The first reading is from Romans 13.8-end

Love for One Another

⁸ Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. ⁹ The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' ¹⁰ Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

An Urgent Appeal

¹¹ Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹² the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; ¹³ let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. ¹⁴ Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Reproving Another Who Sins

¹⁵ 'If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. ¹⁶ But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. ¹⁷ If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. ¹⁸ Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth

will be loosed in heaven. ¹⁹ Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. ²⁰ For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

Reconciliation & Forgiveness

We continue on from last week, where we were thinking about taking up our cross and following Jesus daily, which, as we heard from Paul in his passage from Romans, was to try and live in peace with one another and loving our neighbours as best we can.

This week is a clear example of how to do this, where there is dispute amongst two people and Jesus's advice on how to go about rectifying it.

Our Lord's advice is first for the person who feels harmed against to go and speak to the person directly who they feel has harmed them in some way. If this does not work, then for the person who has been harmed to go and find one or two persons to come along to act as witnesses to speak to the person again. If this fails, then the person is to take it to the church.

You may be asking, did they not have church's in the time of Jesus, and why is this account so unique to Matthew? Well, Matthew is writing to an established Jewish Christian community church at some time twenty years after the death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. As the Jewish people would have had specific laws to deal with such issues, they would be enquiring what do they do now in such events, now they are part of a Christian community church? And so, Matthew includes this very important passage from Jesus to address such situations.

It may be difficult for us to go and address a person if we feel they have harmed us in any way, especially in a close community as a church. But Jesus would like us to deal with the situation right away before it manifests itself into something bigger than it could be. Jesus does not want us to live with the issue more than it need be, so he is encouraging us to deal with the issue straight away and directly, rather than going about our own ways, which can often make the situation much worse.

In this, as in all situations in life, we are to ask for God's grace, strength and mercy in order to deal with such situations without blowing our own gasket and running off in a hump. As we do so, we ask the Lord, to bring his love to the situation, so that situations can be restored, so that we can continue to live our lives in love and peace with one another.

Jesus also asks us to be like children to enter the Kingdom of God. Here, I think our Lord means that we are to be as innocent and willing as children in receiving God's word in our lives. If we take

Jesus's words as God's word, then we have respect for these words and think that they are best for us and our lives.

We are to act in ways which represent our Lord Jesus. Why do we this, because restoration is at the heart of God, Amen.

Some questions

- How shall we bind ourselves closer to one another, the world and to God?
- What bridges can we build?
- What reconciliation do we need to initiate?
- How do we bind people closer to Christ?
- What might we each do to liberate another?

A Prayer from the Ignatian Community on today's Gospel

As I prepare for my time of prayer with the Lord, I become aware of what lies in my heart and mind today. I pray for God's gift of inner attention to him alone. I surrender myself to the power of the Holy Spirit through this prayer time and beyond, into my day. Knowing there is no need to rush, I read the Gospel slowly, receptively. Perhaps I imagine Jesus is speaking to me personally. I pay attention ... relishing and drinking in the words I am hearing. I ask God to guide my heart, allowing his words to resonate within my being. I am silent, receptive ... Reading the passage again, I notice what stirs within me. Do I have a sense of being part of a Christian community ...? ... a sense of belonging to Christ when I pray with and for others ...? Or maybe it has been difficult at this time to feel a sense of belonging to church? I take care not to judge. I speak from the depth of my experience to the God who speaks to me. In expectant stillness I listen for God, noticing how my heart or body are responding. Perhaps God is inviting me to help with the work of building community in some way ... whether in church or elsewhere? I ask for any grace I need. In time, I end my prayer slowly, praying for the gift of a deepening sense of belonging to the Body of Christ.
