



TRUSTEES UPDATE

- As reported in the last Advertiser, we have had five villagers showing an interest in how our village hall is managed. We are incredibly happy that they have now decided to become Trustees and will now start to become active members of the Management Committee.
- As reported numerous times over the years the Village Hall is in excellent health. Financially we are very stable, structurally we are incredibly happy with the layout and look of the hall and alongside the recent solar panel upgrade we are very sustainable going into the future.
- Bookings remain at extremely elevated levels but dictates increased volunteer time to manage and maintain the hall especially at weekends, so the need for a solid group of Trustees into the coming years is necessary.
- The storage battery that can be used to store excess energy created from the Solar Panels is now installed and functioning. Additionally, the Feed-in Tariff allows any excess energy that cannot be used immediately or stored to be sent back to the grid and the hall to receive payment.
- Portable Appliance Testing completed on 27th November.
- The Contract of Hire is still under review and will be bought online hopefully in the New Year.
- In line with the process of ensuring the hall is in a good place going into the next few years, a 3-year water deal has been accepted and will run until 2028 alongside the Electric/Gas and Insurance contracts.
- The Finance Committee met in late September and recommended that no hire fee alterations are required.
- The loft space was given a good tidy up and this complies with conditions of insurance.

- The yearly Fire check was completed in October with no issues arising.
- At the time of going to press, a Blood Donation session is scheduled for 9th January 2026
- Replacement window panels are being sought for windows in the hall and foyer.

Simply Singing and Movie Night continue to be well attended with 30-40 attending.

Simply Singing is an afternoon where we cover lots of the old favourite songs inviting you to offer your own favourites to sing. Don't worry about knowing all the lyrics, because they will either be projected onto the stage screen or you'll have a paper lyric sheet. Don't worry if you don't want to sing, just come along and enjoy listening and watching footage of bygone artists.

ALRESFORD BIKERS - WINTERIZING!

Winter is fast approaching, and will probably be upon us when you read this. Not to worry, because many of the bikes are properly stored away, having been nicely winterized!

Winterizing is a bit of a process. Especially nowadays as we have feeble petrol, with moisture-seeking Ethanol in it, which can do untold damage to fuel systems if left long enough! However, all is not lost. Here's how to prepare your bike, and have no worries while parked for months out of use.

First, fill the petrol tank completely with fresh fuel and maybe add a fuel stabilizer if you're not going to use it at all for months on end. You might run the engine for a few minutes to circulate the treated fuel through the system. This will hopefully stop the modern additives from attacking the inside of the fuel system, causing leaks and blockages. I've never had either, but have never left a bike without touching it for four or five months either, so just to be on the safe side this is what others have advised! I do always fill the tank to the very top for long-time parking though, because it reduces the volume of air that can be filled with moisture sucked in through the vent by the Ethanol. Ethanol is very, very, hygroscopic, and will suck the moisture out of the air and because petrol floats on water, it will find its way to the bottom of the tank, and stay there gathering until you try to start the engine. Then it will be sucked straight into the motor, which you really do not need. If this happens you need to flush the entire fuel system, which is expensive, time-consuming, and irritating. Avoid it if you can!

Then, give the whole bike a good clean! Take the time to clean everything, even in the hidden nooks and crannies where corrosion will attack immediately. You know, where you can't get a finger in - that's where it will appear first! I have special brushes used for nothing else, because these are so awkward! I use a warm air blower to dry mine, partly because it is miles quicker, and partly to get moisture out of exactly those places. My lovely wife's hair dryer is useless for this, and I don't recommend pet dryers either, so I bought a purpose built one, which is excellent. It uses a lot of electricity, but only briefly better than the cost of replacing a mudguard, for example. (Lately, bike spares prices have gone ballistic, you have been warned!)

When it's all clean and lovely, and most importantly, dry, you need to get the protectors out. Wax polish everything you can find. Paintwork, chrome, wheel spokes, all those awkward bits, all need to be protected, and if you don't do it now.....

Then go over the metal bits with WD40 which actually works brilliantly, but nowadays ACF 50 is even better. Either will work for winterizing though. Simply spray them onto the cloth and then wipe them on, just so as not to waste any, and with the cloth wet with protecting fluids you don't wipe them off! Both can be sprayed on anything, and if you're not careful it goes everywhere, so be careful not to get any on tyres, brake pads, callipers, or discs! If you do, get it off quick before you forget. I use bin bags to shield mine.

After that, really niggly bits come next! Lube that chain, if you have one. It needs a proper clean out. I use a toothbrush, with proper chain cleaner on chains I need to clean (on a certain Triumph not a million miles from my Daughter's house!). Don't use a high pressure washer though, water gets inside past the seals and stays there, doing untold damage. Chains have developed since I started riding, and are now brilliantly protected inside by "O" rings, or "X" rings, which stop lube coming out, and grit getting into the bearing surfaces. These rings are seemingly impervious to heat, cold, friction, everything, but still need some lube, and accordingly they last

miles better than when my Dad used to heat chains in oil in a pan on the cooker in the kitchen, much to Mum's annoyance! A ten minute job then, takes hours now, just to get it off the bike! But at least it can stay on the bike these days! Progress, eh?

Your frantically expensive tyres need looking after too. Inflate them to the recommended pressure, or slightly higher, to prevent flat spots. If storing on a concrete floor, place a piece of cardboard or plywood underneath the tyres to prevent moisture absorption and potential damage. I like to lift mine off the ground if storing for any real length of time, just to protect them from flat-spotting! Additionally, it is UV light that makes the rubber turn hard. So if you can keep them in the dark, they'll preserve better. I cover mine over with bin bags, again.

Cover the exhaust and air intake (if you can!) with rags to prevent rodents from nesting inside. I had a mouse in my fairing once - it nibbled on one wire, and nothing else. Finding that wire was a bit of a job!

Then, when you lock it up disconnect the battery or ideally, remove it and store it in a warmer, indoor location. If not, or if you can do it instead, connect the battery to a trickle charger or battery tender to maintain its charge during storage. These things are absolutely brilliant and I use one all the time. I had the same battery for eight years once, they work so well, but that's a whole other matter.

Ideally the bike will spend the Winter in a well-ventilated, indoor area. Use a breathable motorcycle cover that allows air circulation while protecting against dust and moisture. Avoid airtight covers, as they can trap moisture and lead to condensation. I am currently outdoor-testing an Armadillo cover, so more next year on that, but it looks great so far!

Finally, if you're riding through all seasons like I do, watch out! The dark, coupled with other road users using phones, steaming up their cars and vans, and generally not paying attention, are out to get you, so take extra care of them, and leave even more room than normal!

So, if you want to know any more about the above, or get the answers to any of the questions raised, just come find us at our monthly meetings on the second Friday evening at 8pm in HQ, The Pointer Inn. Following swiftly on the heels of Alresford being awarded the runner-up prize in the Essex Village of the Year competition the Parish Council has had an award for being runner-up in the Essex Playing Fields Association competition for Best Village Playing Field in Essex. The playing field award covers all the facilities that are on offer on the playing-field (including the pavilion and play area). There were 282 entrants for the competition this year from across Essex so a tremendous result. In addition, the play area received a separate gold status award for its high standard and the volunteers from the Alresford Colne Rangers Football Club should be delighted with a gold award for the pitch they lease from the Parish Council and that they mainly maintain themselves.

There have been even more awards for the community, Alresford Railway Station Adopters have received a Silver-Gilt certificate from Anglia in Bloom for their Railway 200 celebration display. In addition, at a special Greater Anglia event in Ipswich two of the four station adopters, Sharon Perfect and Cherry Watson won first prize in the Innovation and Environment category. Well done Alresford!

Playing Field

The new toilet block has been completed, the Parish Council made use of various grants, planning gain monies and precept match funding to provide this much requested facility.



A special mention is called for as regards local plumber Mr Russel Pugh for his assistance with onsite pipework and to builder Mr James Stimpson who laid the concrete base for the prefabricated toilet block. The final drain connections to the public sewer were carried out by Mason Ltd of Elmstead Market who were able to install deep underground pipes without disrupting access to the community car park.

Further improvements to the playing field area are planned with additional bench seating already ordered.

Staunton Gate

Two new, covered, litter bins are being installed at the entrances to the play area on the south site. The bins that were inside the play area were quite small, uncovered and their location meant that the contractor we pay for via Tendring District Council was unable to empty them due to the contractor's safeguarding policy.

A letter has apparently been sent to some Staunton Gate residents by Tendring District Council incorrectly indicating that the public open spaces are still owned by the housing developer. It is in fact the case that almost all public areas on the Staunton Gate estate are now owned and maintained by Alresford Parish Council. It was planned from the outset of the

development that the Parish Council would take over the majority of the maintenance tasks, including grass-cutting, allotment administration and play area maintenance.

A polytunnel and noticeboard have been erected by our handyman Jason Spurgeon on the new allotment site at Staunton Gate to provide improved facilities to allotment holders who rent plots from the Parish Council.

Staff

As the village grows the work of the Parish Council increases and it is so important that service levels are maintained for residents. The Council has voted to employ a part-time office assistant to help our Clerk who works three days a week. An advert for the new post has been circulated on-line and on notice boards (**Please see the back page for details**)

Highways

The Parish Council has no powers to act as regards most highways issues such as road repairs and underground drainage. Flooding, after heavy rain, continues to be a problem in a number of locations and is mainly due to inadequate and ageing drainage systems. The Parish Council makes Essex Highways aware of a range of highway drainage faults and although inspections are carried out, for a number of years there has been little in the way of remedial work implemented apart from jet hosing drains. Clearly at some stage action will have to be taken by the appropriate authorities so we do ask residents to report all drainage issues to the Parish Council and the County Council.

Highways issues can be reported by an e-mail or phone call to the Parish Council office and by direct reporting online to Highways via www.essexhighways.org/tell-us. Pictures taken on smart phones can really assist in gathering evidence relating to neglected highway infrastructure issues.

Looking Ahead

The significant changes to Local Councils which will see the introduction of Unitary Authorities and the demise of Tendring District Council and Essex County Council will impact all of us. In the short term it is inevitable that there will be a period of uncertainty.

However, the new arrangements could mean more powers being devolved locally to Town and Parish Councils and providing finances are there it is possible a greater emphasis on infrastructure maintenance will see improvements all round....we will have to wait and see what transpires. 2026 will be a year of change and it could be for the better!

Q&A

- 1. A question I was asked recently: "Are Alresford Parish Councillors paid?" I explained that members of Alresford Parish Council do not receive any pay although many other Councils pay an allowance to all members. In Alresford the Chairman alone receives an expenses allowance and that amounts to £10 a week and is taxed—this is to pay towards regular extra travel, printing documents, telephone calls and other costs that this role generates.
- 2. Another question I have encountered: "Can the public attend and speak at a Parish Council meeting". Yes, is the simple answer. Most Parish Councils, including Alresford set aside an item on the agenda where residents can raise questions and make comments, preferably relating to items on the agenda. The public may not speak at any other time though apart from the set participation agenda item. All Councillors and the Clerk can be contacted by e-mail in between meetings.
