# Recycling

#### Helpful Information from Braintree for your Recycling

What can I do with Bubble Wrap? -Bubble wrap can be collected along with other soft plastics i.e. bread bags, clingfilm, crisp packets and While Birdbrook is in Essex, and our weekly rubbish collection is arranged by Braintree District Council, our nearest Recycling centre is in Haverhill, Suffolk.

The new site in Homefield Road is now open and visits can be booked via their website:

taken to a collection point. These can generally be found at local Supermarkets, but residents are urged to check first.

Can I recycling blister packs? - Blister packs unfortunately cannot currently be recycled as they are made up of 2 different components and therefore need to go into your refuse bin. However, some chemists take them back but only if they have pharmacies e.g Superdrug.

**How do I recycle glass?** Glass is not currently collected kerbside and needs to be taken to a local Bring Back Bank eg at Birdbrook Community House. Lids can now remain on the bottles/jars rather than being removed and will also be recycled.

What about cardboard with packing tape on it? – Where possible packing tape should be removed from cardboard as this is not able to be recycled and can cause problems with machinery at the sorting facility.

**Can Tin foil be recycled?** - Tin foil can be placed in the recycling sacks, as long as it is not small pieces and doesn't have food residue on it..

What is Tetrapak? – Tetrapak is packaging made up of multiple components, e.g. Juice cartons and Pringle tubes. These items need to be taken to a specific bring back bank (locations below).

Textiles can be recycled at bring back banks

**Can I put shredded paper into the recycling sacks** - Unfortunately this is not accepted in recycling sacks as the pieces are too small for the machines to process, instead you could compost it, or see if anyone with small animals would like it for bedding.

Where does it all happen? - Clear sacks are taken to a facility near Ipswich where the material is sorted, baled and sold on as a raw material to make new products. https://youtu.be/hbFfbSnuGlo?si=V1rBSEHTW3cqQWOg

How are sacks rejected and what happens to them? — The collection crews check the sacks and reject them if they see that they contain the wrong items — so those not on the list of accepted items. They will leave the bags at the premises and label it to let the resident know why it has been left. Residents are also written to and advised that they need represent the sack again next collection after removing the incorrect items.

# Part 5 from our Bird Ringing Expert in Birdbrook **Barry Williams**

Hopefully a few of you will have been following my series of articles about my bird ringing escapades around the world and will remember that my pal Malcolm Wilson had moved down to South Africa from Uganda. He effectively started a new life with a lady he had met in Kampala and had two lovely daughters. He had set up an avitourism business in Johannesburg which specialised in catching birds of prey and attracted in bird-ringers from all over the world. On one such trip Malc met a very like minded Canadian divorcee (Charlotte England) and unfortunately Malcolm's marriage didn't last too long after that chance meeting!

Before I knew it he was on his way to Toronto to live with Charlotte. She was a ringer (or bander as they are called on the other side of the Atlantic) and she was an avid bird of prey bander, as was Malc. It was not long before the pair of them were driving around the country roads to the north and west of Toronto catching hawks and owls. I had always dreamed of ringing in the USA or Canada so in April 2016, literally 5 months after I had moved into Birdbrook, I was on my way to Toronto with Dr Richard "The Doc" Charles another member of the

"Chilundi Ringing Group". The CRG is an informal bunch of bird ringers (and football fans and beer drinkers) who had travelled with Malcolm in Africa. As well as having about a dozen members in the UK, our foreign

membership includes members in South Africa, Perth, Western Australia and of course Charlotte and Malc in Toronto.

On our 2016 trip to Toronto we spent most of our time ringing at Tommy Thompson's Bird Observatory on the shores of Lake Ontario, ringing a varied selection of the birds that migrate up through North America on the way to their breeding grounds in Canada. American warblers unlike our rather drab European warblers are spectacular creatures and as I had never ringed that side of the Atlantic everything we caught was new to me. As I may have mentioned in previous articles the experience of going to a net to find a bird that you couldn't identify is so exciting and this happened several times on this trip! Unfortunately we were unable to ring any birds of prey on this first trip, as Malcolm had not yet acquired his Canada banding licence, and Charlotte was recovering from a near fatal car crash which had occurred some months earlier while she was out on a banding trip hunting for owls. The numerous multi coloured American warblers and various other birds, all totally foreign to the Doc and I, more than made up for it.

Soon after our return from that trip I began to hear stories from Malc about the hawks and owls that he and Charlotte were ringing once she had fully recovered and they had obtained their banding permits. A particular bird of interest to both of them is the Broad-winged hawk (aka "Broadies"), a close relative of the Buzzard which breeds in Canada but migrates through the southern states of the US and spends the winter as far south as northern Argentina. Another bird that Charlotte and Malc are also heavily involved with is the Snowy owl. Now famous for appearing in Harry Potter films the Snowy owl breeds in the arctic north of Canada but winters southwards throughout Canada and into the northern states of USA. The trapping and fitting of satellite trackers to these birds enables us to find out where these majestic birds go during the long winter months. The Doc and I agreed that we had to go back but it was not until April 2022 that we were off to Toronto again and this time road-trapping was very much on the menu. As well as nearly 40 Broadies banded in 10 days, we also trapped and ringed Barred and Eastern Screech owls, America Kestrels and nearly 50 other species of birds; and I caught covid!!! I really enjoyed my trips to Canada and people ask me would I




go back?....I'd gladly live there! It's a wonderful place, the people are friendly, the beers good, the birds are stunning and there are Snowy owls there in the winter!! Perhaps next year!!

And finally in mid 2022 at one of the CRG's annual gettogethers one of the Indigo Bunting, Canada, 2022 members, Graham

Dunlop, told us of his bird ringing adventures in Mexico. I always had a particular desire to bird ring in Mexico having visited there several times on business in the 1990's and so after some difficult negotiations with Mrs Williams I found myself in February 2023 sitting in the departure lounge at Heathrow with Graham and another CRG member, Keith Dean waiting for a flight to Mexico City. To say I was excited is a huge understatement. I knew that it was likely that I would again experience that feeling I had first felt in Uganda in 1996 when I first went to a mist net to find a bird I could not identify or even put in a Genus or a Family. An onward flight to Cancun followed by a 3 hour drive took us to the first of 3 sites on the Yucatan Peninsula. Fortunately we had a local guide who had arranged accommodation and obtained permission for us to ring at various sites. When we arrived at the first ringing site near Dzilam De Bravo I was disappointed to find it was an area of old gardens and run down buildings next to a windfarm! My fears were quickly allayed with my first visit to our nets to find several birds I could not identify plus north american warblers that I knew from my two Canadian trips. These birds were obviously wintering in Mexico. The second site was a fantastic research centre at Komchen, full of exotic species and we also visited a wonderful area of salt-pans and lagoons packed with Flamingos near Merida. We also ringed at two other sites outside Mexico City, again providing us with a stunning array of new birds including several opportunities to ring hummingbirds; a quite scary but thrilling experience! The last site was approximately 12,000 feet above sea level, it got so cold at night I slept fully clothed and in the morning we had to clear

the ice off our nets! In all we ringed over one hundred species of birds many of which I had never even heard of, let alone seen or ringed! The first bird I ringed was a Smooth-billed Ani and one of the last species we ringed was a Curved-bill Thrasher.....what great names!

for months!! Dont tell the wife but Komchen certainly needs a second visit, I have to experience the thrill of ringing Snowy owls in Canada and of course there's those Martial Eagles in Africa. There's also an open invite to visit a CRG member in Western Australia but I think I'll need to win the lottery before I do that one.

My pal who used to live in Hong Kong has married a Latvian lady and is building a house in Latvia and he's already invited me there once it's finished. In the meantime I guess I'll have to make do ringing the brood of young Barn owls at Cornish Hall End, some Kestrels and Tawny owls at Shalford and in the last month thanks to another CRG member I've been scrambling about in church bell towers in Ely and Bury St Edmunds ringing nestling swifts These amazing birds will be well on their way to the wintering grounds in Africa by the time you read this! Just think these young swifts will not land again till next year

# Baythorne End Playground Improvement & Birdbrook & Baythorne End Community Orchard

It has been a while since the Parish questionnaires went out.

#### Baythorne End Playground Improvement

We have only applied to the ASDA Foundation currently for playground improvement, for 4 new pieces of equipment. Each piece of equipment is aimed at different age ranges from toddlers to teenagers. We have also put funding in for a picnic bench in this area.

## The Remarkable Rise of the Red Kite

This beautiful bird of prey was once common throughout the UK, indeed it was so common in Shakespearean London that in his play the Winters Tale he referred to their habit of stealing washing for nest building material – he wrote "When the Kite builds, look to lesser linen"! However it was in the last 2 centuries persecuted to the point of extinction with fewer than 10 breeding pairs found in a small area of mid Wales in the 1930 and 1940s. The RSPB paid local farmers there for successful nests between 1920 and 1990 and the Welsh population rose to about 100 pairs by 1993. Although most birds were descended from a single female, showing how close to extinction the UK population had become!

To try to restore the breeding range and improve the genetic pool, birds were reintroduced in 1990 to the Chilterns. These comprised

2 Welsh birds and 11 Spanish birds (from the Navarra region). This was followed over the next 4 years with further Spanish birds being released in that area. Due to the success of this population – birds from Southern Britain were used to reintroduce to the Midlands & North of England between 1995 and 2010. There were also successful reintroduction programs in Scotland.

It was about 12 years ago I first saw whilst out cycling the distinctive Red kite (Milvus milvus) with it's characteristic V shaped tail, shining tawney red feathers and mewing call. It was flying low over a field near Stambourne, I was so excited! Now I often see more Red Kites in our locality than Buzzards but they still thrill me. It's been a remarkable tale of conservation success with 4400 breeding pairs recorded in 2016 (BTO).

They weigh between 1-1.3kg, have a wingspan of 175-195cm and nest in tall trees, the nest is made with large sticks, lined with wool, bits of plastic or even your washing! Generally feeding on carrion but eat chicks, small mammals and even earthworms! I have seen and photographed these magnificent birds "fishing" for dead and injured trout at a trout farm in Rutland. There are many tales of them actually catching very much alive fish – but it's more likely to be them taking advantage of the near misses of the Ospreys fishing there.

#### **Community Orchard**

We have applied for two streams of funding for the Community Orchard: to the Asda Foundation and The Community Gardens and Open Spaces Fund through Essex County Council. We should hear news by mid-September.

The funding bid for the Orchard covers the physical costs of the trees and also consultation with a specialist Orchard Advisor to look at the site & advise on tree varieties, planning, irrigation, disease and formulating a plan for the site.

#### **Anglian Water & Road Closures**

The closure of the B1057 has undoubtedly caused chaos though our villages and country lanes. AW are on track to reopen this on 13<sup>th</sup> September. However, they plan to start Phase 2; 16th September-8th November (Claywall

Bridge/Haverhill Rd). AW says: "We're installing around 3.3km of band new water pipes to link Steeple Bumpstead to Haverhill. The new water main is slightly wider than the usual pipes we install so that it can meet the demand of the growing



#### The Braintree District – Local Plan


Following a Written Ministerial Statement made by the new

Deputy Prime Minister on 30/07/24, a consultation on a revised version of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) was announced. This runs until 24/09/24. The possible implications of the proposals for BDC means there is a clear focus on increasing the supply of land for housing. Any previous oversupply of housing would now not be taken into account and the 4 year supply requirement is proposed to be removed. Rather, the requirement for a 5 year land supply is retained with the 5% buffer proposed to be restored.

Mandatory housing targets are proposed to return which would be calculated using a new standard methodology. The proposed housing target for BDC currently represents an increase of around 35%

(on the current method used to calculate housing need) to 1098 homes per year.

Braintree District Council originally had a deadline of submitting a refreshed Local Plan to the Planning Inspectorate by 30/06/25. The recent central government announcements mean they are giving local planning authorities an extended period for submitting local plans under the current system until December 2026. BDC undertook a Call for Sites between 10/04/24 and 24/05/24. Developers, landowners, residents, businesses, parish councils and other stakeholders were invited to put forward suggested sites which might be suitable for many uses including housing, commercial, retail,



health care, business, leisure, communiy facilities, open spaces, wildlife sites, biodiversity net gain or education in the District.

Around 300 sites were received during this exercise and it is important to be clear that these are not automatically marked for development, nor do they gain any special status. Every site is being assessed to determine whether it is suitable, available and achievable for development or designation within the updated Local Plan against the Strategic Land Availability Assessment Methodology.

The map is a snapshot of the site submissions in and near the Bumpstead Ward. A clearer map of the whole district can be viewed on BDC's website.

The sites submitted at Birdbrook and Baythorne End are shown on the map below left.

Early engagement on the council's Local Plan refresh to 2041 closed 16/08/24. Comments received will be considered by the council as part of the plan's review process. The council now works to understand the recent planning changes from government and their impact on the production of the refreshed Local Plan.

The council's current Local Plan (adopted 2021) is designed to run until 2033 but has to be reviewed and updated, if necessary, at least every five years. The review of Braintree's Local Plan will extend its time frame from 2033 to 2041, looking at growth options post 2033 to meet evolving longer-term needs of communities.

The document determines which parts of the district are allocated for housing, employment and

community facilities, as well as identifying where no development can take place to protect important open spaces and the environment.

As a result of the recent government announcements around the proposed planning reforms, the council has the opportunity to review its Local Plan timetable. A revision to this timetable will ensure that the council can consider the implications of potential changes to the NPPF. The central government announcement may also mean that the council is required to review its proposed housing provisions to take on an increased number of homes in the district.

A revised local development scheme, formally setting out the council's timetable towards a submission of an updated local plan in compliance with the proposed NPPF, will be discussed at a Local Plan Sub-Committee on 16/09/24 which can be viewed on the council's YouTube channel.

Harry Price, a psychic and researcher spent time at the rectory in 1937 and logged a number of poltergeist phenomena. Many people dismissed the hauntings as fake and believe they were

orchestrated. The rectory was damaged by fire in 1939 and was finally demolished in 1944. The site still remains of interest to many. Were all the sightings just imagined or was Borley Rectory truly haunted????Bryan kept us all enthralled with the history and story of this building and it's occupants.
