## Wine Discovery

We all met in November for an evening of fortified wines. Having tried these last year we were all looking forward to this tasting. We were not disappointed when Simon from Metsendorf arrived with his wide array of bottles! He educated us in the history of fortified wines, the fermentation process and the various classifications for the wines. Simon cleverly arranged the tasting around the comparison of two varieties for each fortified wine. We started the evening with two Sherries that, like marmite, you either loved or hated. We moved onto two Madeira's, interestingly the group agreed the Old Malmsey could easily pass as a dessert wine. Madeira does not 'go off' - it is briefly heated to a high temperature when being made to recreate a past environment that was found to enrich the flavour, give the distinctive taste and longevity in the bottle (in the past heat was unintentionally given when it was transported in ships holds for several weeks – but this improved the wine and the winemaking was altered to suit this even more). We then moved onto four varieties of port - a tawny, (matured in oak and bottled just before sale) a late bottled vintage (bottled early to keep its ruby colour), a crusted port (yes kept from oxidation by a thick crust of bacteria!) and a

Quinta (one step down from a vintage). Ports are generally not associated with a specific year – it is a never ending 'top up' process that mixes the different years and creates a product whose contents may have been harvested anything between 1 and 40 years ago. This may sound strange but is one of the reasons why the port makers can consistently give us a bottle of port that will taste roughly the same from one year to the next. No ones taste is the same but everyone from the group had their own personal favourite from the evening - our drinks cabinet is now well stocked in time for Christmas but I'm sure it won't stay well stocked for long! Any wines left over at the end of the evening were carried forward to our December meeting, which was our Christmas dinner held on the 6th December at Pleshy Village Hall. As always a thoroughly enjoyable affair, everyone was in party spirits, the food was delicious and an exceptionally good time was had by all. A big thank you to all of those that helped to make the evening such a success but a special thanks must go to Chris for preparing an excellent 3 course meal. ## Farmer's Diary

People are absolutely critical to the success of any business – and this year this has been especially true in agriculture. Yesterday I was very relaxed as I walked around Chignall Hall but this was certainly not the case last summer. In my "short" experience of being a farmer I can not remember a harvest like it.

As mentioned in the August Newsletter, the only reason I can relax now is because those employed at Chignall Hall have done incredibly well to get all the crops harvested, the land cultivated and replanted before the weather broke. The team have been able to achieve this by working very long hours, for several weeks during the busy period they were averaging over 100 hours per week. We all very much appreciated the support and interest of the village during this difficult harvest.

Fortunately things are much calmer now – we are currently working a more normal week, about 40 – 45 hours, with time taken up maintaining machinery, grading the potatoes and chasing pigeons off the oil seed rape.

There is something very satisfying about looking after machinery so it works when required the following year and similarly there is great pride in ensuring the potatoes sent to The Canaries are of good quality. You do the job once and do it well and then it can be forgotten about. The thing with pigeons is that as much as one scares them away they will return again and again, day after day, taking pleasure in us watching them eating their way through the small and fragile oil seed rape plants. We are currently spending hours and hours chasing these birds around the farm. It is great to see wildlife around the farm and being in the Governments Environmental Schemes we do actively encourage it but at the same time we must remember pigeons are a pest! Depending on crop type and value I have heard it said that every pigeon costs a farmer £5 (and a rabbit £10) in lost income.

Having had a very busy year we are all now looking forward to the festive period and some real time off work with our families. I hope you are also able to relax during the festive period. Happy Christmas.

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## **Essex County Council**

Back in the summer I wrote that I would keep you posted on the County Council's discussions with Post Office Ltd. to reinstate closing post offices. I am pleased to say that new post offices have been opened at Buckhurst Hill, Henham, Little Hallingbury and several more are planned in the next few months. The success of this initiative has attracted the attention of some 150 councils nationwide. Post office closures are currently one of the issues being considered by the Rural Commission set up in October by the County Council, which expects to report back to the Council in the Spring. Other issues being considered by the Commission cover public transport, affordable housing and all those local services crucial to sustaining rural communities. If you wish to submit evidence to the Commission, in writing or in person, you should write to the Essex Rural Commission, PO Box 11, Chelmsford, Essex. A year ago the County Council promised that it would give further consideration to the proposal for a Cross Chelmer Valley road. The traffic modelling, which has subsequently taken place, does <u>not</u> demonstrate a significant benefit in providing an all purpose link between Essex

Regiment Way and Broomfield. Therefore, no further development of this proposal will take place. It is, however, intended to explore the possibilities of sustainable walking and cycling links between the communities in the north of Chelmsford. The Chelmsford Borough Council has been made aware of these findings and it is considering designating the area between Broomfield and Essex Regiment Way a "Green Wedge" when the North Chelmsford Area Action Plan is put forward for consultation.

For many people the construction of a second runway at Stansted Airport has always been a step too far. The County Council is wholly opposed to this enlargement and submitted its preliminary objections to the Secretary of State in October last year. It is to be hoped that the Government will allow all objections to be heard in a singular public inquiry and will not introduce a guillotine mechanism by running two enquiries simultaneously on the pretext of speeding up the planning process. This will make it difficult if not impossible for the non statutory objectors to finance their legitimate representations.

The **Freedom of Information Act** requires every authority to publish what information is available and how it can be obtained. We have been informed that our current Publication Scheme expires at the end of 2008 and to stay within the law, we must have a revised version available for the public by 1<sup>st</sup> January 2009.

In contrast to 2003, when we wrote the last one, the Commissioner has prepared a nationally standard version for us to adopt. We must also publish the detail of what is available and information on anything that is not available.

Comments are very welcome from any residents either immediately or at the next Parish meeting, when this will be on the agenda.

Mashbury has not responded to the Essex County Council **Tree Planting Scheme** as it has been impossible to identify anywhere within the parish which fulfils the criteria of publicly accessible space which will create a community asset. Again, please get in touch if you can suggest a site.

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# **Chignal Parish Council**

REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 11th NOVEMBER 2008 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

P.C. Alan Davey attended the meeting and explained that from 3<sup>rd</sup> November, John McDonald is the new local policeman. The next meeting of the Neighbourhood Watch group will be on 8<sup>th</sup> January 2009.

#### PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

a)Phone Box, Chignal St. James – the request for 'listed bulding' status has still not been finalised. It was explained that the Parish Council can register an interest in buying the kiosk without any commitment to going ahead with the purchase.

b)Footpaths – Dyers Hall - some remedial work has been carried out to the blocked footpath and any further concerns should be reported to Linda Nelson or Janet Campen.

c)Concern was registered by local ramblers on the proposals by E.C.C. to re-route footpaths 7 and 10 and it was explained that the Parish Council is examining the proposals.

d)Road Signs – A parishioner expressed concern at the lack of 'horse' and deer' signs in the Parish and it was agreed that, to alleviate possible accidents, a request be made to the Highways Department for signs to be erected near danger spots.

e)It was reported that a drain has been damaged at the entrance to The Green. This will be reported to the Highways Department with a request that the verge which has eroded adjacent to the drain also be reinstated.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT – It was explained that an invitation has been received for a parishioner to attend the Community Evening on 20<sup>th</sup> January 2009. The Mayor's Office will be advised of the parishioner the Parish Council wishes to nominate.

#### SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS

PLAYING FIELDS – it was reported that advice has been given on the type of preservative required for the teak benches. The materials will be purchased and the benches treated at the appropriate time.

NEWSLETTER incl. WEBSITE – there were no distribution problems reported.

GRAVEL LIAISON –the next liaison meeting is on 27<sup>th</sup> January 2009. It was reported that Lafarge has issued a pre-settlement account of the land behind St. James Church explained that the height of the current contours will need to be increased, extending the completion time until 2012. A brochure prepared by Lafarge shows the re-settlement profiles with trees and hedgerows.

HIGHWAYS – it was reported road edges in Chignal St. James are deteriorating and the Highways Department will be contacted requesting that remedial work be carried out.

Complaints have been received that delivery lorries to the Nursery are arriving between 7.15 and 7.30 p.m. which could be dangerous on the dark narrow roads. Councillor Chambers reported that a representative from the Borough Council has visited the site recently and found that the nursery is being used as a distribution centre with plants being sold at the entrance. No planning application has been received for the plastic houses but the enforcement team is in discussion with the owner.

VDS – Another draft has been submitted to the Borough Council and a response is awaited.

TREE WARDEN – the large broken branch on the bend between Langley's Corner and Chignal Smealey church reported at the last meeting has been removed.

## COUNTY AND BOROUGH COUNCILLORS REPORTS

C.Cllr Aldridge explained that although complaints have been received regarding a sign erected at Howletts Corner, the sign is not on highways land and cannot be removed until a legal opinion is given.

#### **PLANNING**

Gravel extraction and formation of a reservoir opposite the Village Hall – the Planning Officer has received addition information and it is unlikely that a decision will be made until late December/early January 2009.

Blue Cottage – extensions - the Parish Council has forwarded it observations to the Borough and a decision is awaited.

#### DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next meeting will be held in the Village Hall at 7.30 p.m. on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> January 2009.
