# A New Years Present from National Grid for you and future *Generations!!*

The government is working (Electricity report Networks Strategy Group) that shows that the line from Bramford near Ipswich to the Twinstead Tee is inadequate to the task of carrying the loads created by new power stations on the east coast including two new nuclear reactors at Sizewell, plus gas powered stations at Kings Lynn and New Holland. There are, also wind farms in process of establishment near Clacton though these produce negligible impact on this issue.

There are four proposed "corridors" for the new power lines that National Grid (NG) have identified but all end at the "Twinstead Tee" and pass through the lovely countryside of the Stour Valley past Lamarsh and Henny. So we in this area have in fact no choice.

**Corridor 1** would add yet another line of 46.5 metre tall pylons down the route of the existing 400kV line between Bramford and Twinstead but this idea seems to be discounted by NG already.





Though NG denies it, we have been reliably informed that **Corridor 2** is the NG preferred route. This would involve building a sub station, known as a **Grid Switching point (GSP)**, to take power from the 400 to the 132kV lines and a switching station will in this case have to be built between Twinstead and Heddingham. This will be a very large and ugly structure. It is understood NG are interested in the **land on the side of** 

the A 131 near the wooded areas (close to Butler Wood, just before the cross roads to Twinstead & Wickham St. Paul) for this installation. The size of the site would be at least  $150 \times 150$  metres (at least two football pitches side by side) and tall enough to be seen over tree tops.

The new lines might replace the existing 132kV lines if NG can agree it with EDF meaning the smaller pylons would be replaced with 46.5m tall ones. All of the existing lines will be replaced during the project.

**Corridors 3 and 4** run through beautiful unspoiled countryside. **Corridor 3** is the most direct route and probably involves the most environmental damage. **Corridor 4** weaves its way by the longest of the routes avoiding environmentally important sites. Both of these routes have the unconscionable effect of spoiling the currently unfettered landscape of the Brett and Box valleys.



#### **BULMER HISTORY SOCIETY**

Linking the themes of landscape and local heroes, our October meeting commenced with an extract from the Newspaper Archive, and concluded with the launch of a new book about Bulmer.

Joseph Felton, reported *The Bury and Norwich Post* of 1841, was both blind and deaf. He regularly attended Bulmer Church however, where he sat on the steps to the pulpit, with a horn to his ear. Despite his disabilities he gained employment, fetching and carrying parcels to and from Sudbury, which he visited daily, until being struck by a gig in his seventieth year.

From the Book of Remembrance we heard of farm worker Alfred Willis, who lived at Butlers Hall Farm. During the First World War he served in France with the Northamptonshire Regiment. Alfred was killed in action on 29<sup>th</sup> October 1918—just *thirteen* days before the Armistice.

To honour those who paid the supreme sacrifice, the History Society places a wreath on the War Memorial each year, during the Remembrance Sunday Service. This November it was laid for us, by Chairman of the Parish Council, Margaret Mills.


Our final local hero was Philip 'Tulip' Rowe (1871-1955). Born into a farm-working family, Tulip left Bulmer School at the age of twelve, subsequently earning his living 'on the land' and as a rural craftsman. A second volume of his handwritten memories has now been edited, and published by his grandson Robin Rowe, assisted by cousin Peter. Entitled **Pollards and** 

**People**, the book takes the reader on a journey around Bulmer.

Launching **Pollards and People**, Robin provided an expert explanation of Bulmer's landscape, about which his Grandfather makes so many enquiring observations. ('Why *are* Bulmer's lanes and ponds where they are?')

Glimpses of the book were then recounted. We heard of otters in the Belchamp Brook; of families in Smeetham Hall Cottages having to go Bardfield Bridge for their water 'in a dry time', and of the tragedy of a little boy drowning in a well at Batt Hall.

As a young man Tulip had helped fill the Auberies 'ice house' beside Sandy Lane. The older men he worked with provided memories from the mid 1800's. Some recalled the stagecoach passing through Bulmer Tye. Others told him of carpenters from Acton, walking seven miles to— and from— Jenkins Farm every day during renovations. (It was then part of Earl Howe's estate.) The flints used in the farm buildings, Tulip reports, came from Acton too.



The hardness of life is all too apparent. Aged ten, Tulip's uncle had to spend the Christmas Day of 1835, by himself, scarring birds off a field adjoining the Hedingham Road; at about the same age he 'trod the clay' barefooted at the Brickyard.

On other pages Tulip wrote of life as he knew it; of 'a poacher of the highest class', of the 'night rangers' employed to deter them, and of controversial attempts to stop bridleways being gated. He described the road from Lower Houses to Gestingthorpe as 'Watery Road' for a rivulet sometimes flowed along it.

There were amusing extracts too. The carpenter in Bulmer Street who made a coffin, then sat in it, but couldn't get out! The thatcher's mate who fell in a pond near Kitchen Farm and was asked by the on-looking farmer whether he was wet.... There were references to swimming in the Vicarage Ponds; the Bulmer Scout Troop; the large clumps of mistletoe near Butlers Hall; thefts of chalk from Goldingham chalk pit; and of filling in a grave during a driving snowstorm, one April night. We were told of the extraordinary attempt to start a brickyard at Upper Houses in the early 1930's; of a farm having existed at Haven Ground; of bulrushes growing in a pond not far from the top of Finch Hill; and of Tulip brewing the beer, and making the mead for his wedding in 1896.

**Pollards and People** takes us back to the era of Thomas Hardy; it is possibly unique; a 'Victorian farm workers travelogue' around the parish of his birth and lifetime's labour. It is surely one of the largest bodies of work ever written in the North-Essex vernacular. It is an outstanding contribution to our local historical knowledge, and an unparalleled resource for future generations of Bulmer inhabitants.

# UN-APPROVED NOTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BULMER PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON 13th NOVEMBER 2009

**APPROVE THE MINUTES** of the meeting held on 11th September 2009. Proposed by Cllr. Crome, seconded Cllr. Leigh.

**MATTERS ARISING None** 

PETER DARLINGTON introduced himself to the Council as the Village Agent for Bulmer. **'Village Agents'** is a new project sponsored by ECC, NHS Mid Essex and Braintree Local Strategic Partnership who have commissioned RCCE to deliver the project.

The main focus is to provide isolated or disadvantaged older people in rural communities with easier access to information and services from a trusted and well-known friendly face. Village Agents will be responsible for signposting local residents to a range of services and information sources that are able to provide the right help, advice and support and identifying any unmet needs in the local community for older people in rural areas.

Peter can be contacted on 07540 720604 and will be able to help with; welfare benefits, fire and home safety, health and fitness, how to travel, services and carer's support and volunteering.

#### **COE's MEADOW:**

A good report was received from RoSPA. There were some 'low risks' requirements made which were reported to Timberplay by Chris Leigh (Chairman CMMC) and cleared by them. The splits that appear in the play equipment wood is a seasonal occurrence that will open and close with weather conditions.

The car park surface is becoming a problem. Following a quote for resurfacing the area, the cost of which was out of the question, it was suggested that in the Spring a pebble surface should be laid down. Two new items of play equipment are being considered, for which grant funding is being sought Action: Clerk to apply for grant funding. Chase up the Playground Ahead sign and to thank the Dedham Vale & Stour Valley Project Team for their work in clearing out the pond, which was done free of charge.

#### **PLANNING:**

**Keys Barns, Church Road** - change of use of an agricultural building to a 2-bed dwelling. This application was granted to encourage the small business. A domestic property is allowed where it is subordinate to the business.

**Carters, Bulmer Tye** - an amendment to the gable wall window. The Parish Council were unanimous in their views that a fanlight would be the best solution. Bulmer Parish Council did not support this amendment to the original application.

Bulmer Brickyards, Hedingham Road, Bulmer Tye - potential site allocation for future brick clay extraction. No objections from Bulmer Parish Council. Brambley Hedge Nursery Trust - consent requested to change the Trust to a private limited company. No objections from Bulmer Parish Council. BUS SHELTER

It has now been agreed with ECC for a bus shelter to be sited in Church Road between the A131 and Park Lane. However, ECC want to retain a shelter on the A131 and plan to erect a reconditioned shelter in place of the one that is damaged. **Action:** Clerk to make known to ECC Highways that the Parish Council is not happy with this arrangement and feels that it cannot take responsibility if a person should be injured due to a vehicle crashing into the shelter. The Parish Council has a duty to minimise risk where possible.

#### **GREEN WASTE**

The green waste collection on **Saturday** mornings at Park Lane and Vicars Orchard has finished now that every household has its own green waste wheelie bin. The collection could be retained at a cost, but the Parish Council felt the cost was too high for the relatively small number of residents using the **Saturday** collection.

**Action:** A notice is to be put in Newsletter **CORRESPONDENCE & NOTICES:** 

1. The BT kiosk in The Street has again been targeted for removal. The Parish Council continues to write to BDC insisting that it is essential the public phone remains in situ. for emergency purposes which may occur on the recreation ground, especially as there is poor mobile reception from some providers in that part of The Street. It may be that BT will not agree to two kiosks in the village and insist that one must qo.

**NB.** Neither card nor cash is required to call 999 from a kiosk.

2. The **Speed Indicator Device** is to be mounted inside the Park Lane allotments on the A131 side. As it is not allowable to have a SID on a 'no speed limit' road, the head will be

covered. Nevertheless, the CD will still be recording the speed of vehicles and this information can be passed to Traffic Control

- **3.** A resident has asked if a **bus shelter** could be sited in **The Street**. There is only one suitable site. **Action:** the Clerk to write to the resident on whose land the shelter could be placed.
- **4.** A request has been put to Public Transport in Braintree District for consideration to be given to diverting bus service 11/12/13 to serve residents at **Finch Hill**. If a favourable assessment is made, consideration will be given to the request and we will be informed.
- **5.** Notices have been put on village noticeboards publicising meetings over the proposed **pylons route**, which comes very near to Bulmer.
- **6.** Braintree DC is reviewing its services with a requirement to identify savings and the **Parish Support Grant** (PSG) is one element being reviewed. The Parish Council wrote to BDC pointing out that the PSG was essential to outlying parishes as it compensated for providing concurrent functions for their communities, which the District Council would otherwise have to provide. The Parish Council urged Braintree to consider the effect the loss of the PSG would have on residents and village life throughout the District.
- 7. Vehicles being parked on the road and footpath near the bend in Church Road is a worrying problem. The Yeldham Police are being lobbied by several residents in the village, also County Councillor David Finch, the Parish Council and Neighbourhood Action Team. It appears that traffic police view the parking as a non issue since there have been no recorded accidents and Sgnt. Montgomery suggested yellow lines be painted. C Cllr. Finch replied that this would then make it a council enforcement issue and not a police issue. Not acceptable. Action: C Cllr. Finch has suggested that he and the Parish Council write again.

As the winter approaches another season of parish path walks has been completed and approximately another fifteen miles of countryside has been enjoyed by the parish path walkers. So as the autumn arrived so did the much needed rain but on all three occasions we escaped a drenching, all be it narrowly sometimes.

The first of our walks this season way back in September saw us still holding on to the warm sunny days as we walked paths we seldom use. We met at Bulmer village hall and walked the path behind the houses on The Street before reaching the paths around Goldingham Hall. Leaving Goldingham Hall territory we then crossed the road to take some slightly different paths across the fields of Hill Farm, Gestingthorpe before reaching Upper Houses and returning to the village hall by Brakey Hill.

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For October's walk we ventured to Bures and walked on to Wormingford. We set off prepared for more rain after the mornings wet weather and further looming clouds

but were delighted after only а few minutes into the walk sudden change to warm and bright conditions allowing us to shed our coats



hats. We had a lovely walk across some beautiful countryside passing through fields and some small

woodland areas of where wild mushrooms grew abundantly but nobody being quite sure of the edible varieties. As well as fields and woodlands we passed through the grounds of Bures Mill at the beginning of our walk, where we came across some unsuspecting looking free range turkeys, and Smallbridge Hall in



Wormingford nearing the end of our walk. Both beautiful properties with magnificent views of which we enjoyed on our walk along with frequently positioned kissing gates where no opportunities were missed. On our return to Bures the light quickly began to fade as the mist began to rise and darkness eventually fell.

At the end of November we booted it back to Ballingdon. It was a cold crisp morning and a reminder that winter was fast approaching as we gathered at the village hall before heading off for Sandy Lane. At the bottom of Sandy Lane we walked along Bulmer Road and over to Middleton Road where we made our way through to the back of the housing estate to reach the field paths joining the Ryes Lane byway. Along the byway we looked back across to admire the ever-beautiful Stour Valley as

well as stopping to remove the remains of a fallen tree from across the path. Reaching Ryes Lane we headed for Plough Green where we took the path up to the school and the path around the back of the houses on Church Road to walk along the field down to the village hall.

Our thanks as always go to Margaret for giving her time and expertise so freely to lead these lovely little walks. Oh, and of course, the wine gums.

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#### 10 years on

How this first decade of the millennium has sped by, each year clocking up it's own little highlights. Below is a selection of what I have noted down over those "nature my I started keeping this in 2001. This was the year that work was started on Little Dean Spinney. A survey at the time revealed that there were 57 species of wild plants and 11 species of native trees already growing on the site.

May 2002 - A cock Ring Ouzel "the mountain blackbird", paused in its migration to perch on a little ash tree just down the field. It would have been heading for the uplands of northern Britain. It is identical to our blackbird, except for a splendid white crescent across its chest.

Mar 2003 - A female Stonechat, sitting on the name board of Little Dean Spinney.

Feb 2004 - Over at Lavenham, 9 hares, having a right old "free for all" Sparring and boxing, going off on mad chases all over the field, only to return into a sprawling rugby scrum again! We must have been entertained by their antics for the best part of 15 minutes.

Jul 2005 - Our Conservation site, Little Dean Spinney, was selected as being an ideal release site for lizards and slow - worms, that had been rescued So far 11 lizards and 4 from construction sites. slow-worms have been released onto the site. Three log piles were built to provide basking spots for the lizards and small sheets of tin, laid flat, make good places for the slow-worms to hide. We already have grass snakes living there.

Mar 2006 - My first sighting of a Little Egret in the village. These striking birds are very speedily colonising the south and east of England, ten years they were



At first restricted to the coast, they gradually found their way up the river valleys and are now venturing into the smaller tributaries like Belchamp Brook, where I came across this one. As soon as the Egret disappeared, a largish bird glided into view, a Barn Owl, the first I had personally seen in the village for the better part of 25 years. A very memorable few minutes.

May 2007 - I was awakened quite early, by some loud "cuckoos" obviously very close at hand. Clearly, the cuckoo was just behind our boundary trees, in our neighbour Maudie's garden. Unfortunately I turned my attention to a carrion crow, which was mobbing a buzzard, quite close at hand. By this time the cuckoo, which was still calling merrily away, had perched on our garden weather vane, in full view. Needless to say, it took off down the field before I



could even focus the camera on it. If it hadn't have been for that damned buzzard!.....

Mar 2008 - Walking the footpath past the Village Hall towards Upper Houses in mid January, a sizeable flock of small birds arose from the game strip across the field to

the left. I estimated that the flock was between 150 and 200 strong. This was an unusually large flock of linnets, members of the finch family. Although they are British birds, the likelihood is that this flock were winter migrants.

#### And now for two entries from the last couple of months.

Sun. 8th Nov. 2009 - Very surprised to see that a pack of hounds were meeting over on the other side of the Belchamp Valley, presumably drag hunting. The hounds and mounted followers

disappeared in the direction of the Rookery Farm. In that area they must have startled a herd of Fallow Deer, because only a few minutes later, this herd came streaming across the fields from Heaven wood, on Smeetham Hall land. Heading at first for Bulmer Street, but then pouring through a gap in the hedge to emerge in the next field, to disappear from our view as they crossed the Goldingham Hall drive. They made a fine sight, never pausing in their headlong rush.

There were about 20 of them, all without antlers, except for one stag, which brought up the rear, who was sporting a fine set of headgear.

18th Dec. 2009 - Snow everywhere, garden full of Chaffinches, Goldfinches, Blackbirds, Fieldfares, Starlings, Robins, Dunnocks all looking for an easy meal from the bird feeders or the remaining berries and apples on the trees and a Green Woodpecker digging away to get at the lawn under the snow.

I (Simon Harris - Parish Tree Warden) on behalf of Bulmer Parish Council have put forward a plan for an extensive planting of hedges and trees along the A131 and adjoining roads in Bulmer and Twinstead. 

### PROVISION OF TOILETS, KITCHEN AND MEETING ROOM

We have now received approval from the Church of England for the extension to the Church to provide toilets, kitchen and meeting room. We are in the process of applying for Planning Permission from Braintree District Council. The application should be



submitted early in 2010. It is not anticipated that there should be too many problems as English Heritage have already agreed with the proposals in the Church of England's permission.

The design has altered since the Public Consultation exhibition in the Church to take in some of the comments made. It now extends out from the Church 6.5m as opposed to 10m in the previous design. The walls will be of vertical green oak planking on a red brick plinth. The window frames will be oak and the roof tiles the same as the existing ones. English Heritage specified the oak planking.

There is still a long way to go as we do not have the money to fund the building work and although we will be applying for grants from various bodies to help in this, we will have to provide some of the money ourselves.
