ST ANDREW'S REFLECTIONS - JOURNEYS MATTER

People having tough holiday journeys will feature in the news headlines as various folks get away over the summer. We all will have our own stories to tell of getting stuck in traffic (5 hours on the A12?) or getting stuck at an airport terminal e.g. 5 hours at the bottom of the A12 when a Pantechnicon had overturned on the M25.

What if we treat life as a journey? At a funeral recently - one of the stand out readings described life as a railway journey with different folks accompanying for different parts of the journey and the blessings of different scenery to enjoy together.

Well at the beginning of July the Diocese likes to go on a journey to Bradwell on Sea. At this site there is an ancient chapel dating from 654 AD. Amazingly one of the oldest working chapels in the country is in North Essex several hundred metres from the East coast sea. Why mention the Chapel - well it's the journeying which is a "doing" word that links us to the ancient activity called pilgrimage. The journeying in Pilgrimage is as much part of the experience as arriving at the destination and how you travel and who you travel with is so important. (Some friends in the Benefice have recently travelled up to Lindisfarne - the Holy Island off the Northumbrian coast and there spoke movingly about the atmosphere of the Holy Isle). The gifted people creating the stunning "Wyvernwood" want to engage children's imaginations and part of this is inviting them to go on a 'magical journey'.

Interestingly the idea of travelling and Pilgrimage brings us to the original name for disciples of Christ before they were given the nickname, "Christian's". They were called followers of "the way'. What I love about this is that it is dynamic there is the sense of journey. One of the challenges for the church is once you have a building you can get settled and comfortable. St Andrew's had the unsettling experience of losing its church in 1971 to fire but the faithful folk simply shifted and were welcomed and allowed to reform church* in the village hall (*its not about the building its about the people). The joinery of faith went on and a new church was built but as you know that was not the end of the story. Although we give thanks for the hub we recognise that each generation has to make a fresh journey of faith.

What journeying has God called you to in this season - my prayer is that we get to journey well with one another along the path God has set for us. Let us treat each day as an adventure, be open to the wonder of God's creation around us and can we be kind to our fellow pilgrims - sometimes the road can be uphill. So stuck in traffic, gazing across the sea from a Holy Isle or entering a magical kingdom, Godspeed.

What else does your local library recycle? Most will take old batteries; some take small electrical items too. Save yourself a trip to the recycling centre!

If you're running short of recycling sacks or caddies for roadside collections, your local library may be the place to help. Food sacks, garden sacks and recycling boxes can all be found at some of our libraries.

A magical opening awaits at the UK's newest visitor attraction, Wyvernwood

The Enchanted Lost Kingdom of Wyvernwood, the UK's newest visitor attraction, opened its Magic Portal to visitors on Friday 15 July.

Wyvernwood is a unique adventure park, set in more than 20 acres in Alresford near Colchester. It provides families with children aged 2-12 with a magical day out, a digital detox and an opportunity to connect with nature while exploring the adventure park.

Nick White, Wyvernwood's Experiences Director, said: "Visitors step through a magic portal into an immersive experience where families can escape from day-to-day life.

"They enter another world where they will encounter the awesome Wyvernwood inhabitants including Princess Arabella, Tatiana the Queen of the Fairies, our hero the Captain, Gurt the Lord of the Goblins, Merlin the Wizard and of course the Wyvern dragons!

"Families begin their adventure in the Castle Grounds where children can scale the castle walls, set sail in the Captain's Galleon, search for missing treasure, make their dreams come true at the Magic Wishing Well and, if they dare, discover what lies deep within the goblins' lair! They can speed through the Goblins' labyrinth or be first to reach the centre of the maize maze.

"They can then venture along the Dragon Trail to the Wellbeing Woods and discover the Land of the Fairies, find the Captain's Campsite, and help the wizard to create a magic potion at the Wizard's Domain."

Over 700 local residents ventured into the magic world of Wyvernwood during an open day and their feedback was overwhelmingly positive. Nick adds: "All the families I spoke to were enjoying just spending time together, enjoying the activities and outdoor space at Wvyernwood and meeting our wonderful characters."

Sarah Tuckwell from Colchester said: "I've come here with



my family and my 5-year-old granddaughter and it's a fantastic place; it's really lovely seeing the wildflowers and the carvings. I've been down to the Wellbeing Woods, seen the fairies and my granddaughter is thoroughly enjoying herself. It's very nice, well worth a visit."

Olive Moir, aged 5, from Brightlingsea, said: "I really love



the fairy houses because they have lovely doors and windows and they can fly back to their houses. I like

everything, I love the bouncy pillows because they were so fun, I want to go on there because they are so bouncy."

The Enchanted Lost Kingdom of Wyvernwood provides the perfect family day out. As well as plenty of play areas and adventure activities where children can let off steam, there is also a 'Little Kingdom' for smaller children and a birthday party V.I.Tipi for youngsters to celebrate with their friends.

Maxwell Cheal, 7, from Wivenhoe said: "It's brilliant here, I



like it. My favourite bit is the Dragon Karts because they're such fun and brilliant to ride on, and the castle because I like the slide."

As well as having lots of activities for children to enjoy, there are also different types of performances taking place to entertain the guests. Nick continues: "The inhabitants are showing their talents by putting on performances in the amphitheatre where guests can experience storytelling or a puppet show or meet our mascot Gurt, Lord of the Goblins. There is also plenty of activities for older children and adults at Wyvernwood with puzzles and adventures featuring throughout the park"

Whilst providing a great day out for families is key, a visit to Wyvernwood is also good for your mental health and wellbeing. Nick adds: "Our woods are called the Wellbeing Woods because they have a sense of calm and serenity but a visit to Wyvernwood is also about keeping fit and healthy. You can easily hit your step count in a day here all whilst spending time in such a beautiful location.

"One of the things we've tried to do here is get children away from screens and into the great outdoors and connect with nature which is vital for mental wellbeing. Here they can spend time with their family exploring another world, an enchanted lost kingdom, whilst also appreciating nature."

As well as the fabulous fairies, fierce dragons, wise wizards, menacing goblins, a warrior princess and heroic captain who inhabit Wyvernwood, over 40 local people have joined them to make the experience at Wyvernwood even more special.

Nick adds: "We believe in keeping things local at Wyvernwood. As the inhabitants will be busy meeting new friends, we have enlisted some helpers to join them to provide the best experience for our visitors as part of our growing park operations team."

Dates in the summer holidays to visit Wyvernwood are filling up fast so booking in advance is recommended to avoid disappointment.

Tickets are £16.50 per person if purchased in advance, or £20 on the gate (concessions apply). Refreshments and food are available on site. Wyvernwood also caters for birthday parties, schools and groups. Access is via St. Osyth Road, Alresford, CO7 8ES; please check the website for details: www.wyvernwood.co.uk.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS

The AGM will be on Tuesday 2nd August 2022 in the Munson Room at the Village Hall. Time 7.30pm and all welcome.

The bookings for the hall continue to be very plentiful, however the Trustees are keeping close scrutiny on the cost of the utilities, i.e., water, electricity, and gas. There are issues presently with the transfer from our electric and gas dual supplier to SSE on a 3-year period and the contract as present has not been actioned.

There are still funds transferred to the AVHMC from Tendring District Council that are targeted to be used to keep hire fees for regular users at the current levels for as long as possible.

The external notice board is still being progressed with different options being considered.

The hall will be closed from the 19^{th of} August through to the 25^{th of} August to enable floor maintenance and a partial redecoration to be done. All regular users will be informed.

The piano has finally found a new home with monies received donated to the Ukraine appeal.

With regards to usage of the air circulating units in the hall, the contractor is to be instructed to install a manual override to allow units to be used. This will be along the same lines as the heating system override which is protected by a timer that will not allow the system to be left on after hires.

A working party has been set up to investigate online banking, online visibility of hire availability, spreadsheet accounting and a new telephone and email contact for booking enquiries.

"World Cup Willie" was the first FIFA world cup mascot in 1966. He represented a lion wearing a shirt with the UK flag. Created by Reg Hoye, who illustrated books for Enid Blyton. Launched in 1965, it bore an uncanny resemblance to FAs rather square shouldered chief admin officer called E K Willson, hence the nickname.

1.63kg of stamps have been sent.

As the world watches on in horror, groups across the country came together to do what they could for Ukrainian refugees on their journey. With a tried and tested route to Moldova and Romania through Mission without Borders, the decision to support this relief effort was not a hard one.

Together with beautifully knitted items, medical supplies, food, bedding, toiletries, and other essential aid was collected, sorted, and sent on its journey. Huge thanks go to all those who donated over £40,000 and everyone that helped of 5½ tonnes of aid to help the refugees.

At Christmastime, it was decided that the knitters would

make knitted Christmas trees. 350 squares showing different stitches were made and sewn together to form trees. Now the squares have been turned into blankets and hopefully the recipients enjoyed receiving them.

LOOKING AFTER EACH OTHER

In these difficult time with the cost of living going up and the effect it will have on some, it is important we look out for each other. Check on your neighbours, especially the vulnerable and elderly from time to time, some have very few callers, if any.

DANGER!

Here's why you should NEVER swim in quarries or lakes to cool off during a heatwave.

The lovely sunny weather is proving to make bathing in lakes enticing, which has been reported by a neighbouring village and happens all over the country. The water may look harmless, but all the dangers are beneath the surface. The water itself has the potential for disease and toxins and you could be jumping into unknown obstructions and weed beds.

Taking the plunge in lakes and quarries is extremely dangerous, for reasons you may never have considered. For one, you never know the temperature of the water when you dive in.

Quarry water is normally far colder than river or sea water, and can send your body into shock or leave you



too exhausted to swim within minutes of jumping in.

The water can be so cold because of its depth, with underground springs pumping extremely cold water into the quarry.

If you can't stand up in a lake or quarry, there will be no way to recover from the shock of the temperature - and you increase your risk of drowning.



Alresford Angling Association DEEP WATER!

Could we take a few minutes of your time to warn of the dangers of swimming in freshwater lakes? Every year, during the next few weeks, the highest percentage of deaths by drowning occur. These incidents happen on a lovely sunny day and with generally a smooth surface to the water.

Because the water in lakes is in a confined area, there is no surface movement in the water mass and although the surface temperature is lukewarm to the touch, several feet down the water can be as low as 10 degs. The levels of water in a lake are called Thermoclines and the lower levels in a large expanse of water stay constant throughout the year. Hence, if you jump in, the sudden temperature shock will make you gasp and inhale water and inevitably sink. You are also jumping into water where you have no idea what is beneath the surface i.e. solid obstacles or thick weed. Blue-green Algae comes into bloom during the warm summer months and can result in the death of animals or skin rashes and sickness to humans if contacted or ingested. 220 people in the UK lost their life due to drowning. Please do not become a statistic!

And finally, the chances are that you are trespassing on private land and face prosecution. Use a supervised swimming pool or the sea that has lifeguards present.

The club's matches have progressed well with some of the winning catches reaching up to three figures. Silver fish have been in abundance along with Chub and Tench coming to the scales. Carp, Bream and Tench have been giving some anglers a really busy and enjoyable days at Alresford pit lake. The Carp have been very shy to take Boilies but seem to enjoy Sweetcorn and Maggots and presentation is a key to success also. Could all members please read the match fixture list along with notices on gates to avoid arriving for a planned day to find a match is being held on that lake.

The club still has vacancies for new members and we would like to fill our books this season. We have become a club whose members are keen about their sport and look to the welfare of the club and its surroundings. We are still progressing with the purchase of the Grinsted Orchard Lakes and to retain these 30+ acres as a sanctuary for our members plus the wildlife that inhabits it for future generations. ALRESFORD PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

August/September (pages 14 & 15)

Highways

There have been a number of Highways matters that the Council has been turning its attention to. Essex County Council is the body that has jurisdiction over our roads, pavements, and footpaths however Alresford Parish Council is one of a handful of Parish Councils that have entered a special scheme that devolves certain powers enabling us to carry out minor highways works. We receive a relatively small annual grant of £1300 for these works and there are restrictions on what can be tackled, in addition there are safety protocols that quite rightly have to be adhered to. Currently the Parish Council cannot undertake any works on carriageways (so cannot fix potholes/do white-lining etc).

We have spent our grant on improving road signs, some further hedge cutting and by adding precept money we have experimented with repairs to kerbs and a pavement edge drain gully. It is apparent that Essex County Council does not have or cannot commit the resources to fulfil its obligations, but we must mention that our County Councillor Alan Goggin tries his hardest to get highways problems tackled.

Although spraying of pavement weeds is an Essex County Council responsibility, they have delegated to Tendring District Council the task of doing this – it is though only a once-a-year treatment, and the Parish Council has therefore paid our own contractor to do it more often and to do it with due consideration to the environment.

Alresford has seen a number of smaller housing developments in addition to the larger Taylor Wimpey estates and issues have also cropped up at these smaller developments. One important matter for consideration is street lighting and the other is roadside verge cutting, there have been requests for the Parish Council to provide street lighting and also to cut verges on certain developments. Each situation is discussed by the Council and important factors to be considered are cost, the legal status of land areas and the setting of precedents. It is vital that purchasers of new properties understand their own obligations, the commitments of developers and the powers of the different Councils in our area.

Speed limit reduction requests for Cockaynes Lane and on the B1027 have been put on hold as we await new policies to be formulated by ECC Highways – delays there due to experienced staff leaving has set back policy development by months.

Concerns have been raised about the national speed limit section of the B1027 at the point of entrance to the Wyvernwood Playpark and at the time of going to print no permanent speed limit reduction is in place.

Jubilee celebrations

The Queens Platinum Jubilee provided an opportunity for the community spirit in Alresford to publicly shine and the Party in the Park and the over 75s fish and chip event were an enormous success. The organisation of the celebrations started at the beginning of the year with a front-page advertisement in the AA, delivered to every home, promoting an all-invited meeting so that decisions could be made as to what the community wanted. It was clear from that meeting, and subsequent ones, that a mini fete, music and a relaxed al fresco event was to be at the forefront of the village celebrations.

Members of the Church, the Parish Council, the School PTA, the Village Hall and Alresford Colne Rangers (plus others!) combined to provide a memorable event. Well done to Mr Russell Milburn who was the lead for both events – he was an important driving force that made sure everything went smoothly.

The Environment and the Public Realm

Of significant importance has been a recent award granted to Alresford. The award is from the Bee Friendly Trust and Alresford is one of only eight areas in the United Kingdom to receive "Bee Friendly Town Status" (Okay, we are a village!). This award relates to pollinator friendly gardens at the Railway Station and the sowing of wildflowers on verges plus the allotment and public realm gardens that provide superb habitats for bees. Private gardens are also part of the scheme.

Some public areas of the village do need a makeover and a consultant has been tasked with planning changes that enhance what we have and to provide areas that are cost effective to maintain. Our hanging baskets have proved a success and they brighten up the Station Road shopping area and parts of Wivenhoe Road. The roses in the Millennium Garden and on the corner of Wivenhoe Road and the B1027 have looked stunning – well done to the superb volunteers who tend to them. We have a new volunteer for the gardens at the Station Road shops and the area is looking very well cared for.

Playing Field and Play area

Great work by our grass cutting contractor and the volunteers from the football club, they have kept the field looking at its best and just as well as usage of the field and play areas has increased dramatically.

The seesaw was moved a year or so ago in order to create room for two or more new pieces of play equipment and we will be installing those in the very near future. A number of repairs have been undertaken to existing pieces of apparatus. If parents or children spot litter or any damage to play equipment, please contact the Parish Clerk so that these matters can be attended to promptly.

A public convenience block is planned for the field — a much requested project! The Parish Council has also approved a practice goal as a piece of general field equipment and the football club are kindly going to pay towards this.

A G3 multi sports area to supplement the existing hard court is also in the pipeline subject to external funding in addition to expected planning gain monies.

PCSO/POLICING/Community Speedwatch

Our PCSO Julia Brandon is back at work but patrols in the village are being currently being undertaken by PCSO Moss and PCSO Beer and warranted police officers. PCSO Julia Brandon has unfortunately had intermittent sick leave and now for operational reasons is undergoing a phased return to full duties. The payments to Essex Police from the Parish Council for our funded PCSO have been suspended but will resume as soon as we have the agreed service level. A police operation was requested recently to deal with some persistent speeding caused by a few anti-social drivers – we thank Essex Police for allocating traffic officers for following up on the request.

Community Speedwatch (a mainly Parish Council initiative) was halted during the pandemic but resumed in February this year and on that occasion, volunteers were joined by PCSO Brandon who used the Trucam device that can video speeding drivers and record their speeds. Increased Speedwatch activity is planned. We have received our new speed monitoring mobile camera from Norfolk based firm Westcotec and we thank Essex County Council for the grant relating to this project.

Other Council business

A liaison meeting was held between the Parish Council, senior management from Brett Aggregates and Essex County Council representatives to discuss issues caused by vehicle movements through the village and along the haul road leading to Brett's plant.

Parking problems in a number of residential roads around the commercial centre of the village in Station Road have caused concern. The planning approval by Tendring District Council for an extension to the Post Office sorting area of the post office has meant more mail vans than has been the case previously are in use and parking is limited. The Council has asked the Post Office to ensure vehicles are parked with due consideration to local residents.

The Council received legal advice regarding a developer removing a hedgerow on the B1027 and it appears that it was not a written condition that the hedge was retained even though the plans seem to state otherwise.

We are pleased to have recruited a local man to be the new Council handyman and we look forward to his involvement.

It has been a busy time for the Council and I wish to personally thank all Councillors, staff and volunteers for all their hard work and commitment.





Much has happened since our last report. We have a couple of lovely new bikes in the group, and we wish their owners fun and enjoyment with them. We've had some nice rides out too, as the weather has been good actually on the Sunday, it does make a difference to the fun levels, and that's what we're about! We've been out to places in different directions; outwards to the seaside, inland to Finchingfield, for our at-least-annual visit, Cafe 33 to the North, Route 11 Kitchen, which has become a bit of a biker haunt, and is well worth a visit. We've been to Grumpy's Cafe a couple of times, and it's always good. Grumpy actually isn't grumpy at all, and we had a nice chat. He has big plans for the site, which do not involve knocking it down and building houses, but restoring and

improving the facilities and usability of the ancient watermill site. It all looks great for the future there. The Hungry Stag is also a nice place we have visited, and will go again, because it's a nice ride out in the country. The beauty of many of the places we go is the possibility of an enjoyable, fun, unclogged backroads ride there, and either more backroads or faster alternative route back, giving us the choice if the weather turns grim. Some planning goes into these things, you see. Oh yes! We've been Southwards to the Dengie Peninsular too, and we've even put in a brief appearance at Great Bentley on a Wednesday evening in the sun, the first for some time. Another mid-week country ride out to Dennington was very enjoyable too, despite an unexpected detour caused by roadworks in Ipswich, but the detour itself was actually signed properly for a change, and had not been dreamt up in Bletchley Park, and only added about half a mile to the journey, which is also a relief, recently. In fact it was so nice, some more of us went again today, for our Sunday Ride. Apart from getting stuck behind a camper wagon for miles it was a lovely ride, with good scoff at the end, and a good ride back.

Much has been talked about regarding the cost of fuel. So, just so I know what I'm talking about, and also because I am a complete anorak, I have measured my car versus my bike, on the same route. Car scored 40.1 mpg, bike did 65.7. No contest. As a side note, we hear of "additives" that can be put in fuel to make it go further. These are not worth the money. The very best way to make your fuel go further is good maintenance, correct tyre pressures, and a steady hand on the throttle. Cruise Control on a bike really does make a difference over distance, as it isolates the throttle from the jerking effects of all the craters which all cause fuel wastage through manipulating the throttle hand/arm up and down. Riding smoothly is also the most economical, but keeping the machine in good order helps generally. For instance, a dragging brake pad can take 5mpg off a bike without you even knowing.

One event we are looking forward to, that has very recently sprung back into life, is the Essex and Herts Air Ambulance Run. Bookings are open now, so get on the website and book yourself in if you're riding! However, the route has had to be changed, and now it leaves from EHAAT Hangar at North Weald, (come with me if you don't know where that is) but still finishes at Harwich as has become the custom. I don't know if that is just for this year, or permanently. Well worth doing, and all for a great cause. It's a pretty good and different family day out at Harwich too. It happens to be our primary charity, though we do support others also.

Seasons bring different hazards, and things to be aware of, hopefully to avoid! Now that it's Summer, ignoring the diabolical state of our roads, which are a national disgrace for the moment, insects have become an issue, especially on bikes without windscreens of any kind. Riding with eye covering is a must, as a bug in the eye at any speed is not only dangerous, it hurts a bit! It's useful to check visors are genuine, and not cheap knock-off fakes, because they are untested, probably made of inferior materials, and will undoubtedly fail when

needed. For example, the old EU standard ECE 22.05, which is still legal, has been upgraded to ECE 22.06. Part of the upgrade is the very much more rigorous testing of visors. Instead of an impact test with a small plastic ball at about 70mph, now a small steel ball bearing is fired into the visor at 134 mph. If the ball goes through, the visor fails. So riders, that is why visors have become thicker, and more expensive! And in summer, the frequency of airborne things hitting visors is huge, as are some of the bugs. A big Bee can make a heck of a mess on your visor, but cleans off. If your visor is up..... it's in your eye. Personal story here: I once had to have the remaining hard parts of a wasp (it's mandibles, if you're interested) extracted from my throat (in the dip where collar bones meet) with tweezers, by a nurse. It hurt like mad partly from the impact, partly because the wasp obviously stung me on impact, and partly because I am allergic to that stuff and was changing colour before her eyes. An allergic reaction anywhere near one's windpipe is a worry.

Other things that can have unexpected consequences are obviously birds, which range from an unfortunate Sparrow impact once, to a Pheasant, which was a different matter altogether. It hit me pretty hard, and it busted my windscreen, unscrewed one mirror which windmilled, unscrewing more until I could stop. switched my engine off, as it hit the kill-switch too. Worse, it took my concentration for about 10 seconds, and I was motoring. It didn't do a lot of good to the Pheasant either, as I washed unpleasant bits of it off my jacket, helmet, glove, and neck-roll. Pheasants are pretty dim even by bird standards, and will seemingly wait until the very last moment before launching themselves straight at you. Bugs and flies are sometimes a problem, especially if you ride through a swarm, which sounds like riding through hail. A "4-engine bomber" insect, the kind that seem to hover right in front of you, big enough to see ages before it hits you, can be huge, and makes a huge bang on your visor when you clobber it! There are all sorts of other critters out and about at this time of year too, so you'll see AB riders taking great care out in the country. Summer rainstorms are an obvious problem, and we sometimes get caught out in a storm that is like riding through a car wash. Not fun. Massive droplets of rain in your face at 70mph hurts! Hailstones are like shotgun pellets, and hurt even more. unexpected fizzy drink tin was not much fun, even at the 20mph it hit my bike, dropped out of the window of the car in front, in London. Nor was the McD wrappers still full of chips another time. Morons chucking things out of their cars are a big hazard. Cig ends are a real danger. Car drivers don't care, just don't even think of the consequences, including fires. A cig end in your crash helmet is not funny. I have been machine-gunned by half a shovel-full of small stones falling off the back of a builders truck on the A12. The damage can be horrendous, and hearing stones buzz past your head like bullets is not much fun. The temptation to ride around in summer clobber is another hazard to be avoided! Expensive leathers or textile riding clobber is no good unless you are in it. Of course, I have done all the daft things inexperienced riders do, such as riding around in jeans and t-shirt (OK, it was in Cyprus, and it was 41 degrees, and I was invincible, bulletproof, and 45 years younger). So, all the gear, all the time, is my motto now. No bare skin anywhere when riding. And I'll finish off by saying what I say to all young riders who think they are as immortal as I was back then - you do not look cool in A&E! The lovely nurse who is picking gravel out of your kneecaps while you cry your eyes out thinks you are an idiot. Yes, me again!

So, why do we put ourselves through this expensive, sometimes painful, torture? Because it is the most fun you can have with your clothes on. Your actions are your responsibility. You can't even reach your mobile phone, and it can't reach you. Your distractions fade to nonexistent. It is much more involving than anything else. In a car, you're driving through the world, looking out at it passing you by. On a bike, even a pillion passenger is a dynamic piece of the ride. On a bike, you're immersed in the world around you. Its sights, sounds, smells, bug splatter. You have a connection to the world that you can't get from inside a car. You don't look out at the environment; you're part of it, and sometimes it's on you! You have a much greater connection with the world that surrounds you, and interact with it miles more than any other transport permits. And did I mention that it is enormous fun? Here's a picture of a rider having fun!
