

Suzanne Gaywood, entertained us with accounts of how she and her band of helpers in Essex and Grenada have designed and built gardens over the last 14 years at the Chelsea Flower Show to give visitors an idea of the natural riches of this beautiful island. During this time, Suzanne's team have been awarded Gold 9 times. All of the plants used at Chelsea are flown in from Grenada and the team have just 4 days to unpack the carefully wrapped blooms and spices to dress the stand. We saw pictures of flamboyant plants such as pink Gingers, Orchids, Bananas and exotic Heliconias and were lucky enough to be given handfuls of whole nutmegs to take away at the end of the evening.

In November, we found out some of the secrets of a creating a beautiful garden by ensuring that we put the Right Plant in the Right Place. It sounds simple doesn't it but how many of us know where the plants that we have in our gardens originate or the conditions that they need to survive and thrive. Hilary Thomas, a garden designer, author and former Head of Garden Design at Capel Manor College, encouraged us to think about the type of soils, aspect and exposure in our gardens and the sorts of plants that would be happy growing there. In designing gardens, it's also useful to understand how plants grow in communities in their natural habitat and to consider the shape, texture and colour of the plants that we put together. A lot to think about before buying your next plant!

Our next meeting will be on **Wednesday 18th January 2012, at 7.30pm** in the Village Hall when Alex Bass will speak about, **"The river Colne from source to sea".** The talk will focus on the varied history and wildlife of the river from its source to the sea.

On **15th February 2012** we will have a talk on **"The Gardener's Year", by Mr Harry Brickwood**, owner of "Orchard Cottage Garden", Rayleigh and Secretary of the Essex branch of the Hardy Plants Society.

Community News

Update on the Inter-Village Games, 30th June - 7th July, 2012

I'm delighted to report that there was a very enthusiastic response to the recent invitation to the Chignals to participate in the proposed Inter-Village Games next summer. Volunteers have put their names forward for the following activities: Badminton; Carpet Bowls; Clay Pigeon Shooting; Cricket; Equestrian – dressage; Golf; Quiz; Table Tennis; Tennis; 10K Trail Run; Tug of War; and, Volleyball.

Following a meeting of the inter-village organising committee on 7th December, I plan to get in touch with all those who signed up for the above to give you the contact details of the lead person for each sport and to let you have more information of what will be expected. Early next year, I hope we can all get together to map out what we will need to do to prepare for the Games, (including training schedules!)

The only activity that the Chignals will host is the Quiz which is likely to be held at the Village Hall on the evening of **Saturday 6th July**, subject to availability. However, we are being invited to take part in a 'torch relay'. A lightweight torch is being made and will be available to be carried through the participating villages. It is proposed that it is carried by representatives through their own villages before being handed on to the next location. On Day One, **Saturday 2nd June**, the torch would start at High Easter and travel through Good Easter before being driven to Chignal Smealy to be carried through that village and on to and through Chignal St. James.

Each Village would need to assemble its own runners (individuals or teams) and each leg might be 1/4 mile. The objective is that as many villagers, of all age groups, take part as possible so we will be seeking some volunteers to be torch bearers.

Update on Community Orchard and Allotments

In the last edition of 'Chignal News' we asked for your views on whether you'd like to have allotments and/or a community orchard in the village. To date, only two people have expressed an interest in having or sharing an allotment but there has been much more support for the creation of a community orchard that could produce fruit and nuts and provide a place for local people of all ages, (and beneficial wildlife!) to enjoy. 10 households have offered assistance to get the project off the ground and to be involved in management and promotion once it gets established. In addition, when canvassed by email and at our meeting in November, members of the Gardening Club expressed support for an orchard and several people said that they would be willing to provide expertise and/or practical help.

These are some of the specific comments received on how a community orchard could be used:

"I find the idea of having a community space where local varieties of fruit trees and fruits in danger could be grown would be an extremely valuable asset to the village. Such a space sounds fantastic especially if it could be combined with some of the ideas of memorial seats/trees, permanent gazebo, gardening classes for youngsters etc that I have heard being discussed around the village. A relaxing space such as an orchard would also prove useful for village groups such as the Reading Club, Gardening Club, Art Group, Wine Club etc to hold meetings during the summer months".

"We could celebrate the Queen's Jubilee by each child having a tree with a commemorative plaque". "I would support a community orchard and would like to donate a tree and bench as memorials to a loved one".

Given this groundswell of support, I should like to recommend at the next Parish Council meeting on 16th January 2012 that we investigate potential sites for an orchard and explore suitable funding sources. UNCONFIRMED REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 14th NOVEMBER 2011 IN THE VILLAGE HALL.

COUNTY AND BOROUGH COUNCILLORS' REPORTS

Neither County Councillor Aldridge nor Councillor Nicolette Chambers were able to attend the meeting but sent reports on the following:

Councillor Aldridge reported that the Highways Department is again being revamped with one contractor being appointed for highways maintenance. The delivery of salt to parishes has been carried out and it was emphasized that the salt is not to be used on private properties. Councillor Chambers reported that a tree planting exercise will take place shortly in Hylands Park.

SUB COMMITTEE REPORTS

PLAYING FIELDS – the coach from Broomfield Football Club's Under 8's team attended the meeting to request use of the playing field for training on Saturdays mornings for the next 3 – 4 months. It was agreed that the field could be used for this purpose with parking allowed on the field, weather permitting. Alternative parking will be discussed at the next Village Hall meeting.

VILLAGE HALL LIAISON – it was agreed to provide a donation of £500 towards the costs for upgrading the kitchen at the Village Hall.

NEWSLETTER INCL. WEBSITE – a request was made for the Newsletter to be available earlier than at present and the editor will be contacted to see if this would be possible. GRAVEL LIAISON –the next meeting will be held on 22nd November 2011.

VILLAGE WATCH – it was explained that the information included in 'Farm Watch' is not for general distribution..

HIGHWAYS – it was reported that both the stolen manhole and the broken chevron have been replaced but the finger sign to Beadles Hall is still missing. Potholes between Langleys and Ivy Cottage will be reported.

FOOTPATHS /BRIDLEWAYS - changes to the definitive map are expected shortly .

TELEPHONE BOXES - the box at Chignal St. James will be fitted with shelves as soon as possible. It was agreed not to purchase the kiosk in Chignal Smealey.

TREE WARDEN – it was explained that a Winter Tree Course is being run by the Woodland Trust. Free trees are available if a suitable place can be found for planting.

PLANNING – Decisions on both the application for amendments to the previous application at Brick Barns and a temporary change of use of agricultural building at Chignal Hall will be decided shortly.

QUEEN'S DIAMOND JUBILEE – it was agreed that children in the Parish be provided with a momento of the occasion and it was agreed that a sum of £150 be donated towards the cost. Possible ideas on the type of gift will be discussed by a small group of Councillors. INTER VILLAGE OLYMPICS

Representatives from Chignal attended a meeting on 5th October and a summary of events distributed showing progress made since the last meeting.

PURCHASE OF THE VILLAGE GREEN – it was reported that the sale of the Green is progressing.

POSSIBLE FUNDING FROM 106 AGREEMENT – it was explained that funding is available to provide an asset for the Parish as part of the North Melbourne re-development plan and ideas for possible schemes were requested.

USE OF PLAYING FIELD BY CARAVAN CLUB – a request has been received from a caravan club to use the playing field from time to time. It was agreed that the use of the field be limited to 15/20 caravans, three times each year. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next meeting will be held in the Village Hall at 7.30 p.m. on Monday 16th January 2012, a week later than was originally arranged.


The Village Carol service is being hosted by Chignal United Reform Church on Sunday 18th December at 3 p.m.
