When you get this magazine at the start of April we will have said goodbye to Revd Sally and some of us are going to her licensing service at Christ Church Milton next Gravesend on 13th April at 2pm. GARAGE & SHED SECURITY

Whilst most houses have adequate security what is often neglected is the shed or garage, "nothing much in there" I hear you say, "Just a garden spade and fork", but these are perfect tools for a burglar to use to get into your house. Adds insult to injury when the tool used to break into your house is your own, so give it some attention.

Garages and sheds by the nature of their construction and position, especially when away from the house, are always going to be vulnerable. Quite often the supplied locks provide just the barest minimum security and are easily overcome so, always consider supplementing the existing locks with further locking systems both for the doors and items within.

On **garage** doors this could be by adding locking bolts to both sides of the "up and over door" or a garage door defender in the ground in front of the door, if you have side door don't forget the security on this too.

With **sheds** coach-bolt and plate the padlock hasp sections to the frame and door, use a good quality "Close Shackle" padlock or a key operated mortice lock; don't forget the hinges - ensure they cannot be unscrewed.

Consider using "Ground Anchors" or "Shed Shackles" to chain larger items such as ladders, mowers and pedal cycles to (again good quality padlock and chain); keep chains tight so that it is not in contact with a surface it can be struck against. Protect windows with a wire mesh and fit a curtain or white wash the windows to prevent prying eyes.

Visibly security mark your property with your post code and house number as this reduces the value to the thief; you can register serial numbers free of charge at www.immobilise.com. There are also a number of commercially available security marking systems available that are suitable for a wide range of products and others for specific products.

It is also worth adding security lighting and a shed alarm to the shed or garage, there are even alarms available that when activated call your mobile phone, these are relatively inexpensive and available from most DIY/hardware stores. If siting a new shed, where possible position it within sight of rooms in the house routinely occupied.



There will be a training session, led by Vaughan Preston, to teach villagers how to use the defibrillator, recently installed on the wall at Foxearth Village Hall.



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VIVIENNE NORAH HASTIE 1928 – 2019



Just three and a half months after we paid our final respects to her husband Jim, we assembled again at the West Suffolk Crematorium on 27th February to celebrate the life of Vivienne who died on 19th January 2019. Thus ended a 66-year association with Foxearth village for this well-known and greatly respected couple. An affectionate eulogy compiled by the family was read at the service.

Vivienne was born in December 1928 in Glemsford to Ethel and Walter Brown: she was their fourth and final child with brothers Henry (usually known as Harry), Clifford and sister Eva. She often recalled to her family, walking to her primary school with its Victorian stove and describing the friends she made - a very early one being Molly who stayed in touch for 85 years to share many birthdays and visits. Other memories from those days were the amount of walking and cycling that had to be done and the worry that her mother felt when Clifford joined the Royal Air Force, and the relief when the war ended and he resumed civilian life. Vivienne played her part in the war effort by knitting socks for soldiers. Marriage to Jim took place at Glemsford church in September 1953 and a long and rewarding life together was marked by a 65th anniversary last year. Moving to Huntsmans after their wedding Vivienne quickly became immersed in village life. She attended Foxearth church every Sunday and helped with cleaning and flower arranging and she delivered the Parish News by bicycle. To the delight of the couple's daughters, Judith and June, duly arrived. In addition to caring for her family, Vivienne's particular strengths were careful housekeeping and an ever cheerful approach to hard work and economy: qualities which Jim shared. As Jim often worked long days on the farm during harvest time, Vivienne decided that learning to drive would make life a bit easier and Jim's limitations as an instructor were no deterrent! Vivienne's patience won and she eventually taught her daughters to drive. Living on the outskirts of the village could have been lonely but Vivienne was a true countrywoman joining in so many activities. She collected for Cancer Research and the British Legion Poppy Appeal, was an active member of the Over 60s Club and the Women's Institute, taking Scottish country dancing, baking, dress and hat making, preserves, trips and outings all in her stride. If elderly neighbours needed a helping hand, Vivienne was there for them. Fetes, coffee mornings, bring and buy sales etc all benefitted from her willingness to help. She was also captain of the WI darts team - and not a lot of us knew that! In due course, grandchildren came along which meant meeting Simon and Rebecca from school and visiting Anna, Lucy and Charlie where they lived in France. Vivienne was a hands-on grandmother, never too busy to baby-sit, give cooking lessons, knit jumpers and a multitude of other helpful tasks. Until old age made it difficult Vivienne was a regular borrower at the fortnightly (now, alas, less frequent) library van where we would always have a chat about local issues.



NEWS FROM FOXEARTH MEADOWS NATURE RESERVE

Update on the cattle

There are just two Dexters on the Meadows at the moment: a heifer called Wander and a bullock called Mars. They are both pretty placid and gentle. It's important, of course, that visitors to the reserve keep dogs on leads to avoid disturbing the cattle and the wildlife there. Over the spring and summer the cattle will be kept on the part of the reserve which is mainly drier riverside meadow leading up to the northern corner (towards the old railway embankment). This is to allow the vegetation to grow freely in the remaining part of the reserve during the nesting and breeding season for birds. An electric fence is now in place, which stretches across the reserve, but, as we want visitors to still be able to walk the lovely riverside route, Mark and volunteer helpers have constructed a cunning combination of stile and lifting gate, the latter wide enough for wheelbarrows and also to help dog-walkers and those who would find the stile difficult to negotiate. The whole job was done using scavenged and upcycled materials and I was impressed with the result!

Pond-dipping platforms

We very much hope the reserve will become a great outdoor learning resource for local schools. Working towards this, Mark and the Friday volunteers have built a handsome pond-dipping platform on the Island pond. A small section of sturdy DIY boardwalk along the western perimeter pathway gives another pond-dipping opportunity on some shallower pools.

A really helpful grant from the Foxearth Church & School Foundation is enabling us to equip with pond-dipping nets and inspection tanks.

We have taken invitations to visit the reserve to all the local schools, and we are hoping there will be a good uptake. We would love to see more young people enjoying the outdoors and nature and learning about caring for the environment.

FIREWOOD

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VILLAGE KITCHEN BY SALLY HAM

CHOCOLATE FONDANT

AN EASTER TREAT

INGREDIENTS:

200g dark chocolate, 70 per cent cocoa solids, broken up 150g unsalted butter, plus a little extra for greasing 150g caster sugar Pinch of salt 4 large eggs, beaten 25g plain flour

TO SERVE:

1 tablespoon icing sugar Whipped cream

METHOD:

- 1. Heat the oven to 180°C/fan oven 160°C/mark 4. Grease and base-line a 22cm spring-form cake tin. Melt the chocolate and butter in a mixing bowl placed over a saucepan of barely simmering water. You can melt the chocolate and butter in a microwave for about 1½ minutes but do it in stages, stirring 2-3 times, so as not to overheat the chocolate.
- 2. Cool a little, then stir in the sugar, salt and beaten eggs. Finally, stir in the flour. Pour into the prepared tin and bake for 20 minutes. The centre should feel a little soft but there should not be a wobble. Take out of the oven and cool in the tin on a wire rack for 20-30 minutes. Release the sides but keep the cake on the base as it is fragile at this temperature. For a slightly more solid cake you can leave it for a couple of hours at room temperature before serving. Dust with icing sugar before serving.

Braintree District Council has agreed to take part in the second phase of Voter ID trials in relation to the Braintree District's Town and Parish elections on 2 May 2019. This means that every elector voting at a polling station in the Braintree District will need to show either one piece of photo ID or two pieces of non-photo ID before they are given their ballot paper.

All electors will be required to present means of identification from those prescribed by the Cabinet Office. Anyone not providing the correct ID will not be able to vote.

Any elector who does not have a means of identification from the prescribed list will have the opportunity to contact the Electoral Services Department at Braintree District Council and apply for an Electoral Identity Document.

All the details residents need to be aware of can be found on our website at www.braintree.gov.uk/voterid

We will also be informing the public in numerous ways such as newspaper adverts, bus shelters, direct mail to all households, as well as digital advertising including social media.

Key messages

- You need to bring ID to vote in local elections at polling stations on 2nd May 2019
- You need to bring the correct form of ID check the list at www.braintree.gov.uk/voterid
- You can bring either one piece of photo ID or two pieces on non-photo ID. One piece on non-photo ID must have the voter's current address check the list
- Don't worry if you haven't got any ID or any of the ID listed you can apply for a free Electoral Identity Document just call our Elections team who will be able to help you.
- All ID documents must be originals or a certified copy.

Spring should be here now, so let's enjoy it. I do hope that we have not already had it, with the mild days in February. Everything is blooming, and growing like mad, so there is work to be done.

- Plant container-grown trees and shrubs. Water well an hour before doing so and avoid planting too deep; the first roots should be just below the surface.
- Start looking for aphids on the shoot tips of roses. Squash before spraying, if you can.
- Move self-sown foxglove seedlings to a better position once they have 4 leaves, and water in.
- Make sure that hard-wood cuttings taken over the winter, and coming into leaf now, do not dry out.
- Sow annuals that prefer to be direct-sown such as *gypsophilia* and *larkspur* in a weed-free bed.
- Plant up an alpine trough with a mix of equal parts John Innes no.2 compost and coarse grit, and top with a 2 cm layer of decorative grit. Alpines can bear a lot of cold, but very little wet, so the trough needs to be well-drained.
- Prune shrubby herbs such as sage, and trim lavender to 1 inch below the old flower stalks.
- Direct-sow vegetable seeds of calabrese, kohlrabi, cauliflower, carrot, peas, radish and chard.
- In late April sow the under-glass crops, runner beans, pumpkin and squash, to plant out after the last frost in May.
- Inspect gooseberry bushes for sawfly larvae, which become active this month, and squash.
- Fleece small and wall-trained fruit trees against late frosts.
- Plant chitted second early and main crop potatoes in prepared beds.
- Remove the spring flowers of perpetual strawberries, for larger fruit later.

Try not to be fooled by the weather: we can still get some hard frosts. Keep watering if things become dry, and don't be tempted to buy border and container annuals until mid-May at the earliest. Of course they are in all the supermarkets, but that is just commercialism. Hold back, and you won't be disappointed.

The Brexit (Acquired Properties (Rural & Inlets) Licensed for Offloading Organic Lamb) Regulations No.4.


Such an innocent title hides some alarming news for our villages which will, no doubt, increase traffic through our quiet country lanes as people rush to snap up bargains galore.

Thanks to all members who helped by writing reports, providing refreshment, setting up the room and managing the web site were voiced by Ashley. Particular mention was made of Lynda and Clare who run the Society so expertly. On the question (by Clare) of whether we needed a larger committee the unanimous view seemed to be not to change a winning team - and a substitute's bench would be superfluous! Ashley expressed his delight at the vibrancy of the Society citing members' contributions such as John Geddes' research into Foxearth burials, Corinne Cox's archaeological test pit excavations and Isobel Clark's memorial stones work.

Evacuation to Buckinghamshire during the conflict saw him (aged seven) fishing and - under the influence of a very much older colleague -smoking a

After Walthamstow Technical College Alan worked for a time at a division of J Arthur Rank where he was fortunate to meet such celebrities as Edmundo Ros and the boxer Freddie Mills and it was here that a fascination with cinematic technology developed. Called up for National Service Alan opted for the Royal Air Force signing for 4 years on the promise that he could follow his interest in mechanical engineering. He became a crack rifle shot, He met the love of his life, Jo, they married in 1958 and were blissfully happy until she sadly died. Alan later married again and this wife encouraged him to practise faith healing - a talent he had not discovered! And this is the point at which the narrative ended. Surely, Alan, there's more to come - at least another instalment. We wait with bated breath as an appreciative audience demonstrated.

Well it has been a pretty busy few weeks since we began lambing. The first 10 shearlings all lambed with no real disasters and, as I write this, we are up to 40 ewes that have all lambed and only 4 to go - all carrying twins.

I have to say that tiredness from lack of sleep is kicking in but which, I have to admit, has helped when it comes to trying to catch up with the latest goings on with Brexit as I tend to fall asleep whenever it rears it's ugly head on the news !!!!

Much to my youngest daughter Holly's delight, we have 5 lambs on the bottle which are currently being fed 4 times a day.

Apart from some showers and a few windy days with added rain, we have turned the ewes and lambs out as soon as possible once they are mothered up and feeding well.

On the arable front, keeping pigeons off the oilseed rapes has been another job that can not be left or forgotten at this critical stage of growth, otherwise the yield will be affected come harvest.

The rapes are having their last applications of Nitrogen at the minute, as are the winter barleys.

Two fields of winter wheat that have some areas of blackgrass have had a dose of spray to try and knock it back, to give the wheat a chance to grow away and, hopefully, smother it.

This will be followed by the other wheats having a spray application to suppress grasses, and any other broad leaved weeds, that are present. Once this has been done, the wheats will receive another 80kgs of

Nitrogen to give them a kick on as the temperatures begin to rise.

That should keep me busy for the rest of March and into April then it will be more fertiliser and some fungicide sprays on most of the cereals and rapes to keep them clean and healthy as they move through their growth stages

Look forward to filling you in on more goings on next month

Careless Love - Peter Robinson The end of this book leaves the reader with the impression that there is another to come to finish what has been started! That might sound odd for a Peter Robinson novel, particularly as this is his 25th DI Banks. Although he has neatly tied up the ends of a specific crime, there are a lot of 'ends' left which I am sure will lead to a cracking 26th novel.

This police procedural involves the mysterious death of a student found behind the wheel of a car in the Yorkshire Dales. She did not own the car or drive, there are no injuries and the car has not been involved in an accident. Some way away (miles) the body of a middle aged man is found - he looks to have stumbled down a step bank - or was there something more sinister that brought about his death?

Banks gets involved and we meet up with the usual characters in the series, as well as DI Cabot's dad's new girlfriend, Zelda. Zelda has had an interesting past and an even more interesting present in terms of her work in helping to identify people traffickers and prostitution rings.

There are copious references to music (which is a trademark of Robinson's novel) which can be a tad irritating at times, but also great references and descriptions of Yorkshire. For a man who has lived in Canada for the majority of his life, Robinson can evoke a Yorkshire scene better than a Two Ronnie's sketch.

It may not be Robinson's best novel. It is worthy of a read and, if nothing else, it will act as an aide memoir for the next in the series.

Pinocchio Brief by Abi Silver is a very good court room thriller by this first time writer formerly a solicitor, so knows the legal system very well.

As the title might suggest, the background to the plot lines involves lies, or more particularly detecting lies. Experienced advocates may be able to spot lies being told on the witness stand but it is how those lies are interpreted that really matters and how the lawyer will convince a jury that they are or not.

Judith is a very experienced and celebrated barrister who is on the cusp of hanging up her wig. She has wound down her practice and intends to turn her back on the law for good. Judith has a very prickly personality. Enter Constance, a solicitor on the frontline of defending the nations criminals. Constance has been consulted by the mother of a boy who has been accused of the murder of a house master at his school.

The boy, from a working class family who has been fortunate to attend a public school, is obsessed by detail. His intelligence is such that the mundane 'difficult' problems are boring to him and too simple to solve but he has set himself a task and although he is uncommunicative he sets his legal team an almost impossible task.

ROADSIDE NUISANCES

Every year brings a new crop - and a recurrence of old ones - of those hazards to motorists and cyclists that lead to vehicle damage and extreme annoyance. This is not referring to misleading signs, over-grown hedges or kamikaze pedestrians but to the danger of potholes. Essex County Highways Department obviously have a budget to deal with the problem but it is a never ending task, and it is understood that a new way of tackling the issue is under consideration.

PIRAMS (Pothole identification, registration and monitoring system) is a concept to get you - the suffering public - involved in something that is, if not on your doorstep, then perhaps close to your front garden. "Adopt a pothole" was the first title given to the project but there were legal questions about the implied possession so that was tarmac ed over!

What PIRAMS requires is that you report a pothole to the Highways Department, who will then provide you with a document which you need to complete; the design of this is presently being drawn up by a committee but it will probably not be more than six to eight pages. It will be accompanied by a little pot of yellow paint for you to encircle your find. You will be asked to measure the hole including the depth and draw a map to show its precise location. In return you will be given a tracking number allowing you to keep abreast of its progress in the Highways Department scheme of things. You will be asked to report, via the dedicated web site, changes in the hole.

There is, of course, a reporting procedure already for bringing potholes to the notice of the ECC but PIRAMS is an attempt to make it more hands-on and more satisfactory for you. Apart from the sense of valuable public service that this will induce you are probably wondering what's in it for you. Well, various rewards have been suggested - but not, alas, a percentage discount off your Council Tax. You may be offered a one-to-one tutorial with environmental staff on how they deal with bed bugs or perhaps a 4am free ride in a gritter. Well - keep hoping! In the meantime, remember that this important innovation has been brought to you by the Parish News.

General Release from January 2019

This is a very enjoyable film, a slightly cracked burlesque nihilistic circus view of Dick Cheney's political career from working with Donald Rumsfeld under Nixon to being chosen by George W Bush (beautifully dished up by Sam Rockwell) as his Vice President to be the 'Toad behind the Throne' in the road to war and torture. All the corruption and rapaciousness is there, the politics are very dark: people die (in millions) but it is all just a 'job that has to be done'. Christian Bale becomes Cheney before our eyes, but at times becomes something of a caricature of a Mafia Don – death happens on a nod. Between political careers, when Democrats are in charge, he is an oil man, CEO of Halliburtons, for example.

Adam McKay has created a sort of circus, even a monster movie, but it takes a sometimes surprisingly sympathetic interest in its chosen demon, from his youth as a loutish drunken drop-out from Wyoming to his relationship and protectiveness towards his daughter Mary, a campaigner for gay marriage. Which puts Cheney the Republican into something of a conflict.

And where is Trump? Very much there – do please wait for the post-credit sting – because this is a film for liberals, for those who love to hate America. And yet...Cheney encouraged war in Iraq, brought in torture, thought of extreme rendition, was ruthless and highly intelligent in finding legal ways to support the President's actions and curtail inconvenient freedoms, but one really cannot blame America for everything that is happening today.

But don't miss it; as a film it is quite an experience.

There are many young people carrying and using knives which result in fatal stabbing or severe injury. While the Police and government seek to arrive at a solution, I bring you a cautionary tale.

A 60 something man, driving his car, is stopped by police on a routine roadside check. During the police inspection of his vehicle the police indicate the vehicle cannot be driven any further. The man gives over his car keys to the officer. On his key ring is a lock knife



which he had been given some 10 years previously. It was not for use in his work. It was not part of his national dress.

No vehicle related crime was committed, but the man was prosecuted for possession of the lock knife and he pleaded guilty. The starting point for sentencing the driver is 6 months custody and he received 6 month suspended sentence and a 3 month curfew.

A penknife with a folding blade and a cutting edge of less than 7cm/3 inches can be carried in public.



It is illegal to carry any knife with a cutting edge in excess of 3 inches/7cm. There are exceptions, taking a knife to and from work and using the knife in connection with work (it must be kept safe at all times and not accessible by third parties) or if the knife is part of a national dress.

Never carry a knife in public as to do so may bring about a prosecution and a possible custodial sentence.

BROADBAND ON THE MARCH

Gigaclear have made good progress in connecting our villages to super fast broadband (or any broadband). Roads have been closed, which has undoubtedly caused frustration to residents but the contractor, John Henry Group, has been very open with communication. Each property that it proposes to pass as it undertakes trench work has received a letter advising precisely what is going on and when work is being undertaken.

Once the trench has been dug and the cable fed into it, the trench is filled and then, either the earth and undergrowth is put back and the verge is reseeded, or, if the trench is across the roadway, it is asphalted, compacted and rolled. You would hardly ever know a trench has been dug.

Gigaclear hope to make further progress and look to start bringing the service into operation at around the end of June. The connection points have been located outside and on the roadside of properties. When the system goes live (or shortly before hand) residents will have the choice of having Gigaclear complete the connection to their property or have their own, or another approved ISP do so.


The position at the moment is that Gigaclear, as a wholesale internet provider, can sell 'space' in the fibre cable to other providers eg your existing provider who, in turn, will connect your property to the roadside connection (probably for a fee).

If you want to change to, or sign up to Gigaclear, we are informed that there will be no charge to make the connection to the property (provided it is within 100 metres of the roadside connection). Anything over 100 metres will incur an additional charge.

We have all waited a long time for a fast broadband service, so fingers crossed for a summer switch-on!

FOXEARTH & LISTON PARISH COUNCIL

The Council met on 2nd March 2019 with Cllr Tony Clayton in the Chair. There were 13 members of the public present.

Chairman's comments: The Chairman confirmed that the closure of Rodbridge for most of March for repairs would be on a 24 hour basis and not just for the hours that work was being done, as some signs misleadingly suggested.

Stafford Park: It was reported that a planning application would be considered by Braintree District Council on 19th March. The Chairman summarised the comments against the development previously submitted by the Council and these were agreed as being still applicable. They were that the traffic plan was flawed as there is no public transport, a majority of local residents are opposed to the development, local schools and other services could not cope with the influx that 100 extra dwellings would bring, no account is taken of the countryside and the area does not fall within the definition of a brown field site. Asked by the Chairman whether he wished to comment on these points, Mr McPherson said that he could but he would prefer to answer any questions. There were none. A comment was made from the floor that three major developments in Long Melford had impacted upon schools and doctors' surgeries.

Braintree District Council report: District Councillor Iona Parker outlined various issues mentioning in particular that Council Tax was likely to be increased, the councillor individual grant scheme would continue and garden waste collections had resumed. Initiatives included "Help for the High St", a Jobs Fair, police emphasis on road safety and more public involvement in planning.

Handy(wo)man: The Clerk agreed to make an application to the EALC Local Services Fund for £15,000 over three years for handyperson services.

Local traffic issues: Cllr Posen suggested the setting up of a working party, to include local representatives, to look at traffic issues in the two villages. This was agreed.

Broadband: Cllr Posen understood that County Broadband's fibre installation was proceeding and that BT intended to upgrade their system to fast (their definition) in 2019.

Footpaths: Cllr Robson reported that he had put "no horses" signs in appropriate spots. In relation to any handyperson service it was important to coordinate any maintenance, eg hedgerow cutting, with local authority services.
