.....he sings his song in May.....

For most birds, writing their song as actual music is almost impossible – their warblings are so complicated and don't conform to musical notation. But there is one

exception – that harbinger of summer, the cuckoo. We all know that bi-syllabic call of the male cuckoo. But what are his (for it is only the male that 'sings' in this way) notes?

I have made a special point since hearing "my first cuckoo in spring" of rushing to the piano whenever a call floats across the fields and checking. My cuckoo (cuckoos? – who knows?) has (have) been pretty consistent – what is known as a major third, from F# to D, so the key of D major. Major keys generally have a happy feel. The minor mode is sadder, and occasionally my birds have transposed to D minor – F <u>natural</u> to D. Do they feel sad at not having found a mate yet?

Just a few composers have produced works with cuckoo calls incorporated. *On Hearing the First Cuckoo in Spring* is a tone poem composed in 1912 by Frederick Delius. It is very atmospheric music

Those readers who had the wonderful experience of the organ recital on May 14th heard *le coucou* by the 18th century composer Louis-Claude d'Aquin, brilliantly performed by Gillian Ward Russell on our newly-refurbished organ in St Thomas'. There are some 30 cuckoo calls – all in a minor key.

And then there is that giant of composers, Ludvig von Beethoven. The second movement of his sixth symphony ("the pastoral symphony") has cuckoo calls in its closing bars. Who knows what notes Viennese cuckoos sang in the early 19th century, but Beethoven writes his as D to B flat, again a major third; I suspect Beethoven had his composer's hat on – B flat major is closely related to F, the fundamental key of the whole symphony.

Recommended listening? All of the above – especially the real thing!

We had thought-provoking talks by Grace Fisher on the Climate Change Coalition, Sarah Brown, Green Christian, and Graham Burnett with his talk on Permaculture and the Out-doors, as well as his workshops on making and drawing with charcoal. These and many other interesting talks and discussions were complemented by practical sessions, including Duncan

Seath's Repair Café, interspersed with lively music and dance, with The Famous Potatoes, the Fishermen's Chapel Gospel Choir and The Wick Trimmers, as well as ourselves with an Open Mic Night. There were children's Forest School activities, time on the beach and plenty of time for conversations and exchange of views and contact details, as Bradwell became the channel for Green outreach. Othona runs with a very small staff: Debbie, Richard and Peter were ably supported by a wellcoordinated team of volunteers, doing everything from marquees to music setups, from welcoming guests to cooking those fantastic vegetarian meals.

You may have joined Othona for Spring Watch: it is amazing what wildlife we see on the Essex coast; or celebrated Spring by working and having fun together over the last weekend in May. These open community times are always a chance for local people to join in, meeting people from further afield, including our European Volunteers, whose amazing support and fellowship comes to an end as they return home in June – a loving farewell to Alessandro from Italy, Nico from Italy, Olivia from France and Paula from Spain. As a newcomer to Othona, or a regular local visitor, you are warmly welcome to visit, or share a meal or activities – best book if you would like a meal, or just pop in for a cuppa and sometimes even a homemade biscuit!



St Peter, 'the Rock'

St Peter (d. c. 64AD), originally called Simon, was a married fisherman from Bethsaida, near the Sea of Galilee. He met Jesus through his brother, Andrew. Jesus gave him the name of Cephas (Peter) which means rock. Peter is always named first in the list of apostles. He was one of the three apostles who were privileged to witness the Transfiguration, the raising of the daughter of Jairus, and the Agony in the Garden. P.T.O. 11

When Peter made his famous confession of faith that Jesus was the Christ, Jesus recognised it as being the result of a revelation from the Father. He in turn told Peter that he would be the rock on which His Church would be built, that the 'gates of hell' would never prevail against it. Peter and the apostles would have the power of 'binding and loosing', but Peter would be personally given 'the keys of the kingdom of heaven'. Jesus also forewarned Peter of his betrayal and subse-

quent strengthening of the other apostles. After His Resurrection, Jesus appeared to Peter before the other apostles, and later entrusted him with the mission to feed both the lambs and the sheep of Christ's flock.

Peter played a big part in the early Church, and he is mentioned many times in the Book of Acts, where in the early chapters he organised the choice of Judas' successor, preached with stirring authority at Pentecost; and was the very first apostle to work a miracle. Peter went on to defend the apostles' right to teach at the Sanhedrin, and to condemn Ananias and Sapphira. It was



Peter who first realised that Christianity was also for the Gentiles, after his meeting with Cornelius. Later he took a prominent part in the council at Jerusalem and went on to clash with St Paul at Antioch for hesitating about eating with Gentiles.

Early tradition links Peter with an apostolate and martyrdom at Rome. The New Testament does not tell us either way, but Peter being in Rome would make sense, especially as Peter's first epistle refers to 'Babylon', which was usually identified with Rome. Peter's presence in Rome is mentioned by early church fathers such as Clement of Rome and Irenaeus. Tradition also tells us that Peter suffered under Nero and was crucified head-downwards. There is no conclusive proof either way that St Peter's relics are at the Vatican, but it is significant that Rome is the only city that ever claimed to be Peter's place of death.

St Peter was a major influence on Mark when writing his gospel, and the First Epistle of Peter was very probably his. (Many scholars believe that the Second Epistle was written at a later date.)

From very early times Peter was invoked by Christians as a universal saint. He was the heavenly door-keeper, the patron of the Church and the papacy, a saint both powerful and accessible.

In England there were important dedications to Peter from early times: monasteries such as Canterbury, Glastonbury, Malmesbury, Peterborough, Lindisfarne, Whitby, Wearmouth, and especially Westminster. Cathedrals were named after him, too: York, Lichfield, Worcester and Selsey. In all, it has been calculated that 1,129 pre-Reformation churches were dedicated to St Peter, and another 283 to SS Peter and Paul together. 12


