Fete

We had good weather for the Garden Fete and Vintage Rally in June. Held at Woodhall in Chignal Smealey the event was very well attended by both exhibitors and visitors, resulting in £2,500 towards village hall maintenance and refurbishments.

On display were vintage cars, bikes, commercial vehicles, farm machinery and tractors, toys, static engines, lawn mowers and dairy bygones, as well as the street organ that kept us entertained all day. Many of the exhibitors belong to the Farm Machinery Preservation Society, and all of them are presented with brass plaques that are put on show with their exhibits.

A blacksmith and a glass artist provided demonstrations while three alpacas and several rabbits entertained us just by being themselves. The games went down well with the children (and some of the grown ups); stalls included cakes, plants, bric a brac, books and tombola as well as sales of honey and a cake raffle. An art exhibition was held in the conservatory, and three hundred cream teas were enjoyed by appreciative visitors.

Wine Club

A welcome return to Mike Richards, who gave us a tour of New Zealand Wines. New Zealand produces 0.5% of the global wine production however approximately one third of all New Zealand wines are exported to the UK, this explains why they are regulars on our shelves. Mike gave us a tour of the North and South Islands introducing us to the wine makers rather than the wines.

Matt Thomson – the International Wine Winner (NZ) 2009 – an up and coming name to look out for, Kim Crawford – a virtual wine maker and previous International Winemaker 2 years running in the 1990's, Wild Earth (Michelle Richardson) - only the third year in production having planted vines in Central Otago in 2001, through to Te Mata Awatea from the oldest New Zealand wine estate in Hawkes Bay which has been producing wines since 1896. This is causing some disruption on the roads, but hopefully once the work is done the power supply should be more reliable and not cause low voltage problems - which is, I believe, the reason the work is being done.

The cases of swine flu are continuing to increase and sadly there has now been a death of an individual in Essex who did not have underlying health problems. If you should feel ill there is a self diagnostic tool on the NHS website: www.nhs.uk or www.direct.gov.uk/swineflu, which you or your families can use to decide if you have swine flu and what actions to take if you become ill. I am sure that everyone will rally round and help each other if there is a need.

Lost Your Job?

- *Losing your job is a shock
- *You may pretend it hasn't happened
- *Tell your family and friends
- *It's not your fault
- *You have a future

1. Tell your family and friends what has happened and how you feel. They care about you and will listen
2. Ask your employer about other jobs in the organisation. Ask for time to look for jobs outside the organisation, while you are working your notice. Ask about redundancy payments. Ask about your pension rights. Make sure you get your P45 from your employer. Get contact details from friends at work to keep in contact with them. VISIT www.dti.gov.uk/employment/redundancy
3. Contact Jobcentre Plus: 0845 602 3805 and register. Don't delay; it could affect your income. Registration and applying for Job Seekers Allowance is now done on the phone. Book an appointment with a Personal Advisor at your local Jobcentre Plus office to discuss finding a new job, training and other benefits. Take your P45 and two recent payslips to your first interview.
4. If you have redundancy pay, check with your Personal Advisor at Jobcentre Plus before you spend it. This may affect your right to benefit.
5. Seek good financial advice. Do not use the services of door to door adviser. They charge high interest rates. Try your local Credit Union instead.
6. Watch your spending. Review any standing orders, HP agreements, or finance contracts on purchases. If you are worried about meeting payments seek help from your local Citizens Advice Bureau, or the Consumer Credit Counselling Service – Freephone 0800 138 1111 or visit www.cccs.co.uk or www.nationaldebtline.co.uk or Christians against Poverty at www.capov.org
7. If you rent a flat or a house; you may now be entitled to a rent allowance, or housing benefit, or a rebate on your

council tax bill. Check with your local council. If you have a mortgage, tell your Building Society or lender, and ask if they can reduce your mortgage. Don't use any redundancy money to pay off the mortgage before you have spoken to your Personal Advisor at Jobcentre Plus.

8. Keep in touch with your own Trade Union. They can offer advice and support. If you are not a union member, the secretary of your local Trades Council may be able to help.
9. Many jobs come through friends and relatives. So tell everyone you know that you are looking! Look at Jobcentre Plus, visit the local library, search the newspapers, and register with agencies.
10. Build a new routine every day and every week that allows you time off. As well as job-seeking, what about a course at the local college, or helping at a local charity or working an allotment with a few friends, or taking up a hobby?

Sometimes you may feel alone – but your family and friends care about you, and others are there to help and advise. DON'T BE AFRAID TO ASK. YOU ARE WORTH IT!!

UNCONFIRMED REPORT OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF CHIGNAL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 11th MAY 2009 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Chris Philpot was re-elected as Chairman and Martyn Towns re-elected as Vice-Chairman

PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

A parishioner emphasized the need for a 40 mph speed limit in Chignal St. James and the Chairman explained that speeding in the Parish is an ongoing problem but the situation will be monitored for future reference.

Concern was expressed that potholes in the Parish are getting steadily worse. The Highways Department has confirmed that work will be carried out later in the year. Questions were asked on the current situation with the planning application for the extraction of gravel and formation of a reservoir opposite the Village Hall. It was explained that the report for committee has still to be finalised and will not be completed in time for the May Committee.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES OF THE PARISH MEETING ON 9th MARCH 2009

The problems with flooding at Langley's Corner have been resolved and thanks were expressed for the work done to clear the problem.

It was confirmed that Chignal will not be entering the Best Kept Village and Churchyard Competitions.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman thanked all the volunteers who turned out for the 'Litter Pick' on 21st March.

The Chairman attended the AGM of the VDS Committee and thanked the Committee for all the progress it had made.

SUB COMMITTEE REPORTS

Councillors were elected en bloc to continue with their existing responsibilities

PLAYING FIELDS - the grass has been cut and the benches stained with a preservative.

VILLAGE HALL LIAISON – it was reported that a further grant of £10,000 has been received from the Lottery Fund for works to be carried out to improve the car park.

NEWSLETTER INCL. WEBSITE – assistance was offered to help ensure an earlier distribution.

GRAVEL LIAISON – the next liaison meeting will be held on 14th July. It was reported that the resurfacing to Pengymill Lane and work to the culvert have not been carried out and the Clerk was requested to write to Lafarge asking when remedial work is expected to commence.

FOOTPATHS /BRIDLEWAYS – notification has been received from ECC that money is available for any repair work necessary to bridleways.

It was reported that ECC are proposing to divert parts of Footpaths 7 and 10 and notification of the proposals is expected shortly.

The Planning Department will be contacted regarding the legality of the stile erected on the Green.

VDS – it was reported that a new draft has been submitted to the Borough Council and a public consultation will take place from 10 – 12 noon on Saturday 27th June 2009.

COUNTY AND BOROUGH COUNCILLORS REPORTS

County Councillor Aldridge reported that the proposal for ECC to act as a bank providing funding for viable small businesses is progressing. He explained that the Highways Department is trying to fill potholes throughout Essex and a reference number is available through the website for reporting problems.

Councillor Chambers reported that her last surgery on 4th April had been well attended and she is now a cabinet member for Corporate Service so will no longer serve on the Planning Committee.

Maple View – garage and conservatory – the application has been withdrawn

The Old Rectory – extensions – observation will be sent to the Borough Council

It was reported that the request for the telephone box near the Green to be given 'listed building' status has been refused.
