

Old Testament reading

2 Samuel 2.1-11; 3.1

David Anointed King of Judah

2 ¹After this David inquired of the Lord, 'Shall I go up into any of the cities of Judah?' The Lord said to him, 'Go up.' David said, 'To which shall I go up?' He said, 'To Hebron.' ² So David went up there, along with his two wives, Ahinoam of Jezreel, and Abigail the widow of Nabal of Carmel. ³ David brought up the men who were with him, every one with his household; and they settled in

the towns of Hebron. ⁴ Then the people of Judah came, and there they anointed David king over the house of Judah.

When they told David, 'It was the people of Jabesh-gilead who buried Saul', ⁵ David sent messengers to the people of Jabesh-gilead, and said to them, 'May you be blessed by the Lord, because you showed this loyalty to Saul your lord, and buried him! ⁶ Now may the Lord show steadfast love and faithfulness to you! And I too will reward you because you have done this thing. ⁷ Therefore let your hands be strong, and be valiant; for Saul your lord is dead, and the house of Judah has anointed me king over them.'

Ishbaal King of Israel

⁸ But Abner son of Ner, commander of Saul's army, had taken Ishbaal son of Saul, and brought him over to Mahanaim. ⁹ He made him king over Gilead, the Ashurites, Jezreel, Ephraim, Benjamin, and over all Israel. ¹⁰ Ishbaal, Saul's son, was forty years old when he began to reign over Israel, and he reigned for two years. But the house of Judah followed David. ¹¹ The time that David was king in Hebron over the house of Judah was seven years and six months.

3 ¹There was a long war between the house of Saul and the house of David; David grew stronger and stronger, while the house of Saul became weaker and weaker.

New Testament reading

Luke 18:31-19:10

A Third Time Jesus Foretells His Death and Resurrection

³¹ Then he took the twelve aside and said to them, 'See, we are going up to Jerusalem, and everything that is written about the Son of Man by the prophets will be accomplished. ³² For he will be handed over to the Gentiles; and he will be mocked and insulted and spat upon. ³³ After they have flogged him, they will kill him, and on the third day he will rise again.' ³⁴ But they understood nothing about all these things; in fact, what he said was hidden from them, and they did not grasp what was said.

Jesus Heals a Blind Beggar Near Jericho

³⁵ As he approached Jericho, a blind man was sitting by the roadside begging. ³⁶ When he heard a crowd going by, he asked what was happening. ³⁷ They told him, 'Jesus of Nazareth^[a] is passing by.' ³⁸ Then he shouted, 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!' ³⁹ Those who were in front sternly ordered him to be quiet; but he shouted even more loudly, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!' ⁴⁰ Jesus stood still and ordered the man to be brought to him; and when he came near, he asked him, ⁴¹ 'What do you want me to do for you?' He said, 'Lord, let me see again.' ⁴² Jesus said to him, 'Receive your sight; your faith has saved you.' ⁴³ Immediately he regained his sight and followed him, glorifying God; and all the people, when they saw it, praised God.

Jesus and Zacchaeus

19 He entered Jericho and was passing through it. ² A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax-collector and was rich. ³ He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature. ⁴ So he ran ahead and climbed a sycomore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way. ⁵ When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, 'Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must

stay at your house today.' ⁶ So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. ⁷ All who saw it began to grumble and said, 'He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner.' ⁸ Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, 'Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much.' ⁹ Then Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham. ¹⁰ For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost.'

Chapel Evening Service Sunday 5th July 2020

Welcome to the first of our online summer chapel evening services over July and August. Usually, we would be holding these services in the chapel, but due to the current restrictions and the large gatherings around the chapel at weekends, we have decided to hold these services online.

From today's readings, I would like to speak on Psalm 56 from this evening's lectionary readings. Psalm 56 speaks of the psalmist's trust in God alone and this is a great message for us at this time. Perhaps the most striking feature of the psalm is the repeated combination of fear and trust, which is very human like to me.

The psalmist looks forward to the time of salvation. Although he seems to speak as an individual, 'trampled' by enemies speaking cruel words and in danger of people eager for his life, a national picture appears in the expression for the foes, these are warring and numerous, peoples or nations to be cast down in the fury of the Warrior-God.

The sufferer can therefore be understood to be a King, bearing in his own soul hostilities against his land and nation from other peoples. Some scholars believe this to be the story of King David in 1 Samuel 21:10-15 or 1 Samuel 27:1-28:2. He appeals to God to bring down the pride of human armies and he looks forward to serving in peace before the face of God.

Through the great number of assailants, The call for God's speedy help. How can he be trusted, God's word with his commitments and promises are to be praised and wholly trustworthy. The true power of God will surely come. The psalmist sets the word of God; praising that word, he is enabled to trust and to cast out fear, perceiving the emptiness of human might in comparison with the power of God. At the same time he brings his grief to God, and penitence for sins, for he knows that every tear is taken up and treasured by God.

The Lord promises to bring us abundant life and life to the full, so we, who are also suffering at this time, to put our trust in God and his word at this time to lead us out of this pandemic and back into life and a life that is full, **Amen.**
