#### Local Plan Review to 2041 - Changes and Consultation

Braintree District Council must allocate land for where housing could be built of around 1,300 homes a year up to 2041, a mandatory target set by central government. Changes have been made to the BDC Local Plan Review timetable and the Regulation 18 consultation will now be February 2026. This 'Preferred Options' consultation; the first of two statutory consultations, will ask residents for views on the draft Local Plan including the proposed sites before any final decisions are made on sites. This is the opportunity to have your say and help shape the draft Local Plan before it is submitted to the Planning Inspectorate. I have been asked about a 'Green Buffer' between Haverhill and villages in the Bumpstead Ward. If residents and parish councils wish, the consultation in February would be the time to ask BDC for a 'green buffer' to be allocated in BDC's evidence base going forward, as there are currently no plans for this. Once the final plan is adopted, it will allocate land for development up to 2041. This is why it's important for residents, businesses, communities and all interested parties to have their say, engage with the proposed plan and share ideas for shaping your local area and the district's future. #### **Housing target**


- Braintree District Council is required to allocate land for where housing could be built of around 1,300 homes a year up to 2041, a target that is mandatory and set by central government.
- Targets are set by looking at population growth, housing affordability and existing housing stock.
- If it does not plan for the new homes needed, the council would not have a sound local plan. This means that applications for development are more likely to be granted at appeal by Inspectors who act for the national government. This would reduce the council's and community's influence over what kind of housing is built and where.
- Over 300 sites have been submitted to the council for consideration, which would be able to provide over 100,000 new homes. Many sites have been discounted at this stage and are not currently planned to go forward into a draft plan.
- Existing site allocations and windfall development will also support to meet the housing target. Windfall development is on land which has not been specifically identified as available in the local plan process - typically these are previously developed sites or infill sites which become unexpectedly available e.g. small sites such as a barn conversion or a new flat over a shop.

#### **Green Buffer**

I would again draw your attention to the Braintree District Settlement Fringe Study – Landscape Sensitivity Assessment 2025 (see P50+ agenda 24/09/25) it seems that BDC currently have no plans to ensure a green buffer between the villages in the Bumpstead Ward and Haverhill. I have been asked about



requesting a Green Buffer by PC members; it is during the February 2026 consultation (Reg. 18) that Parish Councils, particularly Sturmer and Helions Bumpstead, and residents, put forward a request to BDC's planning team that a 'green buffer' is put in place by Braintree District Council and that this is included in their evidence base going forward.

## The Current Local Plan Sub-Committee Timetable

At this point in time, BDC needs to find sites for a further 1,097 homes. The North of the district (Bumpstead Ward) is still under consideration although Homes England have made it clear that the A1307 cannot cope with further traffic to Cambridge.

- Installing hot water or heating systems
- Repairing hot water or heating systems

Residents can apply for a major housing grant if you are:

- An owner occupier of a property
- A leaseholder with at least five years lease remaining and have a repairing responsibility for the property

• The property you want to repair, must be your only or main residence and must have been in your ownership for at least three years. For first time buyers, you must have owned the property for at least 12 months.

Major housing grants are means-tested and you must repay the grant in full when you sell or transfer the

# HMRC: Making Tax Digital for Income Tax – campaign, webinars and resources hub – The new way to do Tax Returns

It is the biggest change since HMRC launched Self Assessment more than 30 years ago. HMRC has launched a comprehensive communications campaign to raise awareness of Making Tax Digital for Income Tax. It is a new way for sole traders and landlords to report their income and expenses to HMRC and submit their tax returns. From 6 April 2026, sole traders and landlords with qualifying income over £50,000 from self-employment and property will be required to use Making Tax Digital for Income Tax. You will need to use

recognised software, send quarterly updates and submit your tax return by 31st January each year. Info at:



Those received after the 15 January deadline will only be considered once all on time applications are determined. This means applying late could reduce the chance of parents getting a place for their child at their preferred school.

#### **Local Government Reorganisation Update**

Following the Full Council meeting in September, where councillors debated proposals for the unitary authority. The meeting showed a clear preference for the Three Unitary proposal (left) that was developed by Essex County Council and on that basis it was suggested to the Leader of Braintree District Council that this should be the proposal that BDC supports for the final submission to Government. It should be noted that the decision of which proposal, if any, to implement is not a decision of the Council or any council in Greater Essex. The formation of councils is a function of Central Government and the final decision will be made by the Secretary of State. Current provisional indications from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government are that the Secretary of State will set out their 'minded-to' decision in spring 2026. It is expected that Government will launch a statutory consultation soon and BDC will be a statutory consultee. Sadly, Government information for our future remains somewhat vague.

## An Extraordinary Act of Kindness

On 9th November, Remembrance Sunday, my cousin Wendy from Scotland & her husband Howard were staying with Diane & myself so that Howard, a Falklands & Iraq veteran, could parade at the Cenotaph in London. I was taking him to Epping to catch a Central Line train: what follows are in his words. Alan Cook

Wendy & I are staying with her cousin Alan & his wife Diane, primarily so that I could attend the Cenotaph in London. Sunday morning, up bright & early, Alan & I headed off to Epping to catch the tube.

Alan is driving, about fifteen minutes out in thick fog, BANG 💥 we hit a pothole. The tyre starts to deflate, we limp into Cornish Hall End, Alan is devastated. We came to a stop just off a driveway, opposite was a van written on its side Angel 24hour Mobile Tyres.

I said to Alan "what are the chances of that. A mobile try specialist called ANGELS".

Alan had activated his in car roadside assistance who were extremely helpful but said their operative would be with us between 8 - 9am. Alan had left his mobile at home so I was relaying messages on mine. We were sitting in the car, time now 7.30am. The chap who runs Angels came out of his house, incidentally on his way to a memorial service.

Alan went across to have a word & see if he could help, his name was Grant. "What's up mate?" Alan explained so he inspected the damage but unfortunately he didn't have a replacement tyre of the correct size on board.

At this point Grants partner Steph came out of the house & asked what the problem was. Alan explained & pointed to me, by this time I was out of the car. Steph saw me in my blazer, medals, beret & Falklands scarf. "Take my car, he needs to get to the Cenotaph" she said.

We were absolutely flabbergasted & speechless, that someone could just turn round to two complete strangers at that time on a Sunday morning & hand over their car keys.

A Range Rover no less, we just looked at one another in total disbelief. I quickly said, "Alan you're driving".

We left Alans car keys with Steph a we headed off to Epping. It was still very foggy so progress was slow. I kept telling Alan that there was nothing more we could do. If I don't get there, I don't get there, it's okay. I could see that he was feeling bad about things, but it wasn't his fault.

We arrived at Epping & I handed Alan some money in order to show my grateful appreciation & thanks to Grant & Steph, such amazing people.

I got to HorseGuards just in time.

This is the country we live in & don't let anyone tell you otherwise.

An amazing couple who I can't thank enough for making sure that I got there chance to meet up with my shipmates & pay our respects to the fallen.

Grant as it turned out is an ex paratrooper who originated from South Africa. He is associated with a motorbike club who support disabled veteran's & run a food service in Stevenage. The name of his business says it all & is so appreciate ANGEL. They were both certainly our Angels that morning.

## Support your Local Farmers with Your Kitchen Waste

There seem to have been lots of complaints locally about the fertilizer which has been spread on local farms, also misinformation on social media. Perhaps I could clarify what has been used.

Known as Digestate it is a by product of anaerobic digestion of which there are several plants around the country which use the process to create electricity to sell to the grid. Some of these AD plants are based on farms where they are fed with crops such as maize or rye. Larger ones are fed with food waste from households & restaurants.

Each week we all put out our small green bins full of waste to be collected, mostly with no further thought as to what happens to it! Instead of ending up in landfill it is sent to an AD plant in Dagenham, the process breaks down the waste which produces biogas which is burned to produce electricity, the leftover material is the digestate which is a liquid rich in nutrients such as nitrogen, potassium & phosphorus. It is then transported to local farms to be spread as organic fertilizer which is much better for the environment than fertilizer produced from fossil fuels & often sourced from abroad. It produces amazing crops & improves the soil for years to come.

There have been complaints about the odour & yes it does smell for a day or two after application but surely if you choose to live in & take advantage of our beautiful countryside you have to accept and support farming practices, especially recycling our green bin contents.


#### October
