It is our youngest granddaughter's first birthday as I write; we have emerged from a sticky session of squashed cake and bubbles relatively unscathed, considering. She is on the brink of walking, but can scale the sofa unaided and end up on the window sill. Every week brings a new skill; babies are like that. One day they are laying on their backs sucking their toes, and the next they are riding a unicycle and juggling...

These changes are exciting for us, the observers. "Look what she can do!" we exclaim, as if it was done purely as a result of our gene provision. However, my husband and I, as grandparents heading for seventy at a rate of knots, are beginning to struggle at the other end of the scale. When did I first notice that getting down on the floor was fine, but returning to a standing position needs volunteers...or a winch? What is it about needing more frequent breaks in the gardening, or doing the weekly shop becoming a Life Event rather than just something you do between work and going home? Friends, I have long ago laid down my unicycle and juggling balls.

For me, there is great comfort in a world of shifting realities and inconceivable alteration, to hold faith in a God who *doesn't* change. As the boundaries shift, as we lose someone dear, as health falters, as wars wage... as our tempests roar, we can choose to stand firm on eternal solid ground: "O Thou, thou who changest not, abide with me."

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The year once again has been challenging. The Treasurer situation was not resolved as we would have liked and unfortunately the incumbent was not able to fully commit to the position due to personal reasons and this had consequences. This again resulted in the Trustees having to update the accounts in preparation for the Financial Inspection. Once again thank you to Cath Patel and Hayley Milburn for coming to the rescue. The Keyholder situation remains the same with the Chair continuing and Hayley Milburn has also continued to act as the booking/invoice clerk. The Hallmaster booking system has been a success and has certainly helped make the booking/invoice process more visible to all.

▶ Bookings, both regular and private have remained at a level similar to last year with only one Thursday evening, intermittent Friday afternoon and evening session available during the week. We have lost one regular hire, Yoga on a Wednesday evening and there are potential hires ready to occupy this session.

► The Trustees pass on their gratitude to our Secretary Nicola Lockwood-Pugh, Chris Sanderson, Hayley Milburn for all their dedication in fulfilling the officer posts that enable our hall to function, without them the hall would potentially be in crisis. It is this matter that is of most concern to the Trustees. Chris Sanderson, our long service Vice Chair, Maintenance person, Logistics co-Ordinator and overseer of our utility contracts has served notice of his intention to cease these tasks. The reality of finding another Chris is remote and will result in higher costs and of course less prompt attention when tasks need doing in the hall.

► This - alongside the difficulties with the Treasurer position and the reduction in Trustees is why we are bringing this to the attention of our hall users and community. Current Trustees are unable to take on more and we are struggling to recruit new volunteers.

▶ The hall is in incredibly good shape financially, we have a healthy hire occupancy and facilities, but we need to address within the next year where the future of managing the hall lies.

▶ We have continued to improve facilities within the hall, namely the installation of sound proofing doors in the Munson Room which has resulted in a regular hire. Also, routine oven cleaning and window cleaning has been introduced and alongside the yearly floor polish has enabled the hall to continue to look vibrant.

▶ Ms Elysia Thompson our cleaner has continued to maintain the hall to an extremely high standard of cleanliness at an extremely competitive cost.

▶ The condition of the hall is important as this with the competitive hire fee encourages one off private hires that enable Trustees to manage regular/local group fees at the lowest level possible.

We also thank Jeanette Downing and Chris Sanderson for organising Simply Singing and Film Nights that raise funds for the hall and just as importantly provide valued entertainment for those who attend.

We will continue to work in partnership with the Parish Council and St Andrews to provide facilities to our village and the surrounding areas that are relevant and at the lowest possible cost.

The Trustee's state that regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance is made when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

What have the Trustees done:

- Gas / Electric price tariff New 4 year deal" to Gas/ Electric tariffs fixed to 2025".
- Insurance premium fixed for 3 years until 2026.
- Regular Hire Charges not increased for the 19th year in succession.
- Health and Safety handbook updated.
- All Risk Assessment and P.A.T completed.
- Regular updates provided for Alresford Advertiser.
- Safeguarding and Data Protection updated
- Village Hall website improved to allow mobile phone access to full website.
- Charity Commission report submitted.
- Hallmaster introduced as online calendar for availability.
- Gas and Fire Annual checks completed.
- Hall floor repolished.
- The Munson Room continues to be used as a meeting room and as an extra when main hall in use.
- Manual switching provided to allow localised control of air units in main hall.
- Main ceiling fan replaced with LED lighting.
- Censor fitted to eliminate water wastage if taps faulty or left on by users.
- Soundproof doors fitted between Munson Room and main hall

The Trustees will endeavour to:

- Recruit a Treasurer.
- Recommence Financial Best Practice.
- Keep hire fees at the lowest possible level.
- Provide update and news via the Alresford Advertiser.
- Administer and manage all that is required to allow the village hall to function.
- Continue to explore fund raising events such as Film nights and Simply Singing.
- Develop a medium to long term hall management plan part of which will be to encourage involvement from younger members of the community, who are not necessarily associated with existing hirer groups, to become active in hall management and fund-raising activities.
- Replace all north side guttering.
- Organise Defibrillator course.
- Recruit a keyholder.

- Continue to explore Solar Panels to enable the hall to absorb potential high energy costs in the medium to long term.
- Complete a 5-Year Electrical inspection due November 2024.

The Trustees give substantial amounts of their time to the Village Hall and their reward is seeing the continued use and enjoyment that our community gains from the Village Hall. The Trustees will strive to listen to comments and make improvements that will serve the community, whilst maintaining all the basic requirements that need to be executed to allow the Hall to function.

The Trustees wish to thank Diane Spackman for her time as a Trustee and are sad that she has needed to step down. However, we welcome Andrew Pyman onto the Trustees and look forward to the skills and organisational skills that he will bring to the table.

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

A junction is a junction and must not be blocked for the safety of vehicles pulling out. **This includes the school junctions.** This is a major obstruction so PLEASE KEEP CLEAR

Parking Services will be attending the village on a regular basis and may issue fixed penalty notices to those offending

PARKING

There have again been numerous complaints of parents parking on the zig zags and junctions /corners during **school start and end. DO NOT** risk putting children's life's in danger.

Just a polite reminder of the highway code

Parking restrictions outside schools and understanding yellow zigzag markings

- Most school entrances and exits in the UK have yellow zigzag road markings with the writing 'School Keep Clear'.
- Zigzags can also be found at entrances and exits of hospitals, fire stations, police stations and ambulance stations. They indicate the part of the road where motorists should **not** wait, **stop**, or **park** a vehicle. There are accompanying sign that shows specific times when these restrictions are in place. Motorists are legally allowed to park on the zigzags **outside of these hours**.
- Both yellow and white zigzags also show areas that must be kept clear so that children and other road users can see clearly when crossing the road.

To clarify - This is for the safety of the children, same for obstructing junctions, which impairs visibility.

Please park **legally and considerately**. Complaints have been forwarded to **parking services**.

There have been **complaints** of vehicles parking completely on the **footpath** along Wivenhoe Road and parking opposite driveways and drop kerbs in the village, which has caused difficulty in visibility to pull out and danger to pedestrians.

These have been forwarded to **parking services**.

Please refrain from doing this. Drop kerbs are there for partially sighted, disabled etc to cross. Footpaths are for pedestrians, not vehicles.

Considerate Parking Incentive tickets are aimed to educate drivers of the highway code.

Parking services may issue **fixed penalty notices**. No excuse for inconsiderate parking.

WHO TO REPORT TO FOR PARKING ISSUES/ VEHICLES

DVLA: <u>Report an untaxed vehicle - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> Deal with Vehicles with No MOT OR TAX on the public highway. DVLA can remove them.

Police will intervene when the vehicle is being driven with a fixed penalty notice.

Bad parking under the highway code.

Police will intervene if the vehicle is a danger to the highway, i.e. a complete block likely to cause an accident, where other vehicles etc cannot pass.

ZIG ZAG SCHOOL PARKING

Vehicles are still stopping and parking on the zig zags at the school during the prohibited times on the large yellow signs. This is not only an offence, but very dangerous for the children's safety. There is no excuse to park there during these times. Safety is paramount.

There are plenty of places to park around Alresford, even if you have to walk a little further.

All have been reported to **Parking services**, who will be attending the location and may issue fixed penalty notices to those breaking the highway code.

Do not risk putting children's life's in danger.

ELECTRIC ESCOOTERS

It has been reported again!!! that personal electric scooters are being used in Alresford. If you see this happening, please ring the police at the time.

Anyone found using one in public will have it seized under section 165 of the road traffic act 1988

BURGLARY

There was a recent burglary in the village, where a large amount of items and jewellery were stolen.

Please be vigilant when leaving the house. Check all doors and windows are closed and locked and if you were ever thinking of getting **ring doorbell or CCTV**, now is a good time to invest. Both will give peace of mind, to whether anyone has been on or around your property and great evidence if the inevitable were to happen. Most these days have **phone apps**, on motion detection you are alerted, which gives you the chance to ring 999 if anything untoward is taking place.

Most have **2 way conversation** too, so a few choice words could also assist.

Motion sensor **floodlights** are a good deterrent too. Anyone up to no good are less likely to continue when they are lit up and this helps with visibility for the Cameras in **poor light**. Keep front garden gates **closed** if you have them and if you have plans for an annual **vacation**.

Ask the neighbours to put a car on your driveway, giving the impression **someone is there**. Lights on **timers** are also a great deterrent and radios, all giving the same illusion.

FRAUD/SCAMS

Fraud/blackmail/scams have taken place twice this month in the village where persons have tried to scam money out of someone over the phone. A lot of these calls can just be random, where they don't even know where you live. For safety – If you are using online platforms like Facebook, Instagram etc always check your privacy settings, so that a stranger can not see who is on your friends list and other information that they could use to make you think they know you and fool you into paying them.

FRAUD ONLINE

we have seen an increase in reports of people being scammed when buying **vehicles online**. Typically, these scams involve criminals posting non-existent vehicles or vehicle parts on social media. Scammers will use stolen images of genuine vehicles and sometimes even feature a fake address. The victim then sends the criminals money in anticipation that the vehicle will be delivered. However, it never is and when the victim attempts to contact the seller, they discover the ad and the seller have disappeared. To avoid falling for these scams, use our top tips when browsing online for a new car:

- Be wary of a bargain, as this is common tactic scammers use to lure you in. Be especially careful when using an online marketplace.
- Check documents ask to see the seller's vehicle logbook (V5C). This is needed when a vehicle is sold, so legitimate sellers should have it.
- Ask for the registration number and check that the details match up on the DVLA's vehicle enquiry service.
- Look out for pressure-selling tactics, such as telling you that a lot of other people are interested in the vehicle, or you only have a limited time to buy it. **Don't** pay for anything until you've inspected the vehicle.

- During your inspection, check that the documents and vehicle details all match up.
- Don't pay via bank transfer, as it offers little protection, instead use a platform such as PayPal or a credit card for additional protection if things go wrong.

- Welfare visits were conducted to victims of crime, with security advice given. Extra patrols were carried out in these areas.


SUSPICIOUS CIRCUMSTANCES

ALRESFORD PARISH CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2023 TO 2024

The Council Year runs from May until April. Every four years an election is held and an election was indeed called in May 2023. Very often Parish Council elections are uncontested however in 2023 there were 12 candidates for the 11 council seats. It was pleasing to note that all existing Councillors were re-elected to office and a vacancy was filled on the Council in the process. Sadly though only a few months after the election long serving Councillor John Housden passed away and I speak for the Council to say that his affable style, knowledge and experience is greatly missed.

AWARDS

The very good news from the Parish Council Year is that for the second year running Alresford has won the Essex Playing Field Association prize for Best Kept Playing Field in Essex (for a Village of our size). This coveted prize was won for the standard of all the facilities relating to the playing field and included the play area, the hard court, football pitches and skate park. A remarkable result. Well done to Councillors, staff, volunteers and contractors. It is not all about awards though, it is about maintaining high standards for residents and users.

HIGHWAYS

It is true to say that there is dissatisfaction with Highways Maintenance in many area across Essex, Alresford included. Essex County Council is responsible for our Highways Maintenance and the Parish Council engages regularly with Essex County Council to press for improvements. We have made some headway – the mini roundabouts on Wivenhoe Road were re-laid and initiatives involving our County Councillor has meant many potholes have been repaired. The loose and missing kerb stones on the Orchard Road and Coppice Road estate were neglected by Essex County Council and so the Parish Council intervened and voted to carry out some works to the value of £10,000. Road Signs continue to be replaced and upgraded where necessary.

Following many complaints about speeding motorists and even with the attendance of Community Speed Watch and our PCSO the Parish Council felt it necessary to install a Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) on the corner of Crestlands near the junction with Wivenhoe Road. Data collected indicates there has been a decrease in speeding however enforcement checks are still needed as the VAS is a reminder sign only. We thank Councillor Alan Goggin for authorising the grant for this VAS.

GRANTS

As regards grants generally to the Parish Council we have received two grants this year - £15,000 from Tendring District Council and £2,000 from Brett Aggregates. These grants are towards a new Playing Field Toilet Block. The overall cost will likely be £25,000.

PUBLIC REALM

A programme of improvement of public areas is underway. The regular mounting of hanging flower baskets in Station Road and Wivenhoe Road, an initiative by Councillor Swash, has been a success and is set to continue. Tree planting is planned at a number of locations and our handyman Jason has been working hard on the public garden areas in the village. Grass cutting is provided by our contractor J's Garden Services and we have had very good feedback from residents on the quality of the service provided. Litter continues to be a problem in certain areas and our paid litter picker Sam is kept a little too busy. We appreciate also the many volunteers who litter pick.

POLICING

Close links between a Parish Council and the Police are vital and we are pleased with the tripartite contract we have with Essex Police and Great Bentley Parish Council to part fund a PCSO. Having an Officer who knows the community makes a big difference. Our PCSO Julia Brandon is well known and is approachable. An effective venue for meeting the PCSO has been the Coffee Mornings held in St Andrew's Church.

QUARRIES

It came as a surprise to Parish Councillors and residents that Church Farm Field and Lodge Farm Field had been put forward again by Essex County Council in a Consultation regarding the possibility of quarrying these two areas for sand and gravel. The Parish Council held a drop-in surgery event. A very good turnout of 350 plus residents attended the Village Hall on the 17th February (2024). Residents received advice and response forms for the Consultation. The Parish Council is very grateful to the volunteers who delivered invitation leaflets and who helped at the surgery. We feel we have done our very best to respond with some insight to the Essex County Council Consultation. It does seem extraordinary that having rejected the sites previously Essex County Council is considering them again. Proximity to the village and the overall impact on the area are the main issues. The Parish Council is grateful to Chris Sanderson, Russell Milburn, Rob Butcher, and Rebecca King, plus many other residents, for all their help regarding the quarry issues.

STAUNTON GATE

Contracts have been signed by the Parish Council for the handover of land adjacent to Victoria Avenue. Meetings have now taken place to finalise the handover of the South Site. Maintenance of the grass areas will come under the control of Alresford Parish Council. The Allotments on the Staunton Gate Site will be made available as soon as possible – those already on the Waiting List will be offered plots. Taylor Wimpey has recently planted £100,000 worth of trees and shrubs on the site to improve the public areas on the site.

FINANCES

Preparing a budget can be quite daunting in a climate of inflation and uncertainty. It is important that the Parish Council has financial reserves and makes best use of taxpayers' money. The budget prepared for the financial year of 2024/2025 required a small precept increase that amounted to a 1.4% increase. The Parish Council will do all it can not to burden residents with excessive taxation, the previous year an 8.5% reduction in tax was possible. We know however that high standards are rightly expected by the community and we endeavour not to cut back on services. We make the best use we can of grants and planning gain to alleviate financial pressures. Comparisons between Parish Councils are not always straightforward but for general information a current Band D property in Great Bentley will pay £138.45p per year in parish 'tax', and in Alresford the parish 'tax' for a Band D equivalent property is £91.33p.

AND FINALLY

There is only so much that can go into a report like this. Hopefully, residents are aware of the work and role of the Parish Council. It is important though that if there are questions or concerns that residents have, they contact the Parish Clerk. Raising matters at the Public Forum of a Parish Council Meeting is one other way of contacting the Parish Council, but emails, phone calls and letters are encouraged, good communication is vital. As ever the Parish_Council

thanks all the unpaid volunteers who do so much for Alresford, we are a thriving community, and we look forward to the next Parish Council Year with positivity.

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
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
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


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ALRESFORD BIKERS - FULL STEAM AHEAD!
