Graham Mills (1957-64)

Graham is a true Bainesian being a former pupil of Baines Endowed as well as the Grammar school. After leaving Leicester University he was employed with the UK Atomic Energy Authority at Culcheth Laboratories, Warrington, researching reactor materials metallurgy. During this time, he spent time at the Radio and Space Research Station in the Falkland Islands.

After 1973 he began working for the offshore oil and gas construction industry, first with Unit Inspection Company, a subsidiary of British Steel, working at Nigg Bay in NE Scotland helping build the BP Forties Field offshore platform, Highlands 1.

Then he joined Oceaneering for diving and underwater remote technology for offshore oil and gas developments in the North Sea and Middle East.

Following this he planned to retire, but he was hired as the Project Contracts Manager for an FSPO for Tullow Oil and Gas destined for offshore Ghana.

He is currently retired, living principally in Bangkok with a flat in Singapore and one in Aberdeen.
