

The beginning

And it was so. ¹² The land produced vegetation: plants bearing seed according to their kinds and trees bearing fruit with seed in it according to their kinds. And God saw that it was good. ¹³ And there was evening, and there was morning the third day.
- ¹⁴ And God said, 'Let there be lights in the vault of the sky to separate the day from the night, and let them serve as signs to mark sacred times, and days and years, ¹⁵ and let them be lights in the vault of the sky to give light on the earth.' And it was so. ¹⁶ God made two great lights the greater light to govern the day and the lesser light to govern the night. He also made the stars. ¹⁷ God set them in the vault of the sky to give light on the earth, ¹⁸ to govern the day and the night, and to separate light from darkness. And God saw that it was good. ¹⁹ And there was evening, and there was morning the fourth day.
- ²⁰ And God said, 'Let the water teem with living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the vault of the sky.' ²¹ So God created the great creatures of the sea and every living thing with which the water teems and that moves about in it, according to their kinds, and every winged bird according to its kind. And God saw that it was good. ²² God blessed them and said, 'Be fruitful and increase in

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number and fill the water in the seas, and let the birds increase on the earth.' ²³ And there was evening, and there was morning – the fifth day.

- ²⁴ And God said, 'Let the land produce living creatures according to their kinds: the livestock, the creatures that move along the ground, and the wild animals, each according to its kind.' And it was so. ²⁵ God made the wild animals according to their kinds, the livestock according to their kinds, and all the creatures that move along the ground according to their kinds. And God saw that it was good.
- Then God said, 'Let us make mankind in our image, in our likeness, so that they may rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky, over the livestock and all the wild animals, and over all the creatures that move along the ground.'
- ²⁷ So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.
- ²⁸ God blessed them and said to them, 'Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground.'
- ²⁹ Then God said, 'I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food. ³⁰ And to all the beasts of the earth and all the birds in the sky and all the creatures that move along the ground everything that has the breath of life in it I give every green plant for food.' And it was so.
- ³¹ God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. And there was evening, and there was morning the sixth day.

Sermon: By Revd Steven Poss

Mark 8: 31-end - Jesus Foretells His Death and Resurrection Sermon – Climate Sunday – www.climatesunday.org

Welcome to our service today. In today's service we are thinking about the Earth's climate and time for creation. Environmental issues are rising fast up the agenda and the Church of England's General Synod has set an ambitious target of becoming net zero carbon by 2030.

Outside the church, all people but especially young people are concerned about the im-pact of climate change and the crisis nature is facing. This past year we've recognised our need to spend time in nature for our own mental and physical health. Also, the UK government is hosting the world as it gathers in Glasgow in November's global climate conference, known as COP26.

The Climate Sunday initiative is calling on all local churches across Great Britain & Ire-land to hold a climate-focused service on any Sunday before 5 September 2021. At this service, congregations are encouraged to make a commitment to greater action to address climate change in their own place of worship and community and to use their voice to tell politicians we want a cleaner, greener, fairer future at the heart of plans agreed during COP26.

Our vision is to leave a lasting legacy of thousands of UK churches better equipped to address this critical issue as part of their normal discipleship and

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mission; and to make a very significant contribution to civil society efforts to secure adequate national and inter-national action at the start of this most critical decade.

By participating in the initiative, churches will also be able to raise a loud and united Christian voice for bolder action by governments in the run up to the COP26. This relates to the Global and Community Engagement sections of the Eco Church programme.

A Rocha UK supports churches advancing on their Eco Church journey and how Eco Churches can make a significant contribution to the bold and timely aims of Climate Sunday in the critical year ahead. Churches will be asked to commit to a suitable long term action on climate as a congregation (for example, to get to the next stage of Eco Church within a particular time frame), and to raise their voice with others by signing a common in a call for the UK government to get the UK on track to meet its targets to cut carbon emissions and become 'net zero'.

Here we are at St Peter's Chapel filming our service today, which is not only one of the oldest Christian church's in England today, but also one that uses one of the least amount of carbon fuels. Climate Sunday wants to raise three challenges with us today:-

- Climate change is already hitting people in poverty the hardest.
- God calls us to love our neighbours and speak up for them.
- You can make a difference by signing the declaration and by praying.

I would love to introduce you to Orbisa. She's 35 and lives in Ethiopia with her children. She and her family work hard rearing goats and cattle to make a living, but in the past few years nine of her ten cows and nearly half of her goats have all died. That's because the rains aren't coming when they used to, and droughts in the region are getting more severe. As the climate changes, it's pushing Orbisa's family deeper into poverty. In the Bible, Jesus tells us the most important commandments are to love God, and to love our neighbours.

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Tackling the climate crisis is vital to both of these – honouring God by protecting his creation and loving our global neighbours who are hit first and worst by what is now a climate emergency.

Our reading from Psalm 104 demonstrates an intimate knowledge of creation. The psalmist describes the beauty of creation, declaring, 'O Lord, what a variety of things you have made! In wisdom you have made them all.' The author understood how creation works. They knew where the bird's nest, and where the mountain goats live, the great skill of a lion as it hunts its prey, and the vast array of creatures living in the water. They knew creation intimately: they must have spent time observing and learning how all things fit together, and they were inspired to worship as a result! In verse 31 of the psalm, just after the part we've heard this morning, it says God rejoices in his creation. The beauty and variety of all he's made brings God joy!

Whether it's plastic pollution littering seas and the poorest communities, or species going extinct at record rates, or the climate crisis making droughts, floods and storms more frequent and severe, we've misused and damaged this beautiful gift of God. We're feeling some of the effects in the UK, but the impacts are hitting people in poverty the hardest. It's hard to grasp what that really means: it's big and abstract.

Tearfund is running the Reboot campaign this year, and together with The Climate Coalition they are calling on the UK government to lead the world in delivering a post-Covid recovery that is healthier, greener and fairer and which puts us on track to tackle climate change. If you could go online at www.tearfund.org/reboot In this Reboot campaign, they are calling for greater support for people in poverty who are most vulnerable to climate change, and for more investment in renewable energy around the world. We really are at a turning point in history, and the decisions we make now will affect our economy, society and the climate for decades to come. If you have a look through, you'll see there's a place for you to add your name to The Climate Coalition's declaration by writing your name and address. When we speak up together we can make a real difference. We can stand alongside Orbisa and call on the government to take action. Can I give you a moment to do that now.

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In our Gospel reading, Jesus asks us to take up our cross and follow him. God delights in his creation, which includes us and wants us to follow his ways in looking after our-selves, each other and our world. This challenge also includes trying to follow God's ways explained to us in the Bible and this includes being stewards of his creation which is part of our discipleship and following God's justice. Whilst these challenges will be different for us all, we can all make the same changes by trying to reduce the Earth's climate and achieving net zero carbon by 2030. One thing we all can do is switch to a renewable electricity provider and there are lots of renewable energy providers out there.

During this Lent, let us be honest with ourselves and pray to God to help and guide us how best we can do this in our lives. We have a deep and unshakeable hope because of what Jesus has done for us, and what he continues to do in the world. Our first response should be to fix our eyes on God and to pray.

Let us Pray.

Father God, we thank you that you are a God of justice. Thank you that you know Orbisa and her family, and all those already impacted by climate change. Jesus, we are sorry for the ways we've damaged your creation. Help us make changes in our church's and in our own lives to love our global neighbours well. Holy Spirit, would you stir the hearts of members of our government, Guide them in all their decision-making, and inspire them to protect the most vulnerable. **Amen.**
