Chignals & Mashbury Jubilee Community Orchard

Have we got the balance right?

Visitors to the Fruit Celebration on 14th October had a lovely afternoon chatting with friends, enjoying home-made cakes and sharing produce, but not in the Orchard as planned as there was steady drizzle to drive us into the welcoming dry Village Hall. Pride of place on the produce tables was held by the enormous crop of Quinces from the orchard that we were able to harvest this year with all three trees obviously enjoying the summer heat.

Less happy were the Apple trees with few of them setting fruit and the developing apples becoming very soft and prone to rotting and bird and insect damage.

Joining the Essex Orchard Group (ESORG) gives us a wonderful opportunity to talk to other fruit growers about successes and failures and in this instance to discover that we are not alone in having a poor apple crop. As well as the heat the long, cold and wet spring was blamed for poor pollination.

But this swings and roundabouts effect doesn't just apply to what crop we can pick. At the very first meeting to propose a Community Orchard those who came were strongly in favour of making it as organically managed as possible. That we have done and the Orchard is quickly becoming rich and valuable in its biodiversity. Bumblebee nests are worked around. Visitors to the Orchard could admire the handiwork of our nest of **Common Carder Bees with the carefully** combed moss making a roof over their heads. The magnificent Eyed Hawk-moth caterpillars were removed to a tree better able to cope with their appetites and the diversity of wildflowers is welcomed for the Bees, Moths and Butterflies it attracts.

But what about the more damaging of our visitors? We continue to suffer from early-season aphid which feed on the new Apple shoots and distort them as they grow. Squishing them is tricky as they live in curled up foliage. We could spray them but they are eaten by nesting Blue Tits and Ladybirds and anyway most distorted shoots can be pruned off the following winter. Red Ant nests have made the ground uneven and a Mole has joined in to make a well-developed tunnel complex around the Queen Apple tree. Is a bit of a rough surface acceptable if it means that Green Woodpeckers can feed on the Ants?

We hope we are carrying out your wish for how the Community orchard should be managed. There are lots of opportunities for you to agree or suggest a change. Speak to any Orchard Committee member, write to us at the Orchard Friends email or come to the annual public meeting held just before the Chignal Parish Council Annual



Meeting each May.

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Croquet Club

Following the approval in principle at the last Parish Council meeting various options have been considered for the location of a good playing surface for croquet including sharing the cricket ground which the cricket club kindly offered. As a flat and level surface is required which needs to be protected from rabbits, and as the Parish Council does not own the cricket ground, the village playing field is considered the most suitable location to invest in such a facility. The most suitable location within the playing field is at the northern end of the playing field next to the vehicular entrance as this location would have the least impact on the playing field and particularly would not impact on the space available for the annual village fete. It is also further away than the existing croquet area from residential properties adjoining the playing field.

In addition, a small pavilion is proposed on the northern boundary of the playing field to provide shelter from rain or sun and to provide secure storage. It is proposed that the design would complement the new village hall.

It is considered that the croquet court and the pavilion as proposed would together be a positive and aesthetically pleasing addition to the playing field. The pavilion and the croquet court would be available to those using the playing field for events such as family days and could provide an additional focus at the village fete for another activity perhaps such as a simple crazy golf incorporating croquet hoops. It is also hoped that the pavilion would promote new activities.




In Memorium

Essex surface dressing programme complete for this year

This summer 250 miles of Essex roads have been covered in 3,652 tons of binder and then 38,000 tons of stone chippings, which have been rolled in to form a new top layer to prevent potholes forming. The technique, known as surface dressing can be viewed at www.essex.gov.uk/surfacing Surface dressing techniques future-proof the road surface to prevent potholes, but can only be done in warm, dry weather. Since the spring the pothole-fixing crews have patched over 1,000 potholes every month in Essex.

The County Council is currently working with the Essex Association of Local Councils to identify volunteer parish councils which could assist in working with Highways in delivering a range of highway services to their communities. Highways will also be discussing with the City Council how they can work together on improving our roads and how to take advantage of the £1.2million of match funding announced by the County Council in May this year

Task force to define future for the Army and Navy

What happens at the Army & Navy junction affects all of us who use Chelmsford's roads! As you know following the discovery of damage to the base of one of the supporting pillars of the flyover, it was closed for safety reasons in September. Engineers have been commissioned to conduct a full and detailed inspection of the structure to enable its safe reopening at the earliest opportunity.

Meanwhile a special task force, made up of key partners and agencies, including Chelmsford City Council and the Local Enterprise Partnership, local councilors and the MP for Chelmsford are working to explore the future options for the junction, local road infrastructure, planning and finance issues.

More than 3,000 school places created in Essex in time for the new term

Thousands of pupils returned to new and improved schools this September as part of the County Council's plans to meet growing demand for school places across the county. It is investing £315million in creating new school places, with £75 million having been spent on completing new schools and expansion projects in time for the start of the 2018/19 academic year. That means 2,325 additional primary places and 1,110 secondary places have been created across several sites in Essex in the last year.

Locally, the Beaulieu Park School opened its doors on 12th September welcoming its first cohort of 60 reception aged children in two classes. In September 2019, 180 Year 7 students will be admitted. Year on year the school will grow, providing 420 places for local children between four and eleven years old by 2024 and 900 places for local children between 11 and 16 years old by 2023
