Dear Friends.

This Lent begins on Wednesday 14th February and our Joint Benefice Holy Communion Service for this Ash Wednesday is at 7pm at St James Church in Dengie. The Church of England is encouraging us to wait expectantly for God to meet us and sustain us through the storms and trials we all face.

The Church of England's Lent theme for 2024 is Watch and Pray: Wisdom and hope for Lent and life.



The Othona Community

Welcome to the month with the extra day! Thursday 29th February has no special activity programmed for Othona, but how about making the most of that day



by visiting for a cuppa, or even volunteering to do a couple of hours in the garden, or spring cleaning.

As usual, January was a quiet month, giving the resident team and volunteers time to take stock over the last year and finalise the planning for this year. Shared stories trigger memories for long-time visitors, and keep the spirit of Othona live for those who have found the community more recently. One of our newest arrivals, little lvy Joy, rolled into the centre in mid-January in a pram first brought here by our founder Norman Motley's brother Reg and his wife Brenda as each of their three daughters made their earliest visits – the pram then passed to Jan and Trevor, long-term volunteers, for their baby daughter Maddy, now grown up, married to James – with a little daughter of their own, lvy.

Our 2024 programme is now out on the website and ranges from Art to Nature, watercolour painting to woodland maintenance, voice projection to coping with grief. Hopefully there should be something for everyone. Here is this month's Programme:

Brigid is also running a Quiet day (A Quiet Space in Narnia) on the 23rd July

As well as running an open programme for all, Othona is hosting groups from various places (Churches, schools etc.) January and February have been a period of hosting groups for their strategic planning for the next year. Our work with groups outside of our own programme is an important part of Othona, supporting faith groups, marginalised people, young people, and those with mental health problems etc. As part of our mission set out by our founder Norman, we are tasked with promoting and supporting the training of clergy. To this end we were pleased to host a residential trip from Chelmsford Diocese of Year 3 incumbent and pioneer path curates. 27 curates were here on a Next Steps retreat to consider what their next placement should be and how to go about the process; we also hosted the local Deanery away day.

Othona recently welcomed the Trustee board of "The Other MA" (TOMA) here for their planning meeting. This organisation is an artist-run education model and exhibition programme based in Southend, which supports artists who have faced barriers accessing art education. They very much appreciated the space, peace and beauty of Othona.

We are currently working with St Ethelburga's Centre for Peace and Reconciliation (https://stethelburgas.org/) on a hedge planting project. We hosted one weekend of planting here in December with some of their Trustees and the second one in February with two disparate groups of volunteers here to help with the second batch. This project is about promoting understanding between different groups (faith groups, refugees etc.) as much as about the hedge planting. Continuing our work with like-minded groups, we have many visits from residents of the YMCA to provide a holiday and a break from living in the sometimes-stressful environment of hostels in London. We have the senior staff here planning retreats to improve the quality of these residential visits and to look at a pathway to residents volunteering here.

Finally we are in the stage of planning our 3rd Essex Green Weekend, which will be from the 14th-17th June this year. Please put it in your diaries. We hope this will be even bigger than the last two.

News from RAF Bradwell Bay

In last month's issue I mentioned RAF Dengie Flats. RAF Bradwell Bay is said to be an airfield built after the Battle of Britain and so does not get the fame of Battle of Britain stations such as North Weald. However, the Dengie and specifically Bradwell made an enormous contribution to the Battle of Britain. Many pilots were new and aircraft such as the Spitfire and Hurricane were new so both pilots and aircraft needed to be tested on their gunnery skills. The firing range was built on the Dengie flats with an accompanying grass airfield built on land requisitioned from Waymark's farm. The firing range was due to be opened on 1st August 1937 and the bombing range a year later, 1st November 1938.

There is little record keeping of the actual range but by piecing information from various squadron operational record books we can see that the firing range was used from early in the morning until well into the evening.

Imagine the sites observed from the watch tower near St Peters Chapel, with aircraft flying past, often in pairs, every couple of minutes. Many of the pilots fought in the Battle of Britain. The list below shows a few days in May 1940, showing how busy the range could be.

- 5.5 12 Spitfires No 54 Squadron Hornchurch Air to ground firing 0855 to 1235
- 14.5 Magister L8359 Flt Lt Treacy No 74 Squadron Southend, from and to Southend 1955 to 2005
- 15.5 Spitfire's of No 74 Squadron Southend 38 sorties in two's 0935 to 1240

Spitfires No 54 Squadron Hornchurch 0940 to 1255

Spitfire N3188 No 54 squadron from and to Hornchurch 1630

The range continued in use, with some breaks in management by both the RAF and USAF until finally closing on 28th August 1965. In1975 the Royal Navy used a hovercraft to dredge ordnance etc. from the flats.

The very first Valentine card, a legend

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home with their wives, instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage.

A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but who couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison awaiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14th February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.' So, the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.



Our next meeting is on the 14th of February at 7:45 pm in the village hall for our talk on Essex's Heroes and Villains with Martyn Lockwood.



make cater for everyone.


