Moths in the Garden by Moira Tarrant

Most people would be very surprised by the staggering number of insects that probably visit their garden. An excellent example of this diversity is moths. We all know about protecting crops and clothes from pest species and see the occasional visitor to lighted windows and porch lights. But it might come as a surprise to learn that since I started to study the moths that visit my garden 17 years ago, I have identified and recorded over 520 different species. These range from the huge and exotic-looking Hawk Moths down to micro-moths like the Diamond-backed which, although only a couple of millimetres long, arrives like the swallows from the Mediterranean in spring. My garden is average size and boasts no special features apart from a small pond. Of greater significance in terms of moth numbers are nearby mature oak and ash trees as well a good number of common hedgerow trees.

It is often said that butterflies are beautiful whereas moths are dull brown little things. In my experience, the vibrant pinks and greens of a freshly emerged Elephant Hawk-moth rivals anything that butterflies can offer. Moths are usually coloured either to camouflage or to confuse. It is astonishing how successfully the almost artificial looking jade-green and black Merveille du Jour can disappear when sitting on a lichen-covered tree-trunk. And the bright red bars on the Cinnabar and striking "eyes" on an Eyed Hawk-moth both warn off would-be predators.

To study moths an overnight light-trap is usually used. The bright light emitted attracts moths which are funnelled safely past the light into the cool, dark interior of the trap where they quickly settle. Old egg boxes make a good surface as the rough texture gives their feet a good grip. Next morning they can be identified and counted and then released in a way which keeps them from becoming an easy target for birds. Records are sent to become part of the Essex database of moth species and distribution. I also contribute to the Garden Moth Scheme - a nationwide group which systematically records occurrence of a list of commoner species. It is data like this which, over the years, enables us to measure the health of wildlife in our countryside. Moths, after all, are a pretty vital part of the food chain, sustaining bats and thousands of birds and their chicks as well as some mammals.

Concern was expressed that travellers, evicted from a site in Basildon, could move into the area and anything suspicious should be reported to the police as soon as possible.

An incident with cattle escaping from Brittons Hall Farm on to private property and the highway has been investigated.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman welcomed the three new Councillors and thanked the three retiring members for their dedication and hard work. SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS

PLAYING FIELDS – two cuts to the grass have been carried out.

VILLAGE HALL LIAISON – improvements to the kitchen area will be discussed at the next meeting.

NEWSLETTER INCL. WEBSITE -

More information for the website would be appreciated.

GRAVEL LIAISON – it was reported that preventative noise screening bunds are being raised to the south of the cell. A local resident has complained at the odour escaping from the infill and the matter has now been resolved. A 24 hour odour hotline has been set up to deal with future problems tel. no. 0800 80 70 60. A liaison meeting was held on 4th May when it was announced that the Cemex Plant has now been totally removed with only the Electricity Plant still in place. A low level restoration is proposed which will retain the standing. The steep banks to the west of the site will be regraded to ensure future stability.

HIGHWAYS – no problems were reported but parishioners should be encouraged to contact ECC direct if problems do arise.

FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS – some bridleways have been regrassed.

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Farming Life by Chris Philpot

1st Place in the Chelmsford and Hanningfield Agricultural Society Farms Competition! It's been eleven years since we last won but I have just heard that Boyton Hall Farm has done it again.

Every year all the farms in the Borough have the chance to enter this competition. Two judges, from out of the area, visit and assess the farms for the quality of their growing crops, the environmental and conservation work undertaken, management and general impression. As I mentioned last time I wrote an article, staff are crucial to the success of any business and they must be congratulated for their input on this occasion.

We certainly take pride in everything we do here and it is rewarding occasionally to get a 'pat on the back' when so often one gets the impression from those outside the rural community that everything we do is wrong or bad.

Many people have mentioned to me recently the lack of rain recently; I currently estimate we will be harvesting the crops this year two weeks earlier than ever before. Having water collected from the River Can in the winter and stored in reservoirs has helped us keep some crops alive for longer – you may have noticed as you have travelled around the village recently, irrigation taking place on beans, peas and wheat as well as our potatoes. This is also a first – desperate times call for desperate measures! We are forecasting a 50% reduction in yield on some of the wheat crops we have been unable to irrigate. I am afraid the recent rains have, we believe, come too late for some crops.

We have been busy recently constructing our new potato store and maintaining the machinery ready for the fast approaching harvest. Unfortunately management time has been wasted investigating suspicious vehicles (we have had reason to call Essex Police three times in the last week), neighbour disputes (where I am afraid people think they can extend their garden on to the farm – "what does it matter to you" being the normal first comment), two thefts and clearing up dumped household rubbish – great! However, I must say how grateful we are for the phone calls received from the locals, at any time, informing us of suspicious activity in the area. Crime, especially on farms and in rural areas, is increasing and the best form of defence is when the community works together to fight it. If you are not a member of the local Neighbourhood Watch I strongly suggest you join up, all we need is your email address.

We are now looking forward to the harvest and a busy summer – Happy Holidays!
