# **Parish Playing Field Update**



Our community requested that there should be some improvements made to the playing field to encourage more parishioners, especially the younger residents, to use the playing field as a sporting facility.

To date we have built and completed the new entrance and car park area which is used by visitors to both the playing field and the Orchard.

A height restriction has been installed to protect the parking area and new entrance gates and fencing have been installed around the perimeter of the car park which will comfortably take 4 to 6 cars.

The croquet lawn area has been marked out by the installation of oak posts to protect the area and to allow the grass to be regularly cut which will hopefully improve in this area.

The new goal post position has been agreed with those that will use it most and the post is on order with delivery expected in August, ready for our team of volunteers to install it.

A small "Playing field" working group has been established and a meeting held to discuss and obtain a quotation for a "MUGA" court which if agreed will be installed in the corner of the field as shown on the sketch drawing.


This will include Basketball, Cricket Stumps and a Small Goal all to be incorporated into the one green structure with a hard playing surface to suit which is approximately 8 metres square.

Finally, the Gazebo structure is currently being constructed with the main Oak frame and timber shingle roof already in position. We are awaiting the installation of the paving and then the side boarding and bench seats will be installed to complete the Gazebo.

When all these works are completed the field will then be a true "playing field" with seating etc for the use of the Parish. (Photo above: Playing field community group deciding location of goal post)

The Chignal Parish Plan, Objective 20, supports opportunities for residents to improve their homes in line with the Chignal Villages Design Statement. It is considered that this development would not affect adjoining residents unduly and nor would it impact on its rural

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setting. However, the sewage treatment plant is located at the front of the house, and from the detailed drawings, there appears to be an outlet, but no information provided on where effluent will be discharged.

Resolution Recommended for approval subject to appropriate measures being taken to ensure the proper discharge of sewage from the outlet at the front of the house.

4. **Ref**: 20/00825/FUL **Address**: Barn South Hillcroft, Chignal Road, Chignal Smealy, Chelmsford. **Description of works**: Removal of identified buildings on site and re-use and conversion of existing buildings on site to a residential dwelling.

Status of the site and buildings the 'barn' which is proposed for conversion to a residential dwelling appears to be a dilapidated shed on a former smallholding rather than an agricultural barn. We consider that there is insufficient evidence that the building was used as part of an agricultural trade or business. The applicant mentions the presence of a farm shop on the site of the neighbouring property "Hillcroft" in the past. Several long- standing Chignal Smealey residents have reported that they visited the shop sited in the garden of "Hillcroft" which sold eggs, imported fruit such as oranges, bananas and grapes, potatoes, vegetables, and children's sweets. Of these goods, it appears that only the eggs were produced on the site; all the other products sold in the shop were bought in. On this evidence, it is disputed that the building that is the subject of this application formed part of an agricultural holding and thus cannot be regarded as an "agricultural building". Neither is it considered to be of sufficient historical or architectural merit to justify its conversion and conservation as a residential dwelling. The Structural Engineer's report on this building seems to indicate that it needs demolition and rebuilding to comply with current building regulations for insulation, ventilation, and daylight openings. It comments that the roof, external boarding, the timber stud walls, and the unreinforced concrete floor slab need substantial repair or replacement so there would not be a lot left of the original structure. There are also no services to the plot so Electricity. Water and drainage would have to be installed. The photographs show rotten timbers, cracked concrete floor slab and years of decay in the structure. Access the Parish Council also has concerns regarding access to this site as it has limited sightlines on a blind bend, on to the Chignal Road. Several aspects of the Design and Access Statement are not accurate. The Existing Location Plan on page 8 shows the road access as "Manor Road". There is no Manor Road in Chignal: this should be Chignal Road. The site is not well served by public transport: The Lodges bus which is the only one that serves Chignal Smealey runs to Chelmsford town centre once a day on a Friday and Saturday. To access the bus stops for regular services to Chelmsford would be difficult: there is no pedestrian path on Woodhall Hill/Chignal Road and no direct public right of way across the fields to access the bus stops, shops, school and other community services on Copperfield Road. Furthermore, it is also suggested that cycling to Chelmsford would be possible using local footpaths. Under current legislation this would not be permitted. Future use of the site In the Chignal Villages Design Statement, (page 18) reference is made to "the trees and hedges in and around the good sized housing plots in the Woodhall area of Chignal Smealey helping to maintain the rural feel and the gaps between the properties emphasise the rural location by showing that there are no buildings behind". We would prefer this site to remain open and used as a small holding or as allotments. The need for any additional housing in this part of Chignal is being met more than adequately by the extensive new residential development in the parish north of Copperfield Road and by the recent permission granted nearby for the conversion of a complex of largely 19th century agricultural barns to 8 residential units, to the west of Beaumont Otes.

### Resolution It is recommended that this planning application is refused.

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# **Gardening Club**





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We hope that some of you have visited the orchard as part of your daily exercise during the COVID-19 lock-down and enjoyed strolling amongst the fruit trees and the wildflowers.

Despite life changing in March, our committee members have continued to make sure that the orchard is well looked after: grass paths have been mown; trees pruned, fed and mulched and fruit thinned. We have just scythed the entire site and were delighted to be joined by some energetic volunteers who made short work of raking up the hay.

The George Cave and Braintree Seedling dessert apples and some of the pears have fruited well this year and we have had some plums for the first time. Sadly, due to recent changes to the COVID-19 regulations, we have had to cancel our planned **Autumn Fruit Celebration** on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> October. Instead, we shall put out apples and quinces on the orchard picnic table for you to collect from the middle of October. Fruit will also be displayed at a **Harvest Thanksgiving** service, at St Nicholas Church, outside in the churchyard, on **Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> October** at 11.00 led by Rev. Janet Nicholls, Rural Adviser & Agricultural Chaplain.





The wildflowers around the trees and in the semi-circular meadow have been spectacular this year. Early on we were treated to a sea of white Oxeye Daisies and yellow Cowslips, followed by Yellow Rattle and Vetches and now Ladies Bedstraw, Hedge Bedstraw, Scabious, Geranium, Betony and purple flowered Knapweed.

These attract clouds of butterflies, moths and other pollinating insects. The Bug Hotel is well used by a variety of insects, including Leaf-cutter Bees and our wildlife cameras have revealed that badgers and foxes also visit the orchard.

The most exciting discovery made by Moira and Simon this year was a Pyramidal Orchid in the long grass!

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# **Essex County Council**

# Article from Cllr. David Finch, Leader of Essex County Council, for EALC/Parish newsletters, Sep 2020:

The future shape of local councils in Essex is being discussed, writes Cllr David Finch, the Leader of Essex County Council, with the opportunity to simplify the current system coming soon.

This month (September), The Government is expected to bring forward a white paper, which will begin the process of reforming local councils in 'two-tier' County Council areas.

From our discussions with the Government, it is clear that it sees the current two-tier system of county and district councils, or county and city or borough councils as imperfect, and that unitary authorities, which are responsible for all council services in a defined area, are seen as a better option for delivering services. In Essex, for example, this might lead to between two and four new unitary councils.

In a recent speech, the Minister for Local Government, Simon Clarke MP, also pointed to the importance of the future role of town and parish councils, as the Government looks at the potential to devolve more decision making to local level.

In Essex work has begun on what the new 'map' of Essex Councils might look like, with initial discussions having taken place over the summer. Across Essex, we have one of the most complex local government structures in the UK – one county council, 12 district/borough/city councils and two unitary councils in Southend and Thurrock.

There is a real commitment and ambition to consider how much more can be achieved with a simplified system.

Alongside this, and providing new unitary councils are agreed, the Government will also allow us to submit proposals for a 'Combined Authority', led by a directly elected Mayor. A combined authority would be represented by the leaders of the new unitary councils, and would be able to secure funding for investment in our economy and infrastructure. The ambition in Essex is to have proposals ready to submit following the publication of the White Paper.

I would stress that alongside this work, we will keep a focus on working with our partners and delivering for our residents and businesses throughout this period.

We have a made a positive start on this work. Keeping residents and businesses at the heart of our thinking, and ensuring we get the best possible deal and structures to support them in the future, is what will guide our thinking.





# Why Does St. Nicholas Need You?

Our Annual Parochial Council Meeting (APCM) is planned for Monday 5<sup>th</sup> October 2020 at 7pm, in the village hall. Subject to covid restriction this may or may not go ahead, but if it does, we hope that you will come along, especially if you can offer some help to support St Nicholas' Church.

Currently, we have four members of the PCC: Nigel Bevitt-Smith; who is treasurer, Linda Nelson; secretary, Tony Towns; acting chairman and Cherry Scott. Nigel is intending to stand down from the PCC but is prepared to continue as treasurer. Tony and his wife Helen do much of the preparation



for services and host the visiting clergy, Cherry is a great source of local knowledge and provides advice and guidance.

We have a group of ladies that regularly help clean the church and arrange flowers, volunteers also help with the churchyard clearances.

The legal administration, bookings of weddings, baptism, funerals and visiting clergy is done by the benefice administrator, Alison Bates, which is a great help, as we are now without an incumbent vicar.

All services need to be organised, this work is mainly done by Tony and Helen, who helped keep St. Nicholas running, when there was no vicar, for over 11 years until, Revd Caroline Brown, became the new incumbent, but they cannot carry on doing this forever, they would like to be able to take more of a back seat!

Revd Caroline has now moved to another parish and the PCC are in the process of working with the other parishes to select a new incumbent. Although due to Covid 19 this is unlikely to happen any time soon and the lack of a church warden is also a restrictive issue, but it is important, that St Nicholas' voice is heard when this process resumes and for this we need some "new blood" to come forward and take up the mantle of helping St Nicholas keep going for the benefit of us all.

I am, by a good few years, the youngest of the PCC members and some of the other members would love to be able to hand over to a "safe pair of hands". Ideally, we are looking for a church warden, but we would be extremely grateful, if you would be prepared to become a member of the PCC and help spread the responsibility of running St Nicholas.

We know that the residents off the Chignals and Mashbury hold a great affection for St. Nicholas church. We have a healthy (for the size of the village) regular congregation at our monthly services and at special services the church is often full.

Our village assets, such as: the church, the chapel, the cricket ground, the "pub", the village hall, the green, and the orchard are precious assets that need to be supported or we risk losing them, as has already happened with the Three Elms. # **Rhubarb Cake Recipe**

## Rhubarb Cake Ingredients: Pinch of salt 225g / 8oz self-raising flour 150g / 5oz organic raw cane sugar (or use caster sugar) 250g / 9oz fresh rhubarb, finely diced 75g / 3oz sultanas 2 large eggs, beaten Preheat the oven to 180°C / 350°F / Gas 4. Grease and line a 18cm / 7in. tin. Sift the flour and salt into a bowl; rub in the butter until it resembles breadcrumbs. Stir in the sugar, rhubarb and sultanas. Finally beat in the eggs. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin. Bake for 11/4 - 11/2 hours or until well risen and golden brown. (the cake is done when a skewer inserted into the middle of the cake comes out clean). Leave to cool in the tin for 10 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely. Serves 8-10. Note: Because of the fresh rhubarb, this cake does not have a long shelf life and, ideally, should be eaten within about 3 days. Alternatively it can be frozen.

Meeting closed 21.45 Will Adshead-Grant Clerk to the Council As you may be aware, the Parish Council has carried out a number of recent improvements to the Playing Field, including a car park, gazebo, new goal post and demarcation of the croquet courts. At our council meeting on 14<sup>th</sup> September, we agreed to set up a Recreation Committee to take responsibility for the management of the Playing Field, including the regular inspections of equipment and provision of additional sports facilities.

To carry out this important work, the Recreation Committee needs the support of residents, as existing and potential users of the Playing Field, to join our very small band of parish councillors.

One of the first tasks of this new Committee is to advise the council on whether to invest in the installation of a Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) which would provide facilities such as a basketball hoop, small goal, cricket wicket and a surface to practice tennis shots. It is expected that the MUGA would cost around £12,000 to install and there would be additional on-going costs to ensure that this equipment is inspected weekly by a specially trained person and the surfaces are maintained periodically. The annual inspection and maintenance costs could be up to £1,000, (currently, training for an equipment inspector costs £500 every 3 years) which equates to about 25% of our total annual precept.

The initial purchase and installation cost of the MUGA could be funded from a combination of the Parish Council's Community Infrastructure Levy monies, (from developer contributions to the new Persimmon Homes development) and grants from sports funders. The on-going costs would need to be met from an increase in the parish precept collected annually through the Council Tax from each householder in Chignal.

Some lovely fruit is now ready for collection from the table in the orchard. Take a look at the attached photo to see how inviting it looks. Please take your own bags to collect it.

On the tray at the front is some Pearl apples. Described as handsome, lightly aromatic, Sweet and crisp, can be chewy, it is

a cross between Worcester Pearmain and Rival. Introduced in 1938. One of a series named after semi-precious stones. Ours are quite small and can be eaten in the next few weeks.

In the basket are a lovely crop of Braintree Seedling which have very little insect damage this year. Intense sweet rich aromatic flavour with a hint of pineapple. Quite firm, cream flesh. If you can manage it, try storing some in a plastic bag with a couple of holes punched in and keep in the fridge as these are best eaten in December or January.

At the back are two trays of quinces. Leave them in a warm room for a couple of weeks to ripen before you use them. You should become aware of a wonderful scent when they are ready. Attached are some recipes including a new one we haven't shared before all the way from Herzegovina for you to try.

# **Quince Jam Recipe**

Peel, core and slice the quinces and then weigh them - you will need 2lb of prepared fruit. Put them in a pan with  $1\frac{1}{2}$  pints of water and simmer very gently until the fruit is really soft and mashed. Add 3lb sugar, stir until it is dissolved and boil the mixture rapidly until setting point is reached. Pot and cover the jam in the usual way.

Note - if the quinces are really ripe, add the juice of 1 lemon with the sugar. This should make about 5lb of jam.

# Spiced Quince Recipe

Peel and core the quinces and cut each into about eight pieces (you can cut them smaller later if you wish but leaving them large at this stage should dissuade them from breaking up). Cover them with cold water and add a small scoop of coarse salt. Bring to the boil quickly and allow to boil for a minute. Strain and gently set aside the fruit. To each 600ml/1 pint of this juice add 1lb/450g of white sugar, 150ml/½ pint of white wine vinegar and a teaspoon of whole coriander seeds. Bring to the boil, return the fruit to the pan and simmer until the slices are tender. Leave to cool overnight.

Next day, drain off the syrup and pack the quince slices into preserving jars. Bring the syrup back to the boil and pour it over the quinces. Screw or clip down the covers while still warm. Spiced quinces keep a long time.

Excellent with ham or gammon, either cold or hot, and with other cold meats including turkey.

# **Quince Jelly Recipe**

Please note that Quinces have very low natural pectin so for successful jelly you will need to add some pectin or use pectin sugar.

Wash and roughly chop the quinces (skin and cores as well) and put them in a saucepan. Just cover with water and add 6 allspice berries, bruised. Bring the fruit to the boil and simmer until the fruit is pulpy; probably 40 to 50 mins. Pour the pulp into a jelly bag and allow to drain through for at least 12 hours. Discard the pulp.

Measure the juice and return it to a clean pan and add 1lb (450g) of sugar to every pint of liquid. Bring the mixture to the boil and boil briskly, without stirring, until setting point is reached. Skim the foam off with a metal spoon and ladle the jelly into hot jars.

A 3lb bag of fruit should make approx  $2\frac{1}{2}$  lb of jelly.

Excellent with cold meats, particularly pork and game pies.

# **Membrello (or Quince Cheese) Recipe**

Peel, core and grate 1 Kg of quinces. Place 1 Kg of preserving sugar and 700ml water in a saucepan set over a gentle heat. Add the grated quince and bring to a boil, then turn down to a simmer and cook, uncovered, for 2 hours, stirring occasionally until the liquid has thickened and comes away from the sides of the pan when stirred.

Remove from the heat, allow to cool slightly, then pour into a tin or mould lined with clingfilm.

Refrigerate for at least 2 hours before unwrapping and serving.

Membrello will keep for a few months.

This Spanish version of Quince Cheese is a set jelly. It can be served on its own, in an apple tart or pie or with some cheese.

# **Tamara's Quince Recipe**

Wash the quinces and peel and core. Cut the flesh into little pieces. In a large saucepan heat 200ml water and 1kg sugar and heat to dissolve the sugar. Simmer until you have a good light caramel coloured syrup. Add 1kg Quince pieces and cook until soft and sweet.

Ladle it into jars and decorate around the quince pieces with circles of lemon or orange. Seal.

Once opened these don't store for very long so keep in the fridge.

Tamara is Herzegovinian and her family sells these beautiful jars of quinces in their farm shop. Used as a topping for ice cream they are delicious, and a jar makes a really great Christmas present.


Let's hope it's not too long before we can meet once again for a village social occasion.
