." He was then motivated himself to seek out those pupils, who like his old self, were struggling. The result was a notable success for two of the 900 pupils at the school and for the school itself. Rowlett was so impressed (or horrified) by what he saw that he generously donated much needed cash to the school and continuing annual financial help.

Kath will have a valuable scrapbook of critical reviews for her achievements on camera from the Daily Telegraph, to the Times Educational Supplement and beyond.

Some of the reviews suggested that the programme may have been staged because of the presence of the camera in the school looking over Rowlett's shoulder. The answer was that as only Kath and her Headmaster knew of the real reason for Paul Rowlett's presence at the school, the school were told that he was considering changing his career and he was being filmed to see what skills and qualities he would need to work in a school.

Kath's school was chosen from 500 randomly selected schools who were required to register an interest in taking part. The Channel 4 producers obviously could not resist the caring deputy head, who must have presented herself as manna from heaven and a TV audiences delight.

Well done Kath. Thank you for all you do for 'the people of the future' AND thank you all teachers for everything that you do .

Kath's new celebrity status matches that of a former pupil, Laura Trott (Kenny) CBE, cyclist and GB's most successful Olympian.

You can probably still view Kath's episode of Secret Teacher on Channel 4 catch up service.

In Your Defence by Sarah Langford is an absorbing and easy read of the life of a junior Barrister plying her craft in the criminal and family courts. Sarah Langford is, in part, a local writer/Barrister, having a home in Suffolk.

If you ever wanted to know about the nitty-gritty of an advocate's job in the various courts this is the book for you. A comparison could be drawn with 'Secret Barrister' but this brilliant depiction of life at the coal-face of the law is more intimate and less political. Ms Langford's anecdotal glimpse into the human psyche is intriguing. She also lets the reader into her cases as she relates eleven such cases of varying nature from the Crown, Magistrate's and Family courts.

Her clever no nonsense narrative highlights the issues faced by her client, advocates and judges in any trial/hearing setting. Each new case starts with an extract from the section of the law that the chapter concerns. No need for a law degree to understand the law as these are only extracts from the statute concerned with the charge or issue facing her client. As her instructions proceed, the facts are then applied to the law. These are real cases (only the names have been changed) which are life changing in so many ways.

What also comes across is the vast amount of work that is put into her cases and which, in large part are conducted for legally aided clients. Inevitably there is an honestly held comment (in common with 'Secret Barrister') that junior Barristers are effectively being paid less than the minimum wage for what they do - and when you think that the work she does is life changing in so many ways it is shocking that she is paid so poorly.

I can guarantee that 275 pages will fly by and you, dear reader, will have enjoyed this excellent book giving a real insight into the wheels of justice.

The Hundred Year Old man who climbed out of the window and disappeared by Jonas Jonnason is an absorbing read and well worth a few humorous hours turning the pages.

The premise for the story, translated from Swedish, is the impending 100th birthday party being given of Allan, a resident of an Old Peoples Home. The Mayor and many dignitaries and press are in attendance waiting for Allan to come and blow out his candles. The last thing Allan wants is a party and definitely not to blow out any candles. He chooses instead to climb out of his window and escape what he considers the worst party ever.

Wearing his 'pee-slippers' he makes his way to the local bus station. From here the story takes off and he meets some intriguing characters on his journey to escape the party. Unfortunately, Allan draws the attention of some rough criminal types and ultimately the police who are looking for him, not because he has necessarily gone missing but also because he has been implicated in the ultimate crime.

During his one hundred years Allan has achieved many things and met many people. This is the sub-plot of the search for the missing birthday boy.

The story is well told, amusing and gentle. I could not help thinking that I would like to meet Allan such an active man for a centenarian! Perhaps he is related to Forest Gump?


Our House by Louise Candlish is a roller coaster of a ride of emotions and is, perhaps, the ultimate page turner. At many places in the journey, one might be able to work out what-is-going-to-happen-next BUT you will be blown away by the final denouement.

Fi and Bram live in a desirable area of South London; they purchased their house when prices were not as expensive as today; they are raising their two sons there, and enjoy the camaraderie of the street on which they live. They are a happy family. Then, you guessed, something happens which changes lives forever.

This is not a typical read of its kind though. The story is told in the third person narrative, and also the first person of the main protagonists - one by way of a podcast and the other via a WORD document being drafted on a computer. The idea of relating a story via a podcast in a book is new to me and really works - there are even comments posted by listeners as to their thoughts and concerns!

An event occurs which snowballs out of control and the more one of the characters attempts to smooth things over, the worse it gets. This is a book you have to read. I cannot tell you more about the plot else I will spoil the excitement of a really good read. You cannot afford NOT to read this book even if you have to queue at the library, bookshop or wait for your Ebook to download.

The writing is solid, the research is spot-on and the events very real. Reviews elsewhere describe the book as "addictive, twisty and oh so terrifyingly possible". Don't take the reviewer's word, or mine - read this book!
