#### **BILL NIEL**

An inhabitant of Bulmer Street for over 50 years died recently aged 85. Until about a year ago, Bill lived at "Inglefield", the old bungalow opposite St. Andrews Rise, the site of which is currently being redeveloped.



He was born in Stoke Newington and was one of a family of eight. During the war, the family moved down to Tiptree, where they were involved in strawberry growing.

Bill always grew good strawberries in his Bulmer garden and although he used to complain about the birds spoiling them, he would never net them in, as he said it was only right for them to have their fair share! That was typical of Bill. Going back, Bill started working life as a lorry drivers mate, before starting his National Service in the Army where he saw active service in Malaya. Back in "civvy street" he worked as a lorry driver for a while, before becoming an excavator operator for the Essex River Authority.

He moved into Inglefield in the early 1960s with his parents, Earnest and Ruby and after they died, lived there alone until he moved into St Joseph's Care Home about a year ago. The comforts he enjoyed in St. Joseph's were a big contrast to those of his old, unheated home, and he always enthused about the food and especially the glass of sherry before lunch! Because of serious knee trouble, Bill was forced to retire at 55. One of the interests he took up was painting going along regularly to the Sudbury Art Club, which he greatly enjoyed, often other members would come up to his garden to paint.

Although a very quiet man Bill enjoyed chatting with neighbours and anyone passing his garden, either on the footpath behind The Street or along the road. We know that he has been missed by all since his move to Sudbury and his recent passing.

An evening that got everyone in to the spirit of Christmas including the compère entertaining us with iokes from Christmas crackers!

#### **BULMER NATURE DIARIES**

What an incredibly mild, if somewhat unsettled autumn we have had. To underline the point, on 31st October, having our grandson plus parents staying the weekend, we spent the latter end of the morning playing cricket on Walton-On-The-Naze beach, in beautiful warm sunshine! Shortly after noon however, we had to make a strategic retreat in front of the swiftly rising tide! This gave granddad a chance to set up the telescope and to show Timothy some of the birdlife at the Naze end of the coast. Small flocks of Brent geese were making their way N to S along the coast. These are winter visitors to these shores, largely black birds, with a white collar and rump. These can often be seen grazing on costal grasslands and sometimes on nearby wheat fields. A graceful grey plover caught our eye, still in it's full breeding plumage. Very striking, with a coal black face and breast contrasting strongly with it's silvery white mantle. This finery soon disappears as it moults into it's far more sober winter plumage. Like the Brent geese, they nest up in northern Russia and fly thousands of miles to come and spend the winter in our milder climate.

Although you have to go to the coast to see grey plovers, there are two other members of the plover family which sometimes drop in to feed on our local fields, the golden plover and the lapwing. Neither of them turn up that often, but the ones you are most likely to see are Lapwings (also known as the green plover, or pewit, take your pick!) Although at a distance the lapwing appears to be black and white, a closer view will reveals the black to be a beautiful metallic green, with highlights of burnished bronze. It carries a fine crest on it's head, which on a windy day, can make it look as if it's having a bad hair day!,



as shown on Wendy's watercolour.

The golden plover is a gold and black version of the grey plover when it's in breeding plumage, but mostly just a quiet sandy colour in winter, when they occasionally visit our fields.

We were swept by blustery gales on 17th November, the tail end of hurricane Barney. Returning home about 10 at night we had to stop a few times to move the odd wheelie bin and small branch out of the road, also a young woodpigeon which sat unharmed but dazzled, in the middle of the road. The first and so far only frost of the winter was on 21st of October, when we awoke to minus 3 degrees and all the tender plants in the garden were reduced to a soggy mess.

Maybe the prolonged mild spell both here and on the continent, was the cause of our winter migrant birds

arriving later than usual. The first redwing turned up on the 21st. Oct., which is about an average date for them, but I have only seen one other since. A small flock of fieldfares appeared on 6th. Nov., but it wasn't till the end of the month that saw a good flock of getting on for 100 of them near Finch Hill Similarly Hugh Owen, has remarked how these autumn migrants have been thin on the ground so far. In his garden great spotted woodpeckers appear daily as do plenty of tits and a song thrush has been singing. The December temperatures so far have been way above average and this probably explains why some birds are starting to sing. Remarkably we heard a robin singing at 10 pm by street light over at Hadleigh recently. Also of course many wildflowers are still blooming.

A couple of birds that we don't often see in the garden have turned up recently, lesser redpolls, feeding on the seeds of our birch tree and a meadow pipit, which perched briefly on one of the top

branches. Birch seeds are dispersed by the wind. Although quite tiny themselves, they have a little wing on each side. We had a lot of them stuck all over our window, looking just like little insects, complete with two feelers. They fooled us for



a start and it was a while before I cottoned on to what they were. These little aerial capsules can travel a long way on a strong wind, which is why birch is one of the first trees to colonise waste ground, especially on the sandier soils.

It's been another great year for autumn nuts, berries and fruit. Most hedgerows have been heavy with hips & haws and also spindleberries. These in particular have put on a great show. Each spindle berry is divided into four sugar pink, spherical lobes. The pink



casing eventually splits open, to reveal a startlingly orange fruit, inside if which is the seed. One of nature's more unsettling colour combinations! To fully appreciate this, view this picture of the spindleberry in colour view on the Bulmer website essexinfo.net/bulmer/whatson. The berries are poisonous to man, but apparently highly nutritious and are eaten by some birds and, although I have never seen it myself.

Although mild, we certainly had our share of dark, damp days around the middle of December. One such was Sunday 13th, but despite the overall gloom, the garden was absolutely pulsating with birdlife. Goldfinches galore --- 5 on the feeders and another 9 on the ground, clearing up all the dropped seed which showered down from above, goldfinches are very messy eaters. Apart from these there were chaffinches, great tits, collared doves, greenfinches, a dunnock, wren, robin and house sparrows. Five blackbirds were feeding on the remaining apples on our Darcy Spice tree and were joined by a lone fieldfare. About half a dozen blue tits were on the roof carefully going through the clumps of moss growing on the tiles. At first I thought they were searching for insects, but watching closely I could see



that what they were taking were the spore capsules of the moss, no bigger than pinheads. The same afternoon we took the Wildlife Watchgroup for a walk around the Sudbury Water Meadows. Plenty of gulls and mallards for the children to see, but nothing to create much excitement until later on, a kingfisher shot into view to perch about 10ft above the river, on an ancient hawthorn. From this vantage point it made a couple of sorties, diving in without success, but on the third attempt returned with a shiny wriggling fish of considerable size, more than half the length of the bird. All five children had a good view of all this going on, before the bird sped off downstream to enjoy it's prize away from our prying eyes. A satisfying end to a murky afternoon.

Well, that's it for 2015, *Happy New Year* to everyone!

#### 15/20 Welcome and Apologies for Absence

The Chairman welcomed all those present. One minute silence was observed for the people who lost their lives during the terrorist attack in Paris. Apologies received and accepted from CCllr. Finch.

#### 15/22 Declarations of interest

None received.

#### 15/23 Public Participation session

A member of the public raised an issue with post going to the wrong address (Cllr Scattergood offered to investigate) and trucks blocking his driveway, requested the Parish Council to consider some parking restrictions near his property.

Chairman replied we would investigate further.

A member of the public raised the following issues:

- Adoption of Transparency code. Chairman replied that due to S106 money, the Parish Council was not in a position to adopt this at the present time. But would comply in the spirit of the code.
- Call for sites (Planning Development) Chairman replied that this is still at a very early stage, and the consultation period is still at the first stage.
- Allotment rentals Chairman replied that this item would be discussed further under item 15/31 Item 2 on the agenda.
- Speed limits on A131 Chairman replied that this was not possible, as the new SID has no cover, and it is not permitted on sites with speed limits higher than 40mph.

An allotment holder expressed concern regarding dog fouling in the area, photos of which were provided, suggested fencing is required. Chairman replied that this would be discussed and thanks expressed for the photos.

### 15/24 District Councillor Wendy Scattergood addressed the members and public

DCIIr.Scattergood expressed concern of filming and recording at Parish Council meetings. DCIIr Scattergood asked the member of public if this was being shown live on social media or if the intent was to put it on at a later date. The member of the public confirmed that it was not on social media and does not intend to put it on.

Call for sites is still at the consultation stage, Bulmer should have received a letter and Cllr Scattergood will investigate why not received. Everyone was urged to respond, and make comments, anyone can take part at planning committee and local plan meetings.

## 15/25 Approval of the minutes of the meeting held on 21<sup>st</sup> September 2015

Approval of the minutes was proposed by Cllr. C.Ponty seconded by Cllr. S.Buchanan, six in favour, one abstained (Not present 21st Sept.), resolution passed.

## 15/26 RCCE Affordable Housing Enabler (Mr E.Rigby)

Mr Rigby explained the process and left information. A survey better carried out after Christmas would be required to see if there is a need. The process would take just over a month, and cost around £200.00. The land would be just outside of the village envelope, once built would remain the possession of the housing association.

Mr Allocca confirmed that until the survey was carried out and results reviewed, no action would be taken.

#### Mobile Infrastructure Project (MIP) – Braintree District Council

As you are aware, the Mobile Infrastructure Project (MIP) is due to end on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2016.

Despite extensive investigation of potential locations in Braintree originally identified as potential recipients of MIP masts, we regret that it has not proved possible to progress any MIP sites in Braintree within the project timeframe.

In order to progress, a potential mast site needed both planning permission and completion of a lease agreement with a landowner in addition to a viable power supply, vehicular access to the site, and a confirmed connection back to the Mobile Network Operators' networks. All of these elements needed to be in place allowing enough time for site construction and implementation of the masts. Unfortunately this was not achievable in Braintree within the available time frame.

We recognise that this is disappointing, and would like to thank you and your officers and members for your support for the programme.

In cases where we have been carrying forward negotiations and discussions with landowners and local communities we are writing to them to advise them of the position.

I would be grateful if you would share this letter with all your officers and members who have had an interest or involvement in the MIP.
