ALRESFORD BIKERS - WAITING FOR SUMMER

Good times are coming bikers, don't worry! It's not all gloom and doom, although there is considerable gloom about as I write this, as the weather is being a bit "seasonal" out there. However, I am just warming up from having ridden down to Colchester. The roads were as ever, horrible, with the possible exception of the new bit of bus lane at Clingoe Hill. Not even finished and already better than the roads! The seasonal slipperiness does not help, and if you are not aware can catch you out easily, quickly, painfully and damagingly. Especially on the way to Brightlingsea, where on the hill up to All Saints Church the pitiful efforts to clear the mud illegally left by a certain quarrying company will not be sorted out until someone is seriously hurt. If you have to go there, be ultra careful. The pothole situation is not improving very much, if at all. Indeed, there are some new ones, and a canyon I saw this afternoon on the roundabout at the exit from a well known Supermarket not a million miles from Greenstead roundabout, that rhymes with Nesco. Nobody should be that close to the kerb, but forewarned is forearmed, as they say. A hole there big enough to get a whole scooter wheel in, I'd say. I got a good look at it when a daft car driver looked me straight in the eye only five yards away and still pulled out in front of me, and I took evasive action, luckily only about five mph too! Another obvious priority conferred by the spinning prop badge.

Those of us who turn up to meetings and rides out, especially regular ones, will have heard us talking to others about how to stay safe, and where, if we have discovered some new danger, like the aforementioned mud. How to avoid the idiot drivers who can't de-mist their own cars; the ones who usually also think they have lights on because the dashboard is lit, but haven't, especially at the back. You know, the ones who deliberately concentrate on looking forward or left at roundabouts, and pull out anyway no matter that we are there. The same ones who park in Station Road with $\frac{2}{3}$ of the car sticking out in the road, thoughtlessly, lazily and selfishly making it everyone else's job to miss them. By strange coincidence they also happen to be the ones who speed, because limits do not apply to them either. Nor lane directions, nor roundabout rules. They are the ones who turn right at roundabouts, from the left lane, going all the way round in the wrong lane. Always be very careful if there is a two-lane exit and you are in the outer (right) lane going straight on, riders! Never be alongside to the right of any vehicle, ever, nearing your exit! So yes, it is a bit gloomy out there, the wall to wall buffoons are out in more force than other times of year, and it's a bit cold too. So, thick winter clobber on, heated seats and grips on, and off we go, woo hoo!

If you're not riding year round, you might have one of the many bikes laid up in storage for Winter too, no surprise there. Hopefully the riders have taken all the normal precautions, like either emptying the fuel system completely or totally filling the petrol tanks, to stop the Ethanol absorbing moisture and rotting the fuel lines. (If the tank is full, there will be no room for very much moisture, and if empty, it will dry out leaving neither moisture nor Ethanol). Personally, if your bike is going to stand for more than a month or so, I'd empty it, because the miserable quality modern petrol will just go off anyway if you leave it any longer, clogging lines and injectors. Good old carburetors really suffer much worse these days so drain them too, if you have them. Contrary to popular thought, it is not a good idea to run your bike periodically to get it hot and charge the battery, etc. I used to think it was too, but it's not. No matter how long it runs, it will not get hot enough to boil the moisture out of the oil, or exhaust, or even the cam boxes. So if you ever see a grey brown sludge on your dipstick, that's what it is condensed water and oil sludge. If your exhaust is rusting from the inside outwards, that is water too. It takes about ten miles to heat up enough, so ride it, or let it stand is best. I'd also lift my bike off the ground with stands if possible, so that the wheels can be rotated by hand, preventing them from taking a set and developing a flat spot, which stays forever and can ruin brand new tyres in a few weeks! If not, just move it occasionally. Check and maintain the pressures too. Maybe I might also take the battery off and sling it indoors on a trickle charger for the season. Or, if you have a suitable space in your shed, leave the battery on but still attach the trickle charger. My shed is a bike shed, with other stuff shoved in there, rather than a garden shed with a bike in it! Regular removing of batteries is a total pain on more modern bikes! So it's well worth fitting a rat's tail socket once and forever, and use it all the time.

And when the Winter does eventually go, what are we going to do in the coming bike season? Pretty much what we always do - rides out to cafes and bike stops, meet with other bike fans and riders all over the place, take in a classic bike show or two maybe, visit museums and take long trips round the country, ride all over Essex and the local bordering counties. Maybe go on a proper big trip. One thing is sure: there will be loads of tea and bacon sarnies involved! So if you want to know more about bikers, biking, or bikes, or just chew the fat or maybe shoot the breeze with us, come see us at HQ, The Pointer Inn, where Sam and Neil always make us welcome on the second Friday of each month at 8pm. Or just get in touch with us and say hello!

ALRESFORD PARISH CHAIRMAN'S REPORT February/March 2025

FINANCE

The Parish Council Finance Committee usually meets four times a year to assess how the current Council budget is faring and also meets in November or December to recommend a budget for the next financial year. This year was different, the Finance Committee met twice to consider next years budget. The dual meeting was necessary as we felt it vital that we spent longer than usual making sure we had all the information needed to compile a fair and workable budget and precept (the precept is the local tax paid by residents for Parish services, such as street lights, play equipment/grounds maintenance, litter bins, grass cutting, grants, public gardens, etc). The extra information we needed mainly came from Tendring District Council as they calculate our tax base, this is the number of Band D equivalent residencies that are in the village that pay tax.

As there are an additional 25 tax paying properties this year the tax burden is individually reduced. It was inevitable though that with three or more years of national inflation the precept would have to rise and that using Council reserves to top up as we have done in previous years was not now a viable option. We have used over £35,000 from reserves over the past four years to lessen the impact of inflation on our residents' Council Tax bills. What does this mean for financial year 2025-2026? It means there will be an increase from last year - taking our overall net precept to £106,217.84. Although the council tax will increase from last year it will still be 1.6% less than the Council Tax of tax year 2019/20. Comparisons with other local Councils are not easy but our neighbours, Great Bentley, have a precept of £165,000 and we have assessed that in Alresford a £106,217.84 precept will meet our service needs (subject to Full Council approval). In our favour are planning gain monies that will be used for maintenance and investment in improved recreational facilities.

HIGHWAYS

As Essex County Council Highways no longer repairs Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) the Parish Council has taken on this task and we have instructed a contractor to repair the two faulty signs in the village – one in Wivenhoe Road and one on the B1027.

Tarmac repairs to the footpath in Station Road have been continued – this work is a result of close liaison between the Parish Council and County Councillor Alan Goggin under a new scheme using government money. We have applied for further kerbstone repairs in the Coppice Road area under the same scheme and we await a response.

Since installing LED fittings on the Parish Council streetlights we have greatly reduced the failure rate, we do note though that there are one or two lights out and these have been checked and found to be supply cable faults that are the remit of Network Power and they will schedule repairs into their operations.

The Parish Council has campaigned for many years for the B1027 through Alresford to have a 30mph limit however Essex Highways have always refused this. One recent concession is that the 40mph limit is to be extended (the Colchester end of the village) so there is some progress.

Wivenhoe Road has a 30mph limit but where it leaves the main housing area the road becomes the national speed limit of 60mph, again there has always been a refusal from Essex Highways to consider a 40mph link but a new speed management strategy is being considered by Highways for

the whole of Essex and we await the report with interest to see if there is scope for this section of road to be considered for a speed limit reduction in the future.

Parking issues are never easy to deal with in villages but one safety issue relating to parking is causing real concern, vehicles parking close to the railway level crossing in Station Road make it difficult for moving traffic to clear the railway crossing area. The Council is considering the possible options and will be looking to involve Network Rail and Essex County Council. In other locations it has been noted that dropped kerbs and pavements are sometimes completely obstructed by carelessly parked vehicles– this is clearly unacceptable and can result in parking fines.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

As many residents will be aware a property development company in association with a local landowner has put forward a possible new housing scheme for land to the north of Cockaynes Lane. Invitations were sent by the company to a number of residents to attend a consultation regarding the proposals and many turned out to view the plans and speak with the developers at an event staged in St Andrews Church Hub.

The company has put together a scheme for the building of 100 homes, the homes would comprise of dwellings for older persons and for "affordable" properties plus some open market homes. Significant changes to Cockaynes Lane would be needed in order to provide safe access to the site. The Parish Council has serious concerns about all of these proposals and concludes that the scheme does not comply with the adopted Neighbourhood Plan. The site is actually outside of the settlement boundary and as such should only be considered for development under special circumstances. The Council feels that Cockaynes Lane should not be further developed and that even if development on the north site occurs no access should be made from Cockaynes Lane. It is also considered by the Council that Alresford has already played a major part in accommodating housing development and that the general infrastructure of the village would not currently support a further 100 homes without significant local investment. Although the developer insists the proposals are sustainable the issues of inadequate school places, bus transport limitations, vehicle congestion and stretched medical facilities seem to have been sidelined in their plans. The view of the Parish Council is that the financial contributions from the developer for infrastructure would not see any real local benefits. The lane layout changes seem completely unworkable and disadvantage existing properties and businesses in the area, there is also the potential for adverse environmental impacts on the flora and fauna. One aspect of the scheme involves 30 of the homes being "affordable" however if children have to be transported to primary education outside of the village the affordable nature of the homes on offer become less attractive. Likewise the homes designed for the over 50's being located well away from the bus service on Wivenhoe Road seems an unusual aspect of the plans. The Neighbourhood Plan supports the construction of warden controlled facilities for senior residents it does not support what the developer seems to be offering. We await sight of the planning application.

We all know that there is a UK housing shortage and that the previous and current government have housing quotas for local authorities. Without proper supportive infrastructure though and due consideration given to agreed Neighbourhood Plans then speculative developers will cause more problems than they solve with their rural house building projects. The Parish Council has voted to update our Neighbourhood Plan and is taking advice from the Rural Community Council of Essex.

PUBLIC OPEN SPACE ACQUISITION

Alresford Parish Council now owns, for the community, (freehold) land adjacent to Victoria Avenue (Taylor Wimpey site north of Cockaynes Lane). A fenced area for dog exercising and a small children's play area will be located on the site. The area was acquired from Taylor Wimpey and is now fully maintained by the Parish Council.

THE ENVIRONMENT AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Residents sometimes approach the Parish Council with concerns over littering, dog fouling, inconsiderate bonfires and similar issues. One resident raised the matter of pollution from a house chimney due to the burning of unseasoned wood on a wood burning stove. These matters are not dealt with directly by the Parish Council however we will always engage with understanding and we will do what we can, often this means involving other authorities who have the legal powers to act. We urge residents to be considerate of one another and avoid what are unnecessary problems in our community. Complaints have been received about empty alcohol containers being thrown from moving vehicles in Ford Lane, the PCSO is aware and vehicle details have been passed on to her.

Community involvement is quite evident in Alresford. For example it was heartwarming in December to see the very young children decorating the Parish Council Christmas Tree in Station Road and to note the amazing individuals who litter pick and tidy the village all year round. Not forgetting our public right of way clearance volunteers! Well done Alresford.

LOOKING FORWARD

We anticipate significant changes in Local Authority structures due to the government's devolution arrangements. It is possible a unitary authority will replace the County and District Council. There will be close links between Town and Parish Councils and the new unitary bodies, this should hopefully mean improved services and quicker responses to

local issues such as highways and the environment. When the Parish Council is supplied with details of the implications of the new Council system, we will of course inform all residents.







NOVEMBER 2024: 2 x CPI for pavement obstruction **DECEMBER 2024: 1** x CPI for footpath obstruction If you are lucky enough to receive one of these instead of a **FIXED PENALTY NOTICE,** these are just a reminder as a polite wasy to educate on the Highway code.

Parking on footpaths to be considerate to other road users, make it very inconsiderate for footpath users, especially those that rely on mobility scooters and wheelchairs, the partially sighted and parents with buggies and small children. Please think **FOOT**path.

ARE YOU SAFE TO DRIVE? If you are having difficulty driving at night and finding you have to slow down and keep braking unnecessarily...**It may be your eyesight!** The glare of vehicle headlights especially the new LED ones do not help, but you can get anti-glare glasses or yellow lens night frames which help.

Did you know that if you were stopped by police and given a sight test at the side of the road, you could be reported to the DVLA and this could cost you your licence, not to mention potentially being a danger on the roads **Please make sure your eye tests are up-to-date**

PARKING There has **again** been numerous inconsiderate parking reports this month, especially around the **school**.

One lucky driver parked on the **ZIG ZAGS** just missed receiving a fixed penalty. By the time the officer parked legally, the driver had gone. Drivers with children should know how **precious child's lives are.** Please do not park on the **ZIG ZAGS** during the prohibited time (on the yellow signs) you are putting children and pedestrians in danger. Vehicles are **still** parking on junction corners during school pick up. This is not only an **offence**, but extremely **dangerous for children crossing** during that time. Rather than take the chance of risking/putting someone's child in danger by causing a visibility obstruction.

Drivers could receive a **fixed penalty**. Please find somewhere safer to park and leave the corners and junctions clear, As per the highway code and the safety of all.

SUSPICIOUS MALE

A suspicious male was reported to one of the councillors door knocking, which left a resident feeling uneasy. After seeing the Ring doorbell image, said male was spotted a few days later and stop checked.

Please be reminded, never accept any trade at the door, unless of course you want to check their company details first. I would recommend if you need work done, go online to checkatrader.com

If any residents would like a NO CALLING sticker for their door, please let me know and I can drop one off; I usually carry these at all my community engagement meetings too.

ATTEMPTED VEHICLE BREAK-IN

During December there were 2 attempted break-in to vehicles where the owner of one was alerted and chased them off. It seemed to be the same suspect for both. The CCTV could have been a good deterrent.

There has been MORE INCIDENTS OF THEFT FROM VEHICLES, FROM Alresford and neighbouring villages. Always check you lock your vehicle and remove any valuables from inside.

KNIFE/DRUG SWEEPS

Numerous knife/drug sweeps have been done in various locations around the village. If you come across any please report it to Essex Police.

INTELLIGENCE

A vast amount of information has been gained from the community, some of it could be the missing link. If you see something that doesn't look right, please report it.

SCAMS/BLACKMAIL

Please be mindful to what you post online and check privacy settings to whom can see them. There has been a spate of blackmail used with gain of peoples information.

PROTECT YOURSELF - Do not send nude selfies online - these could end p all over the web and almost impossible to track down and delete.

Do you know who you are speaking to online? They may not be who you think they are.

If you are concerned about something happening online, please talk to myself or another officer, if you don't feel you can talk to your parents.

Deal with Vehicles with No MOT OR TAX on the public highway. DVLA can remove them.

Police will intervene when the vehicle is being driven with a fixed penalty notice.

PARKING EAST: parking. east@colchester.gov.uk PARKING SERVICES: parking@tendringdc.gov.uk / 01255 686969

Deal with inconsiderate parking under the highway code. **Police** will intervene if the vehicle is a danger to the highway i.e. a complete block likely to cause an accident, where other vehicles etc cannot pass.
