

Elections 7th May 2026 in 2027, & 2028

As you will have heard, Essex County Council elections will take place on Thursday 7th May. Nominations to be submitted between 30 March and 9 April, so the final list of candidates will be available after that date.

Poll cards will be delivered to all electors registered by 10 April. Applications after this date will be sent a poll card during week commencing 13 April. If you do not receive a poll card it may mean you are not registered, and you can register at www.gov.uk/register tovote.

Registration deadline - for those not already registered is midnight on Monday 20 April.
Postal vote application deadline - for those who do not already have a postal vote set up is 5pm on Tuesday 21 April.

Voters are now required to show photographic identification at polling stations before they are given a ballot paper. A list of accepted ID documents is given at: <https://www.braintree.gov.uk/voting-elections/braintree-district-council-official-elections/2>

Voter Authority Certificate deadline - anyone who does not have the legal required photo identification like a photo driving licence, passport, bus pass etc can apply up to 5pm on Tuesday 28 April.

Parish Council elections will be May 2027
District elections would've also been due in May 2027 however with LGR (local government reorganisation) ECC anticipate these will be cancelled. Shadow elections for the new unitary authority will be held.
Mayoral elections will be May 2028.

Investing in local communities to protect the environment

Government Changes to Planning

As part of the government's drive to reach their target of building 1.5 million homes this Parliament, proposed changes to the planning system have been announced. Two key points are: planning applications for developments within reasonable walking distance of well-connected train stations are expected to be approved. Secondly, local authorities must inform the Secretary of State if they plan to refuse an application for 150 or more homes. The Secretary of State will then determine whether to assume responsibility for the decision-making process and approve the application. This last point has raised considerable concerns among local

authorities who see it as a dilution of the local decision-making powers of planning officers and planning committees. The Leader has since written to the MP.

Local Plan Sub-Committee – Site STUR 2293

It was reported that the Government's Standard Housing Methodology calculation had identified a significant increase in the number of houses required in the District and that as part of the site reassessment process land should be identified for approximately 1100 additional houses for inclusion in the Local Plan Review.



Site STUR2293 land south of Haverhill was brought back to the committee for reconsideration. I attended the meeting and advised the committee that whilst they see this site on a flat piece of paper, it sits on a plateau and overlooks the Haverhill industrial zone with several major, chemical and biological process industries. It includes the very tall 24/7 Culina Distribution Centre which can be seen on the skyline over a great distance. This development would sit at a higher point, above Culina and would irreversibly change the skyline of this valued landscape forever and would be at odds with Council's planning policies. It would also surround the Grade I Saxon church


and Saxon burial mound which is of immense historical importance where one of Boudicca's generals is said to be buried. The site may therefore be lobbied for extensive architectural excavation. West Suffolk Council have listed it in their Site Omission Report 2024 and their sustainability assessment identifies irreplaceable loss of grade 2 agricultural land. In terms of transport and connectivity; there is none! No rail link is planned and Haverhill does not even have a dual carriageway nearby. Again, this is at odds with policies.

The site was not included in the Draft Local Plan by the committee at this time, but I expect it to return one day. It could, potentially find its way back into this Local Plan, residents from the south attended a later LPSC meeting to object to the 5000 home Kings Dean Development, Kelvedon and many asked why the north of the district did not include any large developments. I fully expect that they will respond to the forthcoming consultation.

Future Proposals for the massive 'Haverhill Vales' by Catesby Estates (incl. site STUR2293)

Now is the Time Have Your Say on the Draft Local Plan (to 2041)

BDC are conducting a 6-week public consultation on the Draft Local Plan to commence around **19th February**. Residents are encouraged to comment. It is proposed that several public exhibitions concentrating on the areas with higher levels of growth at Kelvedon, Braintree, Halstead, Hatfield Peverel and Coggeshall will be held. There will probably be a webinar. Each library in the district will be provided with a copy of the Plan and forms and guidance notes on how to respond to the consultation. It will be



published on the Council's website, social media and the local press. Responses to the consultation are preferred via the Council's online consultation portal.

Once concluded, all responses will be published on the Council's website and will be reported to the Local Plan Sub-Committee, who will then decide whether changes are required to

the updated Local Plan, before agreeing a submission version of the Plan for consultation later in 2026.

Number Plate Thefts

Essex Police advise an increase in number plates being stolen from cars across the district. Stolen plates are often used to disguise vehicles involved in crime, such as fuel theft or avoiding speed cameras. How to reduce risk:

- Use anti-theft screws or security bolts for your plates.
- Park in well-lit, busy areas or a secure garage whenever possible.
- Consider CCTV or dash cams for added deterrence.
- Report any suspicious activity immediately to the police.

Mayoral Elections Delayed to 2028

We had previously been advised that Mayoral Elections would take place in May 2026. However, it was announced on 04/12/2025 in the House of Commons that these elections will now take place in May 2028.

Essex County Council Election – Now Scheduled for May 2026

The Rt Hon Steve Reed OBE MP (Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government has written to the Leader of Essex County Council, Kevin Bentley on 29/01/26:-

"... I am writing to confirm that I will not be including the election to Essex County Council in legislation to postpone local elections. I recognise the significant demands facing Essex County Council, including the implications of holding elections alongside key reorganisation milestones early this year, and am grateful for the clarity you provided on how postponement would release essential capacity to support delivery of reorganisation. However, in reaching my decision I placed particular weight on the fact that

STUR2293 and 'Haverhill Vales' will probably return at some point.

the Council has not made a clear and unambiguous case for postponement through its formal representations and your repeated statements that the Council would not be seeking postponement. I have been clear through this process that I would listen to local leaders and not seek to impose decisions on councils from Whitehall. For these reasons, and on balance, I consider it appropriate that the elections to Essex County Council take place in May 2026.”

BDC Budget Proposals 2026-2027

At the Cabinet meeting held 5th February, the following are some of the proposals that will be put to the vote at the next Council meeting:-

The Budget for 2026-27 is balanced with a transfer to general balances. A recommendation is made to Council which will freeze the Braintree District Council’s element of the overall Council Tax bill. This will mean keeping the Braintree District Band D property tax rate at £206.01. To support households on low income with their total bill, the Council has also recently approved continuation of the Local Council Tax Support Scheme which will provide discounts to eligible households. Advice and guidance will be available to those in need of support and, where appropriate, exceptional hardship relief will be considered.

To further support communities with the ongoing challenges from the cost of living, an additional £400,000 is being made available to extend the Cost of Living Fund and the Council will continue to work with key partners in delivering this essential support. This is on the back of an already successful programme of community support which has been delivered using £1 million previously allocated from New Homes Bonus.

To maintain current services, over £2 million is being added to the Budget to meet inflationary pressures, new burdens and other increases in costs or to cover reductions in income. In addition, the Budget proposes almost £1 Million for investment into services to ensure continuous improvement in service delivery, maintain community support, enhance digital services, and meet growing demands on the Council’s regulatory services. Additional funding is also being made available to increase capacity in the Council’s enabling services given the challenges on the Council, not least preparing for Local Government Reorganisation (LGR).

The successful Councillor Community Grant scheme is being extended for a further two years with an increased allocation of £1,500 to each Councillor per annum to use to support local projects and community groups. Funding has been made available for the three main town centres to provide for festive celebrations for the next three years.

Funding is being made available by the Government to enable the authority to tackle the issues of preventing homelessness and rough sleeping as well as supporting those at risk from domestic abuse. The Budget recognises the increasing cost pressures from the need to provide temporary accommodation, and the Council will continue to explore ways in which it can work with private landlords and other agencies to direct households and those at risk of homelessness into affordable and secure housing solutions.

To maintain progress against the Council’s Climate Change Action Plan, an extra £150,000 is being made available, which will fund projects and initiatives including more funding for tree and bulb planting.

(Right) M31 Andromeda galaxy. It is the nearest major galaxy to our Milky Way galaxy. The distance from us to it is about 2.5 million light-years and it is believed to be about 152,000 light-years across i.e. it would take light 152,000 years to travel from one edge of the galaxy to the other. It is in the constellation of Andromeda.



(Left) M33 is a spiral galaxy and is only about 2.7M light-years away. It, just like our galaxy, resides in what is called “The Local group” along with The Andromeda galaxy and several others. M33 is smaller than our Milky Way galaxy i.e. it is about 60,000 light-years in diameter compared to our Milky Way at about 100,000 light-years in diameter. New Bin Collections

Why the change?
The law has recently changed. The Environment Act and Simpler Recycling now requires the collection of recycling materials from households, and not from bring banks, so ALL councils must start collecting a wider range of recyclable material from the kerbside and provide a weekly food recycling collection from all households. The Council also wants to divert as much waste as possible from landfill, or incineration, and capture more of this for recycling to support our climate aspirations, meet targets set nationally and, as part of the new Waste Strategy for Essex, to recycle at least 65% of household waste by 2035. The changes also aim to reduce the cost of waste collection and disposal.

Why are grey bins to be collected only every 3 weeks?
A study by Essex County Council found that, on average, 30% of the waste in grey bins from Braintree District Council households was food waste, and a significant amount of material that could have been recycled through other methods was being placed into the grey bins.

The changes coming in June aim to improve recycling by increasing the capacity for recyclable materials. Food waste will continue to be collected weekly, avoiding any need to place food waste in grey bins.

Crime Prevention and Fraud Advice Crime Data

Taking photos / video footage in public, is it legal?

It is not illegal to take photographs or video footage in public places unless it is for criminal or terrorist purposes.

There will be places where you have access as a member of the public, but will have to ask permission or may be prevented altogether. These could include stately homes, museums, churches, shopping malls, railway stations and council / government buildings. You need to check the situation out on a case by case basis.

The taking of photographs of an individual without their consent is a civil matter. Taking a photo of a person where they can expect privacy (inside their home or garden) is likely to be a breach of privacy laws.
