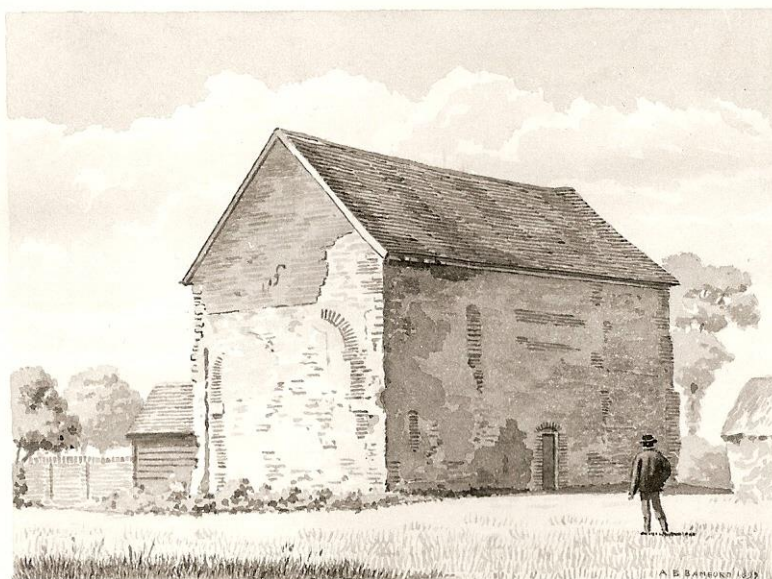
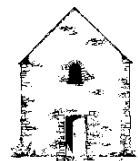

CRADLE OF CHRISTIANITY IN ESSEX

St CEDD'S CHURCH RESTORED AT BRADWELL

A ceremony of historic interest to the Anglican Church took place at Bradwell on Sea on Tuesday, when the ancient chapel of St. Peter-ad-Murum, associated with St.Cedd, was re-dedicated by the Bishop of Chelmsford.

As the name indicates, the chapel was actually built across the walls of the old Roman fort of Othona remains of which are still to be seen, and roman material was largely used in its construction. Only the nave at present remains, this being 55 feet long by 26 feet wide. But excavations made during the restoration revealed the foundations of the chancel, which had an apsidal end and the plan of the chancel has been marked out on the ground at the east end of the nave by means of double lines of stones. In the present wall forming the east end of the building, which was originally the site of the chancel arch, there are remains of the very early Christian practice of building a screen of masonry between the chancel and the nave in arches.

USED AS A BARN The ancient chapel had been used for many years as a store house or barn of the farm on which it stands. Happily, soon after the creation of the See of Chelmsford, through the generosity of the family of Mr. Chris Parker, J.P., the owner of the site, the little chapel with some land around it was transferred to a body of trustees. These comprise the Bishop of Chelmsford, the Rector of Bradwell, Mr. Chris. W. Parker and Mr. J. Oxley Parker; and care has been taken to ensure that St. Peter's will be preserved for sacred use for all time. The work of restoration has been carefully carried out. Mr Piers of H.M. office of works (Ancient Monuments Department), was consulted, and presented an exhaustive report. The walls have been repaired. An entrance made in the south wall for the use of wagons when the place was used as a barn, has been filled in, and the original entrance at the west end - where there was formerly a porch - again brought into use. A door of plain oak, in conformity with the character of the building, gives access to the chapel, and windows in plain oak frames with lead lights have been provided. The roof, which originally consisted very probably of rushes or thatch, is tiled and the interior timbers remain exposed. The floor is hard earth, with the exception that a tiny sanctuary at the east end has been constructed of thin Essex bricks. Mr Wykeham Chancellor, who has taken great interest in the work of the restoration, designed the little altar, made quite plainly of oak which came from Chelmsford Cathedral, this and the altar cross being the gift of Canon Lake. Canon Sanders gave a chalice, flagon and paten for use at the Communion Office.

RE-DEDICATED

The re-dedication was performed by the Bishop of Chelmsford at a celebration of the Holy Communion at 8.15 on Tuesday morning at which there were 28 communicants. In the afternoon a thanksgiving service took place in the chapel, about 200 people being present, representative of all the parts of the Diocese. The attendance included;-

The Bishop of Chelmsford, accompanied by his domestic chaplain, Rev Redwood, who carried the pastoral staff; Bishop Forest Browne, formerly Bishop of Bristol, who gave the address; the Rector of Chelmsford, Canon Lake; the Rector of Bradwell, Rev. Owen; the Precentor of Chelmsford Cathedral, Rev. Thomas; and Rev. Carroll, vicar of Roxwell, who carried the cross. There were also present Mrs. Watts-Ditchfield, Bishop Stevens, Preb. Dormer Pierce, Canons Tancock, Bayne, Sacre, Tollington, and Reeve, and Mr. and Mrs. Chris Parker. The service, shortened evensong, was taken by Canon Lake, and Mr Owen read the Lesson. The singing of the Psalms, Magnificat and Hymns, unaccompanied, was led by the Precentor.

BISHOP BROWNE'S ADDRESS

As there was not sufficient seating accommodation in the chapel for all the congregation, Bishop Browne's address was given out of doors at the east end, on the site of the original chancel. Here, with the congregation grouped around him, some standing and some sitting, with fields of waving corn on either side, and facing the North Sea across St. Peter's sands, the distinguished prelate, who is the foremost authority on Christianity under the Saxons, told again the story of that historic spot and all that it means in relation to the coming of Christianity into Essex. Concluding, the Bishop said:- We are

met together this day in an ancient building, whose stones witnessed the life and labour of Cedd here - witnessed no doubt many meetings in his time, at this very place, of the authorities of Church and State, gathering for the discussion of affairs of the highest import to Church and State alike. We have seen how the first English Bishop of the East Saxons comported himself in the seventh century in his work - with what energy, with what success. The East Saxons are now, after all these centuries, once more a Diocese of themselves with a Bishop of their own. I am sure your prayer is that future generations will have cause to record thankfully when they tell of our historic meeting here today, how this Twentieth century mission was conducted with like energy, with like success.

Subsequently the Te Deum was sung, with the Bishops and clergy grouped in front of the altar, as an act of praise; and the Bishop of Chelmsford gave the Blessing. A collection for the restoration fund amounted to £ 11 9s.

AT BRADWELL RECTORY

Later in the afternoon tea was served in the grounds of Bradwell Rectory and the Bishop of Chelmsford expressed thanks to Bishop Browne for his address, and to the members of the Parker



family and Mr. Chris Parker for making it possible for the dear old Church of St. Peter once more to come into Church hands. He thought it would be well to have a celebration and service there on June 22nd in each year, also on St. Cedd's day, and possibly also, if parties came from different parts of the

Diocese. His Lordship thanked all who had given gifts to the Church and the Rector of Bradwell and the churchwardens, Messrs Brown and J. Chillingworth, for their help in the arrangements. They were largely indebted to the tenacity and perseverance of Canon Lake for what they had achieved. (Applause)

Mr. Christopher Parker expressed his pleasure that this grand old building was now in very good hands. The building had never been, he claimed, in what was called a deplorable condition. By great good fortune it had been retained for useful purposes on the farm, and that meant the roof had always been on and it had always been to a fair extent looked after, and the main walls had not perished by decay. Many friends had been extraordinarily helpful particularly Canon Lake and Mr. Ormond Blyth.

They had collected £380, but there were still other smaller expenses in connection with the reparation of the building. He hoped people would come to look at the Church and be deeply interested in it. Many residents of Bradwell had been very helpful, including his tenant Mr. James Brown, and he was deeply sorry that Mr. Clement Parker to whom the chairs and other things were due, was unable to be present.

Other speakers were Rev. Owen who spoke of the honour conferred on the Parish of Bradwell by receiving so many distinguished visitors; Canon Lake described the work they had completed that day as a venture of faith and Bishop Stevens said it gave him great pleasure to be present both from the Church and an archaeological point of view. He hoped the Essex Archaeological Society might extend their researches in this direction.

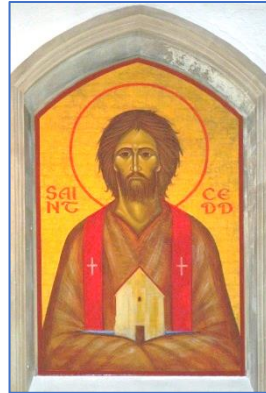

Sermon

Preached from the Cathedral for the Benefice Service at St Peter's Chapel, Bradwell on Sunday, 21 June 2020 by Nicholas Henshall, marking the centenary of the Chapel's contemporary ministry.



"Formed in order to be sent". A quote from Brigid Main, former chaplain of the Chapel. We'll return to that a little later!

Two texts from the letter of James: "we all make many mistakes" (3.2) and "mercy triumphs over judgement" 2.13). neither of these crop up in today's readings and on the surface they have nothing to do with this celebration of Peter and of the chapel – where today we are marking the centenary of the its contemporary history as a place of prayer and praise, and its ministry today.

But the two quotes have everything to do with the character of Peter - patron saint of the Chapel and joint patron of the Cathedral. And therefore I'd suggest everything to do with who we are called to me as we honour the Chapel's purpose and seek to follow the Lord today through challenging and rapidly changing times – on the Dengie just as much as everywhere else.

That first quote - "We all make many mistakes" – could be the first line of Peter's biography. Indeed it is at the heart of Peter's story. He constantly gets things wrong. But – and this is the point of the second quote – every time he gets it wrong, he is confronted and indeed confounded by the loving mercy of the Lord - for "mercy triumphs over judgement".

Peter is completely realistic about himself. He knows his own character. In Luke 5, Jesus gets on Peter's boat to teach the crowds and then tells Peter to go fishing. In response to the huge catch of fish that then follows, Peter falls at Jesus' feet and says "get away from me, Lord, because I am a sinful man". He knows - and Jesus knows - that Peter is going to let him down again and again and again. In Matthew 14 Peter tries to walk on water, but instead he sinks and cries out, "Lord, save me!" At the last supper, Peter's arrogance is such that he even tries to stop Jesus washing his feet.

And above all, when the chips are down, as Jesus is on trial, Peter denies three times that he ever knew Jesus. The biggest betrayal of all – a betrayal as bitter as the action of Judas.

I find one of the most shocking lines in the Gospels is Luke 22.61-62 just after Peter's third denial and the cock crows: "and the Lord turned and looked straight at Peter". Peter goes out and weeps bitterly. Peter has made the worst mistake of his life, but the tears are the beginning of a new journey - the good news that the mercy of Jesus triumphs over judgement. That's why many churches have a weather vane in the shape of a cock – not as a rural decoration but as a reminder of Peter's denial and our need to do the same, to accept the forgiveness and mercy of the Lord.

And then, in the final scene of John's Gospel, Peter and the risen Jesus meet again on the beach. This is the last time they will meet face to face. What is Peter expecting? Rebuke, probably; anger? But Jesus refuses to judge Peter and simply asks him three times "do you love me?" Healing, forgiveness and the promise of a future. In the great words of one of the greatest hymns: "Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven". That's God's promise to Peter. That's God's promise to us.

As we celebrate this centenary; as we celebrate Peter the Apostle; as we celebrate the life of this benefice of communities and churches; and as we celebrate this place as the fountain

head of the good news of Jesus Christ in Essex - and as we do all of that in the extraordinary context of this global pandemic - this is the God we need to know.

A God who doesn't judge us but loves us; a God who knows that we all make many mistakes and who loves us not in spite of our frailties but because of them. For mercy triumphs over judgement.

And this is the God who sends us out - as he sent Peter out - to a new and unknown future. We don't really know what the church or the wider community is going to look like. That's deeply unnerving. But that's God's call to us. And that's where I want to go back to that line of Brigid Main's: "formed in order to be sent". Her point was that historically Bradwell Chapel had never been a place of pilgrimage. You need a shrine for that and there is no shrine because Cedd died and was buried at Lastingham in Yorkshire. No - Bradwell was a mission statement from which people were sent out as heralds of good tidings. And that's our job now.

I'll end with a story that may well be familiar. After the missionary journeys described in Acts, Peter almost certainly settled in the city of Rome, and there is ancient authority that he was the eye-witness source for Mark's Gospel, which was almost certainly written in the city.

It is said that as an old man, with the Christian community under threat, Peter decided to leave the city. Another of his many mistakes. But as he was walking away he met Jesus coming towards him. Peter asked "Lord, where are you going?" Jesus replied "to be crucified instead of you!" And Peter turned round and went on to face the future undefended, with faith and trust in the compassion and love of God.

Windrush Day

Dear All

Monday is **Windrush Day** and marks the 72nd anniversary of the arrival of the Empire Windrush at the Tilbury Docks. The former troop carrier was carrying Jamaican and other British Commonwealth citizens from the West Indies to help rebuild Britain after the Second World War.

I want to draw your attention to two events happening over the next few days and encourage you to make them known in your own parishes:

Church of England Online Service, Sunday 9 am

The Church of England's online weekly service will hear a call for action to build a fairer world ahead of a minute's silence to lament the racism experienced by the Windrush generation and other black and minority ethnic people.

Father Andrew Moughtin-Mumby, Rector of St Peter's Church in Walworth, south east London will lead the service in which the sermon will describe racism as one of the three pandemics faced by the world, alongside the climate crisis and Covid-19.

Please do make this known in your own parishes and encourage people to participate.

We pray for all those who suffer from racism and ask for God's grace and courage as we seek forgiveness, reconciliation and healing. We commit ourselves to working better together for justice, equality and freedom from oppression for all.
