Dear Friends,

February is the month we begin Lent, on the 22nd, but with Pancake Day (Shrove Tuesday), the day before on the 21st, when traditionally all the eggs and fats were emptied from the cupboards to make the pancakes!

This Lent, the Church of England are inviting us to explore how we can live well with the mess of everyday life.

Dust and Glory encourages us to take a fresh look at the frustrations and failings that every day brings and, rather than pretending we can always avoid them, seek to learn from them and grow closer to God through them.

Dust and Glory: A Lent journey of faith, failure and forgiveness is the Church of England's Lent theme for 2023. This year's resources are informed and inspired by the Archbishop of Canterbury's 2023 Lent Book, *Failure: What Jesus said about sin, mistakes and messing stuff up* (SPCK) by Bishop Emma Ineson, who has also co-written the daily reflections booklet for adults (CHP).

There will be free online support for groups studying the book – including indepth video interviews with the Archbishop of Canterbury and others exploring the themes of each of the chapters.

We will also be holding our own Lent course 'Pilgrimage' during Lent and the Diocese of Chelmsford are also offering modules, both of which are advertised in this magazine. Whichever resource you decide to use, may you have a meaningful Lent!

Tales from RAF Bradwell Bay

RAF Bradwell Bay was a multi-cultural base and recently I have been looking at the different nationalities involved. RAF Bradwell Bay was not one of the many aerodromes inhabited by the United States Airforce. There were some American Pilots, but they had joined the RAF before the USA entered the War.

However, the USAF did make use of Bradwell Bay. US aircraft including large aircraft such a B17 Flying Fortress's visited Bradwell, sometimes for fuel, sometimes with battle damage and injured or dead airman.

I have extracted a 7-page document of incidents where the USAF had to land at Bradwell Bay, for example on 29th January 1944:

Around 1320 hours a FORTRESS from 524 Squadron U.S.A.A.F. KIMBOLTON landed with a wounded bombardier, 2nd Lt. NATHAN, who was removed to the American hospital at BRAINTREE. A second member of the crew was unfortunately killed. He was 2nd Lt. RAU the navigator, who had put up a very good show by giving the pilot courses until his wounds and lack of oxygen overcame him. After refuelling the FORTRESS left for KIMBOLTON.

How much involvement from Bradwell Bay was needed. The first contact would have been the rescue crews, i.e., Fire and Ambulance. 2nd Lt Nathan would have been removed and initially taken by RAF Ambulance to the station sickbay and assessed by the Medical Officer. The decision was made to transfer to the large





American Hospital in Braintree and an US Ambulance requested to collect him. 2nd Lt Rau would have been removed to the sick bay mortuary. The Fortress would have had some temporary repairs made so they could fly back to their own base. Before taking off the aircraft would have been refuelled by the

fuel bowsers.

This was just one of many times that RAF Bradwell Bay assisted the USA.

The new doors enable the outer doors to be open so those outside can feel the warm welcome of the inside, and those inside can experience the wonderful views over the river and countryside.

Our guests included Patron of The Friends of St Lawrence Church John Whittingdale MP, Ben Downie Architect, Marian Gibson St Lawrence Parish Council Chairperson, and members of the South Essex Metal Detectors Group who had donated generously towards the

doors.

The Very Revd Nicholas Henshall, Dean of Chelmsford performed the blessing and was assisted in the service by our Revd Steven Poss and the St Lawrence Singers Choir.

The Othona Community.

Fifty years ago – which seems like yesterday to some of us, but ancient history to others – Norman Motley, founder of the Othona Community, wrote a letter. This is now included in the book "Norman Motley – Letters to a Community 1970-1980." That letter described the challenge of the time as: "to learn to live; to reject the philosophy of hopelessness; to counteract the hatred of our national and international life." He was referring to the considerable improvements in the preceding 25 years, to ecumenical relations. Was he right to believe, as he wrote then, that Othona's task in such relations was "nearly over?" Or are there other challenges in the life and worship of the many bodies of Christians, which are not yet resolved? Othona welcomes people of all faiths and none, yet as a Christian community we do rather lack that dynamic mix that might include more evangelical churches, people of Roman Catholic faith or of Orthodox practice. On top of that, and fifty years after Norman's contemplating true ecumenism at Othona, we have seen such a change in the relationship between Christianity and other faiths, as the ethnic and cultural diversity of our wider community has burgeoned, that Othona may barely dare to think that our Community is at the cutting edge of building God's kingdom on earth. Still we seek to turn hopelessness to hope, hatred to love: right here and world-wide.

Communication is a vital aspect of the life of the Othona Community. We are a dispersed Community, with a few people living, working and managing each Centre, Essex and Dorset, many people who volunteer or visit regularly, and yet more whose lives have been touched by the spirit of Othona although they are rarely if ever able to visit a Centre, remaining connected as Members, Friends or through informal networks. But one aspect of modern living is instant communication. Words are spoken, sometimes with little thought – writing so often means a quick tap on the keyboard, lost by tomorrow – and quantities of pictures are taken with no prospect of sharing them in an album for the great grandchildren. What our founding members did for Othona is fairly well captured by word of mouth, writings and quantities of photographs, giving a sense of foundation to what we are now building. Looking back fuels discussions in the present, which give hope for the future.

Now, more than ever, Othona is welcoming a diverse range of people through our sense of the need to work – yes, actually do something – to promote global climate justice. From 28th April to 1st May Othona is hosting the second Essex Green Weekend, with activities for people of all ages, and a chance to connect with likeminded people making a difference which ripples from Essex in words, music and action. The Othona programme is on the Othona Essex website or available locally as a leaflet. There is something for everyone, from quieter

retreats to that ever-lively February half-term. Many people who visit Othona are inspired to volunteer — if that is you, please do contact one of the team for a chat about what you have to offer on a one-off or regular basis: cleaning, cooking, gardening, maintenance, being there to welcome groups, a bit of admin or whatever skills you would like to share — while you enjoy a cuppa and a natter.

Local day visitors are welcome but best contact the team first, particularly if you would like a meal.






