# OLD BOYS' NOTES AND CORRESPONDENCE.

Sigmn. D. B. Lloyd's long and interesting letter (11/11/43) from " an active theatre of operations" (C.M.F., Italy) tells how much he appreciates "the little French that was instilled into him at School," and describes vividly a spaghetti supper! Whilst in Africa he had had malaria, but was again perfectly all right." On 25/2/44 he wrote to tell us of a chance visit to a concert, where he found himself sitting next to another O.B., W. N. Walsh. On 26/11/43 A.C. D. S. Lane was in Hospital in Southport; we hope he is quite

well again. Dvr. C. Worthington (South of England, 20/12/43) had had a serious accident to his arm, but had practically regained full use of it. A.C. J. Fairburn (Cornwall, 13/12/43) told of his strenuous course in the R.A.F. he obtained first place in his squad at the examination. Fus. H. Wharton was serving along with Baron Lloyd (23/12/43). Cfn. R./M. W. G. Johnson had been on a heavy A.A. site for several months. Lieut. J. A. Paterson (Master), who arrived in Africa during the hottest part of the summer, was (20/12/43) instructing at a height of 3,500 feet, and "longing for the sunshine so little appreciated at the time of arrival!" Pte. J. L. Towler (B.N.A.F., 31/12/43) described his trip of several hundred miles across North Africa in a very primitive cattle truck. F./O. H. N. Moulding (Master) wrote (22/12/43) about his "leisure activities" in Italy and sent sketches (!) of "articles made from old bomb fin boxes." A.C.2 G. Curwen (formerly in N.F.S.), writing from near Hereford, 9/1/44, gave details of life in a training camp. On 23/1/44 Sigmn. H. W. Atherton (M.E.F.) had "read the last magazine until it would stand no more." Bdr. J. M. Bibby (B.N.A.F., 28/1/44) had arrived in "this theatre of war when all the fun was over." Cadet G. H. Pearson (C.M.F., 8/2/44) was one of the very great number who sent thanks for the List of O.B.'s in H.M. Forces. Lieut. A. S. Binnie (India, 6/2/44) tells us that the last two months have provided many interesting and exciting experiences " -but he doesn't tell us what! From M.E.F., 14/2/44, Pte. C. L. Kippax reports that, although he had not yet met any O.B., he had seen the name of one in a visitors' book at a hostel. "Just a few lines" (eight pages to be precise !—Ep.) from Arms. S./Sgt. E. H. Bailey (India, 15/2/44) was hoping to spend his 14 days' leave in Madras. Cpl. A. G. Pilling (also India, 14/2/44) had come across Nil Sine Labore chalked on the wall where he had been stationed, but had failed to discover the writer. Spr. T. Matthews is reported missing in Italy. Leonard A. Haworth has been granted his wings in Canada and received a Commission. Able-Seaman Donald Harvey is reported missing, presumed killed.

We have now survived through five war winters; the sixth is still far off, but we have good reasons for praying that it may be as free from prolonged spells of cold weather as its immediate predecessor. However, at the moment the high promise of a lovely Spring is with us, and we eagerly look forward to the coming of the long, sunny days. Great events, we are told, are impending. May they bring the day of Victory very near!

Mr. J. J. Marland, an Old Boy of the School, has taken over the work of Mrs. Griffiths. We extend a hearty welcome to Mr. Marland, more especially because he is one of that great and glorious band of men who have risked their lives upon the High Seas in order to maintain our supply-line unbroken. We deplore the misfortune of war which has deprived the Merchant Navy of one of its officers; but we hope that his return to his old School may be for him the beginning of a new career, no less full of promise than the old.

Mrs. Hampson, the friend of hundreds of boys who have passed through the School during the last two decades, celebrates her seventieth birthday this month. This metamorphosis has meant more and more work and responsibility for Mrs. Hampson as time has gone on, but she continues serenely on her way; neither pressure of work nor the weight of years has succeeded in quenching her high spirit or checking her nimbleness of foot.

No task has ever been too great for her to undertake; not only lunches, but teas for all kinds of School functions and occasions, refreshments for parents' evenings, School Concerts and Old Boys' Dances, hot-pot suppers for Scouts

and Old Boys; all these have been willingly and capably arranged by her

whenever they have been required.

Nor has she ever been absent from her duties. Illness, she will tell you, is a luxury in which she has no time to indulge. She is small, but tough of fibre, and some of you know to your cost how nimble she can be. Since her husband died, about 17 years ago, she has lived away from School, but she is there in her kitchen every school morning before a single one of you has opened his eyes, and she is still there when most of you have left for home.

Such a record is indeed remarkable, and Mrs. Hampson has deserved well of the School. That you appreciate this fact is shown by your ready response

to the birthday fund which has been opened.

Sergeant-Major Brown, of the Air-Borne Troops, lectured to a large number of boys at the beginning of the term. It was a talk which held you enraptured from beginning to end, and you will not quickly forget it.
