



ALRESFORD COLNE RANGERS **FOOTBALL CLUB**

With a busy June now a distant memory, July

was just as busy with constant watering of pitches leading up to the first preseason games. The pitches had to be marked ready to host the Chayse West

Memorial Cup game on July 19th, a game played against Gas Recreation in memory of a super young man sadly now dearly missed. A large crowd was in attendance with the Rangers retaining the cup for the third season in a row.

The season kicked off on August 9th, so now it is nonstop with Youth and Ladies starting in September. With all bar one teams having official cost every game in the region of £150 plus, this makes football an ever-increasing expensive game. Other cost that people do not consider are line paint, football pitch surround equipment, first aid, rent of facilities and these are challenging. Sadly, these costs are crippling other clubs, forcing some to cease.

Alongside this is youth football, they start at Under 6 and play through to Under 18 when a vast majority walk away from the game instead of stepping into adult football. In my distant day there was no youth football other that the odd school match, so you started playing organised football at about 17-18 years of age, about the age that many youngsters having now already been playing for 12 years and now stop playing regularly. That is my opinion of why so many clubs struggle to get players as a decreasing number of young players step up to adult football. I doubt if this will change. Yes, we have a youth set up at ACRFC and hope in time some will progress into the adult teams, and we will continue to encourage this with the unenviable effort from our youth team managers being so vital.

So, the future is challenging, and like all clubs we need not only players to commit to ACRFC but also people to get involved with the running of the club. New ideas and energy are the way forward and would be very welcome at ACRFC.

- Close your box and put a rubber band round it to keep the contents together. DO NOT SEAL YOUR BOX

The Age Groups are: 2 - 3 years, 4 - 6 years, 7 - 10 years 11 - 14 years

ITEMS THAT CANNOT BE SENT:

- Second-hand clothes (new clothes must have the shop tag or label attached)
- Liquids or Foods (chocolates, sweets, crisps etc)
- Any items of cutlery
- English Language reading books
- Toy Weapons

SUGGESTIONS FOR INCLUSION:

Toys and Games: Toy cars, plastic toys and figures, small doll or stuffed toy (with CE label), skipping rope, ball (small or deflated with pump), musical instrument, puzzle

Stationery Equipment: Pens and pencils, crayons, water colour paints, sharpeners and erasers, note books, colouring books, solar calculator.

Clothing and Personal Care: Toothbrush, comb, hair brush, wrapped soap, flannel, hair clips, bows etc, sunglasses (with UV/CE mark), hat, gloves, scarf, baseball cap, reusable plastic containers e.g. plate, bowl, cup, water bottle.

You can personalise your box with a photo or Christmas cards of you/your family

Ideas for different age groups:

Age 2 - 3: Playdough and plastic cutters, plastic building blocks, finger puppets, stickers...

Age 4 - 6: Stickers, glue sticks, dressing up items e.g. costume jewellery, plastic tools, chalkboard and chalks...

In the two meetings since the AGM, we have had five villagers showing an interest in how our village hall is managed. This encourages the Trustees, and it is hoped that in time these people will indeed join the Management Committee.

Whilst this is encouraging, let us not think that the potential problem of not having officers to run the hall in the not-so-distant future has now been eliminated. We will see in the next few months whether the potential new Trustees find they would like to evolve or indeed others not yet known will offer their services, but until we know the answer to these scenarios we cannot rest.

As reported in the August Alresford Advertiser we need to know there is those who can or will offer to step up to a management position by the end of February 2026, so we can plan accordingly where the future of the hall lies.

NEWS

The Solar Panel project is now moving onto installing a Battery to store excess generated electricity that can be used to power the hall when the sun is not shining. There is also the option of 'feeding 'back into the network, unused electricity that we will get paid for and this pay back can be used to subsidise our energy costs.

The MPLC (Motion Picture Licencing Company) licence has been renewed and this will enable the Simply Singing and Film nights to continue. They will restart in October.

New three-year deals have been signed with BGLite to provide our electricity and gas at rates that will help alongside the solar energy keep costs to the lowest level.

During the Summer, the hall floor was repolished, the oven was industrial cleaned, and the hall carpets received their 6-month clean.

Portable Appliance Testing (P.A.T.) booked for Thursday 27TH November and all clubs will be invited to bring their portable electrical appliances to be certificated.

The Contract of Hire has been reviewed and hopefully will be ready to be used by the start of November.

Private hire is starting to pick up after a quiet summer period with November and December already looking remarkably busy. Our thanks to all hall users for the respect they show the hall and the adherence to the 'leaving the hall' as they found it. This makes our cleaners task so much easier.

Simply Singing and Movie Night continue to be well attended with 30-40 attending. The Simply Singing is an afternoon with singers performing on the screen with words to the songs at the bottom of the screen. Those who want to sing along do, and those who just enjoy listening and enjoying old footage of bygone artists without singing cannot sing without any need to feel uncomfortable.

PATH FOR ST PETERS CHURCHYARD APPEAL

For over fifteen years I have been volunteering at St Peters Churchyard originally to keep it tidy and over the years evolving to coordinating maintenance and contractors to bring the churchyard back to a presentable condition and then to keep it in this condition.

This has involved volunteering with others, bringing in contractors for one off projects and consulting with the St Andrews PCC through the Church Warden Lyn Bull to find solutions to a decrease in volunteering and indeed the possible closure of the site for burials and interments.

The first part of this has now been achieved by the bringing together of the PCC and Alresford Parish Council which has enabled a local contractor to maintain the church yard in a condition that all in Alresford would want.

The second part was to extend the Memorial Garden to enable a future for internments and a continued clearance to find extra space for burials. A faculty (permission) request has been applied for from the Diocese of Chelmsford and this if granted will allow the Memorial Garden to be extended.



The third part was if we could get all these parts in place to sustain the future of the St Peters Churchyard, I would manage a project to reinstate an original pathway into the churchyard that would increase accessibility to all enabling even those with mobility issues an opportunity to visit their loved ones resting place or just visit and enjoy the peace of that space. A Faculty has also been applied for. At present and for over 50 years people have used the adopted path (which was not a path prior to the fire in 1971) which routes over existing graves.

The photographs are proposed images to give you an idea of what it would look like.

St Peters is in my view along with The Creek the only real place of peace and tranquillity within Alresford

where many visit just to sit and enjoy. A path will make this a safer option and allow those who have not been able to visit loved ones for years the possibility to do so. The path will be constructed to fit in with the rural aspect and would be wide enough for wheelchairs. It is planned to be located from the main gate and would extend to the Memorial Garden and would again extend at the junction east and west to allow full access to all the recent resting places.

All donations will be made to St Andrews PCC but will be reserved entirely for the St Peters Path.

A local contractor will be used, and the estimated cost of the project is £11,000. To date £8,000 has been pledged and this is and should be a "people-based" project that the community of Alresford should be offered the opportunity to support by way of a donation. They will then always feel a part of this beautiful part of Alresford and help protect and indeed enhance the future of **ST PETERS CHURCHYARD**.



Cockaynes Wood Trust August 2025

This map shows the 55 acres of land which is leased to the Cockaynes Wood Trust [CWT] and Essex Wildlife Trust with the responsibility of managing this community nature reserve resting with CWT on a daily basis.

The picture was taken from Google in 2005. It shows the state of the reserve as it was then. The Alresford Road is shown on the left which is also where the vehicle entrance to the site is. The big fishing lake is on the right; Cockaynes Wood is at the top of the picture and Villa Wood on the middle left.

This picture was taken approximately 10 years after the site ceased to be a quarry. For anyone walking around the site today, they would discover that nature has reclaimed much of the landscape. The biggest stretch of water on our site is rapidly disappearing, water which we call the Scrape.





It is through the hard work of our Working Parties, we have managed to fell a lot of the alders which have been springing up around it but the crassula is spreading across the water, turning the water green. The smaller lake next to it, with the little bridge that divides the two pieces of water, has almost disappeared completely being badly overtaken by reeds as well as crassula.

In the open areas around these two lakes, silver birches grow like weeds and have overtaken the area in the middle of the site we had been thinking of maintaining as an open space but nature has other ideas.

Between this area and the Cockaynes Wood, comprising lots of Sweet Chestnut trees and some ancient oaks, together with plenty of holly, lies a path with, on one side, heather which has gradually been spreading. We cut it back earlier this year, fully expecting it to rejuvenate as well as spread its seeds.

Brambles are a real nuisance when they grow next to paths. We try to manage them the best we can. There is far more work in the community reserve than we have volunteers for and so new people are always welcome.





Since 2012 Alresford has won the main competition twice and has been runner-up twice. We attended the event with no expectations and dared not hope for further honours for our village. White Colne won the Essex Village of the Year competition this year however it was wonderful to hear announced that Alresford was awarded second prize, an excellent result as this year there were one hundred and sixty villages that had entered the competition. There were more honours for Alresford as the Village Hall and Pavilion received a highly commended certificate of merit. Well done to the Village Hall Trustees who care for the Village Hall and the Parish Council who operate the Pavilion!

After the awards ceremony Mrs Jennifer Tolshurst, the Lord Lieutenant of Essex, who had presented the prizes, approached me to offer her personal congratulations to the Parish Council for all the consistent and noticeable hard work by the Council and others that has taken place in Alresford I made sure that I spoke with her about the many non-Council volunteers in the village that make Alresford an exceptional village and she will be visiting us to see for herself. So, some very good news again for Alresford.

Alresford Parish Council status

The General Power of Competence (Localism Act 2011) has once again been adopted by the Parish Council. This power is very helpful as it means we are eligible for more grants and so we have more options as to what projects and tasks we can undertake. The Council no longer has to search through a list of potential powers in order to act as it now has the power to do anything that individuals may doproviding certain laws are adhered to. The reason we have this Power is that we now have a fully qualified Clerk (due to a recently acquired Certification in Local Council Administration achieved by Mr Cooke) and we meet the other criteria required.

Policing/PCSO

In the previous AA report it was mentioned that one or two children in the village had been involved in criminal damage activities including starting fires on the playing field's AstroTurf strips (especially concerning due to the very dry summer weather). Following a review of CCTV footage by the PCSO and others, identification of some of those involved has resulted in action being taken by the Police. It has to be pointed out that this was not a question of children just being "naughty" or mischievous due to school holiday boredom, the problems caused were of such a nature that they could have resulted in serious injury. When parents were shown the CCTV footage of their children they were shocked at some of the behaviours they witnessed and they were keen to see restorative justice carried out. The Parish Council has voted to renew the three-year contract with Essex Police that provides Alresford with a

part-time PCSO.

There is immense frustration amongst residents affected by the poor condition of the kerbstones in the Coppice Road area. The Parish Council continues to lobby and press for works to begin to rectify the problems. Essex Highways has surveyed the area and has mapped out the kerbstones requiring replacement, yet no maintenance crews have started repairs. It seems budgetary constraints are the issue but the argument the Parish Council puts forward is that the longer works are delayed the greater the problems become. The Parish Council has undertaken some repairs in the past but the matter is the responsibility of Essex Highways and the extent of the works requires considerable expenditure.

Heavy Goods Vehicle (HGV) drivers avoiding the bridge weight restrictions on the B1027 continue to use Coach Road and Wivenhoe Road. It is hoped that on-site processing of sand and gravel at Lufkins Farm, Frating, will mean fewer trips being made to Brett's works in Alresford by one particular group of HGVs. In a recent planning application the Parish Council supported the on-site processing of sand and gravel at Lufkins Farm in order to obviate transportation of large quantities of materials to Alresford.

The collision between a bus and a farm vehicle on Wivenhoe Road two months ago quite rightly caused great concern and so a speed and volume of traffic survey is once again being requested by the Parish Council. We have campaigned before for a speed limit reduction on the Alresford Road and Wivenhoe Road sections leading into Alresford from Wivenhoe but Essex Highways has always refused our request. This latest serious accident (although apparently not directly speed related) demonstrates the dangers of this section of road and the Parish Council will continue to lobby for road safety improvements.

Homeless persons

The Parish Council is aware of some homeless persons "rough sleeping" in our area and so Councillors and our Clerk have been involved in seeking assistance for these individuals. As we approach the cooler months sleeping outdoors in makeshift tents etc obviously carries risks and we have encouraged the homeless persons we encounter to register for assistance. Rough sleeping is technically illegal under the Vagrancy Act 1824 however the law is to be repealed and a better option of course is for the appropriate authorities to offer support and direction to those in desperate need of accommodation.

Working together

Meetings have taken place between members of the Colne Rangers Football Club and the Parish Council to see what can be done to alleviate some of the parking issues in Ford Lane and St Andrews Close. The parking problems arise when consecutive football matches are played during Saturdays and Sundays. The number of matches has increased due to the popularity of different age group teams being formed. The Parish Council wants to strike a balance between the needs of those wishing to play football and the rights of residents who are sometimes disadvantaged by poor parking by visiting players and spectators. A reduction in the number of matches in any one day may be a likely outcome of the current discussions. It has to be stressed though that the Parish Council values the tremendous achievement of the football club in encouraging so many young people to take up sport.

And finally....

As winter approaches we can look back at the long hot summer we enjoyed and hope that the rains (or even snows) of the coming winter top up the ground water reserves in the area. There are many plans taking shape to improve village amenities and the Parish Council is embarking on projects to further improve our village.

ALRESFORD BIKERS - RIDE LEADING WHAT DOES A RIDE LEADER DO?

Slightly updated as the last time I mentioned this was 16 years ago! There are many factors that any ride leader needs to keep in mind. These are some of the things on my mind on a Sunday Ride.

Where are we going? Does everyone know the destination? If there are newcomers, or people who just don't ride much, or newbie riders to the group on the day, they need the destination and the outline route, and maybe a minder. If necessary we exchange mobile numbers in case we get separated. Lesson learned the hard way! Either way, we take care of each other!

The route - heavily trafficked or deserted? It makes a difference. We plan to avoid them, but occasionally we need to be on major routes, where traffic might be heavy. I often keep speed down to keep the group together. Nobody falls off the end of one of our rides, but the riders at the back are going generally faster for longer than the riders at the front. Keeping together is difficult in traffic. So I put those riders I think might appreciate the comfort of having more experienced riders behind them, in the middle. I might even accompany this by putting vastly experienced minder with them, and route-friendly riders at the back. Don't be offended guys; I'm looking after you. Lesson learned the hard way!

Modern Satnav's mean I don't have to have ridden the route before, but I sometimes used to go take a practice ride just to be sure. There are still things to watch out for. For example, imagine being a beginner, miles away from their normal patch, riding with strangers, approaching the exit A12 to the M25 for the first time? So much to be careful of, including the cars who get into the exit lane with us early, having properly observed the 2 mile warning signs, and the hugely self-important car drivers who always wait until the last 100 yards and then expect everyone else to let them in. Not if I have a convoy behind me, you don't! (Ask me about a certain MB driver!)

Who is riding? What are their experience and ability levels? Should I be presuming to make that judgement? Not much of a leader if not eh? Do we have a Sunday ride with fast, capable and confident riders, or have we a mixed experience group? Are some going to be unhappy tooling about, while others may still feel rushed? Do I have to review the route I have mentally planned out to allow for Should I split the group and go to the same destination by two routes, one fast and long, the other short and slow? Will we arrive at the same time? Or maybe change the route altogether? Does it matter? Yes it does, emphatically, to the individuals! I must not pull someone into realms they are not happy in, be it speed, traffic, machine handling, or both. If someone finds tooling about at tick-over week after week a bore, they're unlikely to keep coming. If we always have to wait for slower people, they might get tired. Or if they're struggling to chase after a disappearing pack, beyond their comfort zone, they might get disheartened and never feel part of the group. Our riders have universally taken care over this without ever being asked. What a nice bunch eh? My answer to this situation has been to release and let the quicker riders come back more quickly, while I hang around with the slower riders and shepherd them back in their comfort zone so that they do not feel harassed. More than once! Hey, I was a learner once. Good people took good care of me. Payback time. Lesson learned the hard wav!

Do we need stops? Usually no, but occasionally yes, especially on longer rides. Might we need a fuel stop?

What is the range of the rider with the smallest tank? Bike knowledge is needed! If it is a long way we might need fuel along the way, maybe in both directions. I used to know a chap who had a 1200cc bike with a 2.1 gallon (9 litre) tank. Hopeless range, and we always carried jerry cans for him! Some modern bikes have smaller fuel capacities than you might think. But our Sunday rides rarely exceed 75 miles and normally are a bit less. We're not out for endurance records, but short interesting rides and buckets of tea. So we might need, um, er, pit stops too. Lesson learned the hard way!

How are we going to avoid losing people off the back of the group? Do we need the marker system, or can we all see the next rider? The marker system, much used by larger groups, is where the second rider stops at a convenient place just before the next change of direction, and points the way the leader went. They then join on at the back. In this way at least everyone gets a go at pointing the way, leading, and trailing. But that is for big groups and we rarely need it. But I do take care to ensure someone who knows where we are going is at the back. Lesson learned the hard way!

What is the "interested" range? Are our riders up for a 200-mile trip to some interesting place, and back in a day? Or over-nighting? How - in tents, hotels, B&B's, hostels, sympathetic friend's houses? I've done them all. Some folks have not and the idea of a long wet ride back may not be encouraging. So the longer-term weather forecast is important. Lesson learned the hard way! I start scouring weather sites on Tuesdays now!

How long have we got? Most peeps only have the mornings or afternoons, rarely both. Significant Others must not be deserted every Sunday! Are riders up for an all day trip, or a few hours, or even less? What are rider's comfort ranges? Do they need to travel far to get to the start? We have a regular all the way from Kelvedon before we even start! Are they all happy to ride in the dark if we're out late? What about rain or bad weather experience? Will they be OK? One thing is clear: whoever leads the group, no matter how large or small, they're busy!

These freedoms have a price and fairness is one of them. I know cutting the grass comes a distant second to almost any other activity I can think of, especially riding my bike, but it has to be done! And families like to be together some time at the weekend too. Biking may be the centre of my galaxy these days, but not everyone's! Lesson learned the hard way!

So, if you want to know more, find us at our monthly meetings held in HQ, The Pointer Inn, on the second Friday of each months at 8pm, where our hosts Neil and Sam always make us welcome, and you can take in hundreds of years of experience in one go!

A vehicle if driven recklessly/unsafely is a **potential** weapon. You are in control of your vehicle.

30mph - Pedestrian 80% chance of survival 40mph - Pedestrian 20% chance of survival 50mph - Pedestrian unlikely to survive

These statistics are why we have predominantly 30mph limits in areas with high pedestrian activity. These limits are not about protection motorists from harm

Please drive with due care and attention - there is no excuse for poor driving

Thank you to those abiding by the legal safe limit.

E-SCOOTERS

E-scooters are still being seen riding on the public highway, which is illegal. Shops do sell them but fail to tell you they can only be ridden on private land

Please be reminded of the following.

Legal position

Electrically powered scooters are classed as a "powered transporter" which are a type of mechanically propelled vehicle. This means the rules that apply to other mechanically propelled vehicles also apply to e-scooters. This includes the requirement that the vehicle is approved by the Vehicle Certification Agency for its construction and use for transport on the public highway. Currently e-scooters do not have type approval, which means they cannot be insured, which means they cannot be used legally in a public place.

Anyone found using one in public will have it seized under section 59 or section 165 of the road traffic act 1988.

For a section 165 - If you do not have a valid driving licence, you can be reported for the offence, which will land you in court.

CAR PARK SCAM

I would like to make the community aware of a car park scam that has been going around for a while. Some car parks have a QR code you scan when paying for your parking. Criminals are pasting their own QR code over the top of it, which when scanned by your phone, takes money from your account not to mention you have not actually paid for your parking like you believe, which could result in receiving a parking ticket.

A resident used a car park in Harwich which one of these fraudulent QR codes and £400 was withdrawn from their account.

If using one of these car parks with the QR code, check that there is not a fraudulent one pasted over the original. You should be able to tell visually by the raised edge of the sticker or try running your thumb nail round the outside for lifting. I believe most car parks have alternative methods for payment, which include paying on an APP.

PARKING FINE SCAM

Many People have received a text in the form of a parking fine. The link looks to already have been removed, however! Usually new links are added daily.

other scams are popping up daily. Any text or email with sketchy details are most likely a scam. If you receive any like these just delete them.



WHO TO REPORT TO FOR PARKING ISSUES/ VEHICLES

DVLA: Report an untaxed vehicle - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)
Deal with Vehicles with No MOT OR TAX on the public highway. DVLA can remove them.

Police will intervene when the vehicle is being driven with a fixed penalty notice.


