Reading 1 Exodus 14:19-31

19 Then the angel of God, who had been traveling in front of Israel's army, withdrew and went behind them. The pillar of cloud also moved from in front and stood behind them, 20 coming between the armies of Egypt and Israel. Throughout the night the cloud brought darkness to the one side and light to the other side; so neither went near the other all night long.

21 Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and all that night the Lord drove the sea back with a strong east wind and turned it into dry land. The waters were divided, 22 and the Israelites went through the sea on dry ground, with a wall of water on their right and on their left.

23 The Egyptians pursued them, and all Pharaoh's horses and chariots and horsemen followed them into the sea. 24 During the last watch of the night the Lord looked down from the pillar of fire and cloud at the Egyptian army and threw it into confusion. 25 He jammed[a] the wheels of their chariots so that they had difficulty driving. And the Egyptians said, "Let's get away from the Israelites! The Lord is fighting for them against Egypt."

26 Then the Lord said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea so that the waters may flow back over the Egyptians and their chariots and horsemen." 27 Moses

stretched out his hand over the sea, and at daybreak the sea went back to its place. The Egyptians were fleeing toward[b] it, and the Lord swept them into the sea. 28 The water flowed back and covered the chariots and horsemen—the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed the Israelites into the sea. Not one of them survived.

29 But the Israelites went through the sea on dry ground, with a wall of water on their right and on their left. 30 That day the Lord saved Israel from the hands of the Egyptians, and Israel saw the Egyptians lying dead on the shore. 31 And when the Israelites saw the mighty hand of the Lord displayed against the Egyptians, the people feared the Lord and put their trust in him and in Moses his servant.

Reading 2 Romans 14:1-12

The Weak and the Strong

14 Accept the one whose faith is weak, without quarreling over disputable matters. 2 One person's faith allows them to eat anything, but another, whose faith is weak, eats only vegetables. 3 The one who eats everything must not treat with contempt the one who does not, and the one who does not eat everything must

not judge the one who does, for God has accepted them. 4 Who are you to judge someone else's servant? To their own master, servants stand or fall. And they will stand, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

5 One person considers one day more sacred than another; another considers every day alike. Each of them should be fully convinced in their own mind. 6 Whoever regards one day as special does so to the Lord. Whoever eats meat does so to the Lord, for they give thanks to God; and whoever abstains does so to the Lord and gives thanks to God. 7 For none of us lives for ourselves alone, and none of us dies for ourselves alone. 8 If we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord. So, whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord. 9 For this very reason, Christ died and returned to life so that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living.

10 You, then, why do you judge your brother or sister[a]? Or why do you treat them with contempt? For we will all stand before God's judgment seat. 11 It is written:

"'As surely as I live,' says the Lord,

'every knee will bow before me;

every tongue will acknowledge God.""

12 So then, each of us will give an account of ourselves to God.

Gospel Reading Matthew 18:21-35

The Parable of the Unmerciful Servant

- 21 Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother or sister who sins against me? Up to seven times?"
- 22 Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times.
- 23 "Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. 24 As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand bags of gold was brought to him. 25 Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt.
- 26 "At this the servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back

everything.' 27 The servant's master took pity on him, cancelled the debt and let him go.

28 "But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred silver coins. He grabbed him and began to choke him. 'Pay back what you owe me!' he demanded.

29 "His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay it back.'

30 "But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. 31 When the other servants saw what had happened, they were outraged and went and told their master everything that had happened.

32 "Then the master called the servant in. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I cancelled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. 33 Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' 34 In anger his master handed him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed.

35 "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

Sermon by Revd Steven Poss

Exodus 14:19-end - Crossing the Red Sea

Romans 14:1-12 - Do Not Judge Another

Matthew 18:21-35 - Forgiveness

Sermon

The theme of forgiveness is carried forward from the previous weeks, where our Lord calls us to carry our cross daily and part of that is to love our neighbours as ourselves and to seek reconciliation and restoration when one sins against the other. This week we hear of the unforgiving servant who ignores the advice from our Lord to forgive his neighbours and finds himself in trouble for not doing so.

Forgiveness is a tough ask for anyone, but in overcoming the obstacles that prevent us in forgiving the person, there is great reward in us being relieved of the ongoing anger inside of us and the guilt which is living in the person who sinned against us which can often wound us. In our Gospel reading at the end, Jesus asks us to forgive from the heart, which is more than saying to the person, I forgive you.

To forgive from the heart is to pass the matter over to God and to ask for his healing, grace and strength to do

so and to try not to have any ill feeling towards the person again and to try and live in peace with them. It doesn't mean that you need to continue to socialise with them, but to continue to live life without holding a grudge against that person.

The Exodus reading is a story of rescue and redemption which tells of the redemption of the Israelites from Egypt across the red sea and shows us that restoration is at the heart of God, as we can see on the cross. God wants to draw all back to himself through the work and restoration of the cross. This includes the work of forgiveness as the grace and strength received from the work of the cross and the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives can help us to draw ourselves closer to God and to each other.

Crossing the sea is a great analogy for us in the work of forgiveness. It can seem daunting in forgiving, like trying to cross a river, but by persevering through the waters, we can get to the other side feeling accomplished and for reaching that place where we can forgive from the heart and start to live a new chapter in a new land. We do not want to live with the unforgiveness in Egypt, we need to travel to the place of forgiveness to the new promised land.

Christ has gone down into the deep waters of death and raises us to life in triumph and it is in this triumph of love and forgiveness we live as Christians. We are

communal people bound together by biology, language, culture and economics, therefore we are try at all lengths to bring forgiveness into the situation when this community is at risk in dividing itself or if individuals seek to work alone. This is the work of the church as we heard last week, it is part of our mission and a way to represent our Lord. Our lives are entwined in living in community with each other and we may be like Peter where we feel forgiving 7 times is a great achievement, but 77 times? Here we gain an insight into the heart of God where we see unlimited forgiveness. The King in our Gospel story is God who has forgiven us an amount we cannot repay like the ten thousand talents (approximately £1 Billion in today's money), so we are to carry this forgiveness to others.

By advising us on constant forgiveness, our Lord and God is seeking to comfort us by not allowing us to live with the effects that not giving forgiveness brings to our lives. Paul also gives us some broader practical advice to include in our general conduct in his letter to the Romans, so that the Christian community may thrive in its mission.

So, if we are let down by someone, someone cheats on us, or loses their temper with us, says unkind things about us, breaks something of ours etc, forgiveness is the only way to overcome the feelings these situations bring to us. September is also the month of Creationtide when we think about our creation. Forgiveness is not

only a subject with our fellow human beings but with our creation too. May we spend sometime this week to pray the prayer below and call to mind the areas in our lives where we need forgiveness and where and who we need to give forgiveness to.

Our acts of forgiveness flow from our reconciliation through Christ with the Father, and our consequent participation in the life of God. We have been forgiving a great amount in our restoration with God and continue to be. May we also like have a forgiving and restoring heart, that we too may forgive others who sin against us, Amen.

The Litany of Reconciliation was written by Canon Joseph Poole in 1958 and today is prayed regularly by CCN members around the world, and by many others on an occasional basis. While framed around the seven deadly sins, it serves as a reminder that when we pray about the problems of the world around us, we need to begin by acknowledging the roots of those problems in our own hearts. The Litany is prayed, in a short ceremony taking at most ten minutes, at noon each weekday in Coventry Cathedral and in the Cathedral ruins on Fridays.

The Coventry Litany of Reconciliation

All have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God. The hatred which divides nation from nation, race from race, class from class,

FATHER FORGIVE

The covetous desires of people and nations to possess what is not their own,

FATHER FORGIVE

The greed which exploits the work of human hands and lays waste the earth,

FATHER FORGIVE

Our envy of the welfare and happiness of others, FATHER FORGIVE

Our indifference to the plight of the imprisoned, the homeless, the refugee,

FATHER FORGIVE

The lust which dishonours the bodies of men, women and children,

FATHER FORGIVE

The pride which leads us to trust in ourselves and not in God,

FATHER FORGIVE

Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you.).
