The firstfruits of hope (Rom 8:19-25)

The Othona Community

As you sit down with a relaxing cuppa, to read your copy of "Village View", take yourself to a day at Othona, as you share with us Sunday 15th September.

A bell rings for breakfast – sounding across the field so all may know it's time to come to the dining room. But that's not the

start of the day, as the breakfast cooks have been up for some time, preparing real porridge, and setting out an array of cereals and fruits to choose from, with homemade bread to toast. No sooner than breakfast is finished, with many hands to clearing away, washing up and tidying round, than the events of the day are underway, with Warden/Managers Debbie and Richard, and their resident team: Phil, JP, Amanda, George, French Volunteers Lou and Quentin, part-timer Peter, and others joining in to support the team. The structure of the day is still based on the four elements of Othona, set out by our founder Norman Motley: Work, Worship, Study and Play together to build Community.

Preparations are in hand for Sunday worship in the ancient Chapel of St Peter's on the Wall, used by worshippers over hundreds of years, and daily by Othona for nearly 80 years. Today we have Christian groups sharing the day: the Lithuanian Church, and Fambridge Church; and also joining us are the Visually Impaired Sailing Society, coming in for tea and homemade cakes. Othona has a long history of inclusion of blind and partially sighted people, active in their membership and support. With all these distinct groups coming here for their separate purposes you might expect allocation of different spaces for each body of people to pursue their own agendas. Not so: look at everyone playing croquet, together, sharing a game of bowls in the lovely autumn sunshine, enjoying home cooked (and often home grown) meals together, new friendships made and plans to come again next year.

At the time of writing, an art-related week, "Place, Space and Map Making" Workshop is about to start, running from Mon 16 – Fri 20 Sept with Sandie Cottee sharing her expertise – and we say Goodbye to George from Dorset, a familiar face to many in the village as he has helped with local community events, while giving a good year of his time to volunteer at Othona. After two years on the team, Phil is also moving on, and will be greatly missed, particularly in the kitchen – did you try his cookies!? **Othona is now seeking to recruit a new Cooking, Catering and Hospitality Lead – residential position –** see the Othona Essex Website for details: is this you?

News from the Bell tower

On Saturday morning, 12th October, there is going to be a District practice in Bradwell for individual ringers to learn how to raise and lower a bell.

When ringing bells, they are in the up position and can be easily pulled off balance by pulling on the rope. When the bells are not being rung, they are left in the down position and will swing

News from RAF Bradwell Bay

We have spoken of events around the D-Day invasion of Europe, let's look at some of the build-up which stretches back into 1943.

In the Autumn of 1943 2 squadrons both equipped with Mosquito aircraft but with different jobs to do.

In September 1943, 488 Squadron came to RAF Bradwell Bay. At the time they were a defensive squadron and had moved from RAF Drem in Scotland. They were active on home defence especially during Operation Steinbock, known as the 'Baby Blitz', in early 1944. On 21st March 1944 the squadron bought down 3 air-craft in 1 night, 2 by the same crew.

Air Marshal Sir Roderick Hill, Air Officer Commanding ADGB, is shown the wreckage of one of three enemy aircraft shot down by aircrews of No. 488 Squadron RAF, flying from Bradwell Bay, Essex, on the night of 21 March 1944.

In October 1943 605 Squadron came to RAF Bradwell Bay from Castle Camps in Cambridgeshire, in their role as an intruder squadron. The day following the move to RAF Bradwell Bay the squadron was carrying the fight across to the continent to soften the Germans and especially the airfields and transport infrastructure in preparation to the planned invasion in 1944. These raids were to be successful in weakening the transport infrastructure and Luftwaffe so that reinforcements would find it difficult to be transported to invasion areas and to assist in gaining air superiority over the German forces.

Alfred the Great, King of the West Saxons, scholar, AD 899

Can you think of a politician who deserves to be called a saint? If no one currently living politician comes to mind, never mind – there is always King Alfred of Wessex (871-99).

This remarkable and best known of all the Anglo-Saxon rulers may have dozed off and let some cakes burn while a peasant woman was hiding him from the Vikings, but he did so much else which was of lasting good for the Anglo-Saxon people.

It was a desperate time for the Anglo-Saxons - the kingdoms of Northumbria, East



Anglia and Mercia had fallen to the Vikings. Only Alfred's province remained free. Through some inspired military maneuvering, Alfred managed to keep them at bay. As a Christian, he became the defender of all Christian Anglo-Saxons against the pagan Vikings. (His son and grandsons went on to conquer the Vikings, and thus ensured the future unity of England.)

Alfred was also a scholar, and admired certain writings which had laid down models of ideal Christian kingship. He tried to put these principles into practise, such as producing a lawcode. Alfred believed strongly that anyone in authority should have to study in order to learn how to govern. Not such a bad idea for leaders today!

Alfred was never canonised by

the Church, but his translation of Consolation of Philosophy by Boethius is often thought to be a fitting epitaph: I desired to live worthily as long as I lived, and to leave after my life, to the men who should come after me, the memory of me in good works.
