Featured Alumni - Mike Wallace (1966 - 1971)

Mike left Baines L6th to join the BP Tanker Company under its sponsored Merchant Navy Cadet Engineering Officer programme. The first 2 years was spent studying for an OND at Riversdale COT, Liverpool.

He resigned from BP in 1974 to follow his passion for aviation, and luckily gained a place on a 5-year sandwich undergraduate apprenticeship with British Aircraft Corporation (now BAE SYSTEMS) at Warton, reading Mechanical Engineering at UMIST graduating in 1978.

He became a Member of the Royal Aeronautical Society and a Chartered Engineer in 1985. In 1987, while working as a Senior Project Engineer on the new Swedish JAS 39 fighter programme, he was asked to deputise for his Manager in providing reports and presentations for Senior Executives.

Within 12 months he was promoted to be the youngest Head of Department at BAE Warton, tasked with improving the performance of the Bid Proposals Centre. A year later he was promoted again and became the youngest Senior Executive in the Company, appointed to lead the North Sea Air Combat Manoeuvring Instrumentation Range project. The Range was completed in 1990 and became the world's finest system, serving most NATO fighter squadrons and a few non-NATO customers.

By 1995 he was 'invited' to lead a Company commitment for industrial investment in Saudi Arabia. This was a \$1 Billion programme under which BAE had contracted to develop the Saudi industrial base away from the oil and gas industry. He was promoted to Director, Economic Development. had to significantly re-structure the organisation and develop new international investment techniques. The Programme was completed over the next 9 years. In addition, he developed parallel subsidiary programmes to further support employment opportunities for young Saudis. He worked with Prince Charles and the Saudi Crown Prince to introduce the Prince of Wales Youth Business Trust into the Kingdom.

One of the new companies he was working on involved the commercialisation of Saudi Arabian genetics research into a disease diagnostic biotechnology company. In 2005, the Saudi partner invited him to join them and lead the commercialisation of its research
