displayed in front of a block of flats in Deptford, commemorating his stay in Britain where he studied British shipbuilding.




As we reached Greenwich, we saw the Cutty Sark.




A statue of Sir Walter Raleigh was displayed outside the National Maritime Museum.




We saw the famous view of the Royal Naval Hospital, Greenwich.
