COUNTY BROADBAND UPDATE - FIBRE TO THE HOME

As of the 18th May, the 30% target of Pre Orders for Fibre to the Home broadband project has been reached! This means County Broadband (CBB) will now plan the network build, giving speeds of up to 1,000Mbps!

CBB will undertake a detailed planning phase where they will look at how to bring the service to all those who have made a commitment, and investigate how they can deliver the service to some of those more difficult and remote locations. The whole planning process will take around 6-8 weeks.

However, don't stop spreading the word as CBB would like to connect as many people at the start of the project as possible. To that end CBB are extremely happy to announce that they **are extending the Free Standard Installation and 3 free months of phone offer until 22nd June 2018.**

ST ANDREWS PARISH CHURCH

Bulmer church has 4 graves of servicemen who died during the two world wars, and this year the War Graves Commission, who help to maintain such graves, are recognising the presence of all such graves throughout the UK by erecting a small notice on the entrances to churchyards, which have such graves. We hope our signs will be in place before the Remembrance Day Service which will start at 10.45am to allow for an orderly recognition of the 2-minute silence.

We hope residents of the village are happy that the churchyard grass is being cut on a regular basis and are aware that **the church is always open** for private prayer and contemplation. We know that this fact is much appreciated by visitors. 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NATURE DIARY



Several people got in touch to ask about little brown birds visiting their bird feeders. These were lesser redpolls, which have a red patch on their forehead. We had an influx of them in the latter end of winter. They were coming regularly to our Niger feeder from early February through to April. Quite acrobatic little birds they will hang onto feeders at all angles, much the same as blue tits do. They are members of the finch family, their natural food are the seeds of trees such as birch and alder. Although they nest in some parts of the British Isles, we see them here as winter migrants.

On the basis that "one swallow doesn't make a summer", I was delighted when two skimmed low across the field behind us on April 19th, a feeling reinforced half an hour later when a couple of orange tip butterflies fluttered across the sun drenched garden. Surely we were putting that long winter behind us at last. A somewhat forlorn hope, ten days later we were shivering in or raincoats on a day of heavy rain driven be near gale force winds and the thermometer never venturing above 5 degrees C. Then a week later the temperature touched 27 C. and so our weather roller- coaster ride into spring continued! Anyone who watched the first episode of "Springwatch" will have seen how late spring has been this year. Taken from statistics from all over Britain, it would appear that on average most flowering plants were some three to four weeks late in blooming. Despite, or perhaps because of this, the spring flowers have excelled themselves again this year, from

primroses and bluebells, to dandelions and cuckoopints (wild arum). Dandelions especially. Walking down the footpath behind Bulmer Street, there was a veritable flare path of dandelions lighting the way down into the Belchamp Valley.

The 10th of April proved to be a day of birds of prey. About 8 o'clock a male sparrow hawk had secured a small bird for it's breakfast and was devouring it just a few yards from the kitchen window. Having had a reasonable meal, it flew onto the fence where it rested for a good ten minutes. Later a kestrel, hovering a little way down the field suddenly dived like a stone, but straightway lifted off again, whatever it had targeted having eluded capture. That evening just before dusk, we walked down the footpath towards Belchamp. Half way down we met our neighbour Paul returning with his two dogs. He told us he had seen a barn owl several times down there, both morning and evening. Whenever he saw it, it **always** flew up the hedge line towards the Street. We had only walked on a couple of hundred yards further on when the owl floated passed us, but on the other side of the hedge. As Paul had said, it headed up towards the Street before we lot sight of it in the twilight. I had hopes that it had become a resident, but neither Paul nor I saw it after that evening. About a fortnight before this, the same hedgerow presented me with a real surprise, a sudden movement on the path in front of us revealed a common lizard.

These are creatures that don't tend to spread around all that quickly so there may have been a population of them there for years. Despite having walked there countless times before, this was the first one I had ever seen. So have I been a little blind, or have they colonised the area relatively recently?

I've noticed more brown hares out on the fields behind us of late. These are the fields between the Street and Heaven Wood. One day in early May there were six chasing around in front of the wood. They appeared to be paired off and were obviously mad May hares! Looking it up I found out that they will breed through the spring and summer, and can have three or four broods. Apart from these six hares, there we another pair about 400 yds from them. So that's eight in relatively close proximity. But eight hares pales into insignificance compared with the thirty odd rabbits I counted on about a 50yd stretch of hedgerow beside Deal Nursery. Well -- they do breed like rabbits!

Over 25 years ago I bought my first camcorder, keen to record some of our local wildlife. I was very lucky to track down a nightingale singing in a copse close to the Belcamp Brook, thanks to a tip off from Ashley Cooper. On my fist couple of visits the master songster remained well hidden, but on my third early morning visit, it came out into the open and I shot about five minutes of it singing full on. Watching the film recently I was struck by two other birds, which could be, heard singing incessantly in the background, apart from the nightingale itself. One was a cuckoo and the other a turtle dove. That nightingale was the last one that I have heard or seen in our immediate area. Cuckoos are now very thin on the ground; I have only once heard one in Bulmer so far this year. As for the turtledove, I fear that their gentle purring, a sublime and iconic sound of high summer, has sadly become a mere memory in Bulmer.

I'm afraid there is not a lot to cheer about when it comes to other of our summer migrants. I scanned through the British Trust for Ornithology's population graphs, looking particularly at the species, which occur, or have occurred in Bulmer. With the exception of the chiffchaff and blackcap (going up) and the whitethroat (stable), swifts, swallows, house martins, nightingales, turtledoves and cuckoos are all declining. The last two very steeply.



We came across this Crab, or flower Spider on a walk along the field edge close to the Belchamp Brook. Sitting in wait on a flower head they pounce on unsuspecting insects, unlike most spiders, they don't use a web to catch their prey. Here it has caught a large fly, but they will happily take bees as well.

Welcome - Good evening and welcome to our annual Parish Meeting. The aim of tonight's meeting is to provide you with information of the very good events that are run throughout the year by a dedicated band of people and to give you the opportunity to make suggestions on any projects or shortfalls that might be considered by the Parish Councillors. No decisions will be made on these at this stage but will be considered by the council thorough out the year at the normal council meetings.

18/0001 Approval of the minutes of the Annual Parish Assembly Meeting held on 24th April 2017.

Confirmed and approved/signed/published on 15th May 2017.

18/0002 Chairman's Report 2017/2018 - Like previous years this has again been a challenging one for the council with sadly the resignation of Peter Fulcher as chairman, Peter has been a great asset to both the council and the village but more about Peter later. I took over as chairman in November and did not realise until taking on this task what a very taxing and unenviable task it is and I couldn't have got even this far without the support of our excellent clerk Diane. Once again with the resignation of Peter we found ourselves in the position of having to call an election to fill the vacancy, this is a costly business for the parish. The successful candidate being Christine Street,who was welcomed to her first meeting in March.

- The bypass has again been back in the press over the past few months which of course raised concerns thorough out the village, the current position I understand is that a business plan will be prepared at the end of this year running into 2019. No doubt more news will be available at that time.
- The majority of the allotments are running well thanks to a dedicated group of local growers, we currently have two vacant plots should anyone be interested. Tenants who have rented plots but are not currently working on them will politely be reminded of the terms of their contracts. The tenants will in future be allowed to erect greenhouses with toughened safety glass following agreement with the council. Once again, we are looking at providing an extra water point but this is subject to money being made available.

- The Whats Going On quarterly magazine is still being produced and I believe there is still a need for this in paper form as not all villagers have the benefit of the Internet. New contributors to this are always welcome as it is nice to be able to refresh the topics, however I would like to thank current contributors for the great effort they make with their contributions thank you.
- Once again, I would like to thank Barbara Rawlins and her team of dedicated litter pickers for keeping the village streets as litter free as possible and her team of What's Going On distributors.
- I would like to remind all villagers that a Councillor is a voluntary position and they are trying to serve the whole parish. They accept that there will be disagreements with what they are doing at times but any criticism should be constructive please. Decisions are made by the whole council and therefore all Councillors are responsible.
- We are very lucky to have a fully trained clerk in Diane but please note we only employ her to work for our council for 7 hours a week so there will be times when she is not available doing our councils work, therefore emails if possible are most helpful but if you do need to telephone please leave a clear message including your telephone number and she will get back to you in due course.

Bulmer Village Hall Management Committee

Guest speaker explained this is run by The Village Hall Management Committee, which is a charity, the Parish Council are custodial trustees. The Village Hall provide competitive priced facilities for events, they have a few clubs which use the hall as a regular venue. The small room has recently been redecorated, curtains have been replaced with blinds. They organise and run the Village Lottery and various fund-raising events. The hall is essential to the local community, the Treasurer is standing down and so there is a vacancy if anyone is interested.

Skylarks

Guest speaker reported that this was a club for anyone, female/male, young or old. It is a good opportunity to meet other people in the village. They meet on the 4th Tuesday of each month, they have outing days, and hold fund raising events.

St Andrew's School

Head Teacher (Jinnie Nichols) and Deputy Head (Carol Everard) operate between Bulmer primary School and Great Maplestead (2 schools across 2 sites). Currently there are 49 children at Bulmer. The school children go on various trips. Recently passed an Ofstead Inspection as a Good School. The School is involved with the church and would like to continue to work within the community. The school has been invited to take part in the Coe's Meadow Fun day.

Bulmer St Andrew's Parochial Church Council

15 Parishes under two ministers. Services on the first 3 Sundays of each month. There is a special children's corner. Special services are held through the year. All final reports can be viewed in the church. Due to lack of funds could only cut half the grass in the churchyard, volunteers cut the remaining. Grateful to everyone who helped, a new contractor has been appointed this year. It is a Village Church that needs the village support.

Coe's Meadow Management Committee

Coe's Meadow relies entirely on funding. Thanks, expressed to Stour Valley volunteers. The Fun Day is planned to go ahead on Farther Day 17th June, with a bucking bronco theme, volunteers required. New play equipment soon to be ordered, balance scales as suggested by the local primary school children. The basket ball area due to be resurfaced.

Committee currently considering suggestions to hold an event in the winter, based on a Christmas Day theme.

Neighbourhood Watch

Due to the lack of Police presence, Neighbourhood Watch is a vital scheme in Bulmer, based on neighbour's looking after each other, and to provider reassurance. This was a lively and well-attended meeting despite the rain but we made good use of Alison's and John's large poly-tunnel, thank you. Currently we have only two plots not rented out but a couple of the other plots appear not to be worked at the moment. This will be monitored as it is unfair on the other tenants with encroaching weeds etc.

I confirmed to the tenants that the council have agreed to allowing greenhouses with toughen safety glass (size as given for sheds) in the future. Greenhouse details will need to be provided to the yet to be nominated Councillor (to be on the agenda in May) for agreement before going ahead.

The issue of a second water pipe is still ongoing but in the meantime a Hoselock adapter has been purchased which allows for two hose pipes being on the current supply, hopefully the water pressure will be sufficient.

The tenants are helping maintain the grass around their plots where they have personally have the required equipment. However there will be still be a need for the larger strimmer to be use and we have a very welcome volunteer to help with this.

It was mentioned and I saw proof of this that a minority of tenants are still putting unwanted produce and weeds on the paths which hinders grass cutting, also please ensure the ditches are kept clear there have been occasions when grass cuttings and weeds have been deposited in them.

By popular request the Village Hall Committee will again hold a 'fun horticultural event on the 11th August' they intend to make it bigger and better this year. The hedge cutting was praised both for the timing and how well it was done this time.

The overall feedback was very positive with happy tenants.
