## Two Hungry Birds

I've written before about the Sparrowhawk's opportunist *modus operandi* when hunting its prey. Our present regular visitor has honed the usual technique of hopping over the hedge to see what's available. He (for it is a male) flies fast from some 20 yards on the *other* side of the tree (a willow with a trunk some three feet across) that supports the bird feeder, swerving round the tree at the last moment. I've not seen him have any success so far, but no doubt he lives in hope.



I was pleased to welcome our smallest falcon to the garden a few weeks ago, even if he also was investigating the bird feeder for a possible lunch. It was a male Merlin. He was in fact sitting on top of the bird feeder, and clearly hadn't caught anything. A Merlin is not much bigger than a Blackbird, with the typical pointed wings of a falcon, the male with grey upper parts and a black band on the end of the tail. Their hunting technique is clever. They adopt the flight of a Mistle Thrush

as a camouflage. But once in pursuit of its prey the turbo charger kicks in and it follows every twist and turn.

Merlins breed on the moors and uplands further north and west in Britain, but are quite common on our saltings during winter months. They are regularly recorded at the bird observatory by the Chapel, though my visitor was only the second recorded occurrence in my garden.

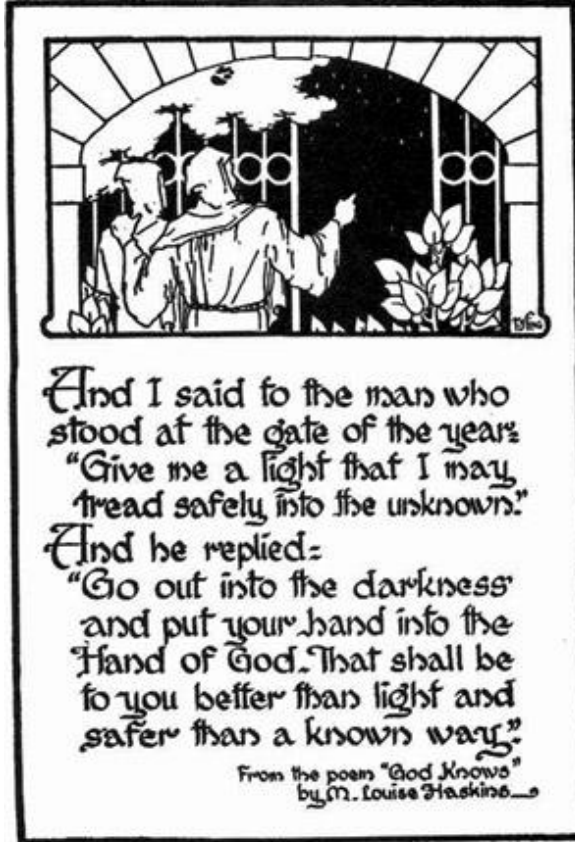

## I said to the Man



Some of us remember hearing these words spoken by King George VI at Christmas 1939, shortly after the outbreak of the Second World War.

The familiar words are inscribed at the entrance to the George VI memorial chapel in St George's Chapel, Windsor, and in a window at the Queen's Chapel of the Savoy.

Today few people will know of Minnie Haskins who made little impression as a poet but she is mainly remembered as a tireless worker, both academic and practical, in the field of social science and industrial welfare. The poem to which these words were the preamble was published in 1912 in a collection called 'The Desert' in an attempt to raise some money for her work which had taken her from the industrial areas of London to India. Not until she was 43 did Minnie follow a more academic route by enrolling at the LSE. She continued her work to improve working conditions and industrial relations until finally retiring in 1944.

# Healthy Eating

## St Cedd's Breakfast Club begins!

St Cedd's Breakfast Club will start on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> January 2020, from 7.30am, Monday – Friday. We will be offering an early morning mini bus pick up from St Lawrence at 7.15am to support parents/carers with transport.

All children attending our breakfast club will be given a choice of breakfast which includes cereals, toast, crumpets, fruit and a drink to give them the best start to the day! After breakfast, children are able to participate in a range of fun activities before the school day begins, such as games and crafts.

Parents/carers lead busy lives and can sometimes find it a struggle to keep up with homework tasks. At breakfast club, a table will be set up where children can read or complete Times Tables Rockstars.

At the end of the session, the children will be taken to their classroom to begin the school day.

Students who eat breakfast before starting their school day not only concentrate better, but they tend to score better on academic tests such as maths, reading and science. According to a study published in the Journal of Economics, students in schools that offered breakfast before class scored about 25 percent higher on math, reading and science tests. Researchers believe that this is because the breakfast provides the energy necessary to increase cognitive or thinking, speed and problem-solving skills.

Breakfast club costs £3.00 per session, which includes breakfast/drink. The mini bus costs £1.00 per day. Individual payment plans will be set up for how many days that half term you would like your child/ren to attend.

We look forward to seeing many of the children there!

Roll on 9th April when we expect a certain event!

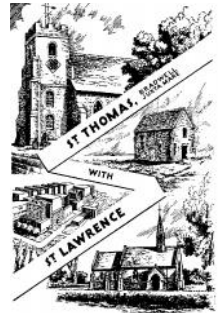

## The Othona Community in January 2020.

You just have time to pop into Othona – if this arrives on your doorstep on New Year’s Day. Come and share a morning cuppa to welcome in the next decade – then slip away before all the heat is turned off. Keep your ears open in the Village shops, and follow how our Othona Energy and Electricity Project is going. By the time of reading, the new biomass boiler should be installed, and an application will have gone in to Maldon District Council for an additional Wind Turbine – not a huge one, a 20m generator tucked in between the newly renovated Education Building (thanks, Essex Community Fund/Bradwell Wind Farm Fund) and the scrubby trees. For all who appreciate the work of Othona, we ask you to look at the MDC Website, and when the Planning Application appears, please write a letter of support, and help Othona generate our own green energy in a Project to reduce our carbon footprint by 95%!

Othona Bradwell will be closed until around mid-March – then watch this space for news of the Opening and the 2020 events, including the Official Opening of the Education Building, with the dilapidated 1950s hut transformed into teaching rooms, art room and residential space. We will still be taking bookings for 2020 over the New Year; the Programme is on the Website, or pick up a paper copy locally. Did you know that you can also book Othona for a private event for your group, or for a family gathering or celebration? – or to hold meetings, or sessions in the new Art Room – you have the idea, we will try to accommodate you.



Othona is moving forward, but only by building on the firm foundations of our past. “Othona, Much Ado about Something” was written by our founder Rev. Norman Motley, and still contains some interesting tips for life at Othona in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.

“The arrival of some Borstal (young offenders) girls proved an unforgettable experience. They asked if they might describe themselves as students from a certain municipal art school. No objection was raised but by the middle of the week, one of the girls said, ‘They’d all be different to us if they know who we are.’ I told her to try them out. So she bashed the table with her shoe and said after supper, one night, ‘we don’t come from such and such an art school, but from Borstal.’ The only comment was ‘so what?’ – and no further reference was made to the fact. It just made no difference.

It must be emphasised that this element is critical. People are what they are and are received as such.”

## Gardening in January

Happy New Year. As the days are now lengthening it is the time to start planning your garden for 2020. If you are able to get on your garden, dig over undug beds. Continue pruning plants back but leave some of your garden uncut to provide shelter for wildlife. Continue putting out food for birds. Don't be tempted to prune plums, cherries and apricots, leave until the summer as pruning these fruit trees now will make them susceptible to silver leaf infections. If we have heavy snow brush it off green houses, cold frames and evergreen shrubs as the weight can sometimes damage these.



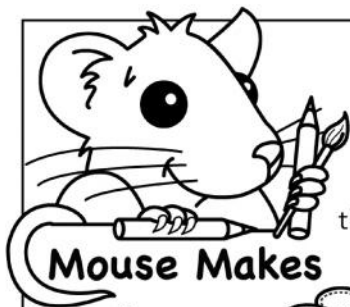
If you have had a real rooted Christmas tree in a pot put it outside, initially in a sheltered place like a shed for the first day to reduce the thermal shock, then consider whether to plant it in the garden or keep it in the pot. Choose a cool shaded damp place to plant it so it will not dry out in the summer; if in a pot keep it in a shaded area where you will water it throughout the year, don't put it out of the way where it may be neglected. A potted Christmas tree must remain wet all year - keep the pot in a tray of water. If you have a tree with no roots cut in up and put it in a green bin for collection, if you don't have a green bin ask a neighbour if they have room in theirs. Or contact Farleigh Hospice at <https://www.farleighhospice.org/events/christmas-tree-recycling> for it to be collected.

## Plant of the month

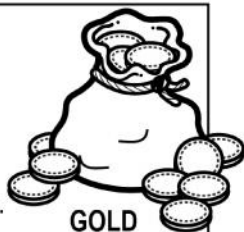
### Sarcococca (Sweet box or Christmas box)



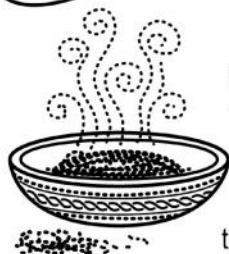
This is a lovely evergreen box shrub that flowers in January, the small white flowers smell of sweet honey, so lovely to have a winter small shrub that flowers and smells so beautiful. I was unaware of this plant till last year when visiting St Peter's hospital in Maldon: the gardens at the front of the building were full of this wonderful scent, on closer inspection it was these flowering box plants. I then found one in one of our local nurseries and have it in a pot near the back door. They also can be planted directly in the garden.

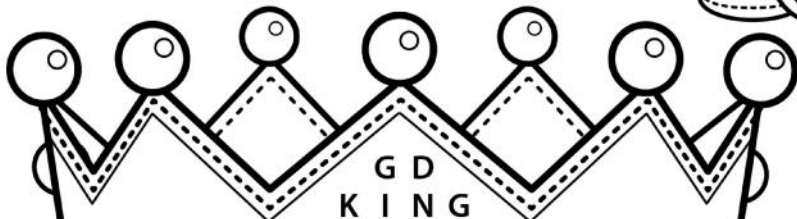
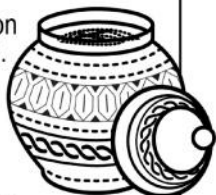


**GOLD**

She prayed silently.

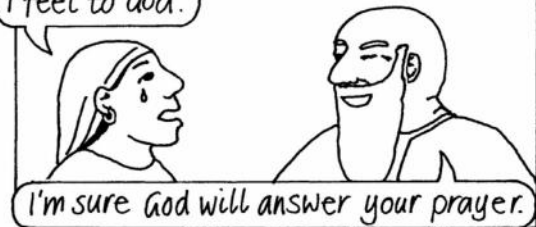


Please give me a son. If you do, he will serve you all his life.
