Queen Victoria to George V in an hour with Steve Lester

For our September meeting, we were joined by our speaker, Steve Lester, for a whistle-stop journey through the reign of Queen Victoria, Edward VII and George V. Armed with an extensive range of royal memorabilia, Steve transported us back in time, immersing us in the history of these three memorable monarchs. Despite



being very well-known figures, we were still surprised to learn some of the stories that Steve told us, especially surrounding the royal memorabilia. For instance, thousands of southern children received a mug for Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee made by northern factory workers, who were children themselves! Or that

potters were caught out at the coronation of Edward VII. It should have taken place in June 1902 but was delayed after the prince became ill. The delay came too late for almost all pottery makers, so most coronation memorabilia you can find has the wrong date. Coronation mugs with the revised date in August 1902 are very rare, so keep a look out for them!

Our next meeting is on the 11th of October in the village hall for our talk from 'The bag lady', Sandra Gunson. New members are always welcome, so please feel free to come along! News from RAF Bradwell Bay

The Little Airstrip that Grew Big

Most people are aware of the concrete runways that remain at Bradwell; indeed, many people had their first driving experience on the old aerodrome. However, the RAF first had a presence in Bradwell on Sea in the form of a grass airstrip on Weymark's Farm.

This airstrip was to serve the firing and bombing range on the mudflats and was known as Royal Air Force Dengie Flats. The small base was staffed by 30 Airman and a sergeant. An officer occasionally visited, staying at the Green Man. The airstrip and range opened in the mid 1930's and was part of the RAF expansion due to the deteriorating political situation in Europe. After the Battle of Britain and the threat of invasion was over, it was decided that more large airfields in the East of England were required, the airstrip at Bradwell was chosen for expansion and became a large concrete runway aerodrome that housed 2,000 personnel.

The Firing range was first discussed in the mid 1920's and faced much opposition. The Great War was supposed to be 'The War to End all wars but the possibility of another European War was looming large. The RAF which had been reduced following the Great War now needed to expand. Expansion meant training and so the idea of the firing and bombing range on the flats was resurrected. The history of this will be shown <u>when</u> we open our museum. Little remains of the firing range, although we have many pictures.



The one remaining part is the observation tower that stands near to St. Peter's Chapel. This was one of three towers going down towards Burnham. This is the only one surviving, and only just surviving at that. It would be nice to have it restored and secured, with an interpretation board. Unfortunately, permission to do this has been sought unsuccessfully.

The RAF Bradwell Bay Preservation Group seeks to preserve the history of the RAF in Bradwell on Sea. We are planning for a museum near the memorial. You can help by donating via our website <u>www.rafbradwellbay.co.uk</u>.

St Francis of Assisi - love for the Creation

St Francis (1181 - 1226) is surely one of the most attractive and best-loved of all the saints. But he began by being anything but a saint. Born the son of a wealthy cloth -merchant of Assisi, Francis' youth was spent in fast-living, parties and on fast horses as a leader of the young society of the town. Then he went to the war between Assisi and Perugia, and was taken prisoner for a year.

By the time of his release, Francis had changed. Perhaps his own suffering had awakened him to that of others. In any case, he abandoned warfare and carousing, and began to help the poor and the lepers of his area. Then one day a voice which seemed to come from the crucifix in the small, semi-derelict church of Damiano Assisi 'Go and repair my house, which you see is falling down'.


This religious experience was a vital turning point in Francis' life: Jesus Christ became very real and immediate to him. His first action was to begin repairing the church, having sold some of his father's cloth to pay for materials. His father was not amused, in fact he was furious - until Francis renounced his inheritance and even his clothes by his dramatic stripping off in the public square of the town. The Bishop of Assisi provided him with simple garments, and Francis began his new life.

His inspiration was always religious, not social, and the object of his quest was always the Crucified Christ, not Lady Poverty for her own sake. Francis rebuilt San Samano, and then travelled as a pilgrim. His compassion for the poor and lepers became famous. Soon disciples joined him, and they set up a communal life in simple wattle and daub huts. They went on occasional preaching tours. (Not until later did they become an Order whose theologians won fame in the Universities.)

In 1219 Francis visited the Holy Land, and his illusions about the Crusaders were shattered. He went on to seek out the Sultan, and tried to convert him. Back home, he found his Order was now 5,000 strong, and growing. Francis stepped down as head, but continued to preach and was immensely popular. He died after a prolonged illness at the age of 45, and was canonised in 1228.

Francis' close rapport with the animal creation was well known. The story of his preaching to the birds has always been a favourite scene from his life. He also tamed the wolf of Gubbio. This affinity emphasises his consideration for, and sense of identity with, all elements of the physical universe, as seen in his Canticle of the Sun. This makes him an apt patron of nature conservation.

The 20th century witnessed a widespread revival of interest in Francis. Sadly, some films and books caricatured him as only a sentimental nature-lover or a hippie drop out from society. This ignores the real sternness of his character, and his all-pervasive love of God and identification with Christ's sufferings, which alone make sense of his life. Two ancient, and many modern English churches are dedicated to him. 12

The next Bishop of Bradwell

The Venerable Adam Atkinson will be consecrated as a bishop at Westminster Abbey during a service led by the Archbishop of Canterbury on Friday 29 September. Adam currently serves as Archdeacon of Charing Cross in the Diocese of London and

was previously Director of Mission Development in the Two Cities area of London Diocese. He has also served as a parish priest in Stepney. His appointment as the next Bishop of Bradwell was announced on 19 June during a visit to churches and schools in the Bradwell Episcopal Area.

Speaking ahead of Adam's consecration, the Bishop of Chelmsford, the Right Reverend Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani said:

"We are looking forward to this special service and to welcoming Adam to Chelmsford



Diocese as Bishop of Bradwell. He will be joining a wonderful team of clergy and lay people who faithfully lead our churches in the Bradwell Area. His experience as Arch-deacon of Charing Cross and his work in mission development and church revitalisation, together with his passion for mission and community service will be a great blessing to our diocese as we continue to serve our local communities and to share the love and good news of Jesus Christ."

Speaking ahead of the service, Adam said:

"I'm looking forward to Friday's service of consecration with a great sense of joy and anticipation as I prepare to take up the role of Bishop of Bradwell and follow God's call to join the parishes and worshipping communities of the Bradwell Area. I'm delighted that people from across Chelmsford Diocese will be present at Westminster Abbey and it will be a privilege to be consecrated alongside Paul and Ian. Please do pray for me and all the people of God in the Bradwell Area as we seek to follow Jesus together." Adam will be officially welcomed into Chelmsford Diocese as the Bishop of Bradwell at a service at Chelmsford Cathedral on Saturday 4 November. The service will also see the welcome and licensing the new Archdeacon of Stansted, the Revd Kate Peacock and the new Archdeacon of Chelmsford, the Revd Jonathan Croucher.

Adam will begin his ministry in November.

About Adam

The Venerable Adam Atkinson has most recently served as Archdeacon of Charing Cross in the Diocese of London.

Adam was ordained Deacon in 2007 and Priest in 2008. After serving a curacy in Shadwell he was a Vicar in East London for 9 years and Mission Director for the Two Cities Area from 2019.

Before ordination Adam worked in media consultancy in the private and third sectors and briefly served as an Army Officer. He is married to Heather who is a priest serving in Bethnal Green. 15
