At present 1300 copies are printed averaging 20 pages per issue and are delivered to every household and business in the village (unless you have told us you are not interested) by a dedicated group of deliverers.

When the previous Editor stood down in 2015, a group of 5 of us stepped in to keep it going. Over the last 10 years, 5 became 3 and then 4 however, we are now back to 3 – an editor, treasurer and delivery co-ordinator; this is not viable for the ongoing future of the magazine which is why we are looking for volunteers to help. We are looking for a new editor and treasurer plus one or two volunteers to back them up – this is something that we do not have now.



VILLAGE HALL NEWS

The Solar Panel project has been completed and the hall is now enjoying carbon free electricity and with the sun shining we are also enjoying feed in fees from our utility supplier.

The project was managed by Chris Sanderson and the contractor was Orton & Wenlock from Great Bentley. The cost was totally covered without a need for grant funding using fund raising from the Simply Singing afternoons and the Film Evenings alongside General Village Hall funds. The Trustees are extremely pleased with the outcome, and this will help sustain the hall for many years to come especially in the aim to keep fees as low as possible.



The Village Hall insurance has been renewed and we are in a 3-year contract thus once again keeping our premiums at the lowest rate whilst maintain good insurance cover. Our Thanks to Trustee Andrew Pyman for leading on this.

Simply Singing and Movie Night continue to be well attended with 30-40 attending. The Simply Singing is an afternoon with singers performing on the screen with words to the songs at the bottom of the screen. Those who want to sing along do, and those who just enjoy listening and enjoying old footage of bygone artists without singing cannot sing without any need to feel uncomfortable.

Likewise dawn and daylight was a useful time to get up to enjoy the day. Such rhythms may be a bit of a shock for some of our teenagers at weekends!

Lunchtime still seems to be a good time to halt the days work. Working through lunch hours is never wise in the long term. We used to have a natural end to the day when daylight went and we would gather round a fire to cook and tell stories but now we have electricity and people seem to work ever longer hours.

In my lifetime there has been a shift to shops opening on a Sunday. It still concerns me as to when folks get to take a proper break.

So how do we pace ourselves, what priorities should we establish? One of the extraordinary comforts that Jesus offers, is that we can come to him: "If you are heavy laden and I will give you rest".

Can some of our busyness be self imposed and do we need to hand our next day over to God and find moments to rest and be thankful? In a busy world, there is always the pull of the busy stream, but sometimes it's a blessing to step aside and reflect and hand over those things we carry. If you find yourself on the 100 mile run of life, make sure you walk the hills and stop to enjoy the view every now and then!

ALRESFORD BIKERS - GETTING THE MILES IN!

Now then, at last it is properly Summer, and we're hard at it now! As Summer cracks on, we're getting on with it and the miles are piling up. Some of us are out on Wednesdays as well as our more traditional Sundays, visiting anywhere and everywhere we can that sells bacon sarnies and tea by the feel of it. I dropped the winter suit and took my leathers for their first ride this year, as my summer plumage comes out with the sun, but they appear to have shrunk, being a teeny bit snug! Ahem, moving swiftly along.... But we're out, riding, having some fun, and marvelling at how some other road users seem to feel the need to reveal their appalling lack of judgement, skill and driving prowess and show off just what terrible drivers they really are. Some clearly believe the world revolves around them. It doesn't. The worst one yet has been a pothole dodger, over the solid white lines, on my side of the road heading straight into me! Good job one of us was awake!

We've attended a couple of shows already too. Firstly we went to the Suffolk Classic Bike Show, in March, in Sudbury, and it was a lovely warm sunny day that really brought the bikes out. This show is always the year-opener, and the early Spring weather can make all the difference both in turnout of both riders going to see, and exhibitors. It takes some doing to ride to an event in rotten weather, on some priceless machine that you have spent all winter cleaning and maintaining. But with a great day this time, machines came from far and wide for exhibition. And this year the local football match had not blocked the roads with parked cars too - bonus of organisation there! There were loads of very expensive new bikes, and a lot of very nice and clearly loved older ones. I'm struggling to make a choice for my favourite, between either a beautiful AJS



like my Dad had when I was small, or a very rare Nimbus, a red one, that rode in while we were there. The Nimbus might just take it as they were very rare here in England when new, because they were made in limited numbers in Denmark, ceasing production in 1959, and this is the only one I have ever seen on the road or outside a museum! I say limited numbers, but they made many thousands of them, and many still thrive in Denmark and mainland Europe. But by contrast, Honda alone had built well over 400 million bikes by 2019! Anyway, I hope the photo does it justice. A very sophisticated machine for its time, it has shaft drive and four cylinders, and although not fast even then, was dead smooth and easy to use. I

daresay that exposed valve gear was a regular clearance setting issue!

The weekend just passed (4 May), we visited Stonham Barns Bike Show. Riding there by a rambling and country back roads route, as we very often do just for fun, it was a great day to be out riding, and strangely many of the roads were very quiet. We had a lot of enjoyment from just riding along in the sun, occasionally on roads with grass growing in the middle. But when we arrived we were surrounded by bikes from all points of the compass. It is still a small show, and has plenty of room to develop and grow, but there were many lovely and indeed beautifully looked after bikes even just in the visitor parking! On display were a mixed collection of bikes all lovingly prepped for show, including this one in the photo, an Aerial Model B, from 1928, and in glorious condition too. Clearly completely restored, and in perhaps better than new original condition, it is absolutely spotless, and stood out from the crowd to me anyway. A really lovely machine, and a joy to see out there. We stayed to watch the stunt riding, which was very good, and enjoyed a few cups of very nice tea too, so all was well!



So there we are. Out and about, riding at almost every opportunity, having fun making tracks all over Essex and the nearby countryside, and occasionally further afield. There is loads to come too, and we're all looking forward to it. If you want to join in, learn about biking from our centuries of experience, have some riding fun with us, just get in contact. 
The new match list is now in operation and Adrian Loughton asked all members to please keep an eye on the list and gate notice boards.

ALRESFORD PARISH CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Pages 9 & 10

Chairman Alresford Parish Council: Cllr Frank Belgrove

Alresford has welcomed many new residents over the past five years with 300 plus new homes being built in the village. Some of these new residents have moved from urban areas where the local council is a Borough Council. It is therefore right that for the benefit of these newer residents I begin my report with an explanation as to the work of Parish Councils. Firstly the term "Parish" Council needs explaining as some mistakenly associate the term Parish in this context as being with the Church and the Clergy.

Parish councils were in fact formed in England under the Local Government Act 1894 to take over local oversight of civic duties in rural towns and villages. Before this date, a variety of groups based around the church parishes had responsibility for these matters, in a system of local government that originated in the feudal system dating back to the 8th century. The creation of Parish Councils was a move towards democracy and removing the power that the Church had over people's lives. Elected Parish Councils were first established to reinvigorate local communities and give them a voice.

Hopefully the Parish Council in Alresford with it's eleven elected members gives the community a high standard of oversight over local civic duties. These duties cover a surprising wide range of matters and require our unpaid Parish Councillors to appoint paid, part-time, staff to deal with the day to day running of the Council. In Alresford the Parish Council has powers and duties that include the following: maintaining most street lighting, fitting and maintaining (via Tendring District Council's chosen contractor) litter bins, owning and maintaining relevant public open spaces, owning and running the main playing field including the play area and pavilion, managing two allotment sites, running a crime prevention initiative by funding our shared PCSO and operating CCTV, being consulted on planning applications, powers to make and uphold bylaws, powers to maintain closed churchyards, owning and maintaining bus shelters, owning vehicle activated signs and owning a war memorial. There are a multitude of other functions, powers and duties that we undertake, and we are often the first port of call for our residents with general enquiries.

The remainder of my report, mainly focuses on the last Parish year – the Parish year runs from May each year until April the next. The report obviously does not cover all aspects of the Councils activities during the year:

Finance: The Precept (the tax the Parish Council requests to be raised locally and is collected within the Council Tax amount) is set at a full Parish Council meeting in December or January each year for the next financial year. Although this year Band D equivalent taxpayers will pay £11 a year more than in the previous tax year they will be paying 1.6% LESS than five years ago. Alresford Parish Council used £35,000 in total from reserves over the past four years to lessen the impact of inflation on residents and it was therefore inevitable the precept and thereby the Council Tax would eventually increase to maintain reserves at a reasonable level. Our Precept request (to be raised from Council Tax) this year is £106,218, we did note that the neighbouring parish, Great Bentley, has a Parish precept approaching £50,000 more than ours and a Band D taxpayer in that village pays £150 a year. A band D taxpayer in Alresford pays £106 a year.

Planning & Housing: Successive governments have sought to ease the planning restraints on rural house building by formulating policies in the National Planning Policy Framework with a presumption that unless a development can be proven to be unsustainable it is likely to be approved even if it falls outside the settlement boundary. The adopted Neighbourhood Plan for Alresford is clear though that only development within the settlement boundary should be permitted unless the property is a facility for the elderly or falls within the specific exemptions as set out in the District Local Plan. In the view of the Parish Council an application for development on land to the north of Cockaynes Lane did not meet the criteria for development as in our view it was not only outside the settlement boundary it was unsustainable due to inadequate infrastructure, and it would also affect the rural character of the area. The problem is that we are not the Planning Authority, and it is possible that due to the new directives for housing quotas Tendring District Council may approve this type of application. Without a nearby bus service, a deficiency in school places and limited medical facilities we foresee significant issues should the development be approved.

Highways: Essex County Council Highways is the authority that maintains our roads and pavements. During the previous year we have been working with our County Councillor Alan Goggin to press for highways improvements in Alresford and this close cooperation has enabled pavement repairs to parts of Station Road and for safety improvements on the B1027 to carried out. Essex Highways has stopped their maintenance of vehicle activated signs and so the Parish Council has taken on this responsibility and repairs have been initiated. One vehicle activated sign in Wivenhoe Road, near The Pointer public house required complete renewal and we will have that work undertaken this year. Essex County Council Highways and Landowners have a legal duty to maintain field footpaths however some footpaths are neglected, the Parish Council runs a Parish Paths Partnership scheme whereby we provide equipment for volunteers to clear overgrown paths, and we are so grateful for volunteers such as Andrew and Mary Barker who undertake this work. We continue to be concerned about the kerbstone issues in the Coppice Road area and although we have paid from precept money in previous years to tackle some of the works we had been told that Essex Highways would now fulfil it's obligations, but unfortunately to date their input has only been to once again survey the area. We will be pressing for repairs this year. Parking has continued to be a real issue with Station Road, Church Road and Ford Lane all affected by congested and inconsiderate parking at times. We contacted parking consultants and the North Essex Parking Partnership (NEPP) regarding possible parking restrictions but the concern was that any major restrictions will simply transfer the parking problems to other roads. Our PCSO and the NEPP have been involved in enforcing parking

Projects and Grants: To reduce, in the long term, operating costs of running the Pavilion and in line with our environmental policy the Council voted to install solar panels on the flat roof part of the pavilion. The works were carried out and financed by an allocated £5000 from the Council's budget and by a grant of £8000 from the Rural England Prosperity Fund. Toilet facilities for users of the playing field have been a muchrequested facility, as a temporary measure a hired portaloo has been installed and this has been followed up by the purchase of a prefabricated toilet block. The toilet block was part financed from a £15000 grant from Tendring District Council and a £2000 grant from Brett Aggregates, we still await the sewer connection to be made, and this delay is caused by our application for a highway licence being held up in the legal process by ECC highways. We have other projects in mind for the coming year including repairs and resurfacing of the hardcourt area. 2024 – 2025 saw Alresford receive the Best Kept Playing Field in Essex Award and we will do our best to maintain the very highest of standards going forward.

Staunton Gate: The Council has obtained the public access land on the north site adjacent to Victoria Avenue, from Taylor Wimpey. The maintenance and any works on the land becomes the responsibility of Alresford Parish Council. A commuted sum set aside in the transaction under section 106 terms means that precept money will not be needed for several years for maintenance costs. The Staunton Gate south site public access land is not legally in the charge yet of Alresford Parish Council, that should occur this year. Already, though, we have taken on administration of the Staunton Gate allotments, and they are now fully booked.

Quarries: When the Essex County Council Minerals department called for suitable aggregate sites, once again, Church Farm Field and Lodge Farm Field were put forward by landowners, In February 2024 a drop-in surgery was held by the Parish Council at the Village Hall and **very strong** opposition from residents to further quarrying was clear. The Council had already voted to object to the proposals, and we still await the decision from ECC Minerals on this matter.

Council members, Staff and volunteers: The Council has a full complement of eleven councillor members following the co-option of two new Councillors during the year. The cooption was necessary following the sad death of long serving Councillor John Housden and the resignation of Alistair Broom. The two new Councillors, Kristin Doulai and Courtney Muller both have young families and bring new ideas and perspectives to the Council. The Council has four part-time staff members, our Clerk and Proper Officer is Matt Cooke, our Responsible Finance Officer is Angela Baxter, and our Handyman is Jason Spurgeon. We also employ a litter picker. Sam Davies. In addition to our Councillors and paid staff the community is fortunate to have so many volunteers that do so much, for example the Alresford Colne Rangers Football Club members consistently carry out work on the playing-field and also run the bar in the pavilion for local events. At the Railway Station volunteer Station Adopters and supporters care for the community garden and platform flower beds. Many other groups raise money for charities and involve themselves in a range of clubs and groups that are pivotal to the community of Alresford.

Contractors: We have contracts with Essex Police to supply a PCSO who we share with neighbouring Council Great Bentley. PCSO Julia Brandon is very well known in the village and has great support. Our grass cutting contractor is J's Garden Services, a local firm run by Andy Holben. The CCTV contractor we use is Tendring Telecoms and Security Systems. Our Pavilion cleaning contractor is Kat Harding. The Council receives an excellent service from our time served contractors and we always obtain a rapid response from these services to any urgent matters that crop up from time to time.

Looking ahead: In the short to long term there are a range of challenges facing all Councils. The Local Government Reorganisation programme will be the biggest shake-up in fifty years in the way Councils operate in Essex. Essex is one of the six areas the government has prioritised for change. Tendring District Council and Essex County Council will cease to exist, instead there will be a Mayoral system of governance across the whole of Essex and likely 5 unitary (combined) local authorities. In our case Tendring, Colchester and Braintree are likely to be a combined authority. The White Paper does not indicate any changes for Town and Parish Councils however in practice the workload for Parish Councils such as Alresford will almost certainly increase as there will be fewer top tier Councillors to deal with local issues. Alresford Parish Council has a number of it's own matters to address, further improvements to the award-winning playing field are needed,

and Staunton Gate South public open spaces will be our responsibility in the coming months. As a Council we look forward though to serving the community we are part of and recognise the important role that volunteers amongst our residents play in making Alresford a great place to live and work





Quick thinking said something was not right about this vehicle; after conducting PNC and intelligence checks on this vehicle, it transpired this was a cloned plate committing crimes all over Essex. The footage and close up still shots of the driver and passenger were downloaded and circulated county wide amongst our officers. On 16/04/2025, the vehicle was spotted by one of the team parked in Clacton and seized. The vehicle is now being forensically examined, and we are hopeful of getting a positive ID to be able to bring these crimes to justice.

Thursday evening get togethers started in Alec's home, moving to the dining room of the Pointer Pub as membership increased, and finally moving to the village hall as membership numbers out stripped space at the Pointer.

I joined the Club on moving to Alresford in 1988, and for myself having spent time as both Secretary and Chairman, I found it one of the most enjoyable and rewarding clubs I have belonged to. Not only being part the club's success in inter club competitions etc, seven consecutive years of winning an eight club colour slide battle being one example, but also for the friends and photographic knowledge gained over the thirty seven years of membership.
