As we enter February we celebrate, on Wednesday 2nd, the Presentation of Christ in the Temple (Candlemas). It is based upon the account of the presentation of Jesus in Luke 2:22–40. In accordance with Leviticus 12, a woman was to be purified by presenting a lamb as a burnt offering, and either a young pigeon or dove as a sin offering, 33 days after a boy's circumcision. It falls on 2 February, which is traditionally the 40th day (postpartum period) and the conclusion of the Christmas–Epiphany season.



The Feast of the Presentation is one of the oldest feasts of the Christian church, celebrated since the 4th century AD in Jerusalem. There are sermons on the feast by the bishops Methodius of Patara (died 312), Cyril of Jerusalem (died 360), Gregory the Theologian (died 389), Amphilochius of Iconium (died 394), Gregory of Nyssa (died 400), and John Chrysostom (died 407). In one of the sermons in the 4th century, we hear...

"[The Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary.] But certainly the Feast of the Purification is celebrated here with the greatest honour. On this day there is a procession to the Anastasis; all go in procession, and all things are done in order with great joy, just as at Easter. All the priests preach, and also the bishop, always treating of that passage of the Gospel where, on the fortieth day, Joseph and Mary brought the Lord into the Temple, and Simeon and Anna the prophetess, the daughter of Famuhel, saw Him, and of the words which they said when they saw the Lord, and of the offerings which the parents presented. And when all things have been celebrated in order as is customary, the sacrament is administered, and so the people are dismissed."

During February, we also celebrate St Valentine's Day on the 14th, remembering St Valentine, Martyr at Rome in 269. As we remember these people who have been imprints in our history, we bring our own prints to our lives and society today, so that we too may be remembered for bringing truth, light and love.

A Morning Out

I've been a member of the Essex Birdwatching Society for almost as long as we've been in Bradwell. But unbelievably, I had never joined one of the bird watching visits. Early in January there was a meeting at the Abberton reservoir over towards Colchester. At around 9 o'clock we arrived. We knew we were at the right place – the largest concentration of telescopes in Essex had assembled on the main causeway.

And the birds must have known. They too assembled in huge numbers on the water – gulls were out in force together with several species of duck, along with grey geese and the inevitable Canada Geese. Great Crested Grebe, Coots, along with the odd Moorhen, were all out there amongst the throng, though in smaller numbers.

But the advantage of being with the experts of the Society soon become apparent. Of course, the Tufted Duck is familiar – they breed on the lake in any city park, and they were on the reservoir in numbers. But suddenly the cry went up "Scaup". Very similar in appearance to the



Tufted, but with a grey, not black, back, and lacking the tuft on the head. It is much rarer and only visits us in the winter. It breeds far away in northern Scandinavia and on to Siberia. A lovely bird.

But it was getting cold. The advantage of Abberton reservoir is that close at hand is the visitor centre of the Essex Wildlife Trust. Entry to the reserve is free to members, but only £2 in any case. A cup of coffee and home-made scone in the warm was very welcome.

The Othona Community – February 2022.

Do you know who is there, down by St Peter's Chapel, tucked away behind the sea wall? So many local people don't have any idea who, where or



why there is a presence in that out-of-the-way corner of Bradwell-on-Sea.

Othona has grown and developed since our founder, Canon Norman Motley, first came to The Chapel at Bradwell in 1945. "The moment I entered the building I knew that we were home.....the other task ahead was to find some place where a mixed group of people could spend residential periods with us." (From Norman's book "Othona, Much Ado About Something.") He found that place, and soon the Othona Community began to meet each summer – then for all the school holidays – up to now, when Othona has warm and welcoming buildings for day and residential visitors all year round.

But "visitors" is not always the right word. Many do visit, enjoy a cuppa and a chat, and make their way home. They may not call in again until perhaps, many years later, they return to bring a friend, and find that, although the old place may have changed, the welcome is the same – not intrusive, not doctrinal, but some describe it as being part of an extended family. Othona's history is rarely written down, tending to rely on the ancient tradition of folk tales. So many conversations start with "Do you remember when..." (Audrey did this, John said that, a group of volunteers built those...) Othona grew, developed a Dorset centre, and now does much communication online.

Our Founders had Vision. In 1941 Norman, an RAF Chaplain frustrated by the lack of relevance of the Church to his bewildered congregation, started nohold-barred answerback meetings, which drew in all manner of people, so they formed a "Nails Movement" to keep them together as the war ended, using a crude symbol of welded nails as their emblem. They believed in "the dream of a centre where, after the war, people of all kinds – especially those linked with the 'Nails,' could meet and perhaps implement the dream of a creative reunion where constructive thinking and subsequent activity could take place." People who make a commitment to Othona may still receive the Nails. Many still have a vision for our future into the 21st Century, with all its joys and troubles, its need for faith, hope and Christian love. So now we had Nails holders, their families, and a body of people who had previously been on opposing sides in the recent war, with those from different strata of society, coming to this meeting place to become one Community. The word spread, and Church groups came to visit and share that blend of Work, Worship, Study and Play that gives a wholeness to Othona. Families brought friends, who brought their families - and we're into 4th and 5th generations, as well as constantly seeing g new faces: local people, groups, schools, passers-by, older and younger, able-bodied and less able, all nationalities, all faiths and none. Everyone is welcome to share their name and contact details to go on our mailing list as a "friend." Those who are willing to pay their £12 a year are "Members" which gives people a sense of belonging and helps support our work – but all who enjoy Othona are the Community.



Flower Arranging Course 2022: The next steps Stage 2

Following the success of the Flower Arranging Course held last year by Barbara Roe there will be the next stage course to be held this year. Commencing March to December 2022 the new course will Include; Principles of Elements and Design and the Colour wheel. The course will meet once a month on a Tuesday morning in the Chapman room.

- Line provides many things for a design; it provides the shape and the structure. The line also allows a path to exist for the person looking at the arrangement. Designers can use different techniques to create their lines.
- Form includes three things height, width and depth. It is important to think about form while placing flowers because this is



while placing flowers because this is what determines the form.

- 3. Space, spacing of flowers give the viewer a chance to view each individual flower.
- 4. Texture gives the arrangement interest and diversity. Allowing viewer to notice different flowers.
- 5. Colour is perhaps the most important element out of all the elements because that is what most people notice. The best way to choose colours for an arrangement is to use a colour wheel.

The cost of the year long course will include materials like baskets, containers, pinholders/kenzans, these are an environmentally friendly alternative to floral foam etc.


