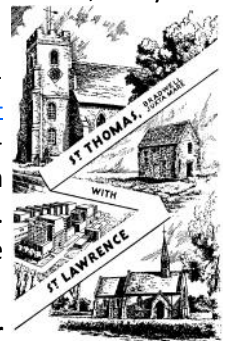

A Wonderful New Location

Choral Evensong in the afternoon and an organ recital in the Cathedral in the evening were the reasons for a visit to Canterbury. But what to do with the rest of the day?

Stodmarsh Nature Reserve lies just a few miles to the east of the city, and was an obvious attraction. It is a gem. A National Nature Reserve since 1951 it has a reputation for attracting rare species. It lies in the valley of the Great Stour river, and has extensive areas of open water and reed beds and damp vegetation. The first view from a hide was of over one hundred Teal, that delightful smallest of ducks, but those recent immigrants to Britain, Great White Egrets, and Herons were also in abundance. One Heron caught and swallowed a fish, the bulge descending its throat as we watched.

As we walked the public footpath which passes through the Reserve we were never far from a Cetti's Warbler, another fairly recent addition to the British list. Usually unseen, we had a rare glimpse of one of these small warblers, calling with its rapid song from the dank vegetation ("Did you do it, did you do it" offers a fair rendering).

But amongst all this rarity the most enduring memory is of a Robin. As we walked back to the car it was singing its weak autumnal song just feet away (males and females sing at this time of year). It then dropped onto the path just in front of our feet, almost coming onto a hand, though we had nothing to offer by way of food. It reminded me of the Robin my wife Brenda trained to come into the kitchen at Westwick and feed from her hand. How much easier bird-watching would be if all were so tame and confiding. But the difficult ones are rewarding as well.

Christine updated us on the Bradwell Christmas Fair, which is now going full steam ahead on Saturday 27 November between 2-5 pm. There will be a pop-up WI café and a WI stall at the Fair – raffle tickets will also be sold for the 'Boozy Barrow' and a wonderful 'Chocolate Box' full of chocolate goodies for £2.00 a ticket on the day. Proceeds from the Fair will be split four ways, the Church, School, Bradwell WI and the Village Hall Trustees.

A new exciting addition to the day of the Fair is the 'Bradwell Festival of Lights' - Bradwell will be invited to take part in this festival by turning on their lights on 26-27 November – entry forms will be in the Community Shop for £1.00 – there will be rosettes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd – entries close on 25 November.

Christine also informed us that the King's Head is organising a Curry and Quiz night on Saturday 27 November (following the Fair) - £5.00 per group of four for the quiz and £5.00 for the curry.

Fabulous 40's Day

Eighty years ago the airfield at Bradwell Bay was developed from a small landing strip to a night fighter station. The airfield was to be witness to many accidents and incidents, some being fatal. Some aircraft left Bradwell never to return.

On Saturday 18th September the RAF Bradwell Bay Preservation Group with the kind help of the Green Man from Waterside took us back in time to the 1940's.

The aims of the Group are to research and record the memories of those times. There were many happy times with weddings and laughter. Squadrons came from Canada, Poland and Czechoslovakia to name but a few.



At 2 o'clock the Reverend Steven Poss led a short service at the War Memorial where the Veterans and British Legion paid their respects to the 130 men who flew from Bradwell Bay but did not come back.

As well as remembering the people who came from all over the world to work at the airfield and those who lived in the village, this was to be a fun day with music, food and speciality beer.



The highlight, was to be a Spitfire flying over the River Blackwater. At about 6 o'clock the air raid siren went in the Green Man, and everyone walked down to the slipway to look for the plane. After waiting for permission to fly over the river, it gave a super display.



As darkness fell, the Hotsie Totsies entertained everyone and sang all the old songs from that era.

Could **YOU** be a **Bloodrunner**?

The **Essex Voluntary Blood Service** – or *Essex Bloodrunners* for short, is a charity providing medical courier services to the NHS and our local Air Ambulances. We are one of 30 such organisations in the UK.

From the NHS Blood Bank at Basildon, our unpaid volunteers deliver blood and blood products to A&E Hospitals in Essex and East London; deliver samples for analysis to a NHS Lab in North London, and via Princess Alexandra Hospital in Harlow, supply blood to the Air Ambulances at Earls Colne and North Weald every night. Amongst many other tasks we also courier breast milk from donors to the Hearts Milk Bank and Addenbrooke's Hospital.

We operate every weekday night, and day and night shifts at weekends and Bank Holidays. Our enhanced support to Hospitals during the Covid-19 pandemic has also introduced a weekday daytime shift. We now need more members. You choose in advance the days and shifts you work. We are looking for reliable and responsible men and women from all backgrounds, employed or retired, with a motorcycle, car or van, a mobile phone and internet access. You will receive training, documentation, full support and a hi-viz uniform jacket.

You will work alone on a delivery run with a typical round-trip distance from home of between 60 and possibly over 120 miles, and be the face of Essex Bloodrunners to the public and NHS staff. The work is not glamorous; can be tiring; you may work unsocial hours in all weathers and you will add thousands of miles to your vehicle. You are unpaid and cover all your own expenses... *so not much going for it really!*

However, rather like being a First Aider or Blood Donor, this is one of the very few ways that an ordinary member of the public can help **save a life**.

BRADWELL CHRISTMAS FAIR – Festive fun, sounds and sights

27 November 2021 from 2.00pm until 5.00pm

The village is looking forward to our Christmas Fair, where proceeds will be divided between St Cedd's School, St Thomas' Church, the Village Hall Trust and the Bradwell-on-sea Women's Institute.

Entry is by voluntary 'gold coin' donation per group to the Village Hall. Whilst most people will give a pound or two pound coin, who can blame the organisers if they have the great expectation that a few sovereigns will also find their way into the village coffers, especially as it is a Dickensian Christmas Fair.

Outside the Village Hall will be a hog roast and ice cream van, whilst inside there will be songs, carols and hand-bells to entertain and loads of interesting stalls, a pop-up café for tea and mince pies and face painting for the young or young at heart.

Stalls in the Village Hall sold out quickly, leading to a waiting list of eager stallholders wanting to join the fun. Mike and Kay, the landlords of the The King's Head, came to the rescue and offered their games room and marquee to meet the additional demand. This increased the number of stalls, selling everything from boutique gin to 'gingerbread man' bunting and toys to toiletries, by over 70%. Mike, will also be providing mulled wine and roast chestnuts, which is a festive treat not to be missed.

Meanwhile down at the Cricketers', Tony and Christine, have hired Santa's Grotto for the children, so they can see Father Christmas and his elves. Entry will be £1 per child and in return they will receive a gift from Santa, again by generous donation from Tony and Christine, and a £1 voucher to spend at one of the participating stalls, including some at the Cricketers' itself selling toys, sweets, chocolate brownies and other cakes and gifts for all the family. Father Christmas will be able to see around 50 children during the afternoon, so enough capacity, at least, for our school children and Bradwell Bay United YFC to be seen.

Our Community Shop will stay open by kind agreement of the Committee and volunteers happy to work and dress up! Look out for their Christmas decorations too, especially in the window. St Thomas church bells will ring from 2.00pm to signal the opening of the Christmas Fair.

The fun doesn't stop when the lights are turned off at the Village Hall and the shop closes. The King's Head will host a quiz and curry night in aid of the same 4 village beneficiaries. Entry to the quiz is £5 for teams of four and Mike will gladly take your booking. Even if you don't fancy testing your knowledge, you can come along and support the players and buy a delicious curry. Hecklers will pay a fine of £1 a shout out!

We will also be turning on our Christmas Lights on 26 and 27 November for the

Bradwell Festival of Light. Every household in the village from Mill End to St Peter's Chapel and from the High Street to the Airfield is invited to light up their homes for these two evening. It can be a simple lantern or table lamp in the window or a dazzling display of fairy lights and winter wonders of grazing deer, snow men and Christmas trees or something between.

If you want to be on the map and win a rosette for your lights, please get an entry form from the Community Shop for £1 and enter your details and return the form. All entries will appear on a 'treasure map' for people to follow. The closing date for entries is Wednesday 24 November 2021. A panel of judges will tour the village and award the rosettes on Friday 26 November 2021. Maps will be available from the shop on 27 November 2021.

The money collected will pay for the rosettes and anything left over will be donated to St Cedd's School, St Thomas Church, the Village Hall Trust and the Bradwell-on-sea Women's Institute.
