A group of 4 members of Surrey County Walkers joined a walking tour in the Rhineland, based in Remagen, which is close to Bonn and the confluence of the River Ahr with the Rhine. Remagen is a pleasant small town.



The flags were up for a forthcoming festival.

It is beside the Rhine. Amazingly, amongst all the barges and cruise boats, there was a small dingy sailing on the river one evening.



On the first day after our arrival, we took the local train up the Ahr valley to the picturesque village of Altenahr.



This village is surrounded by hills.



After a steep climb, we reached a ruined castle above the village.



We walked through vineyards



until we reached our lunch stop at a vineyard. We walked after lunch to a small village to a winery where we sampled the local red wine. Red wine is unusual in Germany and it is particularly unusual to find red wine produced so far north. Actually it is more like a dark rosé, with a taste more like a white wine than typical red wines, such as claret or burgundy. After the wine tasting, we returned to Remagen by train.

The next day we took the boat to Boppard.
