The Chignal's Nestbox Project



The Chignal nestbox project is a Chignal parish grant funded project to provide free nest boxes to parishioners and to put up boxes in suitable locations.

We had our first building session on Sunday morning of July 1st and built 27 garden bird nest boxes. The boxes are built using good quality pine planks and should last at least 10 years. Boxes for small (blue tit, wren); medium (sparrow, robin) and large (starling) birdboxes were made and if you would like to have one or more boxes for your garden please contact us at chignalnestbox@aol.com.

The next session will be to build owl and bat boxes for the Orchard and parishioners with large gardens. Hopefully this session will take place at the village hall in late July. Wine Discovery

Tastings in April and May were led by group members, showcasing some wines encountered on recent trips to France and South Africa.

Pauline and Sue got together to present some Burgundy wines. Pauline focused on a range of white Macon from a favourite producer called Talmard. Having tasted around the region on a few occasions, this producer remains a reliable firm favourite. At the farm gate, the whites we tasted cost around the 7 euro price point. You can normally find at least one Talmard Macon in the Wine Society's selection, costing £10 or £11. Sue sourced a rosé Crémant de Bourgogne (sparkling) and a pair of red wines. The really pricey one was disappointing!

John recently took a wine tasting tour around South Africa and came back inspired to talk to the group about South African wines. He chose a selection from Majestic which showcased a range of grape varieties including the South African cornerstones of Chenin Blanc (white) and Pinotage (red). One of the favourites was a blend of Shiraz, Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon from the Stellenbosch area (Rustenberg RM Nicholson 2016, £11.99).

Our team completed the ride in about five hours – actual cycling time, but it took a lot longer, largely due to the extreme weather conditions. Before we started there were warnings about the impending bad weather and we were advised to avoid metal grids and white lines as these are very slippery when wet.

All was well at first, but then the lightning started, great forks across the sky but no rain. This all changed at the first stop (about 13 miles), we had just arrived when the rain started. It absolutely bucketed it down but luckily, we were able to shelter until we could get our wet weather gear on. Once it eased off we set off in light rain until we got to Richmond and there was another downpour which turned Richmond High Street into a raging torrent. We took shelter and carried on when it eased off. We all finished but we do look at little dishevelled! Despite the weather I don't think many women gave up, but there were at least 450 punctures repaired. I have never cycled in such weather, so I am very proud of everyone who took part and raised over £1.5 million for women's cancers.

Chignals & Mashbury Jubilee Community Orchard

Our community orchard, established in 2013, is getting noticed! We've been asked to provide information on the fruit trees that were planted and how we manage them, records of wildlife and wild plants and details of community events, to include in a major regional survey of historic and current orchards.

Orchards East is an environmental and cultural project covering six counties in the east of England, including Essex: www.orchardseast.org.uk Funded by the Heritage Lottery fund and based in the School of History at the University of East Anglia, it's about discovering and understanding the past, present and future of orchards in eastern England, and will last for three years. The project extends initiatives already developed by Suffolk Traditional Orchards Group and the East of England Apples and Orchards Project. A collaborative project working with existing county orchard groups, other interested organisations and orchard owners, Orchards East hopes to stimulate interest and engage a wide range of new volunteers in all things orchard! We've been given maps showing orchards in Chignal and Mashbury that date back to the nineteenth century and we've reported back on their current state. Most of them are no longer in use as orchards but there are some fruit trees in gardens and in hedgerows that are remnants of former orchards attached to farms, large houses or churches and rectories. Many thanks to those of you who have shared your knowledge and stories of former local orchards.

We'll be going along to the first meeting of a new Essex Orchards Group at the end of this month and look forward to exchanging ideas on how to care for our fruit trees, manage meadow areas and put on interesting and fun orchard events. Ordinary Times

Recently I have had the honour of officiating at two very different weddings. The walls of St Martin's were bursting with the rich sounds of a soul/gospel singer and throaty saxophone and the urge to dance was irresistible! The other was a farmer's daughter who arrived at St Mary's on a tractor and left on a tandem and the church was filled with the glorious scent of flowers arranged in wellies. Both weddings were a total joy! It's a sad fact of life that in the midst of joy there is also sorrow and I have also helped families arrange funerals and say their final goodbye to loved ones. Church life is split into 'seasons' and after Christmas, Lent, Easter then Pentecost we are now in the long period we call *Ordinary Time*. The liturgical colour of this season is green- signifying life and growth.

Life is a wonderful journey with peaceful, maybe even boringly mundane stretches punctuated by the peaks and troughs; mountains and valleys. It can often feel far from ordinary but more like a roller coaster. For things to be ordinary might feel like a real blessing to some of us and in fact there is a Chinese blessing which goes "may you live in ordinary times." Many of us will at times feel overwhelmed by what life can throw at us. These days especially we are under a lot of pressure in life - expected to do so much, achieve so much, and we can feel that visible 'success' is everything; that we must be seen as coping. Like the old Beatles' song *Eleanor Rigby* we can keep a jar by the door for the special smile we put on as we go out to face the world.

It is important to remember that we can get broken and to be kind to ourselves. To find the things and the people that feed us peace and renewal. One of those things for me is time spent doing mundane tasks at the stables, sweeping and mucking out with the dog by my side; taking time to pause and reflect and just notice the good things around me. My father was hard working but spent a lot of time doing nothing, just leaning on a gate and watching the world go by. That's where he found peace. Where do you find rest and peace? We aren't made to go at 100 miles an hour all the time and if we do we can soon get overwhelmed and find ourselves sucked into deep water. I know this has and does happen to me. These are the times I call on Jesus to hold me and help me; to be the hand I can grasp and find safe footing again.
