VE day 75th Anniversary

75 years later The Queen will make an address to the nation on the 75th anniversary of VE Day and will be broadcast on BBC One at 9 pm, the same hour as her father, King George VI, made his radio address marking victory in Europe after what he called "nearly six years of suffering and peril."

In her message on the occasion of the VE Day, which celebrates the formal acceptance by the Allies of World War II of Nazi Germany's unconditional surrender of its armed forces on May 8, 1945, the queen will commemorate the sacrifices of the Second World War generation.

After the message, the public will be invited to take part in a rendition of Forces' Sweetheart Dame Vera Lynn's wartime anthem "We'll Meet Again,"

Whilst listening to Vera Lynn read the following memories of VE day.

VE day memories

During the war people from Bradwell and the neighbouring villages were very close to the action living in and next to a military base. When VE day came over the following days there was much merriment in the area.

Christopher talks of Cyril Kemp putting flags across the road from the shop to the trees at New Hall and a lorry going through and bringing them all down! Also, of all going to Waterside and seeing fireworks on the old pillbox at the Bradwell Quay (the pillbox was removed when the power station came). Jonathan remembers that when the war ending was announced on the radio Grandad Thorpe went into the garden and picked a big bunch of Lilly of the Valley for the house to make the rooms cheerful, also he remembers all going to the village hall where a bonfire was lit and Lou Joslin cycling to the hall with a guy of Hitler to put on the fire. He remembers much noise and merriment at New Hall across the road, which was an officer's mess. My mother talked about a big dance at the village hall, at this dance Joyce remembers Mick (Eileen) Bowtle getting on the stage at the hall and singing all night.

Whilst in London Wyn remembers all her road full of bunting and flags, and everyone having hats. All the evacuees and Land Army girls, including her sister and cousins were home. The road was laid out with tables and all brought their own beaker and plate to share fish paste sandwiches, small jam tarts and homemade lemonade. They had music on the piano and someone played the spoons. All joined in with dancing to Glenn Miller 'In the Mood' and singing along to 'We'll meet again' by Vera Lynn. As soldiers, sailors and Air aid Wardens turned up all joined in with the Conga up the road.



The **Royal Observer Corps** (**ROC**) was a civil defence organisation intended for the visual detection, identification, tracking and reporting of aircraft over Great Britain. The Bradwell group are seen here at their lookout post in Hockley Road.



The **Home Guard** was the armed citizen militia supporting the British Army during the War. Operational from 1940 to 1944, the Home Guard had 1.5 million local volunteers otherwise ineligible for military service, such as those who were too young or too old to join the regular armed services or in reserved occupations. Here we see Bradwell Home Guard at the Village Hall.



Air Raid Precautions (ARP) Sounded air raid sirens, report on bombing incidents. They also enforced the "blackout". Heavy curtains and shutters were required on all private residences, commercial premises, and factories to prevent light escaping and so making them a possible target for enemy bombers to locate their targets. Women were involved in ARP services through the Women's Voluntary Service. Here we see the ARP outside the Kings Head, Bradwell.



Bradwell Bay MT Yard Ladies Grp 1.

Here we see some of the military personnel being photographed in the Military Transport (MT) Yard Bradwell. This is now the school playground, you can see behind the girls the houses in Cage Row, East End Road.



Bradwell Lodge, New Hall, Down Hall and other large country houses were requisitioned by the military usually for an officer's mess. Here we can see officers outside Bradwell Lodge.



Down Hall (now a Care Home) seen here during the war, occupied by the military.

RCAF Douglas Boston Mk III taxiing at RAF Bradwell Bay in 1942 The main airfield was first laid down before WW2 as a grass-surfaced landing ground for the nearby Dengie firing ranges. In 1940 it was made a RAF station with concrete runways, hangars and ancillary buildings. The station is unique as it was the only fighter station where the Fog Investigation and Dispersal Operation (FIDO) was installed.





Artists impressions by Alan Sorrell, better known for his later reconstructions of archaeological sites, particularly of towns. The one that shows the Lodge tells us that he did indeed visit Bradwell. The other one could so easily be based on the East End Road Communal Site with Blackberry Grove on the right.
