The Vernal Equinox

I was in the garden in mid-February and heard – yes, heard - an early promise of Spring. I was reminded of this little 'poem':

Spring has sprung, the grass is ris, I wonder where the boidies is They say the boid is on the wing, But that's absoid From what I hoid The wing is on the boid!

A little research suggested the rather delightful (?) lines originated in New York – even known somewhat obscurely by some as the Brooklyn National Anthem. I was

then reminded of the wonderful three weeks we spent in the eastern States just exactly 30 years ago this month. There Spring was certainly Springing – and there was no doubt that the boids were well and truly aware of that. We were staying with our daughter in Richmond, Virginia. A Common Flicker (similar to our Great Spotted Woodpecker) was excavating a hole in a tree in her garden. We would go off on a sight-seeing few days (to The Falls for example, as



one does) and each time we returned the flicker had made good progress, deepening his nest hole.

What I heard in the Westwick garden also reminded me of the song of a chickadee, a bi-syllabic whistle. Chickadees, common in the States, are closely related to tits. They share the same genus – Parus – and the Black-Capped Chickadee (Parus atricapillus) we encountered all those miles away appeared very similar to a Great Tit (Parus major) – and the sound was the same see-saw song welcoming Spring.

So along with the snowdrops and crocuses and daffodils the boids, wings firmly attached, larynxes in good shape, have no doubt that Spring is just round the corner. The Song Thrush is singing his heart out at the top of the tree opposite Bradwell shop, Rooks are repairing and rebuilding their nests in the trees to the south of St Thomas's church, our Great-Spotted Woodpecker is drumming loudly on a dead tree, advertising for a partner. We can be sure that Swallows will be with us later this month.

RAF BRADWELL BAY PRESERVATION GROUP Preserve, Honour and Educate

Remembrance is important as a way of preserving history, so that we learn from the lessons learnt. Remembrance Day and the Poppy Appeal plays an important part in focusing on the sacrifice. We should also respect, remember and celebrate the people who gave their lives in many ways, and the people who gave service, which changed their life.

The 20th Century included 2 World Wars, the rise of Nazi Ideology, Genocide and Revolutions. The rise of travel, aeroplanes and cars were maybe positive aspects. Who knows where the 21st Century will take us? We already have had wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and now Covid.

Take a look at Bradwell on Sea, an ancient quintessentially English village. The Great War had its effects with soldiers billeted and Zeppelins overhead. The Second World War was a shock. In the mid 1930's a landing strip was built for use by aircraft using the bombing and firing range on the marshes.

RAF Bradwell Bay was developed from a landing strip used for refuelling aircraft using the firing range on the Dengie Flats. It opened in late 1941 and the first operational mission was flown by a Boston III aircraft on 16th April 1942. The crew were Pilot Sgt Stabb, Navigator Sgt Riches and Air Gunner Sgt Taylor. They took off for an intruder raid on Eindhoven. Intruder raids were the main stay of Bradwell Bay's work. The airfield became quite large; some aircraft failed to return with crews killed and some taken prisoner. The aerodrome was often host to large aircraft like Lancasters and B17s needing to make an emergency landing. Although Bradwell Bay was not an official Emergency Landing Station, Bradwell did accept aircraft in distress. RAF Bradwell Bay was a large and important aerodrome.

Some aspects of the station still exist: parts of the runways, blister hangers and the Control Tower. The aerodrome has been researched for years and now there

is an RAF Bradwell Bay Preservation Group formed to preserve what is left and keep a documentary record.



Gardening in March

March brings the start of spring in our gardens. Time to do some final pruning and get the flower and vegetable beds ready for sowing and planting.

Finish pruning roses early in the month, remember to cut to above an outward bud and remove all dead, diseased or crossing branches keeping the centre of the bush open.



Sow tomatoes, chillies and sweet peppers in pots indoors.

Start hoeing veg beds as soon as the weather starts to warm up.

Plant onion and shallot sets, spacing them 10-15cm apart.

After chiting first-early potato tubers, plant in trenches and cover.

Sow parsnips as soon as the soil starts to warm up.

Mow lawns once they start growing, cut the edges with an edging tool.

Watch out for slugs around the new shoots of Hosta plants and other perennials.

Pot up overwintering Cannas and Geraniums etc into fresh compost, water, then place in a warm spot to spur them into growth.

Sow sweet peas in deep pots in a greenhouse or on a sunny windowsill.

Open greenhouse vents on sunny days to prevent humidity building up.

Plant of the month

The Daffodil,

what a joy to see in Spring.

Golden Harvest -

Single Flowering, Trumpet. Thrives in sun or light shade. Perfect for naturalising under trees, in the grassland, front borders, large pots and containers.



King Alfred -

First introduced over 100 years ago, this is still one of the most popular daffodils. It has gorgeous golden-yellow flowers that look spectacular when allowed to nat-



Both these types were grown at East Hall Farm in the late 1960s when Reg Ponder was there. As teenagers we were employed in the Easter holidays picking and packing them for Covent garden market in London. For picking them we got 5/- (25p) for 600 and 1d (1/2p) a bunch for packing them. It doesn't seem much now but we were happy with

this at the time.

Planting: Plant 4-6in deep from late summer to the autumn. After flowering, deadhead and allow the leaves to die back naturally before removing them. Cutting the leaves back before they are dead will cause the bulbs to be blind next year.

The recycled bishop St Chad

Chad's day is celebrated on the 2nd March. Chad should be the patron saint of any modern bishop whose consecration is questioned by another bishop. Chad was consecrated a bishop, then deposed – and then re-consecrated!

It all began about the middle of the 7th century, when Oswiu, King of Northumbria, made Chad the bishop of the Northumbrian see. But due to a scarcity of appropriate bishops, two dubious bishops did the job of consecrating him. This led to Theodore, Archbishop of Canterbury, deciding to depose him about three years later.

Chad took his dismissal with good heart, and peacefully retired. But then Theodore had second thoughts: Chad was of excellent character: humble, devout, and zealous. So, Theodore re-consecrated him – to be the first bishop of the Mercians. Second time around, Chad was a great success – again.



Chad (died 2 March 672) was a prominent 7th-century Anglo-Saxon churchman, who became abbot of several monasteries, Bishop of the Northumbrians and subsequently Bishop of the Mercians and Lindsey People. He was later canonised as a saint. He was the brother of Cedd, also a saint. He features strongly in the work of the Venerable Bede and is credited, together with Cedd, with introducing Christianity to the Mercian kingdom.

When Chad died in about 672AD, he was quickly venerated as a saint. People took a great fancy to his bones, believing that they would bring healing. Even today, four large bones, dating from the 7th century, and believed to be Chad's, are in the R.C. cathedral in Birmingham.

Bishops today may still argue about consecration, but they are unlikely to have their bones disturbed.

It can be read in the Bible in Luke chapter 14 verses 15-24
