#### CAN YOU HELP! DO YOU LIKE OLD BUILDINGS! DO YOU WISH TO HAVE A CHURCH IN THE VILLAGE!

St Andrew's Church is Grade I Listed and has been the church in Bulmer from the 12<sup>th</sup> Century. As with any very old building there is much work required to keep it in good order. The cost to provide services and generally run the church, without carrying out any building work, is over £20,000 per annum. This sum,



which does include insurance of the church, is provided by those attending the church and some other people in the village. The Parish Council also provides a grant of £650 towards the grass cutting in the churchyard: this covers about half of the costs and is given as the churchyard is the cemetery for the parish.

Every five years the church has to be inspected by an Architect who details all the work required. The last inspection was in 2008 and the following work, to be completed by 2013, is still outstanding:

Repointing of the tower walls and stonework repairs; internal repairs and decoration within the tower chambers; repairs to the churchyard boundary walls. Total estimated cost  $\pounds$ 43,000.

In addition further less urgent work (i.e. after 2013) was recommended including:

Repointing of the porch; provision of a lightning conductor; internal plaster repairs and general redecoration work; improved access for the disabled. Total estimated cost at least £26,000.

The church does not have the money to do all these repairs or the future work. We have also recently been given Planning Approval for a much-needed extension to provide toilets, kitchenette, small meeting room, office and storage. This extension would provide access for the disabled. The estimate for this is between £210,000 and £250,000 excluding furnishings.

Many churches have a 'Friends' organisation made up of people in the community who wish to see a church building remain there. They are not necessarily regular churchgoers rather they are people who seek to preserve an historic building in the village and believe that the church should be available for all. Such an organisation can have charitable status and would seek to obtain finance for the works required by applying for grants and undertaking other fund raising activities. Setting up a Friends of St Andrew's Bulmer seems to be a way by which the church building could be maintained and improved for all.

#### **BULMER NATURE DIARIES**

It must be a measure of the extremes of climate that we have endured during the past year, that I am starting this column with yet another account of record-breaking weather.

I've been chatting to my old mate Brian Ambrose, from Sudbury. He has been keeping weather records for over forty years. In January and February this year he had a total of 123mm of rain, but from 1st March until 26th May he only recorded 13mm in total. Brian compared this with the big drought year of 1976, when for the same periods his figures were 55 mm and 50mm. respectively. The drought of '76 dragged on until 26th Aug, but between then and the end of the year we were deluged with a staggering 330mm of rain. This spring has now been officially recognised as the driest on record, but what a relief it was in the third week of June, when a couple of heavy deluges saw the water-butts overflowing and a green tint returning to the lawn!

After last December's freeze up and a more normal Jan. and Feb, the early flowers, such as Celandine & Cherry Plum were slow to show, but from the end of March on, things changed. April saw a mini heat wave and from then on most plants were early rather than late, with temperatures topping 26 deg C on the 23rd (that's 80 F in old money). This almost tropical heat certainly hastened the bud burst. I cannot recall a year when all woods and hedges were in full leaf by the end of April, at least a couple of weeks early. Only a few Ash trees remained bare. Most flowers were early, with Bluebells being past their best by the end of the month. The premature warmth certainly suited the early butterflies. Brimstone, Holly Blue and especially Orange Tip turning up in really good numbers.





**Comings and goings** The dates I have recorded for migrant birds in or close to Bulmer, **last years dates in brackets**.

*Last winter visitors,* Redwing 13th Mar, Siskin 28th Mar, Fieldfare 30th Mar (3rd Apr) Brambling 4th Apr. *First Spring visitors,* Chiffchaff 2nd Apr (28th Mar) Blackcap 2nd Apr (18 Apr) Swallow 3rd Apr (16thApr) Cuckoo 23rd Apr (25th Apr) Whitethroat 28th Apr (20th Apr) Swift 2nd May (30th Apr) House Martin 1st May (1st May). We do seem to have heard a Cuckoo and have seen House Martins more frequently this year. The martins must be nesting somewhere in the Street and are no doubt having to travel further to get a supply of mud for their nest, with everywhere so

parched. We have a Wren that nesting under our summerhouse roof. The picture is of a nest in the same spot, a few years ago.



On 21st March a herd of about 25 Fallow Deer raced across the fields towards Heaven Wood having been startled by some dogs. On the Hedingham road, the number of Roe Deer being hit by cars has led to a request that deer warning signs be erected. It may seem a bit bizarre, but road kills are a good indicator of the status of our local mammal populations, especially the nocturnal ones. Extraordinarily, in the first week of May, two Badgers and a Fox were killed between Bulmer Street cross roads and Dogs Pit corner, which I would think is more like the average for a normal year than just one week. But I'm sure that this indicates a healthy population of both, some might say too healthy. Rabbits, of course, are the most commonly encountered victims, along with the odd Grey Squirrel. I'm sure that we don't see as many flattened Hedgehogs as in the past, which points to a drop in their population. Their inbred defensive mechanism of rolling up into a ball when threatened, doesn't exactly provide a lot of protection against our speeding wheels and must make them the most vulnerable creature to venture onto our roads. I certainly don't think that there's any reason to rejoice because we

see less of them killed on our roads, it just reflects a drop in their numbers.

It may not be coincidental that as the road toll of Hedgehogs decreases, those of Badgers are on the increase. By and large, the hedgehog's coat of spiky armour serves it very well in protecting it from would-be predators, but not from the badger. With their massively strong forepaws,



armed with very long, steel-like claws (see photograph) they can unroll a hedgehog to expose the

little creatures' soft underbelly, and there's dinner. These strong claws can also dig through rock hard soil to open up wasp and bumble bee's nests. My neighbour Bill had this very thing happen to a bumblebee's under his front hedge, just a few of weeks ago, showing that Badgers are active in Bulmer Street.

There's no doubt that certain animals and birds have a higher degree of

"road sense" than others. On the couple of occasions that I have had to screech to a halt to avoid a Badger, it seems that they



are quite oblivious of any danger approaching; they just bumble along, ignoring all else. On the other hand, Foxes are far more likely to dart into the nearest hedge. The one bird, which seems almost as vulnerable as the hedgehog, is the Pheasant. At times they seem to wilfully throw themselves to their fate under our wheels, their squashed carcasses being all too common a sight. These make easy pickings for the scavenging Magpies and Carrion Crows. Now, these are birds that appear to have developed a very acute road sense, often feeding until the last fraction of a second, before niftily hopping aside or winging their way out of danger.

There's a large pond in the valley below Goldingham Hall. Up to about ten years ago, in early March, this used to be the gathering point for hundreds of Toads that had made their way there with one object in mind, to mate. Their croaking made an almost musical sound and could be heard from quite some distance. As well as the toads, there were always a goodly number of frogs, also intent on spawning. I visited this March, but not so much as a single croak met my ears and we found only one little clump of frogspawn, with no toad spawn at all.

There were some interesting bird sightings around Bulmer Street over the past little while. I have twice watched a Red Kite soaring over, the huge wingspan and forked tail of this magnificent raptor, made it easy to identify.

Dean Byford told me he was sure that he had seen a Goshawk down on the footpath. He said that it had caught a Jay and had flown off with this sizeable bird with little effort. I was a little sceptical at first, but Dean was at one time into falconry and would certainly recognise a Goshawk if he saw one. Another bird, this time not positively identified, had me puzzled. I had sighted this large brownish bird, some way down the field. It quickly disappeared into the crop, but despite watching for over an hour, failed to see it again. A near neighbour, Roger Collorick also saw it. My first thought was that it was possibly a Hen Harrier, but it did look a bit owl like and having compared notes with Roger, decided that it was probably a Short Eared Owl. These birds nest in the more northerly parts of Britain, usually on open moorland. In winter they often turn up on our coastal marshes such as Old Hall Marshes near Tollesbury.

**APPROVE THE MINUTES** of the meeting held on 14th January 2011. Proposed Cllr. Crome, seconded Cllr. Rowe.

**MATTERS ARISING:** Cllr. Crome advised the Council that he had passed the NRSWA course on New Roads and Street works Operative Units. This enables the Parish Council to carry out work on roadways and highways, providing a qualified operative (Cllr. Crome) is on site. The Parish Council thanks Niall Fraser for his donation of special clothing to the Parish for use by the operative.

DAVID FINCH CC spoke briefly on the following

- subjects: -
- budget
- parish updates
- big society
- mobile libraries

• how ECC was proposing to deal with the current economic situation.

**NIGEL HARLEY** spoke on how Braintree DC, was endeavouring to make savings, e.g.

- by delaying some planning applications to 2/3 weeks reduce the number of councillors and despite
- reduced government funding, BDC was promising -
- no cuts to front line services
- green clean campaign maintained
- Village agents to carry on for another year

• to pay more attention to the needs of the north of the District.

Nigel announced that he would not be standing for reelection in May and that Julian Swift would be representing this ward, if elected.

Cllr. Mills thanked Nigel for all the time, help and assistance he had given to the Parish during his term as District Councillor.

**COE's MEADOW REPORT** - Cllr. Leigh (chairman CMMC) reported that the committee was getting ready for this years Fun Day and that they were applying for and hoping to get funding from Nat West Bank. There is to be a working party to clear scrub from behind the bungalows in the Avenue and trim the laurels on 2nd. April.

# PLANNING

**1 Finch Hill** — alteration of external materials from painted render to off white hardiplank boarding and new first floor window. Granted

4 Bulmer Tye - retrospective consent for new vehicular access over The Fox car park leading to rear of 4 Bulmer Tye. The Bulmer PC supports this application with the proviso that the temporary screen remains until the bund planting is sufficiently grown. Back House Croft, Bulmer Street — variation of conditions. The Bulmer Parish Council was of the opinion that if these variations were granted, it would leave Back House Croft without a garage and now that the new access has been granted there is likely to be a further application to build a garage close to the village envelope boundary. This would constitute further overdevelopment. Because of the original reasons of why these conditions were applied, there seems to be no logical reason why they should be removed. The Bulmer Parish Council does not support this application. However, the recommendation of Braintree Planning Committee is for the application to be granted.

**Jenkins, Bulmer Tye** — installation of 16 photovoltaic solar panels to the south-facing roof of the barn. This application has gone to Appeal. The Parish Council, will be writing to the First Secretary of State to support the Appeal.

**ALLOTMENTS** - Cllr. Morgan attended an Allotment Management Day held by the EALC and came away with fresh ideas on making improvements to Turnpike Piece.

Some suggestions are as follows -

• drainage issues - land drains to be laid along the paths (quote being sought)

• spoil from the ditches is higher than the plots, causing flooding. This needs levelling.

• tenants to keep their plots tidy and when terminating a tenancy the plot should be cleared by the outgoing tenant.

• no hose pipes should be allowed, but a dip tank installed

• better liaison with tenants

• notice put up regarding dogs to be kept on leads It was suggested that a sub committee be formed to come up with a master plan stating priorities. It was also suggested that an annual prize could be given for the best allotment.

Cllr. Rowe and Cllr. Crome said they would be willing to be on the sub committee.

# **CORRESPONDENCE & NOTICES**

**1.** The Clerk reported to County Highways that there were several **potholes** at Batt Hall.

**2.** Following receipt of Mr. Kirby's report (Braintree Building Control Surveyor – see F.272), the Parish Council accepted his views and acknowledged there were **no defects to the sewer situated on** 

**Turnpike Piece**, but would wish the area to be brought in line with his report. The Parish Council accepted Mr. Benns offer to carry out Mr. Kirby's suggestions. The Council also wrote to the occupants of Nos. 14 and 15 Park Lane to advise them it was their joint responsibility, with Mayhill House, for the maintaining, cleaning or renewing the sewer and not that of the Parish Council.

**3.** The Clerk was asked to advise Mortimers that they wanted the **wild flower** areas on Coe's Meadow to be cut & collected just once a year.

**4.** The **hedging scheme** opposite Parsonage Wood, Hedingham Road was taken up with another contractor.

**5.** The **handrail post** at the steps to the churchyard has been made safe and will be replaced in due course.

**6.** Following information sent to Brooks Newmark MP regarding **vehicle parking** at the corner of **Church Road,** Mr. Newmark had contacted the Chief Constable, whose response was ..... 'the matter had recently been raised at the Joint Action Group and discussed with partnership agencies in order to raise a satisfactory resolution. After visits from the local Neighbourhood Constable, the resident in question is showing more consideration as to where he parks his vehicles. After taking advise from both Highways and our own Traffic Dept., parking restrictions are not being breached' .....

Cllr. Margaret Mills told the meeting that she would not be standing for re-election on 5th May and unfortunately, due to an unavoidable commitment, would not be able to attend the next meeting and AGM. Cllr. Mills will, however, remain a Councillor and Chairman until including the 4th May 2011.

The Parish Council thanked Margaret for all of her time, effort and energy and also knowledge she has put into the parish over the last 25 years.

PARISH PATH WALKS - Spring 2011

After what appeared to be yet another drawn out cold and wet winter the weather of April and May felt like we'd shifted directly into summer. With spring passing us by so swiftly there seemed hardly any time at all to appreciate our most wondrous season, and this combined with a late Easter and several bank holidays almost tripping over each other the parish path walkers were only able to accomplish two outings. Our first walk was on Easter Monday when we headed west. Peter Minter kindly permitted us to gather at the Bulmer brickworks from where Margaret led us out onto the field paths towards Gestingthorpe. It was a glorious afternoon with the sun blazing as we reached Gestingthorpe where we arrived in the locality of the pheasant and our paths took us off in the direction of Great Maplestead and Castle Hedingham. These fields are criss-crossed by several paths, many of which we haven't walked before but give an opportunity to marvel at swathes of our beautiful landscape. We returned by the perimeter paths of Over Hall and the church then headed for Hill Farm where we welcomed the chance of some shade in Wiggery Wood.

The sun only shinina through the trees in shafts to illuminate the beautiful blooming bluebells, one of the few signs that we were still actually in spring. Leaving Wiggery Wood our paths then brought us back to the brickworks.



Our next outing was on the last bank holiday of May. A good crowd of us gathered on Plough Green to follow Margaret around our local parishes for another wander to see the delights of our now severely parched countryside. From Plough Green we headed for the Fox where the paths to the rear were a complete contrast to the last time we waded across them. From Ryes Lane we took the road down Amos Hill and towards Green Lane and up into Twinstead,



where amazingly we came across a pond that still contained a small amount of water. From Twinstead we crossed the A131 in the direction of

Wickham St Paul then took the bridle path along to Butlers Hall Farm. Our paths continued on bringing us to the Bulmer brickworks, up onto Wesborough Hill and Hilltop Farm where taking the bridle path back to Jenkins completed our walk.
