Wine Discovery

June saw a very interesting blind tasting (you do not know what wine is in front of you) hosted by Sue and Graham as they raised the hackles and prepared us for a contest between England and France. Eight wines had been selected, 2 each of sparkling, white, rose and red, one of each from England and one of each from France, our task was to ascertain which wine came from which country. I hear many of you saying that should be an easy task, but English wines have improved greatly in recent years with many of the famous champagne houses planting vineyards in Kent (an advantage of global warming?). As the sparkling wine made its way around the table, heavily cloaked in brown paper, I noted a few worried faces amongst the group as they realised this might not be guite so easy as they thought. The sparkling split the group with about 50% getting the Anglo / France split correct. A similar story greeted the white and rose wines and again congratulations to the hosts who had thought to decant the Alsace from its distinctively shaped bottle into something less conspicuous. The big surprise came with the red wine, no one was expecting the English wine to be very good and as a result most people chose the better wine to be French.



How wrong we all were, the English wine was a medal winner of distinction. Once again the wine club tasting introduced many in the club to good quality wines from a source right under our noses that many of us would not have previously considered. Based on the tasting I for one will be willing to give selective English wines a try!

With the village hall out of action for July we were pleased when Gill and Dave offered their garden for an informal tasting and BBQ evening. John selected the wines based on a theme of 2 grapes (Sauvignon Blanc and Syrah/Shiraz) from 3 continents (South America, Australia and New Zealand, France). Everyone was able to mingle informally while tasting the wines that, as always, were excellent and showed the different styles of the continents and how wines made from the same grape can vary so much. REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 9th JULY 2007 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

The Police Community Officers introduced themselves and explained their role in the Community, reporting that there had been two burglaries in the Parish recently at the Pig & Whistle and Ash Rise. They then responded to parishioners questions as follows:

Charity Events – it was asked if warnings could be given to advertise that charity events were taking place through the parish but it was explained that the Police are very rarely made aware of these events.

Speeding in Chignal Smealey – the Officers confirmed that a further check will be carried out by the Traffic Division. Problems have also arisen with slow moving vehicles, some towing horseboxes, and if names can be provided, the police will speak to the drivers.

PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

A parishioner expressed concern that planning permission for a change of use had not been obtained for barns at Chignal Hall. The Borough Council has been informed and it is hoped that the necessary action will be taken.

A letter has been received from a parishioner following an accident on the bend between Brick Barns and Pieces Cottage, requesting that crops be planted further back from the road to improve visibility. It was felt that overgrown verges have also caused obstructions and the Borough Council will be notified of the problem.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF 14th MAY 2007

The minutes of the meeting were read, agreed and signed as a true record.

MATTERS ARISING

Telephone kiosk Chignal St. James – Ann Salmon has written to English Heritage enclosing photographs of the kiosk and surrounding areas requesting that 'listed building' status be granted.

A meeting has taken place with the owners of the nursery regarding the delivery lorries causing obstructions but some lorries are still turning on the Green.

The notice board near the Church has been repaired and thanks were extended to Gordon Lee for carrying out the remedial work and agreeing to improve the visibility to the notice board at the Three Elms.

PRESENTATION TO JOHN DENNISS

A gift voucher was presented to John as a mark of appreciation for all his hard work on behalf of the Parish Council.

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

The Chairman reminded the Councillors of the importance of completing the Register of Interests, which on completion will be retained by the Borough Council.

CHAIRMAN'S AND SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS

The Chairman reported his attendance on a Course, the costs for which will be shared with Roxwell Parish Council.

Gypsy and Travellers Accommodation – The Chairman attended a meeting to discuss the need for 1200 sites in East Anglia with between 52-87 in the Chelmsford Borough.

PLAYING FIELDS – it was reported that a second quotation for grass cutting has been received but the current contractor provided the most favourable price. The grass is being cut regularly and consideration will be given to cutting back the hedge at the next meeting.

VILLAGE HALL LIAISON – the extension works have commenced with completion expected in the next 6 weeks. Thanks were expressed to the Church Warden for offering the use of the Church Hall for the meeting if the Village Hall was unavailable.

NEWSLETTER incl. WEBSITE – John Denniss has agreed to continue as part of the distribution team for the Newsletter. The editor now has the necessary programme to maintain the Chignal Website.

GRAVEL LIAISON – the meeting was advised of a change of personnel in the ECC liaison team. There is now a 10 year plan for the site and Lafarge is hoping to put on an exhibition showing proposals in the Village Hall in the Autumn. The next liaison meeting will be on site at 10 a.m. on 25th September 2007.

HIGHWAYS – it was reported that some potholes have been filled but a number still need remedial work. There are problems with flooding on the road near Brettons because of a field drain emptying onto the road but the problems will be resolved by the Borough Council in the Autumn.

FOOTPATHS – a parishioner has written to thank those responsible for cutting and clearing the footpath between the Green and the Three Elms.

RURAL TRANSPORT – the next meeting will be held in November.

VDS – it was reported that the 7th edition of the draft has been completed. The designer has given a presentation on his computer and a design sub-committee formed.

CORRESPONDENCE

Councillors were advised of a training session on the new Code of Conduct.

Stevens Farm – new timber gates – application approved Chapel House – dormer window – application approved Woodside – single storey conservatory – application approved

St. James Church – detached garage – decision awaited.

Essex County Council

Many of you will have heard of the increasing problem of waste disposal in Essex and other counties. Whilst the Chelmsford Borough Council is responsible for waste collection in our area, the County Council is responsible for its ultimate disposal. In the past, most waste was simply dumped in landfill sites. Today not only is the available capacity of such sites diminishing and costs increasing, but they will in future be subject there were awards totalling £43,000 for to an escalating landfill tax, increasing from the current £24 per ton by £8 each year. By 2009/10 Essex will be paying the Treasury £17.9 million per annum for landfill alone. That equates to 3.6% of your current council tax bill! The County Council is therefore focusing on improving the recycling of our waste - currently approaching 40% - with a goal of 60%. For the remaining secondary waste we will be developing ways to extract more of the recyclable materials (glass, metals etc) and generate gas for power production from material that will rot down, using "anaerobic digestion" processes. Residual waste that cannot be re-used can either be landfilled, at increasing cost or turned into "solid recoverable fuel" (SRF) that can also be used for power generation. Essex needs to embrace these new techniques so that we can achieve a high rate of recycling. We certainly don't wish to see mass burn incineration in our county and we don't want to rely on landfill, which is not only wasteful, but environmentally damaging. However, we do need secure energy supplies and an environmentally friendly, renewable way of


generating that energy and efficiently utilising waste that cannot be recycled.

The watch words are **REDUCE, RE-USE & RECYCLE.**

I am pleased to see that in the last round of the Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) disbursements Broomfield, Writtle, Roxwell, Little Waltham, Great Waltham, Ford End and Highwood. This represents approximately a third of the £134,000 allocated by the ECC for the Chelmsford area. The CIF has facilitated pump-priming to obtain far greater sums which have been employed to provide a wide range of community projects and I am confident that, due to its success, this form of capital funding will continue over future years.
