if I suggested that we should hold our Christmas Carol services after the 25th of December when the church's Christmas season actually starts!

I'm sure you can remember doing maths problems which ask: if it takes one farmer with a tractor one day to plough a field, how long does it take two farmers, each with a tractor? The answer, we imagine, is half a day, but some things can't be hurried like that.

When Mary hears from the Archangel Gabriel that she's going to have a baby, she knows she'll have to wait nine months, and nothing will speed that up. As Mary waits for her baby to be born, so we also have to wait, and in Advent we join her for the final month of her pregnancy.

We don't like waiting, I suspect, because we often think of time waiting as time wasted. If we look at it as time watching, and time preparing, then it can feel quite different.

Advent gives us time to prepare not just the turkey and the pudding, but our hearts, minds, and souls. Then when the day arrives, when Jesus is born, we'll be at the right place in the story, the most important story ever told, of how God became a baby so that he could become part of our story.

Birdbrook Speed-watch group



Richard (Toby) Hunt

Toby Hunt, who died in August aged 100, was almost certainly the oldest Birdbrook resident at the time of his death. Apart from a period of military service with the R.A.F during the Second World War, spent largely in Africa, he had lived his whole life in the parish of Birdbrook.

He was born in Moyns Park and attended the church primary school in Birdbrook.

After the war, he started work with Archers builders, mostly painting and decorating in properties, amongst others, that were owned by Gurteens and Anglia Launderettes. After being made redundant, he went to work for Walter French builders where he developed his considerable carpentry and brickwork skills.

Toby, who only shortly before his death, revealed he was not that keen on the name and preferred his given Christian name, Richard, was married to Mary for over 70 years. She was the sister of Tim and Peter Ralling and was also born and reared in Birdbrook. They had no children of their own, but adopted Liz, now Liz Gatt, who has two daughters, of whom Toby was immensely proud and who were very attentive to him in his last years, particularly after Mary died in August 2019.

By the time Liz arrived, Toby was self-employed and embarked on the building of their bungalow, Ricmar, in Moat Road, where he and Mary spent the rest of their lives.

He was a keen and knowledgeable plantsman and regularly exhibited his sweet peas. He was an active supporter of St Augustine's Church, singing in the choir and taking on the role of P.C.C secretary for many years. The church was fortunate, too, to be supplied with copious quantities of flowers and greenery from his garden and greenhouse until only very recently.

However, this is exactly why this hub is so important, for those of us unable to travel, see family and friends and sometimes not sure of how or where to gain support during such harsh financial times, this hub welcomes and enables everyone to take part. From Newborns to veterans, teenagers to millennials everyone is welcome at the Birdbrook Community Warm

Hub! (Please note all under 18's MUST be accompanied by a parent/guardian). The idea of the warm hub is to offer a warm space for all to visit for free and spend as much or as little time as you would like to enjoy the warm venue (without the cost of electric for yourselves) while socialising with friends, neighbours, and family together.
