
Welcome to this 8th Sunday after Trinity Proper 13 Communion Service

Reading 1 Genesis 32:22-31

Jacob wrestles with God

²² That night Jacob got up and took his two wives, his two female servants and his eleven sons and crossed the

ford of the Jabbok. ²³ After he had sent them across the stream, he sent over all his possessions. ²⁴ So Jacob was left alone, and a man wrestled with him till daybreak. ²⁵ When the man saw that he could not overpower him, he touched the socket of Jacob's hip so that his hip was wrenched as he wrestled with the man. ²⁶ Then the man said, 'Let me go, for it is daybreak.'

But Jacob replied, 'I will not let you go unless you bless me.'

²⁷ The man asked him, 'What is your name?'

'Jacob,' he answered.

²⁸ Then the man said, 'Your name will no longer be Jacob, but Israel,[□] because you have struggled with God and with humans and have overcome.'

Matthew 14:13-21 Jesus feeds the five thousand

Jesus feeds the five thousand

¹³ When Jesus heard what had happened, he withdrew by boat privately to a solitary place. Hearing of this, the crowds followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴ When

Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them and healed those who were ill.

¹⁵ As evening approached, the disciples came to him and said, 'This is a remote place, and it's already getting late. Send the crowds away, so that they can go to the villages and buy themselves some food.'

¹⁶ Jesus replied, 'They do not need to go away. You give them something to eat.'

¹⁷ 'We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish,' they answered.

¹⁸ 'Bring them here to me,' he said. ¹⁹ And he told the people to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the people. ²⁰ They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces that were left over. ²¹ The number of those who ate was about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Sermon by Revd Steven Poss

Matthew 14:13-21 - Feeding the Five Thousand

<u>Sermon</u>

In our Gospel reading, we hear of the famous reading of the feeding of the five thousand. The theme kind of follows on from last week with the parable of the mustard seed, with the subject of God multiplying what is given to him in faith. We tend to think of big and large congregations or people coming to faith and whilst this is good and biblical, we often want to get there quickly. As the parable of the wheat and weeds and this current pandemic has taught me, it is patience that is needed in ministry and to discern what God is asking of you and commit yourself to doing this and allowing him to bless and multiply it in his way and in his time.

This can often see us wrestling with ourselves, as we are not content with what we have and can include inner turmoil, both of which, we hear of in our first two readings today. The first is of the encounter with Jacob wrestling with a man and God in Genesis 32.

Angela Tilby writes "This passage yields profound insight into our relationship with God. It shows us that God takes us on as we are, but does not leave us unchanged. God struggles with the flaws of our nature; we struggle with the contradictions of our experience. God wants us to be healed, but we need to be humbled. The blessing that Jacob receives is the blessing of integrity. Mysterious though it is, it is our wounds that makes us whole."

The words of emotion from our reading from Romans also represent inner feelings, St Paul wrestles with, that the deep

pain of what faith in Jesus Christ means for his fellow Jews in faith. Our faith may have implications for our relationship with family and friends and this is something that God is doing in and through us. However, Jesus has given himself for all, it is not down to us if they choose not to put their faith in him, but we can be on hand to witness to anyone who asks for the hope that is in us.

In our Gospel reading, we hear of the people who come to Jesus in faith and they are feed with bread and fishes. As we set aside time to be conscious of our emotions and feelings during these challenging times, we ask God to feed us with his words and presence in Holy Communion, so that we can manage them and act upon the good feelings and emotions that we have.

This shows us the compassion of Jesus, the same compassion that the people felt from Jesus at the feeding of the 5000 when he was trying to be alone. As we receive the compassion from Jesus, we can be confident to disclose and pour out all of our emotions and feelings to him, so that with his compassionate love, can help us make sense of them and provide us with ways forward, which will bring us peace. This will also help us to understand the emotions and feelings of others and help us to have compassionate to others.

We are told of the expectation that food in the desert would characterise the days of the Messiah. 'It shall come to pass at that time that the treasury of manna shall again descend from on high, and they will eat of it in those years, because these are they who have come to the consummation of the ages.' – 2 Barusch. Such

was the expectation in many Jewish circles in the first century and Jesus fulfils it.

By feeding the multitude in this desert place, Jesus is making a statement and a claim. He is making a statement about who he is and what he has come to do. He is indeed the Messiah, and he has come to usher in the days of salvation. He has every right, therefore, to their allegiance. The King is coming to and for his kingdom. No wonder that in John 6:15 we read that the multitude wanted to take him by force and make him King.

But the feeding of the multitude does not only look back to Jewish expectations and fulfil them. It looks forward in anticipation of the eschatological banquet that Jesus would institute for his messianic community.

After the feeding of the 5000, Jesus dismisses the crowds and goes up the mountain to pray, also like Jacob did in our Genesis reading where they found rest and guidance. In ministry, we also need time to withdraw to tend to ourselves, paying attention to our emotions and feelings and this will help us be compassionate to other people's emotions and feelings. This is part of paying attention to God's direction and call on our lives, Amen.
