Project Beacon

2016 has seen new volunteers come forward for Project Beacon as well as maintaining some old ones.

The balance of experience and enthusiasm is crucial and at the moment I feel we are still getting this right! The aim of Project Beacon has always been to go to people and be on their terms, this may be in a shop doorway or on the side of the road or whilst they are bedding down for the night on a bench.

Some of the stories we hear and circumstances that people find themselves in is heartbreaking and hard to deal with at times. It is important to remember that the power of prayer is so important in what we do, we are never tasked with something that we cannot do and with the Lord all things are possible! But Jesus looked at them and said,

"With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible." Matthew 19:26 ESV

For those of you new to our newsletters, Project Beacon is our Saturday Night outreach into the City of Gloucester. We go to where people are, build relationships and follow 3 strands of work :

- Providing something warm for people (tea, coffee cuppa soup pot noodle etc).
- Making sure people have something warm to wear / sleep in (providing sleeping bags to those who need them – if we have them, clothes, hats and gloves especially in the winter).
- Signposting, encouraging individuals to engage with support services, complete referrals if needed, let people know where they can go to get food in the week.

In a nutshell this is what Project Beacon is all about; we have some non Christians come out with us as well which is great. What a fantastic way to practically show someone

what the church is /should be all about. We also have other agencies that come out with us to see what we do and how we do it, this gives them an insight into the difficulties some people face and helps them build relationships with people as well.

One of the key themes that run through our newsletters is the value and importance of our volunteers. Without them Gloucester City Mission or Project Beacon would not be able to do the work it does. If you are reading this and wondering what you could do to help, if nothing else please pray for our volunteers! They are an amazing crazy bunch and we would be lost without them.



My response was short, explaining that we were happy using the premises where we were and further, explaining that we were unlikely to consider such an initiative. How wrong can you be?


