Hearing and responding to the Word of God

Reading by Eunice Siggins 1 Samuel 3.1-20

The Lord Appears to Samuel

3 In those days, when the boy Samuel was serving the LORD under the direction of Eli, there were very few messages from the LORD, and visions from him were quite rare. ² One night Eli, who was now almost blind, was sleeping in his own room; ³ Samuel was sleeping in the sanctuary, where the sacred Covenant Box was. Before dawn, while the lamp was still burning, ⁴ the LORD called Samuel. He answered, "Yes, sir!" ⁵ and ran to Eli and said, "You called me, and here I am."

But Eli answered, "I didn't call you; go back to bed." So Samuel went back to bed.

⁶⁻⁷ The LORD called Samuel again. The boy did not know that it was the LORD, because the LORD had never spoken to him before. So he got up, went to Eli, and said, "You called me, and here I am."

But Eli answered, "My son, I didn't call you; go back to bed."

⁸ The LORD called Samuel a third time; he got up, went to Eli, and said, "You called me, and here I am."

Then Eli realized that it was the LORD who was calling the boy, ⁹ so he said to him, "Go back to bed; and if he calls you again, say, 'Speak, LORD, your servant is listening.'" So Samuel went back to bed.

¹⁰ The LORD came and stood there, and called as he had before, "Samuel! Samuel!"

Samuel answered, "Speak; your servant is listening."

¹¹ The LORD said to him, "Some day I am going to do something to the people of Israel that is so terrible that everyone who hears about it will be stunned. ¹² On that day I will carry out all my threats against Eli's family, from beginning to end. ¹³ I have already told him that I am going to punish his family forever because his sons have spoken evil things against me. Eli knew they were doing this, but he did not stop them. ¹⁴ So I solemnly declare to the family of Eli that no sacrifice or offering will ever be able to remove the consequences of this terrible sin."

¹⁵ Samuel stayed in bed until morning; then he got up and opened the doors of the house of the LORD. He was afraid to tell Eli about the vision. ¹⁶ Eli called him, "Samuel, my boy!"

"Yes, sir," answered Samuel.

¹⁷ "What did the LORD tell you?" Eli asked. "Don't keep anything from me. God will punish you severely if you don't tell me everything he said." ¹⁸ So Samuel told him everything; he did not keep anything back. Eli said, "He is the LORD; he will do whatever seems best to him."

¹⁹ As Samuel grew up, the LORD was with him and made come true everything that Samuel said. ²⁰ So all the people of Israel, from one end of the country to the other, knew that Samuel was indeed a prophet of the LORD.

Jesus Calls Philip and Nathanael

⁴³ The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, "Come with me!" (⁴⁴ Philip was from Bethsaida, the town where Andrew and Peter lived.) ⁴⁵ Philip found Nathanael and told him, "We have found the one whom Moses wrote about in the book of the Law and whom the prophets also wrote about. He is Jesus son of Joseph, from Nazareth."

⁴⁶ "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Nathanael asked.

"Come and see," answered Philip.

⁴⁷ When Jesus saw Nathanael coming to him, he said about him, "Here is a real Israelite; there is nothing false in him!"

⁴⁸ Nathanael asked him, "How do you know me?"

Jesus answered, "I saw you when you were under the fig tree before Philip called you."

⁴⁹ "Teacher," answered Nathanael, "you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!"

⁵⁰ Jesus said, "Do you believe just because I told you I saw you when you were under the fig tree? You will see much greater things than this!" ⁵¹ And he said to them, "I am telling you the truth: you will see heaven open and God's angels going up and coming down on the Son of Man."

'God is speaking, but are we listening?'

1 Samuel 3: 1-20 - Samuel's Calling and Prophetic Activity John 1: 43-end - Jesus Calls Philip and Nathanael

Normally we probably communicate with many different people every day, at work, in the shops, on the bus, at church. Curiously I understand that our words are only part of what people will 'hear'. The tone of our voice, the expression on our face, the gestures we make, will all 'speak' too. I am sure we have all tried to have conversations where the other person is looking over our shoulder, or is checking a text message on their phone, (or has their eyes closed during a sermon). It makes it difficult to really believe they are listening!

During 2020 it was perhaps even more challenging. We might have had to resort to e-mails and phone calls for the first time to communicate with people that we would normally speak to 'face to face'. And if it was 'face to face', it was probably more likely face-mask to face-mask! Obviously with masks on it is harder to see facial expressions, and often it's harder to simply hear what has been said. Perhaps the younger generation are totally used to communicating through tweets and texts, in a language that baffles me! And they seem to be able to hold three 'conversations' at the same time. But I find it easier to have just one conversation at a time!

When Jesus was meeting his disciples for the first time, as we read in John 1, he is doing it 'face to face'. Philip instantly follows him without any objection. But when Philip speaks to Nathanael his reaction is perhaps a bit rude, "can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Even though he knew that the prophets had said that the messiah would come from Nazareth!

When Jesus speaks to people today, we see similar reactions. Some, like Philip, instantly follow Jesus, without a miracle, or a prophetic word like Jesus gave Nathanael. But others, also like Nathanael, almost ridicule that Jesus could be the son of God. "And anyway, he lived 2000 years ago, how is that relevant to me today!"

Samuel, that we read about in 1 Samuel 3, was just a boy when God spoke to him, and probably it was the first time God had spoken to him. But also, it was a time when 'The word of the Lord was rare', verse 1. And so, Eli even didn't realise it was the Lord until the third time! I think we need to consider this very carefully in our present circumstances. We are now in a third lock down with the virus and 'perhaps' God is speaking to us?

Although Eli was in charge at the temple, he had turned a blind eye to the sins of his two sons and ultimately it would lead to the Ark of the Covenant being captured in battle by the Philistines (chapter 5). However, Eli was still wise enough to make sure that whatever God said to Samuel he would listen to. Perhaps the challenge for us today is are we ready to listen during this virus if God is speaking to us! This might be individually, or perhaps corporately, or nationally as the virus is affecting the whole country, and even the whole world.

2020 was a usual year for all of us, to say the least. Many of us probably spent a lot more time indoors, with 'time on hands' so to speak. I have one friend in the West Midlands who has become an avid constructor of jigsaw puzzles! But how many of us used the forced lock down to spend more time listening to God, either through reading the bible, reading Christian books, or listening to teaching online? Although in 1 Samuel 3:1 it says that 'The word of the Lord was rare', was that because the Lord had given up speaking, or that the people had given up listening? And could we ask the same question today? Perhaps because we think of a 'God of love' we cannot imagine that God has brought about this virus. And I personally don't think He did. But I do believe God is wanting to speak to us through it, if we are prepared to listen. Brilliantly Eli was prepared to listen, but he didn't actually do anything about God's word, and ultimately the Ark was lost and wouldn't return for twenty years. To me it would be so sad that if at the end of this pandemic we were still ignoring the voice of God when he chooses to speak to us, and that it took another twenty years before He spoke to us again.

So perhaps there is a challenge for us in the readings from 1 Samuel and John. 'When' (and I prefer to say 'when' instead of 'if') God speaks to us, will we be ready to listen? Will we be like Philip and immediately go with Jesus (wherever he wants to take us)? Will we be like Nathanael and ridicule that it could even be God speaking? Will we be like Samuel and be unable to

respond because we have never heard the word of the Lord before? Or will we be like Eli and accept the word, regardless of what it might be?

With the way the virus is going right now it seems likely that we are going to be in some form of lock down for at least another couple of months. We have no idea really when we might be able to meet together again 'face to face' in church. So, it could be that God is allowing us the time to listen to Him. With Samuel it was actually on the fourth 'attempt' that God got through to him. Hopefully we won't have to have a fourth lock down after this one. But if we do may we be ready to hear whatever God is saying to us, individually, corporately, or nationally even! **Amen.**

The world is in crisis; Creation is groaning. People and the Earth have been crying out for many years. But for too long, many people - particularly those in the global North - have chosen not to listen, instead remaining complicit in destruction and continuing to increase inequalities. In such a time as this, what have Christians got to offer?

Our doctrine of creation suggests that it was never meant to be like this, but that human nature is tarnished or fallen. The biblical narrative of salvation provides a remedy and challenges us to play our part in the process of redemption and recreation. This is the journey that we will take together over the six sessions looking at the implications for our daily lives both as individuals and as communities of faith and hope.

We are here for such a time as this. Called to respond with words and actions. USPG partners with churches across the world in their mission of transforming lives through education, health care and justice for all. USPG's partner churches offer us insights, hope and encouragement in the ways that they are confronting the issues of ecological justice in their own context: and in doing so, challenge us to respond: are we ready to accept the challenge?
