From the Chair of your Parish Council

Another year is in its final stages and for me, I don't know where the time has gone. Not an easy year with all the restrictions we have been subjected to and the worry of Covid19 making 2021 a unique year for us all. Let us hope that life will return to a better normality in the near future.

The Parish Council has continued to function and has now held two meetings "face to face" making everything far more straightforward. We are working hard to replace the playground equipment in Birdbrook, led by Councillors Katie Gentry and Martin Gilbert . I thank them both for their commitment and drive in this project. As a Council we have earmarked funds to replace the swings and are awaiting the outcome of yet another grant application. We seem to be thwarted at every turn when it comes to grant applications. The Trustees of the Community House have offered to help and we looking to work more closely with them in the coming months. The table top sale organised mainly by Katie was a major success and she should be delighted with the response from the community. Well done to those who assisted in raising further funds for the playground and a big thank you to those who have already donated.

Have you spotted the new lights in the bus stops in Birdbrook and Baythorne End? Katie informed us that the bus stops were very dark places now that the days have drawn in. For very little money Councillors Martin Gilbert and Steve Rhenius took the initiative and installed some lights powered by solar panels.

It was very disappointing to hear from District Councillor Diana Garrod that the Covid19 rates in our region have increased significantly to such an extent that hospital visiting has been put on hold except for end of life patients. Depressing, but serves as a warning to us all to keep our distance, wear masks where appropriate, and for the best opportunity to fight the disease get the vaccination.

As Headmaster of a school in South London I led many assemblies but for me the most important in our annual calendar was the Remembrance Service. The Royal British Legion sent through facts and stories relating to the world wars and other conflicts. The statistic that struck

me as staggering and one in which I emphasised each year was the loss of life on both sides in the Great War; if memory serves me well it worked out to be just under five thousand people who perished each day and every day for five long years. This figure seemed to resonate with pupils when put in the context that it was equivalent to all the pupils in the school five times over lost their life each day for five years. To remember those who defended our freedoms and those who paid the ultimate sacrifice the Parish Council make a donation each year to the Royal British Legion and we lay a wreath at the War Memorial at St Augustine's Church. It was a privilege and an honour to undertake this role again this year at the Annual Service of Remembrance.

Wishing each and everyone of you a wonderful Christmas and a healthy and prosperous 2022.



Birdbrook Wild Life Column

It's been a funny old Autumn; after a fairly average summer, autumn has been very mild and quite dry. It certainly seems to have confused some of our migratory birds; there was a report of swallows still heading south in Suffolk last week and the Redwings and Fieldfares must think it's still summer having piled into the UK a few weeks ago to escape the wintery weather in Northern Europe, There were reports of flocks of several thousand Redwings in Essex and also large numbers of Fieldfare throughout East Anglia. It's quite unusual to see so many of these migratory thrushes in early winter. Their numbers tend to build up after Christmas but there is guite a large flock of Redwing around the village at the moment and Fieldfare have also been seen locally in good numbers. On the east coast there have been large flocks of Snow buntings which tend to only show up in when the weather gets really grim and I just wonder whether this is a sign of a forthcoming bad winter.


There seems little doubt that our resident birds did not enjoy a successful breeding season and by now I should be ringing quite a few Blackbirds, Robins and Dunnocks but unfortunately they just don't seem to be present in their usual numbers. There does however seem to be good news for one of our resident garden birds. Many of you will have read about the huge decline in the numbers of Greenfinches. This has been mainly due to an outbreak of trichomonosis, a parasite-induced disease which prevents the birds from feeding properly. As with a lot of our common birds, loss of habitat, especially hedgerows and use of insecticides

on farmland and in gardens also has had a huge effect on numbers!! Well, the good news is that this year they seem to have made a stunning recovery, at least locally. I usually ring between 10 and 20 Greenfinches in a year but this year numbers have soared. I ringed 40 birds in September and over a 20 in October and quite amazingly they were all young birds. Pete Connolly at the bottom of Station Road had a flock in early October in excess of 60 birds. He also had a Brambling in his garden! A close relative of the Chaffinch these winter visitors rarely venture into gardens except in the hardest winters.....another sign of what's to come perhaps??

And whilst on the subject of winter visitors I thought you may be interested to see a real rarity that has turned up in Essex in the last few weeks. In amongst the Brent geese flocks on the Crouch Estuary are two Red-breasted geese that normally migrate in the winter to eastern Europe from their breeding grounds in Siberia. Many thanks to Ian Tarbin for the photograph.

And now for a bit of fun. How about keeping a list of the bird species that you see in and around your garden. You'll be surprised just how many you actually see and I've seen over 70 species in the 6 years that I've lived here. Why not get the children involved....it might even get them away from their X-Box's for a while! Oh, and a Happy Xmas to everyone – and opposite is a photo of a Robin ringed earlier this year.

Hello From Your District Councillor

Community Transport

Some patients of the Steeple Bumpstead GP surgery have had difficulty accessing their healthcare provider in Haverhill. I would like to confirm that Braintree District Council will provide transport to Haverhill for healthcare reasons, e.g. visit to the GP surgery or to collect prescriptions or medicine. This is currently only organised via telephone. There is a cost involved and full details can be found at: www.braintree.gov.uk/community/social-car-scheme or telephone: 01376 557883.

Unfortunately there are few volunteers in this part of the district and BDC would love to hear from anyone who would be interested in joining their Social Car Scheme. Please contact either myself or the BDC team on 01376 557883 for more information.

Isolated Bird Flu Case

An isolated outbreak of Avian Influenza (or Bird Flu) has been confirmed at an animal sanctuary in Kirby Cross in Tendring. The outbreak is in birds and there are no cases in people. Avian Influenza is primarily a disease of birds and the risk to the general public's health is very low. Pet owners with other animals do not usually need to take other action. If a person has concerns regarding their pet, they should contact their private veterinary surgeon.

The Food Standards Agency has said that Avian Influenza poses a very low food safety risk for consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

New Legislation - Botulinum Toxin and Cosmetic Fillers (Children) Act 2021

Botulinum toxin and cosmetic fillers for under 18s - New legislation: It is a criminal offence to administer botulinum toxin (commonly known as 'Botox') or a filler by way of injection for a cosmetic purpose to a person under 18, even if they have the permission of someone over 18. More information: www.gov.uk/government/publications/botulinum-toxin-and-cosmetic-fillers-for-under-18s

Cycle Storage Grant

We are offering capital grants to businesses on our industrial estates willing to install on-site cycle storage facilities. Grants of **up to £2,000** are available to support 30 small or medium sized businesses. BDC's cycling strategy aims to increase the number of short journeys that people make by bike, in an effort to reduce emissions and congestion, tackle climate



change and ease the pressure on car parking. We know that good facilities to store bikes is a really important factor in people's decision to cycle to work. Businesses can visit www.braintree.gov.uk/cyclestorage to find out more about the scheme, criteria and application

process. The scheme is open to applications until **6 December 2021**.

Essex Business Adaptation Grant to re-open soon

A scheme designed to help businesses adapt their operations or premises in response to Covid-19 is coming soon. Small and medium sized businesses will be able to apply for a grant of up to £5,000 to make their businesses Covid-19 secure. Keep an eye out for the updates on the BDC website or social media.

Temporary Suspension of Visiting in Local Hospitals

Visiting is temporarily suspended in Addenbrooke's hospital, Cambridge, east and west Suffolk hospitals and north east Essex hospitals. This is due to the high number of COVID-19 infections in the community. However, there are some exceptions and visiting will still be supported for:

- End-of-life care
- Those in formal caring roles for patients with learning disabilities or severe dementia, for example
- Parents of children
- Maternity

There will be no changes in the above areas. Volunteers will be unable to visit general wards, but can continue to offer their support in end-of-life care and maternity (please enquire at the relevant hospital). The situation will be reviewed in December in line with hospital admissions and overall community prevalence, and to decide whether to continue with the suspension or return to a restricted visiting policy.

Christmas is a time for family and friends, and I would like to wish all residents a happy Christmas break. I know everyone is eager to get back to normal, but please spare a thought for the vulnerable; keep them safe and take a Lateral Flow Test before you visit.

A phage, or bacteriophage, is a natural, microscopic predator that attacks and kills bacteria. There are more phages on Earth than every other organism combined! Phages exist naturally all over the planet and can be found in water, soil or on animals.

Phages can kill bacteria that have become immune to antibiotics. They are clinically safe and highly specific, so they don't harm the good bacteria. By taking samples from a wide range of environments, scientists can isolate new phages that can be used to treat antibiotic-resistant infections.

Bus Shelter Lights


